Dysart wood heating project gets \$2.8M

A renewable energy project, that will heat up to 45 buildings in downtown Haliburton with wood chips, has received a \$2.8 million grant from the province's Municipal GHG Challenge Fund.

The sizeable investment was announced during a Dysart council meeting on April 23.

If all goes according to plan, it's estimated

property owners will save 20-30 per cent on their current heating bills, according to Jamie Stephen, managing director of TorchLight Bioresources.

"The building owners that connect to the system would be able to drastically reduce, or eliminate, their consumption of heating oil, propane or electricity use for space heating," said Stephen. "The goal is also to significantly reduce heating costs for

building owners and tenants."


The grant will subsidize about half of the \$5.8 million in capital costs. They've also sought \$1.9 million in federal funding for the wood production facility and additional capital. The rest will be raised through private sector financing.

If the money isn't raised, Mayor Murray Fearrey told The Highlander that TorchLight Bioresources and Haliburton Forest will be on the hook for it. Taxpayers won't be subsidizing the system, he said.

The project was first pitched to Fearrey and CAO Tamara Wilbee in the fall of 2017. It was then presented to council, which gave Stephen's consulting company the go-ahead to gauge the downtown core's interest in a wood-fuelled district energy system. Back then, Stephen said most

business owners expressed an interest in the project.

The system will provide heat to buildings with hot water sent through pipes three-and-a-half feet underground. Wood chips from Haliburton Forest will be used as fuel and processed at a central energy centre. The approximately 3,000-square-foot linear building will be located on a stretch of land between the library's parking lot on Maple Avenue and the York Street lot.

The municipality received the money and has partnered with Stephen's company, the Haliburton Forest and Biothermic, a provider of biomass boilers. On Tuesday, council signed a unanimous shareholders' agreement to establish a bioenergy corporation and purchase shares in the corporation. The municipality will own half the company while the other half will belong to a holding company, primarily comprised of TorchLight Bioresources and Haliburton Forest.

Buildings will need to be retrofitted

Buildings will need to be retrofitted for the service. In an interview, Stephen said that in most cases, grant money has been allocated for that. However, buildings that use baseboard heating would be handled on a "case-by-case basis."

"Those retrofit costs are significantly higher than forced air or a boiler type of system," he said.

The corporation, comprised of three directors from the municipality, will determine the rate of the service.

"The price that is charged to building owners is a relationship between the utility corporation and building owners," said Stephen. "That's something, as directors of the corporation, we'll have to establish and find the fair rate."

Since the corporation is for-profit, they plan to be in the black, he said. The more customers who sign up, the lower the energy rate will be. At this point, it's unknown how many will connect.

Malcolm Cockwell, managing director of Haliburton Forest, told *The Highlander* the project could be in jeopardy if there isn't enough participation.

"It could affect the viability of the project, for sure," said Cockwell. "If 75 per cent of the potential building owners said 'no thank you,' that's definitely a problem."

But Stephen believes it will be an easy sell with the savings

"If you're utilizing a local fuel, are connected to the system, you're totally insulated from the volatility of fossil fuel pricing and the changes in electricity pricing. You're also insulated from any changes in climate policy at the federal or provincial level," he explained in an interview.

Customers will be able to lock in their heating rate once it's set. They will be billed monthly and a meter will measure the flow rate of the water.

About four or five full-time jobs will be created, said Stephen. These will focus on the production of wood chips, also known as energy chips, at Haliburton Forest.

Construction scheduled for next summer

Stephen will meet with all of the building owners to discuss the system, collect data about their energy consumption and address their concerns.

Then they will come up with the final system design. Construction of the centre and installation of pipes is scheduled for next summer.

Instead of being under the centre of a road, the pipes will go through parking lots and "non-major routes whenever possible."

"We've tried to use an approach to minimize any disruptions in traffic," he said.


The goal is to launch the service in the fall of 2019.

"This year will be all about planning, permits, working with building owners and finalizing all the plans," he said. They intend to have a public meeting in the future.

