#### WORKING WITH YOUR SCHOOL BOARD

<u>WELCOME</u> to another Twin Falls School District Board of Trustees Meeting. You are encouraged to attend all regular board meetings.

We are proud of our school system and the board members are dedicated to the continued improvement of the Twin Falls Schools.

We understand that from time to time patrons of school districts have concerns and feel a need to bring those concerns to the attention of the school or teachers. In order to maintain continuity and best resolve these concerns, we recommend to our patrons the following procedures:

- 1. The first and most effective step is to take the concern to the staff member who is closest to the problem. (In many cases this will be the teacher, coach, etc.) We have found that most problems are resolved at this level.
- 2. If there is still a concern on the matter, we then recommend that the concern be brought to the attention of the Principal. We have found that unresolved concerns from item #1 are usually resolved satisfactorily by the building administrator.
- 3. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Director of Elementary Programs or Director of Secondary Programs.
- 4. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Superintendent of Schools. Difficult concerns can usually be resolved.
- 5. However, if the patron still feels the concern has not been properly resolved he/she may use the right of appeal to the Board of Trustees. This is done by calling or writing to the Superintendent and asking for the item to be placed on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled board meeting.
- 6. If you desire to address the board, we would like you to be as comfortable as possible. As a board we hold public meetings which are not public forums and therefore have rules which are necessary for the benefit of all. The following guidelines will assist you as you present your information to the board.
  - A. Prepare your thoughts ahead of time. Usually a brief written outline handed to each board member helps the board follow your presentation. This outline would also give them something upon which to make notes as you speak.
  - B. If a group is involved, select one individual to be your spokesperson. He/she can then guide the presentation with the board and help the board chairman in directing questions to the group.
  - C. Plan your presentation to be as brief as possible. This should include a question/answer period. If more time is needed it is best to give a complete written presentation to the board for their future study. If you give more than five to six minutes of testimony, time restraints will make it difficult for the board to respond that same evening.
  - D. Usually the board will direct the administration to help resolve the concerns and ask for a report back to the board at a later date. However, please remember a solution may take time to be resolved.

We are eager to have our patrons and school staff working together for the improvement of education in the Twin Falls Schools.

- <u>I.</u> <u>Call to Order</u> The Board of Trustees of School District No. 411, Twin Falls County, State of Idaho, met in its regular monthly meeting virtually in a Zoom online meeting platform (accessible by the public), Twin Falls, Idaho, at the hour of 7:00 p.m., on Monday, July 13, 2020. The following trustees were present: Chairman, Bryan Matsuoka; Trustees, Heidi Casdorph, Jonathan Lord, and Jayson Lloyd. There were also present Superintendent of Schools, Brady D. Dickinson; Board Clerk, Michelle Lucas; Associate Superintendent, Bill Brulotte; as well as directors, interested patrons, employees, and the news media. Vice Chairman, Paul McClintock was unable to attend.
- II. Approval of Agenda (Additions and Deletions) –Chairman Matsuoka asked if there were any additions or deletions to the agenda. There was a need to amend the agenda to make sure the 2020-2021 Budget and 2019-2020 Amended Budget Hearing took place at 7:10 p.m. Trustee Lord moved to approve the agenda with the amendment to move items VIII. A. 4 and 5 to VIII. A. 1 and 2 as recommended by Superintendent Dickinson to meet the published time for the 2020-2021 budget hearing and the amended 2019-2020 budget hearing. Trustee Lloyd seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.
- III. Pledge of Allegiance The Board of Trustees stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.
- IV. Unscheduled Delegations (Audience to Address the Board) There were none.
- V. Consent Calendar Trustee Lloyd moved to approve the consent calendar which included: minutes from June 8, 17, and 30, 2020 meetings; board financial reports; building financial reports; accounts payable and payroll; contracts for private service providers (PSP)/consultants/other: Explore Learning-Gizmos Science; Edmentum; Istation-Reading; Istation-Math; City of Twin Falls for SRO's; South Central Public Health; and Vector Solutions (x2); new teacher contracts: Dominik Unger, Rachel Hardy, and John Shipley; certified retirement for Catherine Turpin; new classified employees: Nancy Larimer, Christine McClain, and Amy Harris; classified transfer Rita McDonald; classified retirement from Kaylene Loveday; classified resignation from Jazmin Sedano; extracurricular employees: Ashley Argyle and Amber Irwin; and extra-curricular resignations from Kiersten Williams, Leah Brown (district department head/PE/health, Cindy Oneida, and Chris Robbins. Motion was seconded by Trustee Lord. Motion passed unanimously.

