### WORKING WITH YOUR SCHOOL BOARD

<u>WELCOME</u> to another Twin Falls School District Board of Trustees Meeting. You are encouraged to attend all regular board meetings.

We are proud of our school system and the board members are dedicated to the continued improvement of the Twin Falls Schools.

We understand that from time to time patrons of school districts have concerns and feel a need to bring those concerns to the attention of the school or teachers. In order to maintain continuity and best resolve these concerns, we recommend to our patrons the following procedures:

- 1. The first and most effective step is to take the concern to the staff member who is closest to the problem. (In many cases this will be the teacher, coach, etc.) We have found that most problems are resolved at this level.
- 2. If there is still a concern on the matter, we then recommend that the concern be brought to the attention of the Principal. We have found that unresolved concerns from item #1 are usually resolved satisfactorily by the building administrator.
- 3. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Director of Elementary Programs or Director of Secondary Programs.
- If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Superintendent of Schools. Difficult concerns can usually be resolved.
- 5. However, if the patron still feels the concern has not been properly resolved he/she may use the right of appeal to the Board of Trustees. This is done by calling or writing to the Superintendent and asking for the item to be placed on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled board meeting.
- 6. If you desire to address the board, we would like you to be as comfortable as possible. As a board we hold public meetings which are not public forums and therefore have rules which are necessary for the benefit of all. The following guidelines will assist you as you present your information to the board.
  - A. Prepare your thoughts ahead of time. Usually a brief written outline handed to each board member helps the board follow your presentation.

    This outline would also give them something upon which to make notes as you speak.
  - This outline would also give them something upon which to make notes as you speak.

    B. If a group is involved, select one individual to be your spokesperson. He/she can then guide the presentation with the board and help the board chairman in directing questions to the group.
  - C. Plan your presentation to be as brief as possible. This should include a question/answer period. If more time is needed it is best to give a complete written presentation to the board for their future study. If you give more than five to six minutes of testimony, time restraints will make it difficult for the board to respond that same evening.
  - D. Usually the board will direct the administration to help resolve the concerns and ask for a report back to the board at a later date. However, please remember a solution may take time to be resolved.

We are eager to have our patrons and school staff working together for the improvement of education in the Twin Falls Schools.

The following trustees were present: Chairman Jonathan Lord; Vice Chairman Jayson Lloyd; Trustees, Heidi Tubbs, and Eric Smallwood. There were also present Superintendent of Schools, Brady D. Dickinson; Board Clerk, Michelle Lucas; Associate Superintendent, Bill Brulotte; as well as directors, interested patrons, employees, and the news media. Trustee Heidi Casdorph was unable to attend.
- <u>II.</u> <u>Pledge of Allegiance</u> The Board of Trustees stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.
- III. Procedural Matters Action Items

- V. The motion was seconded by Vice Chairman Lloyd. Motion passed unanimously.

### VI. Superintendent's Report

- A/B. Superintendent Dickinson announced the certified employee of the month for the month of April, from Perrine Elementary School as Lori Hinton, ELL teacher and from Rock Creek Elementary School, Shari Cowger, principal. Superintendent Dickinson announced the classified employees of the month from Perrine Elementary School as Marisol Jimenez, safety aid and from Rock Creek Elementary School, Wendy Maughan, paraeducator. Superintendent Dickinson read a brief resume' about each recipient and presented them with a gift, plaque, and gift certificate to Twin Falls Sandwich Company.
- C. Superintendent Dickinson shared information that the District Administration Team decided to switch banking institutions to First Federal Bank from U.S. Bank and stood for questions.