Fearrey admitted the municipality is "taking a bit of a leap of faith."

"I give you complete credit for doing so," said Stephen, adding there are 4,000 district energy systems in Europe. "There are very few in Canada—and certainly none at this scale, that are connecting this [amount of] buildings."

Money for the province's fund comes from the carbon market. It's part of the Climate Change Action Plan, which aims to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. (With files from Alex Coop)

Dorset health hub gets permanent funding

The humble health hub that thought it could - has.

The Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (MOHLTC) has now guaranteed permanent base funding for the Dorset Health Hub, effective April 1.

Collin Reaney, of the Dorset Community Partnership Fund, a charity, confirmed the news this week.

"We were challenged with a three-year demonstration project, where we had to show need, demand and also demonstrate community support," Reaney said in a Tuesday interview with *The Highlander*.

He said the ministry has been a partner up to now, paying for two staff, a nurse practitioner and an administrative assistant.

The difference, he said, is the funding is "forever ... as long as you continue to serve the public, you have base funding for a nurse practitioner and an admin. assistant.

"This puts us in a better position as the charity to go out and raise money for our end."

The MOHLTC has never, and will not in future, fund the entire hub.

The charity has raised \$1.3M to date. They built and equipped the hub and fund a third staff member, a registered practical nurse.

Reaney said they need to raise approximately \$140,000-a-year. He estimates the ministry contributes between \$220,000-\$250,000 per year.

Other Haliburton County partners in the initiative are the Township of Algonquin Highlands (AH). The charity chases grants as well.

The hub now has 450 patients, evenly split between Haliburton County and the District of Muskoka.

AH Coun. Brian Lynch called the news "pretty significant" but he did add "we wanted more money than that because the model that is funded is two staff members and we found that a three staff member model worked better.'

He said there has to be two staff in the hub or it is forced to close.

Lynch said the charity has also raised money for additional programs, such as diabetes prevention, and for extra summer hours. He said they are also paying for community outreach programs, including making home visits and taking blood.

Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock MPP Laurie Scott was pleased to hear the Liberals had listened and put the funding in place on an annual basis.

"I think it's great. The communty saw the need. And while it sounded to me like a stretch when they first started, 'what will the MOHLTC think of it?' it makes sense to have those rural clinics. It saves going to emergency rooms, especially when the summer population comes.

"Good on the community for raising the money, good on the Muskoka area for joining in and leading the fight for it. We supported it from the beginning and I'm quite pleased it obviously got results and the ministry is taking it over. Good on all the local people. It is a local initiative that proved itself to be worthy of bringing in the MOHLTC which is not an easy feat."

Mobile broadband project gets \$71 M

The provincial government has come through with a \$71 million investment to improve mobile broadband service in Eastern Ontario, including Haliburton County. The funding announcement was made on Tuesday.

This is the first investment in the Eastern Ontario Regional Network's (EORN) project, which is expected to create 3,000 full-time jobs over 10 years and spur \$420 million in new business revenue, according to a news release.

"It's extremely important," said Dave Burton, county councillor and member of the EORN's board of directors. "The people are asking, wanting and needing this project."

Last year, EORN prepared a business case for a \$213 million public-private partnership to improve the reach and quality of cellular data services in the region. The federal government and private sector are also being asked for financial support.

The project is expected to cover more than 99.5 per cent of the region and address about 93 per cent of gaps in capacity. It will improve service for phone users browsing websites, downloading content and streaming videos, for example. Emergency

services in the county are also expected to gain a secure communications network.

Burton said he will make a pitch to Ottawa MPs next Monday in an effort to secure matching federal funds.

In 2010, EORN completed its first internet-focused project called Broadband for Eastern Ontario. It increased internet speeds to 10 mbps to 89 per cent of Eastern Ontario. The total cost was \$175 million, with a \$500,000 contribution from the county.

The CRTC recently designated both mobile and fixed broadband as basic services for all Canadians. (*With files from Alex Coop*)

Clean bill of financial health

Algonquin Highlands (AH) received a good report card from its auditing firm at the April 19 council meeting.