#### VIII. Budget & Finance A. Information Items:

- 1. The Board reviewed the canned foods, frozen meats, products, non-food items, and equipment bid recommendations for August 10, 2020 through January 25, 2021. Bids recommended are: Nicholas & Company \$361,866.65 (weekly deliveries for half the year); \$4,951.04 to Nicholas & Company; \$2,560.86 to Shamrock Foods; \$12,262.50 to Gem State Paper & Supply; \$10,946.70 to Northwest Distribution, and \$12,441.07 to Sysco Idaho Inc. for a total request of \$405,028.82.
- 2. The Board reviewed the Classified, Administrators, and Classified Supervisors Salary Schedules which show the freeze placed on school budgets by Governor Brad Little. This item is also listed for action this evening because it's a time sensitive matter.
- 3. 2020-2021 Budget Hearing: Chairman Matsuoka called the 2020-2021 Budget Hearing, pursuant to Section 33-801, Idaho Code, to order at 7:11 p.m. which was properly noticed/published pursuant to Section 33-402, Idaho Code. Director of Fiscal Affairs, Bob Seaman presented an overview of the 2020-2021 proposed budget, listing General M&O Fund at \$61,226,006 (revenues and expenditures) and All Other Funds at \$32,530,336 (revenues and expenditures) which showed a few minor changes that came in last minute, after publication. He reviewed with the Board, in detail, the minor adjustments. Mr. Seaman commented that the original planned budget was going to be \$64 million dollars and this budget shows the governor's 5% holdback for a \$61 million dollar budget, which he noted is the same as the budget from 2018-2019 school year. He also noted that the CARES Act funds from the State is enough to cover the shortage in Federal Programs. Superintendent Dickinson shared the timeline for approving the budget and recommended approval of the amended 2020-2021 budget as presented tonight. Chairman Matsuoka asked if there were any patrons wanting to testify in regards to the 2020-2021 budget. Chairman Matsuoka opened for public comment: There were no public comments from patrons, community members or employees
- 4. **2019-2020** Amended Budget Hearing: Chairman Matsuoka called the 2019-2020 Amended Budget Hearing pursuant to Section 33-801, Idaho Code, to order which was properly noticed/published pursuant to Section 33-402, Idaho Code. Director of Fiscal Affairs, Bob Seaman shared the 2019-2020 amended budget and addressed the trustee's questions. Mr. Seaman recommended approval of the 2019-2020 Amended Budget as presented, which recognized the 1% state holdback, with the minor amendments he outlined thoroughly this evening; amended General M&O funds totaling \$62,817,920 and All Other Funds totaling \$44,766,731. There were no public comments or questions on the amended 2019-2020 budget.

5. Eric Heringer, managing director of Piper Sandler, Idaho office updated the Board and discussed refinance options to save the district and tax payers' money long term. He presented a historic look at the bond and other district levies since 2006. Mr. Heringer shared that their goal, along with Twin Falls School District administration, is to maintain the bond and plant facilities levy at a level rate. The District's market value has increased situationally over the past 4 years. Preliminary market value for fiscal year 2021 indicate another 6.49% growth which would result in over \$4.7 billion of taxable market value. The District's 20-year compound growth rate is 6.05%. Mr. Heringer shared a market value update, levy plan update an annual savings analysis, refunding considerations, and interest rates, then stood for questions from the Board. A resolution to refinance the existing bond funds will return August 10, 2020 for Board consideration.