### VII. Instruction A. Information Items:

1. District Department Lead for Language Arts, Mr. J.D. Davis and Director of Secondary Programs, L.T. Erickson presented on the process, rationale and selection of the 2023 English Language Arts Curriculum Adoption. It has been 17 years since this curriculum has changed. The committee has worked for two years to hone in on aligning adoption goals and purpose with the District vision, mission and policies in mind. The committee narrowed the selection down to two companies and after presentations from these companies Savvas, My Perspectives was the clear winner. This will be a 1-3 year implementation to make sure all current and future content teachers are trained on the curriculum. Parent and teacher committee members shared their thoughts on the curriculum with the Board. Mr. Davis and Dr. Erickson stood for questions from the Board and thanked them for their time. This item will return next month for Board action.

The following trustees were present: Chairman, Jonathan Lord; Vice Chairman, Jayson Lloyd; Trustees, Heidi Casdorph, Heidi Tubbs, and Eric Smallwood. There were also present Superintendent of Schools, Brady D. Dickinson; Interim Board Clerk, Claudia Paredez; Associate Superintendent, Bill Brulotte; as well as directors, interested patrons, employees, and the news media.
- II. Pledge of Allegiance The Board of Trustees stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

### III. Procedural Matters Action Items:

- 1. Approval of Agenda (Additions and Deletions) Chairman Lord asked if there were any additions or deletions to the agenda. The agenda was amended and re-posted on April 21, 2023 at 9:13 a.m. with the addition of approving an administrative contract in the consent calendar. Trustee Smallwood moved to approve the agenda as amended. Vice Chairman Lloyd seconded the motion, motion carried.
- IV. Unscheduled Delegations (Audience to Address the Board) Chairman Lord asked the Interim Clerk of the Board if there was anyone wishing to address the Board. There were none.
- V. Consent Calendar Vice Chairman Lloyd moved to approve the consent calendar items A-E, which included: certified retirements for 2023-2024 school year from Judy Black and Cindy Braun; certified resignations for 2023-2024 school year from Victoria Francis, Justin Burch, Abby Snow, Ronald Withers, and Cara Hilles; administrative contract for Michelle Larson, as principal of Harrison Elementary School; extra-curricular employee supplemental contracts for Cassandra Merkley, Joseph Bartley, and Emily Coats; certified extra-curricular resignations from Katie Kauffman, Christopher Harrington, Eric Bauman, Jordan Sundquist, Justin Lineberr, Mike Easterling, and Justin Burch; and extended out-of-state travel request from Twin Falls High School and Canyon Ridge High School. Trustee Casdorph seconded the motion, motion carried.

### VI. Board In-Service A. Reports on Building Goals

1. Vice Principal of South Hills Middle School, Jason Kiester shared a few challenges and highlights for his school. Mr. Kiester's building report was included in the board packet. He

shared a few of the listed challenges such as increased student behaviors and the need for consistency to help with behaviors. He also shared bright spots for his school such as the fact that their staff have been trained in so many great programs such as Thinking Maps, SIOP, Trauma Informed, and etc. He commented that the staff at South Hills Middle School has a great culture and cohesive leaders stepping up while Sarah has been out on maternity leave. After a few minutes of roundtable discussion with the Board, Mr. Kiester thanked the board for the opportunity to share information about his school.

