WORKING WITH YOUR SCHOOL BOARD

<u>WELCOME</u> to another Twin Falls School District Board of Trustees Meeting. You are encouraged to attend all regular board meetings.

We are proud of our school system and the board members are dedicated to the continued improvement of the Twin Falls Schools.

We understand that from time to time patrons of school districts have concerns and feel a need to bring those concerns to the attention of the school or teachers. In order to maintain continuity and best resolve these concerns, we recommend to our patrons the following procedures:

- 1. The first and most effective step is to take the concern to the staff member who is closest to the problem. (In many cases this will be the teacher, coach, etc.) We have found that most problems are resolved at this level.
- 2. If there is still a concern on the matter, we then recommend that the concern be brought to the attention of the Principal. We have found that unresolved concerns from item #1 are usually resolved satisfactorily by the building administrator.
- 3. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Director of Elementary Programs or Director of Secondary Programs.
- 4. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Superintendent of Schools. Difficult concerns can usually be resolved.
- 5. However, if the patron still feels the concern has not been properly resolved he/she may use the right of appeal to the Board of Trustees. This is done by calling or writing to the Superintendent and asking for the item to be placed on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled board meeting.
- 6. If you desire to address the board, we would like you to be as comfortable as possible. As a board we hold public meetings which are not public forums and therefore have rules which are necessary for the benefit of all. The following guidelines will assist you as you present your information to the board.
 - A. Prepare your thoughts ahead of time. Usually a brief written outline handed to each board member helps the board follow your presentation. This outline would also give them something upon which to make notes as you speak.
 - B. If a group is involved, select one individual to be your spokesperson. He/she can then guide the presentation with the board and help the board chairman in directing questions to the group.
 - C. Plan your presentation to be as brief as possible. This should include a question/answer period. If more time is needed it is best to give a complete written presentation to the board for their future study. If you give more than five to six minutes of testimony, time restraints will make it difficult for the board to respond that same evening.
 - D. Usually the board will direct the administration to help resolve the concerns and ask for a report back to the board at a later date. However, please remember a solution may take time to be resolved.

We are eager to have our patrons and school staff working together for the improvement of education in the Twin Falls Schools.

- <u>I.</u> Call to Order The Board of Trustees of School District No. 411, Twin Falls County, State of Idaho, met in its, properly posted, regular monthly meeting at Canyon Ridge High School #301 located at 300 North College Road, Twin Falls, Idaho, at the hour of 7:00 p.m., on Monday, October 10, 2022. The following trustees were present: Chairman, Jonathan Lord; Trustees Heidi Casdorph, Jayson Lloyd, Heidi Tubbs and Eric Smallwood. There were also present Superintendent, Brady Dickinson; Associate Superintendent, Bill Brulotte; Board Clerk, Michelle Lucas; as well as district directors, employees, patrons, and news media.
- II. Pledge of Allegiance The Board of Trustees stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.
- III. Procedural Matters Action Items:
- 1. Approval of Agenda Vice Chairman Lloyd moved to approve the agenda as posted. Trustee Casdorph seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

- V. VI. Superintendent's Report

A/B. Superintendent Dickinson announced the classified employee of the month from Sawtooth Elementary School for the month of October as Marcy Hendry, behavior support specialist,

and certified employee of the month as Allison Jennings, K-2 special education teacher at Sawtooth Elementary School. Superintendent Dickinson read a brief resume' on each employee recognized and a brief comment from their principal and gave them their plaque, pen and gift certificate to Idaho Pizza Company.

C. Mid-Columbia Bus Company representatives, Michelle Taber, Regional Vice President; Brian Johnson, Regional Director of Operations; Robert Gummere, Location Manager; Laura Lopez, Dispatcher, and Johna Helmer, Dispatcher, addressed the Board sharing their goals for the year. They shared their plans for obtaining and retaining a full staff of drivers, continued customer service, and focused improvements for the 2022-2023 school year. The Board thanked the team for the update.

1. After reviewing the music textbook materials over the last month and with no other questions, Vice Chairman Lloyd moved to approve the Music Textbook, The World of Music by McGraw Hill as presented. Trustee Tubbs seconded the motion, motion carried.

