WORKING WITH YOUR SCHOOL BOARD

<u>WELCOME</u> to another Twin Falls School District Board of Trustees Meeting. You are encouraged to attend all regular board meetings.

We are proud of our school system and the board members are dedicated to the continued improvement of the Twin Falls Schools.

We understand that from time to time patrons of school districts have concerns and feel a need to bring those concerns to the attention of the school or teachers. In order to maintain continuity and best resolve these concerns, we recommend to our patrons the following procedures:

- 1. The first and most effective step is to take the concern to the staff member who is closest to the problem. (In many cases this will be the teacher, coach, etc.) We have found that most problems are resolved at this level.
- 2. If there is still a concern on the matter, we then recommend that the concern be brought to the attention of the Principal. We have found that unresolved concerns from item #1 are usually resolved satisfactorily by the building administrator.
- 3. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Director of Elementary Programs or Director of Secondary Programs.
- 4. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Superintendent of Schools. Difficult concerns can usually be resolved.
- 5. However, if the patron still feels the concern has not been properly resolved he/she may use the right of appeal to the Board of Trustees. This is done by calling or writing to the Superintendent and asking for the item to be placed on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled board meeting.
- 6. If you desire to address the board, we would like you to be as comfortable as possible. As a board we hold public meetings which are not public forums and therefore have rules which are necessary for the benefit of all. The following guidelines will assist you as you present your information to the board.
 - A. Prepare your thoughts ahead of time. Usually a brief written outline handed to each board member helps the board follow your presentation. This outline would also give them something upon which to make notes as you speak.
 - B. If a group is involved, select one individual to be your spokesperson. He/she can then guide the presentation with the board and help the board chairman in directing questions to the group.
 - C. Plan your presentation to be as brief as possible. This should include a question/answer period. If more time is needed it is best to give a complete written presentation to the board for their future study. If you give more than five to six minutes of testimony, time restraints will make it difficult for the board to respond that same evening.
 - D. Usually the board will direct the administration to help resolve the concerns and ask for a report back to the board at a later date. However, please remember a solution may take time to be resolved.

We are eager to have our patrons and school staff working together for the improvement of education in the Twin Falls Schools.

Trustee zones that differ more than 10% population must be adjusted to reflect less than a 10% difference in representation. WHEREAS, SCHOOL DISTRICT and BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY are in agreement about the need to increase access to behavioral health services for at-risk youth.

NOW, THEREFORE, SCHOOL DISTRICT and BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY agree to the

This MOU is to serve as the operating agreement between both parties for the purpose of providing and coordinating behavioral health and prevention services to students.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY will follow all policy and regulatory requirements for SCHOOL DISTRICT in working with the school and with students. SCHOOL DISTRICT will provide written documentation of such requirements upon completion of this agreement.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY offers these services to students at schools selected by SCHOOL DISTRICT as a part of their community provider services.

INTENDED RESULTS

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY and SCHOOL DISTRICT share a commitment to building a delivery system that increases youth access to behavioral health services and prevention collaboration and formal partnership. Intended outcomes of this partnership include:

- 1. Quicker and easier access for students identified for behavioral health counseling;
- 2. More efficient use of resources;
- 3. Stronger linkages to community partners;

GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

The purpose of this MOU is to formalize terms and conditions under which the parties shall work together to support the provision of behavioral health and prevention services responsive to the needs of youth and families within the SCHOOL DISTRICT. The MOU sets the framework for coordinated practices in the following areas:

- Separate responsibilities of BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY and SCHOOL DISTRICT; 1.
- Integrated roles and responsibilities at schools served; 2.
- 3. Space and facilities;

- 4. Management of life-threatening emergencies, including privacy considerations; and
- 5. Exchange and disclosure of student information, subject to constraints of privacy considerations and safeguards.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PARTIES

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY and SCHOOL DISTRICT agree upon the following general framework for separate responsibilities and contributions to the partnership.