#### VIII. Budget & Finance B. Action Items:

- 1. Trustee Lloyd moved to approve the bid requests for canned foods, frozen meats, products, non-food items, and equipment for \$405,028.82 as submitted. Trustee Lord seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.
- 2. Trustee Lloyd moved to approve the 2020-2021 Classified, Administrators, and Classified Supervisors salary schedules as submitted. Trustee Lord seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.
- 3. Chairman Matsuoka called for a motion for the 2020-2021 Budget as amended. Trustee Lord moved to approve the 2020-2021 Proposed Budget with the minor amendments as presented by Mr. Seaman. Trustee Lloyd seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously
- 4. Chairman Matsuoka called for a motion for the 2019-2020 Amended Budget. Trustee Lord moved to approve the 2019-2020 Amended Budget with the minor amendments as presented by Mr. Seaman. Trustee Lloyd seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

These are first readings and will return next month for action.
- 2. Director of Human Resources, Shannon Swafford shared a new job description for a district educational sign language interpreter. This will return for action next month.

#### IX. Personnel B. Action Item:

1. After a brief discussion, Trustee Lloyd moved to approve the 2<sup>nd</sup> reading policies and procedures: 2607 Award High School Credit for Courses Taken Before Ninth Grade, 2607P Awarding High School Credits for Courses Taken Before Ninth Grade, 2610 Advancement Requirements (9-12), 5260 Abused and Neglected Child Reporting, 5260F Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Form, 5810 Compensatory Time and Overtime for Classifies Employees, 5876 FSLA Non-Exempt Employees and Overtime Requirements – NUMBER CHANGE 5810P, 7200 Accounting System Design, 2700P Graduation Requirements, 7400 Miscellaneous Procurement Standards, 7400P2 Procurement Methods Under a Federal Award, and 7400P3 Requirements and Restrictions for Procurement Under a Federal Award. Trustee Lord seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

#### X. Board Goals A. Information Item:

- 1. Director of Community Relations, Eva Craner along with former Twin Falls School District Superintendent, Wiley Dobbs shared the 2020-2025 Draft TFSD #411 Strategic Plan. This item will return to the Board work session on July 27, 2020 for action.
- 2. Superintendent, Brady Dickinson, Associate Superintendent, Bill Brulotte, Director of Educational Technology, Ryan Bowman, Director of Elementary Programs, Teresa Jones, Director of Secondary Programs, LT Erickson, Director of Support Services, Kindel Mason, and O'Leary Middle School Teacher, Peggy Hoy outlined and reviewed the HEAL Taskforce Draft Fall 2020 Re-Opening Plan titled TFSD #411 Operational COVID Protocol which addresses operational protocols for returning to school during the COVID-19 pandemic. The plan outlines a color coded system which outlines protocols that will take place when there are no community spread COVID cases (green), minimal community/school spread (yellow), moderate community/school spread (orange), or substantial community/school spread (red). Administration will be in continuous contact with South Central Public Health District (SCPHD) to determine which color the district falls under. Superintendent Dickinson shared that the color will not change daily. Students, parents, and staff will have notice prior to changing the schedule (color) based on cases and recommendations from SCPHD. After reviewing the plan in its entirety and the presenters answering the Board's questions, Mrs. Craner demonstrated how patrons and employees can get to the survey/feedback page on our Twin Falls School District website to give feedback/comments to the 2020 Operational COVID Protocol plan. All of these comments will be shared with the Board prior to the next board meeting. Superintendent Dickinson reiterated that all the feedback/comments received will be taken seriously and considered. This plan will return for board action and if the plan is revised based on feedback/comments; that amended version will come to the board July 27, 2020.
- 3. The Board reviewed and discussed joining efforts with Blaine County School District on a resolution titled: "Allowing Decisions Regarding Student Hearings in Executive Session" and with Nampa School District on a resolution titled: "Salary Based Apportionment for Classified Employees", before the July 31, 2020 deadline. The Board discussed that they

support the classified salary based apportionment but don't believe the other resolution regarding executive session affects us because of the way we do our expulsions/hearings currently.