- 2. Principal of O'Leary Middle School, Ace Marcellus shared a few bright spots followed by some challenges for O'Leary Middle School. His building report was included in the board packet. Mr. Marcellus shared that the biggest challenges this year are having more student conflicts. He shared that he feels they are finally starting to rise out of the COVD related stress and his staff are asking for additional trainings. After a few minutes of roundtable discussion with the Board, Mr. Marcellus thanked the board for the opportunity to share information about his school.
- 3. Principal of Bridge Academy, Araceli Huicochea shared a few challenges and celebrations at her school. Her building report was included in the board packet. A few of the bright spots from a long list Ms. Huicochea shared included a decrease in student behaviors, student advocating for meeting needs and growth plans; getting a half-time instructional coach has been great; and having a full time counselor. A couple challenges included lack of regular substitutes to cover classes and high number of student absences. After a few minutes of roundtable discussion with the Board, Ms. Huicochea thanked the board for the opportunity to share information about her school.
- 4. Principal of Robert Stuart Middle School, Amy McBride shared a few challenges and bright spots for Robert Stuart Middle School. Her building report was included in the board packet. Mrs. McBride shared a major challenge this year has been student behaviors leading to more discipline. She also shared some bright spots that included the positive culture they have in her school even with large staff turnover, and getting more positive feedback from Facebook posts. After a few minutes of roundtable discussion with the Board, Mrs. McBride thanked the board for the opportunity to share information about her school.
- 5. Principal of Canyon Ridge High School, Kasey Teske shared a few bright spots and followed up with some challenges for his school. Dr. Teske's building report was included in the board packet. Dr. Teske shared his building goals, growth indicators, instructional focus, school improvement initiatives, interventions, and leadership premium use. The biggest challenge he shared was student's having COVID complacency, more failing grades, higher absences, and more apathy in classrooms. Some bright spots Dr. Teske shared are that all fall sports gualified for State; having a first championship in girls soccer and volleyball; and the award as one of ESPN's Top 5 Schools of Unified Sports in the Nation. After a few minutes of roundtable discussion with the Board, Dr. Teske thanked the board for the opportunity to share information about his school.

### VII. Executive Session

Since there was no other business to come before the Board, Trustee Smallwood moved that the Board retire into executive session, after a five minute break, as per Idaho Code 74-206(1) subsection (b), (d) and (j): (b) to consider the dismissal or disciplining of public school students; (d) to consider records that are exempt from disclosure as provided in chapter 1, title 74, Idaho Code; and (j) to

consider labor contract matters authorized under section 74-206 (1)(a) and (b), Idaho Code. Vice Chairman Lloyd seconded the motion. Chairman Lord asked the Interim Clerk Claudia Paredez to poll the board. **THIS AGREEMENT**, entered into on this 28th day of April 2023 between Kristi Kulik, ASL Interpreter, (hereinafter known as "Provider") and Twin Falls School District, Twin Falls, Idaho (hereinafter known as "District") for the calendar school year 2023/2024; The parties to this agreement, in consideration of the mutual covenants and stipulations set out herein, agree as follows:

**ARTICLE 1. TERMS OF AGREEMENT** The period of this agreement will commence on the 28th of April, 2023 and remain in effect until the 24th day of May, 2024.

**ARTICLE 2. RELATIONSHIP OF PARTIES** In performing services under Agreement, Provider is and shall at all times remain an independent contractor of the District. Nothing herein is to be construed as establishing an employer employee relationship.

**ARTICLE 3. CONFIDENTIALITY OF PARTIES** Provider agrees that all information regarding services provided pursuant to this Agreement, including, but not limited to, the student's identity and the nature of services rendered, shall be confidential. Provider is prohibited from disclosing any information obtained as a result of rendering services pursuant to this agreement to any individual not authorized by the District without parental consent.

ARTICLE 4. REPORTING OF ABUSE, ABANDONMENT OR NEGLECT Provider acknowledges its obligation to comply with Idaho Code 16-1601, et seq. and report within 24 hours, any suspected abuse, abandonment, or neglect of a child to the Building Administrator. The building administrator will assist with further reporting.

**ARTICLE 5. PROVIDER LICENCE** For the duration of the contract, the provider will maintain in effect and have in possession, all applicable licenses required by state and federal laws for ASL Interpreters. Provider will supply support services with a current copy of said license each year.

ARTICLE 6. INSURANCE AND LIABILITY Provider shall be solely liable for any losses or damages resulting from Provider's performance of any of the services covered by this agreement. Provider shall indemnify and hold harmless the District from any liability including, but not limited to, costs, expenses, and attorney's fees resulting from Provider's performance of the services provided under this agreement. Providers Worker's Compensation Policy and Proof

**ARTICLE 8. NON-DISCRIMINATION** The parties hereby agree that no person shall on the grounds of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, age, or disability, be excluded from or denied participation in, or otherwise subjected to discrimination under any activity performed pursuant to this Agreement

ARTICLE 9. SCOPE AND SEQUENCE OF SERVICES Provider agrees to provide services to Twin Falls School District students who qualify for services via an evaluation team process. Provider will provide ASL Interpreting services. If the provider will be unavailable for a day, provider agrees to contact the schools and support services. A detailed service statement will be delivered to support services before the 6th of each month for services rendered. If the statement arrives after the 6th payment will be paid the following month.

