#### WORKING WITH YOUR SCHOOL BOARD

<u>WELCOME</u> to another Twin Falls School District Board of Trustees Meeting. You are encouraged to attend all regular board meetings.

We are proud of our school system and the board members are dedicated to the continued improvement of the Twin Falls Schools.

We understand that from time to time patrons of school districts have concerns and feel a need to bring those concerns to the attention of the school or teachers. In order to maintain continuity and best resolve these concerns, we recommend to our patrons the following procedures:

- 1. The first and most effective step is to take the concern to the staff member who is closest to the problem. (In many cases this will be the teacher, coach, etc.) We have found that most problems are resolved at this level.
- 2. If there is still a concern on the matter, we then recommend that the concern be brought to the attention of the Principal. We have found that unresolved concerns from item #1 are usually resolved satisfactorily by the building administrator.
- 3. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Director of Elementary Programs or Director of Secondary Programs.
- 4. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Superintendent of Schools. Difficult concerns can usually be resolved.
- 5. However, if the patron still feels the concern has not been properly resolved he/she may use the right of appeal to the Board of Trustees. This is done by calling or writing to the Superintendent and asking for the item to be placed on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled board meeting.
- 6. If you desire to address the board, we would like you to be as comfortable as possible. As a board we hold public meetings which are not public forums and therefore have rules which are necessary for the benefit of all. The following guidelines will assist you as you present your information to the board.
  - A. Prepare your thoughts ahead of time. Usually a brief written outline handed to each board member helps the board follow your presentation. This outline would also give them something upon which to make notes as you speak.
  - B. If a group is involved, select one individual to be your spokesperson. He/she can then guide the presentation with the board and help the board chairman in directing questions to the group.
  - C. Plan your presentation to be as brief as possible. This should include a question/answer period. If more time is needed it is best to give a complete written presentation to the board for their future study. If you give more than five to six minutes of testimony, time restraints will make it difficult for the board to respond that same evening.
  - D. Usually the board will direct the administration to help resolve the concerns and ask for a report back to the board at a later date. However, please remember a solution may take time to be resolved.

We are eager to have our patrons and school staff working together for the improvement of education in the Twin Falls Schools.

- 1. Building Goals Goal 1 improve every cohort's proficiency on the IRI from the 2017-2018 performance and show adequate growth toward this goal throughout the year. Plan for Goal 1 K-3 IRI Each grade level will intervene at the highest leverage skill students are lacking and go forward. They will use iStation data to identify these areas. All intervention instruction will be thoroughly planned and taught using istation lesson plans and other programs like SIPPS, and Wonders. Goal 2 improve every cohort's proficiency on the ELA and Math ISAT from the 2017-2018 performance. Plan for Goal 2 ELA Grades 3-5 will utilize iStation data to identify intervention needs. They will first intervene with the highest leverage skill students are lacking and go forward. All intervention instruction will be thoroughly planned and taught using istation lesson plans and other programs like SIPPS, and Wonders. Math teachers will continue focusing their instruction on helping students gain not only procedural fluency but conceptual understanding and mathematical reasoning skills as well through the utilization of Number Corners.
- 2. Growth Toward Goals Goal 1 We are hoping to see an increase an increase in IRI scores but understand that IRI scores compared to this year will be different due to the change off assessment. We are focusing on growth from Fall scores to the present and have made significant growth on the ISIPP (IRI assessment). Last years growth was very positive in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade, 2<sup>nd</sup> grade, and Kindergarten. Goal 2 Cohort growth on the ISAT was much better in ELA than Math particularly in 5<sup>th</sup> grade.
- 3. Growth Indicators IRI and ISAT Data
- 4. Instructional Focus/Priorities We have teachers piloting the Write Tools program which helps improve student writing. We continue with a focus on improving Tier 1 Math and Reading Instruction. In grades 3-5 Special Education students receive grade level instruction in Reading with support from para-educators in their general education classroom.
- 5. School Improvement Initiatives Oregon Trail continues in the Leader In Me process. Through this process we are looking to increase trust, accountability, and overall school performance. We are looking forward to Literacy Professional Development that is upcoming in order to make improvements based on feedback from the Literacy Audit that was recently conducted.
- 6. Intervention and Extension We utilize the Walk to Intervention method for reading intervention at all grade levels. In grades K-2 Special Education, ELL, and Title I teachers work with their specifically serviced students alongside students with similar needs. In grades 3-5, special education students receive their intervention with the special education teachers in a pull-out setting because they are receiving core instruction in the general education setting.
- 7. Leadership Premium Usage Leadership premiums are utilized for afterschool tutoring, social media leadership, honor choir, and other afterschool activities including Bingo for Books leadership and Spelling Bee Leadership.
- 8. Challenges 1. We have 128 ELL students and 77 IEP/504 Students. This translates to 34% of our population demonstrate identifiable high needs. 2. We struggle with teacher workload commitments when there are not guest teachers. While it has greatly improved, we fear that teachers are growing weary of having the extra students. 3. We have several students with considerable behavior issues that have required quick thinking teamwork to find realistic solutions.
- 9. Bright Spots 1. While we have many students with high needs, we get to enjoy the success that comes from student growth. This student growth may not correlate with grade level proficiency, but we enjoy being able to see kids grow. 2. Year 2 of Leader In Me implementation. Our Leadership Day was a tremendous success. Our action teams are branching out and making their marks on the school. 3. Teacher retention. All resignations last year were due to retirement or promotion.