#### X. Board Goals B. Action Item:

- 1. Board of trustees finalized the July 27, 2020 regular July board meeting and work session agenda. The bond levy item was removed and will return to the August 10th board meeting. The Board also decided to hold the July 27th board meeting both in-person and virtually. This meeting will be held at a physical location for those that want to attend in person and will have a zoom meeting link to connect virtually and be posted accordingly.
- 2. After a brief discussion, Trustee Lloyd moved to sign on to support the "Salary Based Apportionment for Classified Employees" resolution and not the "Allowing Decisions Regarding Student Hearings in Executive Session" resolution. Trustee Casdorph seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously to only support the classified resolution at this time.

Call to Order/Procedural Matters Action Items The Board of Trustees of School District No. 411, Twin Falls County, State of Idaho, met in its regular annual July board meeting/work session both virtually in a Zoom online meeting platform (accessible by the public) and at Roper Auditorium, 1615 Filer Avenue East, Twin Falls, Idaho, at the hour of 5:00 p.m., on Monday, July 27, 2020. The following trustees were present: Chairman, Bryan Matsuoka (via Zoom); Vice Chairman, Paul McClintock and Trustees, Heidi Casdorph, Jonathan Lord, and Jayson Lloyd. There were also present Superintendent of Schools, Brady D. Dickinson (via Zoom); Board Clerk, Michelle Lucas; Associate Superintendent, Bill Brulotte; as well as directors, interested patrons, employees, and the news media.
- <u>II.</u> <u>Pledge of Allegiance</u> The Board of Trustees stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.
- III. Procedural Matters Approval of Agenda (Additions and Deletions) Chairman Matsuoka asked if there were any additions or deletions to the agenda. There were none. Trustee Casdorph moved to approve the agenda as submitted. Vice Chairman McClintock seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.
- IV. Unscheduled Delegations (Audience to Address the Board) There were none. There was one individual that submitted the paperwork to address the Board but the request was withdrawn.
- V. Consent Calendar Trustee McClintock moved to approve the consent calendar which included: administrator retirement for Robert Seaman for the 2021-2022 school year as director of fiscal affair; new certified employees: Mallory McGowen, and Leia Trammel; certified retirement for 2020-2021 school year from Laurie Stanley; new classified employees: LeeAnn Alexander, Manuel Ramirez, and Sherry Sarbu; in district transfer for Jasmine Victorious; classified retirement for Debbie Padia; classified resignations from Stefanie Penning, Christopher Newbry, Dawn Hentrup, and Becky Flanary; extra-curricular employees: Shalene Ruiz, Mark Schaal, Domink Unger, and Jared Sorenson; and extra-curricular resignations from Nathan Bishop, Stacey Behrens, and Brian Ayers. Motion was seconded by Trustee Lord. Motion passed unanimously.
- VI. Fall 2020 Re-Opening/Operational COVID Protocol
  Associate Superintendent, Bill Brulotte outlined the changes to the Fall 2020 Re-Opening/Operational COVID Protocol plan. These changes were made based on the survey results and other input from the committee and SCPHD (South Central Public Health District) since the last board meeting. The survey resulted in 1,042 comments that the Board reviewed in prior to the board meeting. Director of Community Relations, Eva Craner shared a

summary of feedback, listing data from an analysis of the different themes, the survey produced. Such as comments that were for face coverings and comments that were not, comments for the plan as it stood and others that had concerns. The most common theme expressed was a desire for a face covering requirement. Overall, education concerns were the lowest of all the categories. Each Trustee commented on the plan and thanked the committee and administration for delving into this emotional subject and ultimately doing what's best for students. Trustees shared their confidence that the district will try their best to keep students and staff safe. Associate Superintendent, Bill Brulotte introduced health professionals CNO at St. Luke's, Arlen Blaylock and Ethnologist at SCPHD, Logan Hudson, which stood for questions from the Board. Both professionals stated that requiring face masks will undoubtedly help reduce the spread of COVID-19 in our schools and community. Dr. Blaylock commented that face shields are some protection but masks are better. Director of Educational Technology, Ryan Bowman, Director of Secondary Programs, L.T. Erickson, Director of Elementary Programs, Director of Support Services, Kindel Mason, and Teacher and Educator Support Committee Member, Peggy Hoy commented on the plan changes being recommended. Superintendent Dickinson noted that this isn't going into policy so changes can be made as needed in case community spread changes, etc. The Board will be updated on changes regularly as the plan may need to evolve. Schools will notify parents in every way possible of changes to colors' (green, yellow, orange, red) or other changes/updates. ACTION: After much discussion, Vice Chairman McClintock moved to approve the Fall 2020 Re-Opening/Operational COVID Protocol plan as presented this evening. Trustee Lloyd seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