Carl Pahapill, of Pahapill and Associates, presented a report on the 2017 books.

At the end of his delegation, he said it represented "a healthy financial report" for AH.

He highlighted the fact the township has good reserves and a very strong financial administation team.

Some key points included an accumulated surplus of \$17,171,718 versus \$16,273,273 in 2016. Total reserves and reserve funds were \$5,144,818 last year, also up on 2016, when they were reported as \$4,462,983. Tangible capital assets are just under \$14 million.

Pahapill also lauded AH's municipal debt, saying they only have one outstanding debt, which was \$170,450, but for which they are paying off \$48,700 a year, with a low, 3.73 per cent annual interest rate.

Deputy Mayor Liz Danielsen, who chaired the meeting for an absent Mayor Carol Moffatt, who was sick, said it was always

very satisfying for a township to learn it is in a strong financial position with good management. "We do have a strong team here and we're proud of them."

Pavilion for Oxtongue Lake centre uncertain

Council has deferred making a decision on whether or not to proceed with a picnic pavilion at the Oxtongue Lake Community Centre

The item came up for discussion after Chris Card, parks, recreation and trails manager, said they'd been unsuccessful in getting an Ontario Trillium Foundation grant for the project. He came to council looking for direction for next steps.

While preparing the grant request, he said he got quotes from four companies, ranging in price from \$43,045 to \$55,258 plus taxes.

"Given these amounts, it is possible to proceed with a request for proposal for the installation of a pavilion in 2018 using available reserve funds. However, this would not leave much for unforeseen expenses associated with the project or otherwise," Card said in a written report.

He was alluding to a recently completed designated substance survey done on the community centre itself. Card said although he didn't have a final report "the news is actually pretty good there" with no asbestos found in the attic and some undisturbed asbestos under existing kitchen flooring.

He said if council gave him a dollar figure for the pavilion, he could prepare a request for tenders, for \$56,000 plus landscaping and a contingency to bring the final price tag to \$66,000.

Councillor Marlene Kyle said a committee had been working for several years to get a pavilion, and was starting to lose their enthusiasm. "Clearly I'd like to see us go ahead with this sooner rather than later." However, Kyle also acknowledged that the building itself may need work.

She and other members of council want to see the final report on the status of the community centre before committing to the pavilion project. Coun. Brian Lynch added he'd like to see an outdoor washroom component completed if the pavilion is endorsed. The item will come back to council. (AH briefs by Lisa Gervais)

Hospital workers get tentative agreement after rally

A few local health care workers, wearing "Together for Respect" campaign signs around their necks, participated in a province-wide workplace rally on April 18.

They started in front of the Haliburton hospital during the lunch hour and moved to Hyland Crest in Minden that afternoon.

Three days after expressing their frustration with the Ontario Hospital Association (OHA), union bargaining representatives and the OHA ratified a tentative agreement.

"The bargaining team is happy with it, but we will receive the results this week and plan a date for a members' vote soon," said Nancy Cowan, chief steward of Haliburton Highlands Health Services.

Together, the Canadian Union of Public Employees, SEIU Healthcare and Unifor sought wage increases in line with other unions. They said hospital and long-term care staff are overworked and facilities are understaffed.

The contract is for 75,000 nurses, personal support workers, administrative staff and others at more than 100 Ontario hospitals. They were without a contract for a year.

The "humble" hub.

That's how Collin Reaney refers to the Dorset Health Hub.

A lead member of the Dorset Community Partnership Fund, he and numerous volunteers and partners have done the near impossible. They have raised money to build and equip a health hub building. They have fundraised to pay for one of three staff members. They've covered all kinds of costs as needs have arisen. They do diabetes prevention. They've started making home visits. They even do blood work. While talking to Reaney on Tuesday, he said they are in the process of having a well sunk. It never ends.

