WORKING WITH YOUR SCHOOL BOARD

<u>WELCOME</u> to another Twin Falls School District Board of Trustees Meeting. You are encouraged to attend all regular board meetings.

We are proud of our school system and the board members are dedicated to the continued improvement of the Twin Falls Schools

We understand that from time to time patrons of school districts have concerns and feel a need to bring those concerns to the attention of the school or teachers. In order to maintain continuity and best resolve these concerns, we recommend to our patrons the following procedures:

- 1. The first and most effective step is to take the concern to the staff member who is closest to the problem. (In many cases this will be the teacher, coach, etc.) We have found that most problems are resolved at this level.
- 2. If there is still a concern on the matter, we then recommend that the concern be brought to the attention of the Principal. We have found that unresolved concerns from item #1 are usually resolved satisfactorily by the building administrator.
- 3. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Director of Elementary Programs or Director of Secondary Programs.
- 4. If the concern is not satisfactorily resolved at that level, then the concern should be taken to the Superintendent of Schools. Difficult concerns can usually be resolved.
- 5. However, if the patron still feels the concern has not been properly resolved he/she may use the right of appeal to the Board of Trustees. This is done by calling or writing to the Superintendent and asking for the item to be placed on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled board meeting.
- 6. If you desire to address the board, we would like you to be as comfortable as possible. As a board we hold public meetings which are not public forums and therefore have rules which are necessary for the benefit of all. The following guidelines will assist you as you present your information to the board.
 - A. Prepare your thoughts ahead of time. Usually a brief written outline handed to each board member helps the board follow your presentation. This outline would also give them something upon which to make notes as you speak.
 - B. If a group is involved, select one individual to be your spokesperson. He/she can then guide the presentation with the board and help the board chairman in directing questions to the group.
 - C. Plan your presentation to be as brief as possible. This should include a question/answer period. If more time is needed it is best to give a complete written presentation to the board for their future study. If you give more than five to six minutes of testimony, time restraints will make it difficult for the board to respond that same evening.
 - D. Usually the board will direct the administration to help resolve the concerns and ask for a report back to the board at a later date. However, please remember a solution may take time to be resolved.

Life Ready Students

1. The TFSD will continue to strive for growth in all academic measures. This includes IRI, ISAT, graduation rates, and school-based assessments with the ultimate goal of being above the state average in all measures. (See Addendum 1 for state-required reporting metrics.)

Literacy:

- a. Elementary: Continue to strengthen core instructional practices and streamline Tier II and Tier III instructional pathways.
- b. Secondary: Implementation of new ELA curriculum: Savvas Learning, My Perspectives. Continued implementation of the Achieve 3000 Program at the middle schools as well as fidelity with WRITE Tools implementation.

Math

- c. Elementary: Continue to strengthen core instructional practices and streamline Tier II and Tier III instructional pathways.
- d. Secondary: Align curriculum, instruction, and assessment with the ISAT.
- 2. The TFSD will support work around student behaviors:
 - a. Elementary: Make systematic changes in support for students who are struggling with behaviors.
 - b. Secondary: Continue monthly meetings with VPs to calibrate discipline, including consistency among disciplinary actions such as expulsions.
 - c. Support Service: Training, support, and provide services in collaboration with the elementary and secondary programs. Build up the behavior programs in the district.

Quality Learning Opportunities

- 1. The TFSD will work with State CTE to develop a Career/Technical School for the TFSD, will work with CSI on a Machine Operators Apprenticeship, and will add an Agriculture Program at CRHS.
- 2. The TFSD will continue to work on expanding the Dual Immersion and Gifted Learning programming with advisory committee input.
- 3. The TFSD will continue to emphasize and utilize the least restrictive environments for special education students as applicable and will work to increase the graduation rate among special education students.

A Healthy Learning Community

- 1. The TFSD will continue to implement and evaluate policies that support student and staff member mental health.
- 2. The TFSD will continue to offer and collaborate with community-based mental health support for students and staff members.

3. The TFSD will support work to create a community center where patrons can access resources such as migrant liaisons, school nurses, homeless support, and community health navigators.

Quality Personnel

- 1. District administrators will meet with each principal in the fall to collaboratively set school-level goals for the year. Progress towards these goals will be evaluated at the end of the school year.
- 2. The TFSD will implement strategies to attract and retain qualified staff for certified and classified positions. This may include:
 - a. Continuing to support new and veteran teachers.
 - b. Creating collaborative teaching teams that are focused on results.
 - c. Providing support and training to staff in effectively using Collaboration Monday to maximize the opportunity for alignment in curriculum, instruction, and assessment.
 - d. Ensuring that Professional Development is high quality, timely, and aligned to district goals.

School Community Public Relations

- 1. The TFSD will continue to implement a public relations plan centered around advanced opportunities for students in the TFSD. At the secondary level, this plan will highlight dual credits, students earning associate's degrees, CTE opportunities, etc. At the elementary level, this plan will highlight enrichment opportunities and highlight academic support and parent engagement.
- The TFSD will increase opportunities for staff engagement by hosting Superintendent Office Hours throughout the year in each school. During these office hours, Dr. Dickinson will be available for staff to visit about any topic of importance.
- 3. The TFSD will continue to highlight schools through the Highlights of the Week emails and will support enhancing school-based social media promotion.
- 4. The TFSD will support work to enhance customer service for patrons interacting with the TFSD.

School Environment and Facilities

- 1. The TFSD will continue the implementation of the 10-year long-range plan for facilities including security, HVAC, furniture, and technology.
- 2. The TFSD will explore options to accelerate the work to update and modernize our aging school buildings. This may include working with the Budget Advisory Committee on a proposal for either a bond or second plant facilities levy.
- 3. The TFSD will work with the Safety Committee to provide additional security to our schools including reviewing current practices and working with the Twin Falls Police Department to ensure best practices.

Stewardship of Resources

- 1. The TFSD will ensure an accurate and responsible budget is implemented for 2023-2024 that maintains programs, takes care of employees, and keeps the district in sound financial condition.
- 2. The TFSD Fiscal Affairs Director and Finance Department will work to Streamline processes to modernize business practices.

The TFSD continues to make progress on pathways to careers with respect to AA degrees earned in high school and CTE certificates completed by our students. Academic indicators continue to slowly progress and significant effort, collaboration, and resources are being dedicated to support the best instuctional practices to ensure our students succeed at all levels. Student behaviours continue to present challenges that undermine our academic focus. To address this, a conserted effort has been placed on aligning district and school-wide expectations and developing and implementing student behavior plans.