## VII. 10 Year Plant Facilities Plan Update and District Building Projects Update Director of Educational Technology & Operations, Ryan Bowman shared to

Director of Educational Technology & Operations, Ryan Bowman shared updated security upgrades and completion of year two of our 10-year plan. Canyon Ridge High School and O'Leary Middle School vestibules will be completed by the second week of August and ready for the start of school. Due to COVID-19, Mr. Bowman is working with his team to make adjustments to the schedule for future projects. Robert Stuart Middle School's vestibule is the last one that needs completed. This project will be the most extensive of all the vestibule projects and may have to be pushed back a year due to the hit to our plant facilities for supplies and resources due to COVID-19. Mr. Bowman also shared a list of projects that have been completed and projects that will be complete in August. Mr. Bowman also shared future projects scheduled and noted that work on the FF&E to get furniture updated will also begin soon. Mr. Bowman stood for questions from the Board.

#### VIII. 2020-2025 TFSD #411 Strategic Plan

Director of Community Relations, Eva Craner outlined the 2020-2025 strategic plan for a 2<sup>nd</sup> reading. This plan's focus areas are: Life Ready Students; Quality Learning Opportunities; A Healthy Learning Community; Quality Personnel; School Community Public Relations; School Environment and Facilities; and Stewardship of Resources. ACTION: After a few clarifying questions, Vice Chairman McClintock moved to approve the 2020-2025 TFSD #411 Strategic Plan as presented. Trustee Casdorph seconded. The motion. Motion passed unanimously.

#### IX. Superintendent's Goal and Objectives

Superintendent Dickinson shared his 2020-2021 goal and objectives. His goal and objectives align with the district 10 year plan and the 2020-2025 strategic plan. He asked for Board input on his objectives and stated this is a living document like the strategic plan, which is

open to modifications as the board sees fit. Superintendent Dickinson thanked the board for
the opportunity to share his goal and objectives for this coming school year.

Dear Twin Falls City Mayor Hawkins and Council Members:

On behalf of the Twin Falls School District #411 Board of Trustees I would like to express my sincere appreciation to the City Council and Travis Rothweiler for your support of our schools. Your support has truly helped the District mitigate challenges created by COVID-19.

The TFSD has experienced budget challenges, as have you, due to COVID-19. Last spring the State of Idaho utilized a 1% holdback of funds followed by another 5% for the coming year. Our district operates on a lean budget so any loss of revenue has the potential to have a negative impact on the students in our community. Understanding our difficult position, the City did not bill us for our share of the Student Resource Officers (SROS) contract for the time the SROS were out of the buildings. Doing this was one of the reasons we were able to keep all of our staff employed during the close down instead of resorting to lay-offs. I believe this not only benefited us as a school district, but also the community at large by keeping more of our employees on the payroll.

Secondly, we have been stretching our Federal CARES dollars as far as we can in an effort to open schools safely in a few weeks. Because resources are limited, the City utilized part of its CARES dollars to help provide every student in the district with three face masks. In addition, face masks will also be made available to parents. Keeping students, staff, parents, and community members safe is a top priority for us and face coverings are one of the few tools we have in the fight against this disease.

I believe it is the partnership enjoyed by the City and TFSD that is ultimately going to lead to us beating COVID-19 in our community. We strongly desire to return to school in as normal fashion as possible and remain open. Doing this requires all of us doing our part to reduce the spread of COVID-19 within our community.