VIII. Budget & Finance A: Information Items:

- 1. Twin Falls School District Accountant, Rachel Youren shared and explained the one page 2021-2022 revenue and expenditure summary statement from the amended budget, which summarizes the IFARMS report that is downloaded to the state. She reported that the current actual 2021-2022 ending fund balance on June 30, 2022 is \$27,317,047.00 and that one main difference is from the adjustment from bond funds to supplement other funds and because of taxes. This summary is published in the paper prior to October 27th. This annual report shows the combined statement of revenues and expenditures with changes from budgeted amounts to actual balances for all funds. This represents the annual financial condition of the district. Ms. Youren stood for questions from the Board.
- 2. Twin Falls School District #411 Auditor from Quest CPA's PLLC, Kurt Folke highlighted many areas of the 2021-2022 audit. He commented that this was a complicated year with new Covid funds and spending requirements that came with those funds. Mr. Follke complemented the finance department for doing a great job tracking all of it and that the audit found everything in good standing. He highlighted information on pages 1-4, 48/49, and 50-52. They found no findings that required action. This was a positive year to increase District carryover and Ms. Youren did a good job being careful on the budgetary side. Currently there is a 2.2 month operating reserve, which is good, they recommend between 1.5 to 3 month reserves. Mr. Folke noted to keep an open mind to invest excess reserves in local investment pool. It's possible to make between \$150,000 \$200,000 over the next year.

1. Twin Falls School District #411 Auditor from Quest CPA's PLLC, Kurt Folke stood for questions from the Board. Vice Chairman Lloyd moved to approve the 2021-2022 annual audit as presented. Trustee Tubbs seconded the motion, motion passed.

TFSD Supplemental Levy Discussion

Issue: This year the TFSD hired 10 armed security guards to cover each elementary school and Bridge Academy. The cost of this personnel is \$575,000 and will be covered this year by carryover and some federal funds. The original intent was to recommend an increase to the supplemental levy by a corresponding amount to cover the future cost; however, due to the appropriation of an extra \$330 million to Idaho Schools (unknown allocation) next year, there is an option to not raise the levy in anticipation of additional funds becoming available. Instead, the security guards would be paid for directly from the supplemental levy with other costs currently covered by the levy shifted and covered by anticipated increases in discretionary funding.

Proposed use of 2023-2025 Levy

- Safety and security: \$442,000 (security aids), SRO (\$320,000) and Guards (\$575,000): \$1.3 million;
- > Activities (equipment, travel, etc): \$400,000 (no pay-to-play); and
- > Staffing (\$4,000,000):
 - Approximately 70 Classified Positions including custodians, secretaries, and teacher assistants (state allocation does not match appropriation of funds with the current funding formula).
 - Approximately 21 Certified Positions (keeps class sizes manageable and supports programs such as elementary music and PE).
 - Approximately 6.5 Administrative positions (district employs less admin than allocated by the state; however, allocation does not match appropriation of funds with current funding formula).
 - Approximately 30+ Advisors and part-time positions (club advisors, mentors, etc).
 - Other part-time/temporary positions.

Options:

- 1. Maintain the levy amount at \$5.7 million and absorb increased expenses with anticipated funding from the state and district carryover with the option of certifying less should additional funding be recognized. Rate: \$6.25 per month per \$100,000.
 - a. Pros: maintains current tax (no increase).
 - b. <u>Cons</u>: portion of expected new money from the state (first \$575,000) will need to cover expenses related to shifting expenses from the levy back to the general fund due to the addition of security personnel.
- 2. Raise the levy to \$6,275,000 to fully cover the cost of security guards with the option of certifying less should additional funding be recognized. Rate: \$6.75 per month per \$100,000.
 - a. <u>Pros</u>: Covers the cost of security guards allowing new money to be spent in other areas.
 - b. <u>Cons</u>: Could be a hard sell to the community with property tax concerns given the expected new money from the state and access to federal funds.

- 3. Lower the levy to \$5.5 million and absorb increased expenses related to security guards with anticipated funding from the state and district carryover with the option of certifying less should additional funding be recognized. Rate: \$6.00 per month per \$100,000.
 - a. <u>Pros</u>: Lowers the levy rate for taxpayers and drops property taxes \$3 a year per \$100,000 of taxable value.
 - b. <u>Cons</u>: increases the portion of new money from the state (first \$775,000) needed to cover expenses due to shifting expenses from the levy back to the general fund as a result of adding security personnel. Greater risk of negatively impacting the fund balance.
- 4. Delay the levy election until May with the hope the legislature finishes budgets in time to know the exact amount necessary to cover the district budget.
 - a. <u>Pros</u>: may have more information on specific designated uses of new state money.
 - b. <u>Cons</u>: District budget is set in May/June for a July 1 start to the new year. This doesn't allow for much time to plan and should the levy fail, also the district doesn't have another date to run a second election prior to approving the budget. In addition, there is no guarantee the legislature will have budgets done in time to move forward with a May levy. Other options don't have a huge variance in amounts so this option may not be worth it—risk versus reward.

