WORKING WITH YOUR SCHOOL BOARD

<u>WELCOME</u> to another Twin Falls School District Board of Trustees Meeting. You are encouraged to attend all regular board meetings.

We are proud of our school system and the board members are dedicated to the continued improvement of the Twin Falls Schools.

We understand that from time to time patrons of school districts have concerns and feel a need to bring those concerns to the attention of the school or teachers. In order to maintain continuity and best resolve these concerns, we recommend to our patrons the following procedures:

- 1. The first and most effective step is to take the concern to the staff member who is closest to the problem. (In many cases this will be the teacher, coach, etc.) We have found that most problems are resolved at this level.
- 2. If there is still a concern on the matter, we then recommend that the concern be brought to the attention of the Principal. We have found that unresolved concerns from item #1 are usually resolved satisfactorily by the building administrator.
- 3. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Director of Elementary Programs or Director of Secondary Programs.
- 4. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Superintendent of Schools. Difficult concerns can usually be resolved.
- 5. However, if the patron still feels the concern has not been properly resolved he/she may use the right of appeal to the Board of Trustees. This is done by calling or writing to the Superintendent and asking for the item to be placed on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled board meeting.
- 6. If you desire to address the board, we would like you to be as comfortable as possible. As a board we hold public meetings which are not public forums and therefore have rules which are necessary for the benefit of all. The following guidelines will assist you as you present your information to the board.
 - A. Prepare your thoughts ahead of time. Usually a brief written outline handed to each board member helps the board follow your presentation. This outline would also give them something upon which to make notes as you speak.
 - B. If a group is involved, select one individual to be your spokesperson. He/she can then guide the presentation with the board and help the board chairman in directing questions to the group.
 - C. Plan your presentation to be as brief as possible. This should include a question/answer period. If more time is needed it is best to give a complete written presentation to the board for their future study. If you give more than five to six minutes of testimony, time restraints will make it difficult for the board to respond that same evening.
 - D. Usually the board will direct the administration to help resolve the concerns and ask for a report back to the board at a later date. However, please remember a solution may take time to be resolved.

We are eager to have our patrons and school staff working together for the improvement of education in the Twin Falls Schools.

A Special Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Twin Falls School District No.411, Twin Falls County, Twin Falls, Idaho was convened at 6:15 p.m. on Tuesday, May 24, 2022 at Canyon Ridge High School, room #301, 300 North College Road, Twin Falls, Idaho in said District, pursuant to authority provided by Sections 33-510 and 74-201 through 74-208, Idaho Code, and pursuant to affirmation by the Clerk that notice of the special meeting had been given to each Trustee and had been announced by written public meeting notice posted at the School District Office and by electronic notices posted on the District's website not less than 24 hours before such meeting was to be convened. The Affidavit of Posting of Notices and a copy of the notice of a Special meeting of School Trustees were entered into the record.

<u>I.</u> Call to Order - The following trustees were present: Chairman Jonathan Lord, and Trustee's Heidi Casdorph and Jayson Lloyd. There were also present Superintendent, Brady Dickinson; Associate Superintendent, Bill Brulotte; as well as district directors, and employees. Trustee's Heidi Tubbs and Eric Smallwood were unable to attend.

II. Procedural Matters Action Items

1. Approval of Agenda (Additions and Deletions) – Chairman Lord asked if there were any additions or deletions to the agenda. There were none. Vice Chairman Lloyd moved to approve the agenda as posted. Trustee Casdorph seconded the motion, motion passed.

III. Budget & Finance A. Information Items:

1. The Twin Falls School District and the Twin Falls Education Association negotiated the teacher's contract for the 2022-2023 school year. The board and association successfully reached a tentative agreement at their third meeting on May 19, 2022. Teachers ratified the afternoon of Tuesday, May 24th, 2022. Superintendent Dickinson went over, in detail, the negotiations summary sheet sent out earlier with the Board packet. Negotiated changes include: **Kindergarten**: the team agreed to remove the extra conferencing days for half-day kindergarten from the calendar due to the addition of full-day kindergarten and the restructuring of half-day kindergarten. In addition, kindergarten teams have the option of splitting their block time instead of having one 45 minute block. **Grievance Procedure**: the team agreed to add a director-level between the principal and superintendent to match practice. In addition, the team agreed that if a grievance reaches the Board both sides of the grievance will be presented to the Board by an independent 3rd party. **Collaboration**Time: the team agreed to move the language from our memorandum of understanding