I am confident there are very few other cities and school districts in Idaho that enjoy the positive relationship we have here in Twin Falls. Please know that we stand ready to help the city, as you have us, in any way we can as we continue to navigate these unchartered waters.



# COVID-19 REGIONAL RISK LEVEL PLAN

**EFFECTIVE DATE: 8/5/2020** 

AS IDAHO'S RESPONSE to the COVID-19 pandemic transitions from a statewide response to a regional response, the following plan has been developed by South Central Public Health District (SCPHD). The plan is applicable to all counties within SCPHD's region: Blaine, Camas, Cassia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka, and Twin Falls.

This document establishes the criteria SCPHD will use to monitor COVID-19 disease trends and resources. The established criteria and related outputs will inform the SCPHD Board of Health and guide decisions to assess risk levels and for moving between stages, placing or removing restrictions, or providing recommendations to local jurisdictions to place or remove restrictions.

South Central Public Health District aims to mitigate the rapid spread of COVID-19 in order to protect the health and wellbeing of residents in the district, and to prevent overwhelming first responders, the healthcare system, and personal protective equipment (PPE) supplies in our region. Idaho Code 39-414(2) outlines that Idaho's public health districts shall "do all things required for the preservation and protection of the public health and preventative health...." Furthermore, it is desire of the SCPHD Board of Health to minimize the impact to local economies as much as possible while still protecting public health.

The SCPHD Board of Health and Director will be responsible for the implementation of this plan and will collaborate with local elected officials within the region. It is important to note that local elected officials have the authority to implement their own measures, which may be more <u>OR</u> less restrictive than those included in this plan, to do what they deem necessary to protect the health of the residents they serve.

#### THIS PLAN IS SUBJECT TO CHANGE AS MORE INFORMATION BECOMES AVAILABLE

This plan will not be in effect indefinitely; however, it is not possible to determine an end date at this time. The risk assessment and mitigation strategies included in this plan will be in effect until a COVID-19 vaccine becomes available, treatment options for COVID-19 are readily available, other mitigating factors currently not known are identified, <u>OR</u> until the plan is modified or rescinded by the Board of Health.

#### WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT SCPHD's COVID-19 RISK LEVELS:

- The risk levels may be applied at the town, city, county, geographic, or regional level.
- **Different areas of SCPHD's region may be at different risk levels.** Risk levels can increase or decrease.
- In ALL risk levels, the preventive measures outlined in the Minimal Risk Level should be followed. *Always prepare for the next risk level*.
- In addition to metrics determining exposure risk, public health officials will closely monitor and may take into consideration for movement to a different risk level the following:
  - Input from hospital partners
  - Trends in COVID-19 testing, including positivity rate and turn-around time of test results
  - Supplies of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for healthcare providers/first responders
  - Epidemiological investigation capacity
  - COVID-related hospitalizations and deaths
  - Syndromic surveillance of emergency department visits with COVID-like symptoms

#### **DEFINITIONS**

#### **CRISIS STANDARDS OF CARE:**

#### **MEDICAL SURGE CAPACITY:**

Medical surge capacity refers to the ability to evaluate and care for a markedly increased volume of patients—one that challenges or exceeds normal operating capacity. The surge requirements may extend beyond direct patient care to include such tasks as extensive laboratory studies or epidemiological investigations.

#### **TIMELINE FOR MEASUREMENTS**

Data to support the corresponding Health Risk Level and any related mitigation strategies will be posted each Thursday by 5 pm.

Health Risk Levels will be made on Thursdays based on the prior two weeks starting on a Sunday and ending on a Saturday. Movement from one risk level to a lesser risk level will occur at 14-day intervals (one incubation period for COVID-19), while advancement to a level of higher risk can occur at any time.

#### **MOVEMENT BETWEEN RISK LEVELS**

Determinations to move to a more restrictive risk level may be made mid-stage if any of the criteria below are met:

- Crisis standards of care are implemented
- Senior leadership at a local hospital indicates that further increases in cases in the community will overwhelm local hospital capacity
- Reported cases exceed > 5 daily new cases per 10,000 people in a defined population (e.g., town, city, or county) or if new case rate adversely impacts SCPHD's ability to respond.

