Family donates jewel to Land Trust crown

When Leopoldina and John Dobrzensky retired to Haliburton in the 1970's, they bought a property 'Leo' says nobody

On Saturday, Leo and her daughter, Margaret, formally transferred that property, now known as the Barnum Creek Nature Reserve, to the Haliburton Highlands Land

Trust (HHLT). And, boy oh boy, did they want it.

"This is an important acquisition for our county and for the province," an excited Mary Lou Gerstl, HHLT chair, said.


The well-known Haliburton mother and daughter were in attendance at the HHLT's annual general meeting June 2 at the Minden Hills Cultural Centre when the announcement was made.


"Margaret and I are so happy that the land we love so dearly will now be preserved for future generations," Leo said in a speech that brought tears to people's eyes.

She said she and John started looking for land outside of Richmond Hill in 1973 but were initially disappointed, "since John's wish for some land, forest and a farmhouse

was too ambitious for our pocketbooks." But then they spent a weekend at a friend's cottage on Eagle Lake. Just outside of Haliburton, they discovered an abandoned farm property, with a cabin on a seasonal road without water or electricity. It had been on the market for over a year "because nobody wanted it," Leo said.



back because he thought it was a prank.

"The land of little value became priceless to us, as we discovered a wealth of all kinds of animals, plants, fruit trees, edible mushrooms, as well as wonderful sites such as meandering Barnum Creek and its cataracts in the spring," Leo said.

She said John was one of the early landowners to apply under the Government Woodlot Improvement Act Agreement, so the overcut forest would be replaced by young growth which would then be allowed to reach maturity, and "after 44 years of careful management by him and Margaret, the goal has been reached.'

Approximately 600 acres was transferred through the federal Ecological Gifts Program, with Gertsl calling it a "beautiful, ecologically diverse property."

She said the HHLT will continue to manage the properties in perpetuity, to ensure the health and diversity of the ecosystems

The property is located a few kilometers south of Haliburton.

"The property is a spectacular example of the diversity of ecosystems in the Haliburton Highlands," Gertsl said. "The reserve includes habitats ranging from tolerant hardwood forest, mixedwood forest, marsh and swamp ah well as open upland successional.

She said similar habitats are found immediately south of the property and onto a large tract of Crown $\check{\mathbf{L}} \mathbf{and}$ that is known to provide habitat for species at risk such as

She said they left a message for the agent, who didn't call Blanding's Turtle, Whip-Poor-Will and Five Lined Skink. She said it also provides habitat for local flora and fauna. She said the mature male forest has abundant ground cover, including wild leek, blue cohosh, leatherwood and maidenhair fern.

Calcareous soils, which are limited in the highlands, are derived from fingers of marble, dolostone and limestone extending into the granitic rock that dominates the landscape. These soils are suitable for rare and endangered plant species.

The property includes a wide marshland on the east, flowing to a narrow creek, and finally to a series of beaver ponds. The creek serves as important habitat for a variety of animals.

"We can now hand the land over in good shape and hope that it will be a jewel in the properties of the Land Trust, now and for future generations," Leo concluded.

Police respond to explosive situation at Forest

Deteriorated explosives and old, dangerous detonators - stored years ago at Haliburton Forest in a shed could have resulted in a tragedy last week. However, the OPP's explosive disposal unit (EDU) was called in to literally neutralize the threat.

Malcolm Cockwell, manager of the Forest, said they called the OPP last Thursday after the surprise discovery of "potentially dangerous materials."

Local OPP said they got the call about 12:38 p.m. after staff at the Forest found the material.

"The explosives and detonators were stored together and created a very dangerous situation," OPP said in a media release.

"Due to the condition of the explosives and detonators, EDU members had to dispose of explosives at the scene using approved disposal techniques. EDU members rendered the scene safe for the property owner and public."

The OPP reminded the public to call police if they

suspect they may have come across what they believe are

Cockwell said he's glad the Forest did.

"We were very grateful for the professionalism of the OPP, EDU, and the other emergency services. They all made a great effort to ensure the situation was resolved in a safe manner. We are truly fortunate to live in a place where such competent, caring experts are available to keep us safe, even when surprises like this come along."