(MOU) into the contract. In addition, a permanent committee with broad representation will continue discussing the use of this time. **Workload Analysis**: the team agreed to have the

elementary grade level leaders and secondary department leaders discuss workload next year as a standing agenda item. This will also be a standing item at the breakfast meetings next year. The hope is to find strategies to be more efficient while making sure instructional time is preserved by ensuring our practices are streamlined and aligned to district goals. Interviews: the team agreed that interview committees should contain representation from the folks who will be working with the new person hired as much as possible. Extra Duty: the team agreed to add girls wrestling coaches, Esports coaches, and middle school yearbook to the extra duty schedule. Personal Leave Payout: the team agreed to continue the pilot of paying the daily rate of the lowest rung for unused personal leave for another year. Stipend Days: the team agreed to add the 5 additional (optional) stipend days to the calendar for next year with 3 hours set aside for professional development and the rest of the time provided for teachers to use as work time. Teachers will be paid their daily rate if they elect to work these days. Evaluations: a number of topics emerged from the evaluation committee and the team agreed to have the committee work through the issues next year and bring back any recommended changes. Insurance: the team accepted the recommendation of the Insurance Committee to stay with Pacific Source and adopt a new package with enhanced benefits. The package utilizes the money allocated to the Twin Falls School District for insurance while maintaining \$500,000 money for leadership premiums. If not fully used, this money will carry forward for insurance next year. Compensation: The committee agreed on the final proposed salary package which included a new schedule; addition of 5 stipend days to the calendar (see above); approximate 3% stipend from the State of Idaho-salary enhancement allocation; 2% ESSR COVID stipend; 3.6% for P6/AP1, P6/AP2, and P6/AP3; and stipends for #3 and #4 will be paid out in two installments. The first will be paid in the October paycheck and the second will be in March.

III. Budget & Finance B. Action Items:

1. After some discussion, Vice Chairman Lloyd moved to ratify/approve the 2022-2023 Collective Bargaining Agreement language as outlined which includes 2022-2023 contracts. Trustee Casdorph seconded the motion, motion passed.

Vice Chairman Lloyd moved to adjourn the meeting. Trustee Casdorph seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 6:21 p.m.

TWIN FALLS SCHOOL DISTRICT #411 American Rescue Plan: 2022-2023 Safe Return to School (7/11/2022)

Introduction

In the summer of 2020, the Twin Falls School District #411 convened the HEAL Taskforce to create a return to school plan for the 2020-2021 school year. This plan was created with the help of dozens of stakeholders and with the assistance of the South Central Public Health District (SCPHD) and St. Luke's Magic Valley. In addition, a community survey was utilized to gain additional feedback. The finalized plan was revised throughout the year based on the changing recommendations of the CDC and the SCPHD.

In March of 2021, a new community survey was completed. Thousands of community members representing numerous stakeholders took part and provided data and written feedback. Based on community feedback and recommendations of the CDC, revised protocols were adopted in July of 2021.

As is required by law, this plan will be reviewed at least every six (6) months. Its last approval was on January 10, 2022.

July 2022 TFSD #411 Operational COVID Protocols

HEALTH AND SAFETY STRATEGIES

<u>Face Coverings</u>: Properly fitting face coverings are optional for all staff, students, and visitors. The TFSD will make available the CDC recommendations regarding use of face coverings.

PPE: Each school has access to disposable masks available in the office for use by staff, students, and patrons electing to utilize a face covering. This includes N95 masks.

<u>Hygiene</u>: Hand sanitizer will be made readily available throughout the school. Each classroom and office is supplied with mounted dispensers for hand sanitizer.



Posters communicating the importance of hygiene (handwashing and respiratory etiquette) will be displayed and communicated.

<u>COVID Positive/Presumed Positive</u>: The TFSD will follow the latest CDC guidance for students and staff who are COVID-19 positive/presumed positive.

COVID-19 Testing: The TFSD will utilize school nurses, as well as the SCPHD, for COVID-19 testing as long as tests are available. This will be made available each week to staff as well as parents desiring to have their child(ren) tested for COVID-19. No testing will be completed without parent approval.

School Cleaning: Extra attention will be given to the cleaning of buildings with products approved to kill the COVID-19 virus.

HVAC: All air filters in the district have been upgraded to medical-grade filters. The district continues to explore HVAC upgrades to improve air quality and circulation.

<u>Communications Plan</u>: new guidelines and recommendations will be shared with students, staff, and parents through the use of our mass communication system, signage within buildings, use of district social media, and other means of communication to stakeholders.

Immunization: COVID vaccines are now approved for students 5+. The decision on vaccination is a parental choice. The COVID-19 vaccine is not required or tracked by the TFSD. Parents/guardians and staff will be made aware of opportunities for immunization against COVID-19. Onsite clinics may also be utilized. The TFSD will continue to partner with the South Central Public Health District to communicate updates and recommendations regarding COVID-19 vaccinations.