# TFSD Opening Up Plan for High School/Middle School Athletics and Activities

The Twin Falls School District realizes that the physical and mental well-being of its students is essential to their success. We strongly believe in the return to physical activity and athletic competition of our student athletes. In doing so we understand we must put the safety of everyone involved in these activities first.

## Our Guiding Principles

- 1. Health and Safety of Student Athletes, Coaches, Officials, Game Administration, Fans
- 2. Participation of Student Athletes
- 3. Financial Implications
- 4. District/State Tournaments

## Health and Safety Measures for all Conditioning, Practice, and Contests

- 1. Screen for Signs of COVID-19
  - a. All coaches and students should be screened for signs/symptoms of COVID-19 prior to a workout. Temperature check when necessary
  - b. Responses to screening questions for each person should be recorded and stored securely so there is a record of everyone present if/when a case is confirmed. Coaches need to use the sheet provided.
  - c. Any person with symptoms of COVID-19 should not be allowed to participate and should contact his/her primary care provider
- 2. Stay Home if sick or a close contact with someone who has confirmed COVID-19
- . Do not go to work, school, practice, or competition if you do not feel well or if you have been informed you are a close contact of someone with COVID-19
- a. Contact and follow the advice of your medical provider
  - 3. Practice Good Hygiene
- Wash hands with soap and water or use hand sanitizer
- a. Avoid touching your face
- b. Sneeze or cough into a tissue or the inside of your elbow
- c. Disinfect frequently use items and surfaces
- d. Wear face coverings
- e. No pre-game and post-game contact
- f. Shower and wash workout clothing immediately upon returning home
  - 4. Hydration
  - All student athletes will have their own water bottle
- a. Hydration stations will not be utilized
  - 5. Illness Reporting
- . Create a District and Conference plan for how you will notify event athletes, coaches, event staff, media, and spectators

## Guidelines for Events with TFSD Phases

## Green Phase

Social distancing and face coverings are recommended for all coaches, officials, spectators and other contest personnel during events, but not required. All COVID-19 protocols will be in place.

## Yellow Phase

Social distancing and face coverings are required for all coaches, officials, spectators and other contest personnel during events. Social distancing and face coverings recommended for all athletes not participating in activity. All COVID-19 protocols will be in place.

## Orange Phase

Activities will continue as scheduled. However, no spectators will be allowed to attend events. All COVID-19 protocols will be in place.

### Red Phase

No Activities, No Practices, No Meetings

## Separation and/or Sent/Stay Home Criteria

Students who exhibit the listed symptoms will not be allowed in school. Should the symptoms develop at school, the student will be isolated until he or she can be picked up.

Fever

A cough or shortness of breath or difficulty breathing

Two or more of the following:

Chills

Repeated shaking with chills

Muscle pain

Headache

Sore throat

New loss of taste or smell

Students will not be allowed to return to school until:

The student is cleared to return to school by the student's physician, or

It has been 10 calendar days since symptoms first appeared with 3 days of no fever and/or use of fever reducing medication and 3 days of symptom improvement.

A Negative COVID-19 Test

#### Confirmed Covid-19 Test

If a student/athlete tests positive or was presumed positive for Covid-19 and had symptoms, they can return to school and participation after:

It has been 10 days since symptoms first appeared and,

- 3 days with no fever without use of fever reducing medication and/or,
- 3 days of symptom improvement

If a student/athlete tested positive for Covid-19 bud did not have symptoms, they can return to school after:

10 days have passed since the test date

No symptoms within those 10 days

If a student/athlete has had close contact (high exposure) they should:

Stay home 14 days after the date of last contact and monitor for symptoms

## Athletic Contests – Potential Infection Risk by Sport

Higher Risk – Sports that involve close, sustained contact between participants, lack of significant protective barriers, and high probability that respiratory particles will be transmitted between participants.

