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GHSA STUDENT/PARENT CONCUSSION AWARENESS FORM

DANGERS OF CONCUSSIONS: Concussions at all levels of sports have received a great deal of attention and a state law has been passed to address this issue. Adolescent athletes are particularly vulnerable to the effects of concussion. Once considered little more than a minor "ding" to the head, it is now understood that a concussion has the potential to result in death, or changes in brain function (either short-term or long-term). A concussion is a brain injury that results in a temporary disruption of normal brain function. A concussion occurs when the brain is violently rocked back and forth or twisted inside the skull as a result of a blow to the head or body. Continued participation in any sport following a concussion can lead to worsening concussion symptoms, as well as increased risk for further injury to the brain, and even death. Player and parental education in this area is crucial – that is the reason for this document. Refer to it regularly. This form must be signed by a parent or guardian of each student who wishes to participate in GHSA athletics. One copy needs to be returned to the school, and one retained at home.

COMMON SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS OF CONCUSSION: Headache, dizziness, poor balance, moves clumsily, reduced energy level/tiredness • Nausea or vomiting • Blurred vision, sensitivity to light and sounds • Fogginess of memory, difficulty concentrating, slowed thought processes, confused about surroundings or game assignments • Unexplained changes in behavior and personality • Loss of consciousness (NOTE: This does not occur in all concussion episodes.)

BY-LAW 2.68: GHSA CONCUSSION POLICY: In accordance with Georgia law and national playing rules published by the National Federation of State High School Associations, any athlete who exhibits signs, symptoms, or behaviors consistent with a concussion shall be immediately removed from the practice or contest and shall not return to play until an appropriate health care professional has determined that no concussion has occurred. (NOTE: An appropriate health care professional may include a licensed physician (MD/DO) or another licensed individual under the supervision of a licensed physician, such as a nurse practitioner, physician assistant, or certified athletic trainer who has received training in concussion evaluation and management. No athlete is allowed to return to a game or a practice on the same day that a concussion (a) has been diagnosed, OR (b) cannot be ruled out. b) Any athlete diagnosed with a concussion shall be cleared medically by an appropriate health care professional prior to resuming participation in any future practice or contest. The formulation of a gradual return to play protocol shall be a part of the medical clearance. By signing this concussion form, I give Jackson County High School permission to transfer this concussion form to the other sports that my child may play. I am aware of the dangers of concussion and this signed concussion form will represent myself and my child during the 2022-2023 school year. This form will be stored with the athletic physical form and other accompanying forms required by the School System. IMPACT TESTING

lackson County Schools are currently implementing an innovative program for our high school student-athletes. This program will assist our team physicians/athletic trainers in evaluating and reating head injuries (e.g., concussion). In order to better manage concussions sustained by our student-athletes, we have acquired a software tool called ImPACT (Immediate Post Concussion Assessment and Cognitive Testing). ImPACT is a computerized exam utilized in many professional, collegiate, and high school sports programs across the country to successfully diagnose and manage concussions. If an athlete is believed to have suffered a head injury during competition, ImPACT is used to help determine the severity of head injury and when the injury has fully healed.

The computerized exam is given to athletes before beginning contact sport practice or competition. This non-invasive test is set up in "video-game" type format and takes about 15-20 minutes to complete. It is simple, and actually many athletes enjoy the challenge of taking the test. Essentially, the ImPACT test is a preseason physical of the brain. It tracks information such as memory, reaction time, speed, and concentration. It, however, is not an IQ test.

If a concussion is suspected, the athlete will be required to retake the test. Both the preseason and post-injury test data is given to a local doctor or, to help evaluate the injury. The information gathered can also be shared with your family doctor. The test data will enable these health professionals to determine when return- to-play is appropriate and safe for the injured athlete. If an injury of this nature occurs to your child, you will be promptly contacted with all the details.