Responsibilities of BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY agrees to:

- 1. Provide administrative oversight of their employees providing services at school locations, managing the scope of services and performance expectations as identified in the above goals.
- 2. Obtain written permission from parents prior to meeting with students, including a signed release of information between SCHOOL DISTRICT and BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY.
- 3. Communicate regularly with building level administration regarding scheduling and services being provided to students on SCHOOL DISTRICT campuses.
- 4. Provide the following scope of services: outpatient individual and family psychotherapy, in addition to assessment and referral for additional services if necessary.
- 5. Meet with SCHOOL DISTRICT Administration, or their designee, quarterly to evaluate services, MOU and to make adjustments based on needs and priorities.
- 6. Will retain, keep current and provide a copy of professional liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000.
- 7. BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY will be responsible for working with parents/guardians of clients to determine insurance eligibility, bill all sessions to the appropriate insurance, collect payment, and in some cases, determine eligibility for a sliding scale program, which can reduce or eliminate payment on the part of the parent/guardian.

Responsibilities of SCHOOL DISTRICT

SCHOOL DISTRICT agrees to:

- 1. Identify students for behavioral health services and refer to BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY for individual/family/group therapy as appropriate and with multiple options offered to families.
- 2. Provide space and facilities support for mental health clinicians in agreed upon schools, during agreed upon times.
- 3. Meet with BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY Administration quarterly to evaluate services, MOU and to make adjustments based on needs and priorities.
- 4. Train BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY clinicians to be providing services within the school with appropriate site specific training regarding facilities, emergency procedures, and reporting structure.

OUTREACH, SCREENING AND REFERRAL

The process for outreach, screening, and referral will be outlined below:

- 1. Teacher identifies student who may be eligible for psychotherapy services, and contacts the school Counselor.
- 2. School Counselor meets with student, confirms need for services, fills out SCHOOL referral sheet, and makes attempts to obtain new client paperwork packet from parent/guardian.
- 3. Once new client packet is received by BEHAVIORAL HEALTH Clinician, student will be placed on

Clinician's schedule.

- 4. Student will first receive a Comprehensive Diagnostic Assessment, to confirm student's suitability for psychotherapy, to determine appropriate treatment goals, and to assess for any additional services student may benefit from.
 - a. If it is determined that student could benefit from additional services, student parent/guardian will receive communication from BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY informing them.
 - b. Parent/Guardian will then receive information about at least three (3) agencies in the area that can meet these needs.
- 5. Student receives psychotherapy for the prescribed period of time deemed necessary by the Clinician.
- 6. Students can be discharged from care for the following reasons:
 - a. Student qualifies for discharge based on FHS No Show Policy.
 - No student will be discharged for this reason without first collaborating with a School Counselor. Should the School Counselor be unavailable the Principal or Assistant Principal can be notified at the School Office.
 - b. Student has met all treatment goals determined by Clinician and student at the beginning of treatment.
 - No student will be discharged for this reason without first collaborating with a School Counselor Should the School Counselor be unavailable the Principal or Assistant Principal can be notified at the School Office.
 - c. Student is unsuitable for treatment due to non-cooperation with Clinician and/or treatment.
 - No student will be discharged for this reason without first collaborating with a School Counselor Should the School Counselor be unavailable the Principal or Assistant Principal can be notified at the School Office.
 - d. Student presents as a danger to the safety of Clinician.
 - No student will be discharged for this reason without first collaborating with a School Counselor Should the School Counselor be unavailable the Principal or Assistant Principal can be notified at the School Office.

EXCHANGE OF STUDENT INFORMATION AND PRIVACY CONSIDERATIONS

Responsibilities of both parties

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY and SCHOOL DISTRICT will not use or disclose students' personal behavioral health information in a manner that would violate the requirements of the HIPAA privacy rule. Additionally, SCHOOL DISTRICT will not use or disclose students' personal and/or educational information in a manner that would violate the requirements of The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

The parties agree that personal behavioral health information in records maintained at school will not be released to school personnel without required minor or parental consent.