#### 1. Building Goals:

Goal #1 On the spring 2019 ISIP test, 83% of Kindergarten students will be at or above the state benchmark. 64% of first grade students will be at or above the state benchmark. 70% of second grade students will be at or above the state benchmark. 72% of third grade students will be at or above the state benchmark.

Goal #2 The percent of students scoring proficient or advanced on the ELA and Math ISAT will increase a minimum of 2% from Spring 2018 to Spring 2019 while staying at or above the state and district average.

Goal #3 75% of students with disabilities in 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grades will increase 20 points on the ELA and Math ISAT test. 75% of 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students with disabilities will increase 20 points on their reading ISIP test.

#### 2. Growth towards Goals

We continue to track every at risk student not at grade level on the ISIP, Istations or ISAT interim assessments. The Title 1 team consists of four Title 1 paras, a literacy para and a Title 1 teacher. Our building is hosting after school tutoring twice a week through leadership premiums. Our teachers currently use Imagine Learning with ELL students, ISIP's, Istation Math and Reading, and MobyMax interventions for reading, math and language to improve ISIP's/ISAT scores and to drive instruction.

#### 4. Instructional Focus/Priorities

- ❖ ISIP Maintain at above or at state/district level of performance
- ❖ ISAT We are reviewing the interim assessments to track the students that are still below grade level and to assist them in improving. Every student basic or below, during the 2017-18 school year, will have a plan on Mileposts. Teachers are expected to maintain or improve the number of students that are proficient or advanced. Each teacher in 3<sup>rd</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup> grade has a goal as to how many students need to be proficient or above on the ELA and Math ISAT spring tests.
- ❖ We will use SpEd, ELL, Title 1 interventions, after school tutoring, Imagine Learning, TTM math, Istation Math and Reading as well as MobyMax.
- All Milepost plans are reviewed and monitored by the building administrator. All special education teachers work on their student's plans and all student plans are reviewed by the administrator, instructional coach and our capacity builder Tammy Young. All teachers will have plans reviewed by our Milepost coordinator and myself for correct interventions, probes, baseline data and goals. If the plans need to be revised, I get with the individual staff member during teaming meetings with the help from our Instructional Coach.

#### 5. School Improvement Initiatives

- ❖ I meet bimonthly with all grade level teams to discuss last year's students/scores and current students/scores. Each student will know their last year's scores, and what score they need to be proficient at their current grade.
- Collect and review ISAT, ISIP and Istation's data and compile it for the  $K 5^{th}$  grade teachers.
- ❖ I meet with Title 1 team/teacher to tighten up the Title 1 schedule, intervention process, data collection and Milepost plan review and revisions.
- Coordinate test preparation and ISAT progress of every classroom 3<sup>rd</sup> 5<sup>th</sup> with the help of our computer lab aid, instructional coach and vice principal. We will coordinate the ISIP testing with the Title 1 teacher to track and process grade level results as they become available.
- Our instruction coach and I meet with building staff at bi-monthly teaming meetings to review every Milepost plan and make sure it is being monitored, and the data is being entered timely and accurately.

#### 6. Interventions and Extensions

Our teachers implement ability grouping for reading and math skills based on data from the classroom, chapter and unit testing, ISIP, ISAT interim and Istations. The struggling readers work within the WonderWorks Program, SIPPS and Bridges interventions strategies for struggling math students. Our building extension activities include TTM math, Istation math and reading, MobyMax, and Imagine Learning for our ELL students. All intervention programs are designed to help the students get to a level higher than they are working within the classroom.

## 7. Leadership Premium Usage

STEAM/Robotics – 3 teachers

Tutoring – 9 teachers with afterschool programs approximately 112 students depending on the needs/intervention.

#### 8. Challenges

One challenge has been our declining student population. We currently have 424 students and a year ago we were at 477. During the 2015-16 school year we had 789 students. We are striving to meet the AYP challenge of our 3<sup>rd</sup> - 5<sup>th</sup> grade general education students as well as our struggling special education students. Our building goal is to be at or above the district and state averages on ISIP, ISAT math and ELA. We have challenging students on IEP's (high needs and emotionally disturbed) and 504 plans; thus posing an increased challenge to meet AYP requirements and behavior challenges to our Special Education staff.

## 9. Bright Spots

Morningside has been actively working to increase technology within the classrooms. We purchased 10 new PC's to continue replacing our Title 1 classroom along with 20 Chromebooks and 10 iPads. We also purchased this fall two carts for a total of 60 Chromebooks, operating systems and headphones for our general education classrooms. We currently have only have two classrooms without a Chromebook cart. Morningside's 2017-18 K-3 IRI scores were higher or near the district and state percentages in 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> 1<sup>st</sup> and kindergarten. Our 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade math and ELA ISAT scores were better than the state and local averages. Our 5<sup>th</sup> grade students grew the highest in the district on ISAT math and ELA. Our PTA is actively trying to help as much as possible with parent support within the classrooms to collect data, Pancakes with Parents, Title 1 math and reading nights, coordinate and organize a school wide spelling bee fundraiser. The PTA has funded several large projects at Morningside including the library main desk remodel, bus trips to Boise for 4<sup>th</sup> grade and skiing for 5<sup>th</sup> grade, student fees at JIVE performances, and help with providing turkey diners at Thanksgiving and Christmas gifts to our needy families. Our PTA also provides several grants to teachers who applied for classroom improvements.