TFSD Supplemental Levy Discussion

Issue: This year the TFSD hired 10 armed security guards to cover each elementary school and Bridge Academy. The cost of this personnel is \$575,000 and will be covered this year by carryover and some federal funds.  - Approximately 6.5 Administrative positions (district employs less admin than allocated by the state; however, allocation does not match appropriation of funds with current funding formula)
 - Approximately 30+ Advisors and part-time positions (club advisors, mentors, etc).
 - Other part-time/temporary positions

Options:

- Maintain the levy amount at \$5.7 million and absorb increased expenses with anticipated funding from the state and district carryover with the option of certifying less should additional funding be recognized. Rate: \$6.25 per month per \$100,000
 - a. Pros: maintains current tax (no increase)
 - b. <u>Cons</u>: portion of expected new money from the state (first \$575,000) will need to cover expenses related to shifting expenses from the levy back to the general fund due to the addition of security personnel
- Raise the levy to \$6,275,000 to fully cover the cost of security guards with the option of certifying less should additional funding be recognized. Rate: \$6.75 per month per \$100,000
 - a. <u>Pros</u>: Covers the cost of security guards allowing new money to be spent in other areas
 - b. <u>Cons</u>: Could be a hard sell to the community with property tax concerns given the expected new money from the state and access to federal funds

- 3. Lower the levy to \$5.5 million and absorb increased expenses related to security guards with anticipated funding from the state and district carryover with the option of certifying less should additional funding be recognized. Rate: \$6.00 per month per \$100,000
 - a. <u>Pros</u>: Lowers the levy rate for taxpayers and drops property taxes \$3 a year per \$100,000 of taxable value
 - b. <u>Cons</u>: increases the portion of new money from the state (first \$775,000) needed to cover expenses due to shifting expenses from the levy back to the general fund as a result of adding security personnel. Greater risk of negatively impacting the fund balance
- 4. Delay the levy election until May with the hope the legislature finishes budgets in time to know the exact amount necessary to cover the district budget
 - a. <u>Pros</u>: may have more information on specific designated uses of new state money
 - b. <u>Cons</u>: District budget is set in May/June for a July 1 start to the new year. This doesn't allow for much time to plan and should the levy fail, also the district doesn't have another date to run a second election prior to approving the budget. In addition, there is no guarantee the legislature will have budgets done in time to move forward with a May levy. Other options don't have a huge variance in amounts so this option may not be worth it–risk versus reward.

Title I-A, Title I-C, Title II, Title III, Title IV, Title ID, McKinney-Vento Homeless, Foster Care

 Title IA: POVERTY: Funds to provide help for kids and schools in poverty. TFSD uses the funds for teachers, para-pros, summer school, parent involvement, and some supplies. All schools receive funding except Rock Creek, Pillar Falls, O'Leary, TFHS and CRHS. The percentage of students on Free and Reduced Lunch in each school is as follows:

*Harrison Elementary: 78.1%

*Lincoln Elementary: 90%

*Morningside Elementary: 74%

*Schools that are CEP schools (receive free breakfast and lunch for all students in the school.)

- Title IC: MIGRANT: Funds to provide help for migrant students. TFSD uses the funds for Family Liaisons:
 Yudith Hall elementary, and Mireira Munoz secondary; para-pros, summer school and a few supplies.
 Current number of migrant students: Approximately 200, mostly at Oregon Trail Elementary and South Hills
 Middle School.
- Title IIA: TEACHER QUALITY: Funds to ensure that teachers are certified by state of Idaho definition. TFSD uses the funds for instructional coaches, stipends, and professional development.
- Title III: LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENT: Funds to help students who are English Language Learners. TFSD uses the funds (by federal regulations) for professional development and supplies. This money cannot be used to pay salaries except for extended day services. Khrista Buschhorn is the Instructional Coach for EL programs.
- McKinney-Vento: HOMELESS: Funds to meet the needs of homeless children and families. Becky Jaynes is our coordinator.
- Neglected and Delinquent: INCARCERATED STUDENTS: Funds to provide educational services to kids in JD and their transition when released. Roger Keller is the contact person for this program.

Things to Remember

All Federal Programs funds provide additional support for at-risk populations.

The use of the funds must supplement, not supplant general funds.


The use of the funds must follow strict guidelines with extensive reporting to the State Department of Education.