EXECUTION OF MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

The parties agree that:

- 1. The parties to this Agreement are not partners or joint venturers with each other and nothing herein shall be construed to make them partners or joint venturers or impose any liability as such on either of them. Neither party shall receive any compensation from the other party for services related to this agreement. This Agreement shall not be construed to be an exclusive Agreement between BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY and SCHOOL DISTRICT, nor shall it be deemed to be an Agreement requiring SCHOOL DISTRICT to refer students to Provider for health care services.
- 2. Each party shall indemnify and hold harmless the other party and its officers, directors, shareholders, employees, agents, and representatives from any and all liabilities, losses, damages, claims, and expenses of any kind, including costs and attorneys' fees, which result from the duties and obligations of the indemnifying party and/or its officers, directors, shareholders, employees, agents, and representatives under this Agreement.
- 3. This MOU is expressly subject to and shall not become effective or binding on any party hereto until it has been fully executed by all parties.
- The MOU shall be binding on all parties, their successors and assigns.
- 5. All parties shall review terms and conditions of the MOU during the spring quarter of each academic school year. Amendments to the MOU negotiated during the spring quarter affect terms, conditions and binding agreements for the following school year.
- 6. The term of this MOU shall commence on July 31, 2021 and shall continue for a period of 12 months. Thereafter, this MOU shall continue unless otherwise terminated pursuant to this paragraph. Notwithstanding the above, this MOU may be terminated without cause by BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY or SCHOOL DISTRICT upon 30 calendar day's written notice.

Addendum #1 to Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Between SCHOOL DISTRICT and BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY

1. Student in Crisis Protocol

If a student is already a client with BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY, the school counselor/social worker/administrator agrees to contact the BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY Clinician to let him/her know the student is in crisis. The school counselor/social worker/administrator agrees to provide the immediate mental health supports necessary for the student. The BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY clinician agrees to meet with the student and/or family at the soonest available appointment. If a student is not a current BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY client, and in a mental health crisis, a signed parental consent form is required before a referral can be made. The school counselor/social worker/administrator agrees to provide the immediate mental health supports necessary for the student. The school counselor/social worker/administrator can contact parents on an emergent basis and receive consent. The BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY clinician will meet with the student and/or family at the soonest available appointment.

2. Pro Bono Student Psychotherapy Process: SCHOOL DISTRICT

Students without insurance or students with mental health benefits that are cost-prohibitive for them and their families may be eligible for pro bono services with BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY. Three appointment slots for pro bono clients will be allowed per week per full-time clinician load.

- Intake paperwork is completed and sent to intake at BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AGENCY.
- If client is uninsured, or has private insurance that requires payment, intake will contact parent to let them know that paperwork has been processed, and the expected amount of payment.
- If parent is unable to pay, intake will notify Regional Manager who will determine if client is approved for pro bono or partial payments.
- If approved, clinician and intake will be notified and will determine if there is room in the schedule for a pro bono client upon working with schedule and at the recommendation of school counselors/social worker.

All terms and provisions from the original MOU also apply to this addendum.

ARTICLE 3. CONFIDENTIALITY OF PARTIES

Provider agrees that all information regarding services provided pursuant to this Agreement, including, but not limited to, the student's identity and the nature of services rendered, shall be confidential. Provider is prohibited from disclosing any information obtained as a result of rendering services pursuant to this agreement to any individual not authorized by the District without parental consent.

ARTICLE 4. REPORTING OF ABUSE, ABANDONMENT OR NEGLECT Provider acknowledges its obligation to comply with Idaho Code 16-1601, et seq. and report within 24 hours, any suspected abuse, abandonment, or neglect of a child to the Building Administrator. The building administrator will assist with further reporting.

ARTICLE 5. PROVIDER LICENCE

For the duration of the contract, the provider will maintain in effect and have in possession, all applicable licenses required by state and federal laws for occupational therapists. Provider will supply support services with a current copy of said license each year.