Cockwell said they've learned two big lessons. First, always call experts when you're uncertain about how to proceed safely. Second, workplaces must be kept clean and tidy at all times to prevent dangerous situations.

"While we already work hard to have a clean, tidy, and safe workplace, it turns out that we were storing some dangerous materials from many, many years ago. We are grateful that everything was resolved last week without incident, and since then, we have checked all of our facilities to ensure that we are not storing any other potentially dangerous materials."







Dysart OKs rezoning for spreading field

Total Site Services has received Dysart council's blessing to rezone its property to expand a septic spreading operation.

In March, the company made the municipality aware of its plans to enlarge its operation off Coaldale Drive from four to 10 hectares and install four sewage lagoons. Council approved the processing of a rezoning request application. During a public meeting last month, three residents provided their comments in-person and two letters were submitted. Those against the proposal cited concerns about odours, potential leaks and negative impact on property values. One person spoke in favour of directing septage to the municipal sewage facility; however, its wastewater treatment plant can only handle a fraction of the population's waste.

In 2015 and 2016, Total Site Services pumped 2,424 and 3,250 cubic metres of septage, respectively.

By creating the lagoons, they will be able to increase spreading capacity to 1,500 cubic metres per week.

The Ministry of Environment and Climate Change must approve the company's application before it can proceed with the expansion.

Several studies and documents were prepared by the company, including an environmental impact study. All of the material has been peer reviewed, according to senior planner Sue Harrison. This review identified items the municipality wants further clarification on, mainly related to engineering, best management practices and site logistics.

Staff and the municipality's engineering consultant met with the company's owner and consultant team to discuss the results of the review.

"We agreed that the details raised in the review, need to

be, and will be, addressed throughout the site plan approval process and will be specifically addressed in the site plan agreement," said Harrison.

Charlsey White, the county's planning director, determined the proposal is consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement. This is a government document that outlines policies on land use planning.

Deputy Mayor Andrea Roberts expressed her support for the expansion.

"I would be in support of this because it's definitely needed in this area," said Roberts.

Terry Clement, one of the respondents to the proposal, told council he still isn't in favour of the expansion. Clement and his brother own a 100-acre property beside the site. It was originally purchased by their grandfather in the 1940s.

"It's like ... you've owned a house for three generations and they open a garbage dump beside you," he said. "You're probably going to fight that all you can, right?"

Trace Laframboise, the company's operations manager, said the field was used for spreading many years before they bought it five years ago. She added that owner Pat Casey will do everything possible to protect the environment.

"We are following all the stringent setbacks ... we did all the studies and everything before we came up with the idea for the lagoon," said Laframboise.

The spreading process involves putting raw, untreated sewage from septic and holding tanks onto a field. Total Site Services operates one of two such fields in the county. The other, located in Algonquin Highlands, is run by Haliburton Septic Pumping. It was temporarily shut down by the ministry last fall but was reopened for another two years following a mediation process.

Trucker upset with council

A Minden man says he's been running his business for more than eight years without complaint but now the township wants him to relocate.

Trucker Jarrett Campbell came before council May 31 to express his frustration.

He said his business, at 24 St. Germain, does house tractor-trailers but it is commercially-zoned.

"All I'm asking is to make a living ... I'm just asking for a little bit of help here."

Mayor Brent Devolin said as Minden Hills embarks upon its Official Plan, a trucking company such as Campbell's is probably not in the township's plans for the evolution of the downtown, acknowledging it was something Campbell probably didn't want to hear.

Coun. Pam Sayne encouraged the businessman to be part of the solution.

Campbell said his business was respectful of his neighbours. He added he is being faced with expensive change at a time when he is trying to grow.

Coun. Jeanne Anthon took exception to Campbell's comments there had never been complaints about his business, saying she had heard several verbal complaints about tractor-trailers in the core of the town with children around.

Campbell noted a tractor-trailer goes to the LCBO in Minden's downtown and he feels his business is no threat to children.