Continuity of services

<u>In-Person Option</u>: The TFSD will maintain face-to-face instruction to the greatest extent possible utilizing the health and safety strategies outlined above designed to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. Schools will operate educational services in a regular fashion whenever feasible. This includes maintaining open campuses for in-person learning five days a week (as outlined in the TFSD school year calendar), except in instances of emergencies.

<u>Full Remote Option</u>: parents/guardians who desire a fully remote option for their child(ren) will be able to access courses via the Twin Falls School District through the Idaho Digital Learning Academy (K-12) as well as Venture Upward (K-8).

Continuity of Education: During times students are out of school with sickness or exposure, students will be able to continue in their coursework through the use of a distance learning platform as was made available during the 2020-2021 school year. This includes the use of a learning management system allowing students to continue with their schoolwork remotely. Educators will be encouraged to provide students with support in these instances. These supports may include and are not limited to videos of lessons, recorded tutorials, videos created by other educators on the content, packets of work, or interactive digital activities.

<u>Special Education</u>: IEP teams will ensure student needs are met in both face-to-face and virtual settings. Special education teachers and general education teachers will partner to ensure all IEP components are met. Unique circumstances resulting from COVID-19 will be addressed in partnership with parents in order to meet the needs of the student. These unique circumstances will be communicated to all impacted employees including those involved in transporting students.

<u>Digital Access</u>: All students will have access to a device to take home to complete work remotely when excluded. In addition, the district will have access to Hotspots which parents and staff can check out for internet access during times they are excluded from school due to COVID-19, if they are in need.



Student/Family Support: School counselors will be available to students who need assistance with social, emotional, and/or mental health. Counselors will make available a variety of community resources for parents in support of their child. The counselors have provided web pages with resources at all schools so that parents can easily find and utilize community support options. Counselors will also work with staff on schoolwide programs designed to assist students. These programs may include peer support programs, such as Sources of Strength, referral for counseling services both on and off campus, and social-emotional wellness education programs.

Students and their families will have access to the Student and Family Assistance Program (SFAP) through BPA Health. This program provides students and their families with five (5) free consultations per incident, per year with an expert regarding impairments related to health, marital, family, financial, alcohol, drug, legal, emotional, stress or other personal concerns that may adversely affect the student's academic performance. In addition, students and their families will have access to a 24-Hour Hotline for issues needing immediate attention.

Staff Support: The Employee Assistance Program will be utilized to assist any staff member who needs assistance with social, emotional, and/or mental health. For the 2022-2023 school year, the number of free visits has been increased from three (3) visits per incident to ten (10). In addition, staff will be notified of programs and other opportunities designed to assist staff with individual needs during difficult times.

Employees who need leave due to COVID-19 related reasons will have access to medical and personal leave as outlined in FMLA, Board Policy, and the Collective Bargaining Agreement.

Plan Review

This plan will be reviewed and revised at least every six (6) months as is required by the American Rescue Plan and will include a process for stakeholder input. The next review will be complete before January 11, 2023. The timing of the review will be related to the health conditions within TFSD schools.

Our school has been operating with faculty door locks nearly the entire year (Oregon Trail). IT and maintenance has been notified many times and still no action. Oregon Trail is wide open for an attack/hostage situation. Look at the Twin Falls crime statics of late. Murders, shootings robberies, many people moving in and bringing their garbage behavior with them.

Hand sanitizer dispensers are rarely filled. There is also no extra cleaning being done by cleaning staff. In fact, there is less cleaning done than ever before, reason being is unknown.

I would like to have a reassurance that I am indeed leaving my 6 year old son in a safe place. Even if homeschooling was a good option I cannot have my child stuck in my home 24/7.

Please take this into consideration as there are more important things than just the COVID-19 regulations.

Not sure what the answer is... BUT we have open campus during recess, lunch recess and beginning and ending of school. Anyone can walk on and into our schools at different times of the day. Present and past kids know the routine, so they are able to gain access. I would like to say it will never happen here... but I can't... I do worry about security on and around our campus.

Thank you for allowing full in person school, mask free this fall!!

I feel TFHS and all the schools should keep all outside doors locked to force visitors to go through the front office. When students travel in between classes, teachers can be assigned doors and stand there with an open door to ensure travel.

Hi friends on the school board, as it stands the plan is just fine. Please note that if we go back to requiring facemasks or other draconian measures during the next medical emergency that I will, of necessity, have to consider either home-schooling my kids or moving them to a different district. We appreciate all you do on behalf of our children.