We wish to stress that the ImPACT testing procedures are non-invasive, and they pose no risks to your student- athlete. We are excited to implement this program given that it provides us the best available information for managing concussions and preventing potential brain damage that can occur with multiple concussions. The Jackson County School administration, coaching, and athletic training staff are striving to keep your child's health and safety at the forefront of the student athletic experience.

ALTERNATIVE TRANSPORTATION LIABILITY RELEASE

JCSS/Jackson County High School is not always able to provide transportation for students to off campus extracurricular school activities. In cases when transportation is not provided by JCSS/Jackson County High School, as in the use of a school bus or charter bus, it is the responsibility of the student's parents/guardian to secure their student's attendance at such activities. JCSS, its local schools, officers, employees or agents shall not be responsible for any injury or loss arising out of a student's transportation to or from the off campus activity when such transportation is provided by parents, student, staff or any other party.

ATHLETIC CODE OF CONDUCT

The Jackson County School System Athletic Departments have adopted these guidelines to support our student-athletes as they choose to participate in our athletic program. This form must be signed and returned each school year and be on file in the Athletic Office to try out or participate. This form applies to all student-athletes from the start of fall sports practices until the end of the spring competitive seasons including those days that school is not in session. The Athletic Handbook outlines this and all other policies for which a student-athlete is responsible. The Athletic Department recommends that you obtain and read a copy of the handbook by downloading it from your school website or pick up a copy in the Athletic Office at your school.

Consequences for failing to adhere to Policies and Expectations for the Jackson County Student-Athlete on this form or in the local school Athletics Handbook could result in disciplinary action as determined by the head coach and/or athletic director, which may include but not be limited to loss of varsity letter for that season, suspension, or dismissal from the team. There is no statute of limitations on violations of the Code of Conduct.

Note: If an underclassman is not participating in athletics when consequences for a violation of this document or the athletic handbook are prescribed, the penalties will be applied to his or her next competitive season. Should a senior be found in violation, any of the above mentioned consequences may be applied retroactively.

Student/Parent Sudden Cardiac Arrest Awareness Form

1: Learn the Early Warning Signs

If you or your child has had one or more of these signs, see your primary care physician:

- · Fainting suddenly and without warning, especially during exercise or in response to loud sounds like doorbells, alarm clocks or ringing phones
- Unusual chest pain or shortness of breath during exercise
- ullet Family members who had sudden, unexplained and unexpected death before age 50
- Family members who have been diagnosed with a condition that can cause sudden cardiac death, such as hypertrophic cardiomyopathy (HCM) or Long QT syndrome
- A seizure suddenly and without warning, especially during exercise or in response to loud sounds like doorbells, alarm clocks or ringing phones

2: Learn to Recognize Sudden Cardiac Arrest

If you see someone collapse, assume he has experienced sudden cardiac arrest and respond quickly. This victim will be unresponsive, gasping or not breathing normally, and may have some erking (Seizure like activity). Send for help and start CPR. You cannot hurt him.

3: Learn Hands-Only CPR

Effective CPR saves lives by circulating blood to the brain and other vital organs until rescue teams arrive. It is one of the most important life skills you can learn - and it's easier than ever.

- Call 911 (or ask bystanders to call 911 and get an AED)
- Push hard and fast in the center of the chest. Kneel at the victim's side, place your hands on the lower half of the breastbone, one on top of the other, elbows straight and locked. Push down 2 inches, then up 2 inches, at a rate of 100 times/minute, to the beat of the song "Stayin' Alive."
- If an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) is available, open it and follow the voice prompts. It will lead you step-by- step through the process, and will never shock a victim that does not need a shock.

By signing the waiver for the sudden cardiac arrest form, I give Jackson County High School permission to transfer this sudden cardiac arrest form to the other sports that my child may play. I am aware of the dangers of sudden cardiac arrest and this signed sudden cardiac arrest form will represent myself and my child during the 2022-2023 school year. This form will be stored with the athletic physical form and other accompanying forms required by the Jackson County School System.