Coun. Sayne said not all staff action is complaints driven. She empathized with Campbell and the need to bring more business to Minden but acknowledged there are also town planning issues. "We have to find a way to help you."

"I'm not above coming up with a solution," Campbell replied, noting he has suggested fencing his property. However, "when I'm told we have to get out, that's a hard one to swallow."

A staff report will be coming to a future council meeting.

Tiny house coming to Minden

A tiny home will be trucked from Barry's Bay to the Minden Hills council building for a second public consultation on alterative housing for the village during Canada Day celebrations.

The Minden Hills Housing Task Force held its first open house the Saturday of the Victoria Day long weekend and said 34 people signed in, with 11 wanting to being kept informed about tiny house options.

Chair Fay Martin said Joe Wills from Barry's Bay Tiny Homes attended on May 19 but didn't have a model home available to bring with him and show the general public.

However, she asked council to allow the task force to spend unused budgeted money to bring one in this time around. The task force is recommending clusters of tiny homes as just one future housing option and thinks having one on-site July 1 will attract even more people to the open house. NOTA candidate wants to 'normalize' government

A young war veteran from Woodville is the None of the Above party candidate for Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock.

Tom Rhyno, 32, says he grew up on a farm in Stouffville and spent his first 22 years there.

He's worked in construction and labour all his life but joined the Canadian Army in 2008. He served five years as a combat engineer in Gagetown, N.B. and other parts of Canada. He received the Queen's 60th Diamond Jubilee Medal in 2012 for distinguished service to the country and was honourably released in April, 2013.

Rhyno then got back into the trades and is currently working on becoming an elevator mechanic. He's married to wife Kadey and a father of three.

"I joined politics because I'm fed up with weak, corrupt leaders taking people for a ride, the lies and deceit are unacceptable and I will no longer stand idle," he told *The Highlander*.

In his opinion, the Conservatives have the right economic plan but lack empathy. The NDP have the empathy but at a cost of millions to hard-working individuals. The Liberals have the money and the empathy but are ideologically

concrete and fail to see how working together is best for everyone, he said.

Highlands East mayor goes for fourth term

Highlands East Mayor Dave Burton wants to serve the people for another four years. After much thought, he filed for re-election on May 29.

"I decided there's enough gas in the tank to go another term," said Burton in an interview. "I feel I have a lot to bring to the table. I feel I can be available, approachable and accountable."

The incumbent was first elected to the top spot 12 years ago. He previously was a councillor in Oro township (eventually amalgamated to Oro-Medonte) for six years. He and his family moved to Wilberforce in 1998, but Burton's relatives first began visiting the area in the 1940s.

"It's not how long you've been here, but what you've done," he said.

During his tenure, Burton is proud of the work of the municipality's five advisory committees. Comprised of ratepayers and councillors, they include: economic development and business, recreation and culture, trails and outdoor tourism, environment, and housing and grants.

"I think it's been a real good way to get our community involved in what we're doing and be part of the recommendations," he said, adding he started the committees eight years ago with council.

He's also very happy with the results of the new septic reinspection program. Last summer, two student employees inspected 903 systems on seven lakes. It will continue this summer.

"My mandate is to protect our assets. We have to take care of the lakes and be good stewards of them."

If re-elected, Burton plans to focus on improving high-speed internet and cell service through the Eastern Ontario Regional Network's (EORN) mobile broadband project. Burton is on the EORN board and is its past chair.

Other priorities include developing a policy for short-term rentals and improving infrastructure, such as roads and sewer systems.

He said he recruited a doctor for the community and she's expected to start seeing patients next year.

And, he really wants to bring a financial institution to the municipality. At the start of 2017, Scotiabank closed its Wilberforce branch.

"They pretty much cut off my right arm when they took the bank out of here," said Burton. He's involved with a few external organizations, including the Ontario Good Roads Association and Source Water Protection. As of Tuesday, no one else had put their name forward for mayor. The election is on Oct. 22.

At sea

Imagine you are on a boat. A clear and crisp May morning and you are enjoying your second cup of coffee, a fresh peanut butter sandwich and watching the most perfect sunrise.