And, in just under three years, they've amassed a patient base of 450 people, about half from Haliburton County. The women working at the hub said they've had as many as 30 people a day. For residents of Dorset and surrounding areas (they have patients from Tory Hill), the hub is, quite literally, a lifeline. Where in this day and age do you have a health care professional visit homes of seniors and people who can't drive, for example?

Between the fund, the District of Muskoka, the Townships of Algonquin Highlands and Lake of Bays, as well as the Province of Ontario, they've done some amazing things.

Local MPP Laurie Scott, a former nurse, admitted that when they first talked about a health hub for Dorset, she thought it sounded like a stretch. What would the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care think?

Well, they thought enough of it to invest an estimated \$220,000-\$250,000-a-year for two staff and other support over the first three years.

And, as of April 1 of this year, they thought enough about it to earmark permanent base funding. The once skeptical Scott said getting the MOHLTC to agree to base funding is no small feat.

Cue the uncorking of the champagne bottles at the little hub that could.

Now ... don't get them wrong. They're delighted about the 'forever' funding. But, of course, they would have liked a bit more, to pay for that third staff member and help with expanded programming and neverending costs.

What we really love about this project is the community saw a need. They then supported it. And that is how the hub

continues to grow. They really look at what their patients require and they respond to that.

In the process, they are easing pressure on the health care system, helping to keep

patients at home and reducing unnecessary trips to the hospital.

And while it may be "little" and "humble," people are watching the Dorset Health Hub. We've heard the Haliburton Highlands Health Services is certainly keeping a keen eye on it.

And, why not?

This is a health care experiment that is working and there is no reason it cannot be duplicated elsewhere.

All it will take is good, old-fashioned hard work. Reaney says he talks to a lot of people when it comes to fundraising.

And, of course, it takes vision, like that of founder Herb Hickling nearly seven years

Accelerato

Seems a little too like the seal cull for me but then again you Canadians got pretty tetchy when the rest of the world said that was a bad idea, so 'ave at 'er!

For my part, I simply drive around county roads and it is amazing just how many potholes seem to jump out right into my path. The small ones are no bother. A quick bump bump and they're done. The big ones are more tricky though, there's

more potential for real damage: kind of like the difference between squishing a squirrel

supportive environment up here and an opportuity to get out and meet other artists." She and O'Reilly, who are arts council committee members, gave credit to Finn for providing the space.


"With Carole's support and allowing us the space it's really given us a chance to put the juried show together."

Society makes women live 'fake lives'

Local author Heather DelRosario says women are held

back from the life they would choose, but she wants to help them fix that.

Her new book, My Year to Thrive, is a step-by-step guide that helps women break through the barriers that are stopping them from living a better life, she said in a recent news release.

The idea for the book came from DelRosario's own experience.

As a successful career woman, she said that she was a perfectionist and drove herself to be the absolute best at what she did. She pushed herself so hard that at the age of 47 she found herself burned out. Stress

pushed her to the point where she landed in the hospital with chest pains, her mental capacities were so affected that she couldn't put two sentences together and she was so emotionally spent that she let her marriage fall apart.

"I felt like I was a fake. I became the person that society was telling me was successful, but lost myself in the process," DelRosario said.

After her burnout, she decided things had to change. She sought out mentors and taught herself strategies she needed to change her life.

And when she succeeded, she said she wanted to help others.


"I lived my life the wrong way for a very long time, as an emotional prisoner. But there's so much more out there for women and I want them to have it," she said.





About 45 people went to the final Razzamataz Kids' Shows performance of the season last Sunday.


The entertaining trio from California





People and places inspire Jim Love's comedy

A radio play that made its debut on Canoe FM two years ago is about to come to life on the stage.

Local playwright Jim Love is the creative force behind Iron River Gas Bar and Cabins, a two-part comedy that will be performed on May 2 and 4 at the Northern Lights Performing Arts Pavilion.

"We [with Canoe] had a five-part radio series and that's what started this," said Love in an interview.

About six months ago, Highlands Little Theatre asked him to turn it into a stage play.

"It's a story about redemption and finding your way back to participating in life fully," he said.