Examples – Football, Wrestling, Performance and Competitive Cheer/Dance

Moderate Risk – Sports that involve close, sustained contact, but with protective equipment in place that may reduce the likelihood of respiratory particle transmission between participants OR intermittent close contact OR group sports OR sports that use equipment that can't be cleaned between participants.

Examples – Volleyball, Soccer, Basketball, Baseball, Softball, Tennis

Lower Risk – Sports that can be done with physical distraining or individually with no sharing of equipment or the ability to clean the equipment between use by competitors.

Examples – Cross Country, Track, Golf, Non-Competitive Dance/Cheer

## Use of Locker Rooms

The use of locker room should be out of necessity only. Masks are mandatory in the locker room. If use is necessary, student/athletes will be phased into the locker room by grade level. The locker room will be monitored at all times by coaches. Student/Athletes must take workout clothes home every day to wash.

## **Training Room**

The training room will be treated much like the locker room. Masks are mandatory in the Training Room. There will be a limited amount of people allowed in the training room at one time. We could phase in athletes just like we do in the locker room.

## Bussing

Face coverings are mandatory. Social distancing when possible. One student/athlete per seat if possible, two students maximum per seat. Parents will be allowed to take only their student/athlete to and from athletic events.

#### JOB GOAL

Facilitate communication between deaf and hard of hearing students and others, including school staff, service providers, and peers within the educational environment.

The primary functions of an employee in this class are to communicate effectively and to interpret accurately from spoken English to sign language (ASL, PSE, or MCE, whichever appropriate) and from sign language to spoken English. The position also provides tutoring and supplemental instruction for students.

#### **QUALIFICATIONS**

#### <u>Minimum</u>

- Bachelor's degree
- Previous interpreting experience is preferred
- Desire to assist students who are hearing impaired with ASL, tutoring and supplemental instruction
- Adherence to Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf Code of Professional Conduct
- Any equivalent combination of experience and training which provides the knowledge and abilities necessary to perform the work
- Such alternatives to the above qualifications as the Board may find appropriate and acceptable

## ESSENTIAL DUTIES (or other duties assigned by the Superintendent or Board).

- Interprets for students utilizing their preferred mode of communication during the school day in academic and non-academic settings with staff, peers and other students who are deaf or hard of hearing.
- · Assists teachers in modifying and adapting materials and presentations used in the classroom.
- May assist the student with tutoring or other supplemental instruction under the direction of a certified teacher.
- Assists in implementing a student's Individual Education Plan (IEP), English Language Plan (ELP) or 504 plan.
- Performs interpreting duties in the classroom, tutoring, supplemental or special instruction, conference, and related educational and extra-curricular activities, as directed.
- Performs all work duties and activities in accordance with District policies, procedures and safety practices.
- May be required to conduct in-service or training classes to instruct staff in ASL.
- Performs other tasks and assumes other responsibilities as the Superintendent and/or Board may deem necessary.

## KNOWLEDGE, SKILLS AND ABILITIES

- American Sign Language (ASL), or other required sign language systems, including appropriate signs, vocabulary, and cultural or regional variations.

- Follow oral and written instructions and observe District policies and procedures;
- Demonstrate professionalism, integrity, ingenuity and inventiveness in the performance of assigned tasks.

#### **EVALUATION**

Performance of this position will be evaluated annually in accordance with provisions of the Board's policy on Evaluation of Classified Personnel.

Change to Article IV Executive Board and Officers

Method of Nominating and Electing Officers: Sections 19, 20 & 21 or a stand-alone section specific to Vice President.

To Be Amended as follows:

As in the election of Regional officers, the Vice President shall be nominated from Small/Intermediate sized districts/charters determined by enrollment in ODD years. Nominations for Vice President shall be taken from Large/Extra-Large sized districts/charters in EVEN years. For clarity, this process is outlined below:

Utilizing the same enrollment categories for the ISBA Resolution voting and the newly proposed ISBA Dues assessment, (which is Small: 1 to 999 students, Intermediate: 1,000 to 2,999 students, Large: 3,000 to 9,999 students and Extra-Large: 10,000 or more students) the nomination process would be structured for odd and even years.