It is 5:45 a.m. and you are about to set sail on a 12-hour cruise into the Bay of Fundy and learn how to be a fisherman.

Not any old fisherman but a lobster fisherman.

Your captain, Albion Leslie, a 30-year veteran fisher of Grand Manan, N.B. has entrusted you and your parents with the important task of banding lobsters.

A tricky skill of scooping and lassoing the flailing appendages of these angry Crustaceans hell bent on crimping and crushing anything that gets in their way. Which by 7:30 a.m. was my finger.

And for those keeping track, that is three broken bones and one severely dented fingertip in my short 14 years.

This adventure was unlike anything I have ever done. It wasn't your typical tourist activity.

In fact, tourists are rare on lobster boats. But when your parents know someone who knows someone, an experience like this is impossible to turn down.

So, one arms themselves with rubber boots, oil pants and an anti-seasick patch in order to learn a true Maritime tradition.

Captain Leslie has seawater for blood. His ancestors were pirates.

Good old-fashioned pillage and plundering privateers dating back to the war of 1812. He is what you would picture a seventhgeneration sea farmer to be.

A man who loves the open water, plays guitar at church and names his boat after his wife and granddaughters, "Gaga and Girls."

When I asked him about his best day at work he said, "my largest catch was over 9,800 pounds in one day.

That was a great haul!"

Besides our captain, two other crew, Ashleigh Gaul and James "JR" Cook, work tirelessly lugging and landing 375 traps to bring in their daily catches.

The lobster season is long in this part of N.B., eight months of 12 to 16-hour days. Ashleigh, a new resident of Grand Manan, is a writer, underwater diver and former fisherman from the Northwest Territories.

She is one of only six or so women on the island who lobster fish. JR, father of four daughters, and fourth-generation fisher, has made his living on the high seas.

There are so many tasks while on the boat that it easy to keep busy for the day at sea.

Bait bags have to be packed, ropes to stay clear of, traps to empty,

cookies to eat, bycatch to release, seagulls to feed, compasses to follow, and a general camaraderie that made the long day go by in a flash.

I was fascinated by the culture, the industry and even the fishing gear.

The similarities to fishing and my parent's art business was so shockingly similar that it was no wonder that on our first vacation in five years we would end up working on a boat.

Provincial election

In the lead-up to the provincial government election today (June 7), The Highlander posed a series of questions to candidates in our riding of Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock. The first set of answers ran in our May 31 edition. We are continuing with the remainder today.







Q

How do you plan to address the needs of youth when it comes to mental health and suicide?

A: Zac Miller, NDP

An NDP government will create a dedicated Ministry for Mental Health and Addictions with the sole job of co-ordinating and building an integrated mental health and addiction service that Ontario needs. We will build 30,000 supportive housing units. With the funds generated by eliminating EQAO testing, we will hire 400 new mental health workers to be placed in high schools to give student access to help when needed. These 400 new workers will be on top of another 1,600 hired over a five-year period. New Democrats will cut children's mental health wait times to a 30-day maximum with a \$590 million investment.

A: Chuck MacMillan, Consensus Ontario

By implementing programs for education to counsellors in schools, for teachers, support staff and parents on how to recognize mental health since there are various kinds. Also, [we] would include health units, CMHA, and other institutions trained in this topic. Intervention and free counselling will help prevent suicides.

A: Gene Balfour, Ontario Libertarian

Failures of centralized government planning and services delivery to address these issues proves that this approach is wrong. The crises that our young people face in areas of mental health and suicide are highly individual. Solutions customized to each person have a better chance to succeed than a rules-based, bureaucratic system that characterizes most government-operated services.

The Libertarian proposal for specialized non-government options is ideally suited to bring better methods to these issues. We live in a highly specialized world with unprecedented access to digital information to address any conceivable problem. Governments are ill suited to exploit this modern reality.