**ARTICLE 10. DISTRICT OBLIGATION** Twin Falls School District will provide notice to the provider of meetings in advance if the ASL Interpreter is required to attend.

ARTICLE 11. 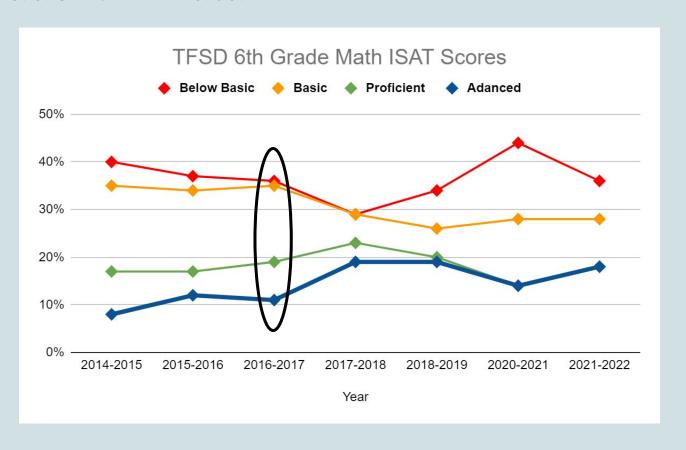

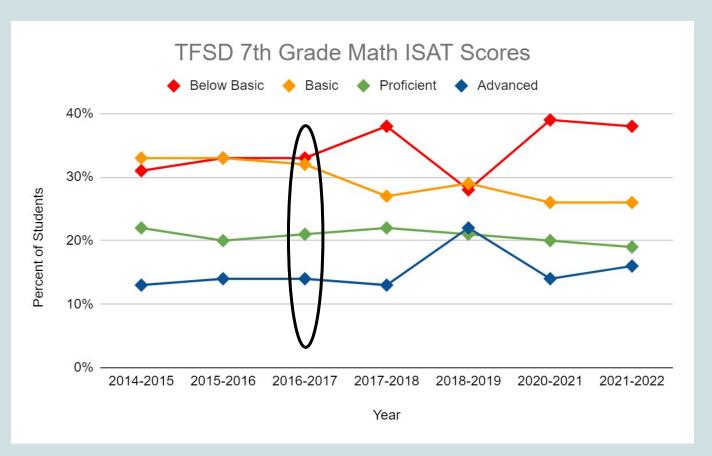

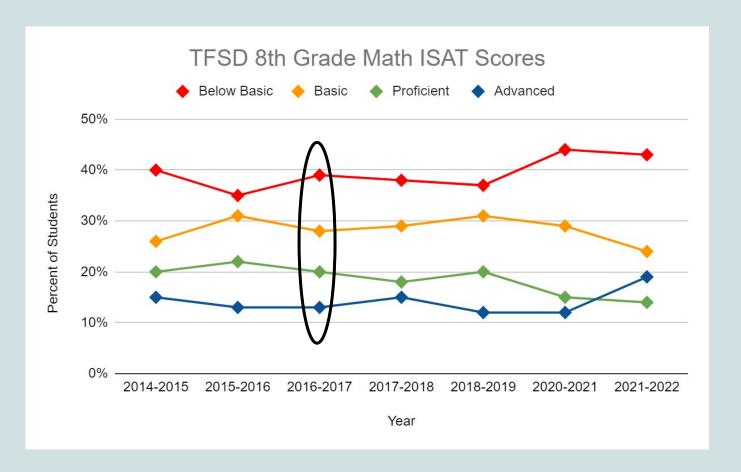
## 6th Grade ISAT Data