ARTICLE 6. INSURANCE AND LIABILITY

Provider shall be solely liable for any loses or damages resulting from Provider's performance of any of the services covered by this agreement. Provider shall indemnify and hold harmless the District from any liability including, but not limited to, costs, expenses, and attorney's fees resulting from Provider's performance of the services provided under this agreement. Providers Worker's Compensation Policy and Proof of liability insurance shall be submitted to the district within one month of the date of this agreement. ARTICLE 7. AMENDMENT/TERMINATION

This Agreement may be amended at any time with the prior written mutual consent of both parties. Any and all amendments to this Agreement shall be in writing. Additionally, either party may terminate this Agreement within 30 days written notice.

ARTICLE 8. NON-DISCRIMINATION

The parties hereby agree that no person shall on the grounds of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, age, or disability, be excluded from or denied participation in, or otherwise subjected to discrimination under any activity performed pursuant to this Agreement.

ARTICLE 9. SCOPE AND SEQUENCE OF SERVICES

Provider agrees to provide services to Twin Falls School District students who qualify for occupational therapy via an IEP team process. Provider will supply services as described in the student's IEP. If the provider will be unavailable for a day, provider agrees to contact the schools and support services. Provider will complete timely student evaluations as directed by the evaluation team. Provider will complete eligibility report for occupational therapy. Provider will complete detailed student service reports, due to support services by the 5th of each month. Student progress reports will be completed and given to support services to be placed in student files each grading quarter. A detailed service statement will be delivered to support services before the 6th of each month for services rendered. If the statement arrives after the 6th payment will be paid the following month.

ARTICLE 10. DISTRCIT OBLIGATION

Twin Falls School District will provide notice to the provider of meetings and evaluations. The district will provide Topic Training and professional development training which provider may attend at his/her own cost. 2021-2022 employees at P5 or P6 who do not achieve AP will be frozen until they qualify for the AP. They are grandfathered at the 2019-2020 P5/P6 amount of \$52,000 and \$55,222 respectively. No additional employees will be moved into P5/no AP grandfathered or P6/no AP grandfathered and instead will need to achieve AP. P6 employees who qualify for AP will move into the appropriate P6/AP (grandfather) rung. P5/no AP will move to AP1 upon qualifying. Employees who don't qualify for movement on the ladder (Professional and AP) will be paid their state allocated amount until the time they qualify for movement (as per state law).

For 2021-2022 all certified employees will receive a one-time 2% COVID stipend for additional work completed in the 2021-2022 school year to address academic issues related to COVID. This includes data analysis, intervention planning, lesson planning, collaborative work, PD, etc.

ARP/ESSR 3: We are in the process of creating a committee to develop a required American Rescue Plan. This plan will detail how the provided funds will be expended. As per the law there is a requirement that this plan be developed in conjunction with the stakeholders. As a result the TFSD will work with the TFEA to identify and invite members to serve on the committee and various subcommittees.

<u>Investigations</u>: A committee is currently working on a policy recommendation to outline the employee investigation process. Once completed this updated policy will be brought before you for consideration.

<u>Collaboration Time</u>: Next year we will return to the collaboration schedule (Monday) utilized in the 2019-2020 school year (1 hour early release on Monday).

October Inservice Days: The past few years these days have been student contact days with leave options for employees who want to attend their state conference. This has been an ongoing pilot and this year we agreed to formalize the language.

Personal Leave: Employees will now have the option to convert unused personal leave to sick leave at the end of the school year. In addition, for those who choose to be paid out on personal leave, the payment amount will be raised from \$95 to the daily rate of the state minimum salary. For next year this will be approximately \$215. This increase is a one year pilot. We will evaluate whether or not it reduced leave as well as the financial impact next year.

Evaluation Procedure: The 2020-2021 pilot dealing with the appeals process for employees who do not agree with a rating on their evaluation was finalized and placed in the contract.

SPED Scheduling: We agreed to pay SPED teachers from building funds when they are required to come in off contract time to complete the scheduling process for SPED students.