A: Laurie Scott, PC

Ontarians have been suffering for far too long and mental health should be taken as seriously as any other form of health. An Ontario PC government will invest \$1.9 billion in mental health, addictions and housing supports. With this investment, Ontario will build community capacity to provide evidence- based care and support that will reduce

pressures on hospitals and reduce wait times for services. A PC government will also work closely with the Canadian Mental Health Association, Children's Mental Health Ontario, and Addictions and Mental Health Ontario to ensure value for money as it makes these investments.

A: Brooklynne Cramp-Waldinsperger, Liberal Secondary school, and the endeavors that follow, are both exciting yet challenging times. During which, having accessible and relevant mental health information and resources can be imperative to success of our youth. The Liberal Party understands this and has introduced the single largest investment in mental health care in Canadian history, with a \$2.1 billion commitment that will mean better and faster access to mental health and addiction services for hundreds of thousands more children, youth, and adults across Ontario. In 2018-19, more than 12,000 more young people will be able to access community-based services such as therapy and counselling, a number that will grow to about 46,000 by 2021-22 [edited as she surpassed the word limit].

A: Thomas Rhyno, None Of The Above party

PC CANDIDATE LAURIE SCOTT

Income: The Basic Income Pilot Project is underway in its first year. We can create real change that puts more money back in your pockets, reduces hydro rates, lowers your taxes, and allows our industries to flourish - providing well-paying jobs. I understand how difficult it can be for families in our community to make ends meet and they are forced to make tough decisions between heating their homes and putting food on their tables. For that reason, we will continue to support this pilot project and look forward to seeing the results.

Food Security: Life in Ontario is expensive. That is why Ontario PCs are committed to making life more affordable for everyone in the province. We will also be raising the OW rate by 10 per cent, seven per cent and five per cent, and ODSP rates by five per cent. Social assistance rates have been cut by both Liberals and Conservatives for the past decade and it is time that we reverse that trend. By giving people an increase, it will make it easier for them to pay their bills and allow them to find a good paying job, and not be simply pushed into low-wage, precarious work. The

NDP will keep the \$15 minimum wage that is to take effect billion over the next three years to support a significant next January because it is time that individuals receive a living wage. Auditor gives Dysart two thumbs up

The municipality of Dysart has aced its annual audit. Trina Cornell of BDO Canada recently gave councillors an overview of the municipality's financial position last year. A couple of highlights include an accumulated surplus of \$31.3 million, an increase of \$1.2 million from the previous year; \$33 million in non-financial assets and a \$1.7 million increase in revenues.

"It was a good audit this year," said Cornell. "Everything went quite smoothly."

The municipality has been "very consistent year over year, plus or minus one per cent," she said.

Most of this year's revenue—\$628,000—was generated through property tax. An additional \$366,000 came from construction user fees, an extra \$84,000 from grants and a \$380,000 gain on disposal of assets due to the insurance claim on the Harcourt Community Centre.

However, expenses increased \$924,000, bringing the total to \$13.2 million. Some of this is attributed to an additional \$327,000 in policing costs, increased fire salaries related to retirees and \$348,000 in environmental expenses, such as recycling services for more construction waste.

Minden to hire own economic development officer

Although the County of Haliburton has a tourism director, a facilitator, and soon a roving information provider, The Township of Minden Hills is hiring an economic development, destination and marketing officer of its own.

Questioned by The Highlander about this, Minden Hills Mayor Brent Devolin conceded "there is some overlap," however he said the Minden job is about much more than tourism.

Devolin said he, and others, have had four years to think about economic development for the town. They've had a consultant and task force.

He said they've looked at towns across

the province that have done a good job with economic development, and most are single-tier models.

That isn't the case in Haliburton County.

Here, the County of Haliburton traditionally handles tourism and the lower-tier municipalities, economic development.

Devolin said in Minden they've come to the conclusion that when it comes to economic development and tourism, "there is some overlap and some huge synergies."

For example, he said tourism traditionally looks at people coming for a day or a week, but "we'd like people to come that are businesses, that would invest in, and bring services and goods here we don't have."

He added that also means telling these people about the cultural and event offerings of the town – which is why the person hired will also oversee the Minden Hills Cultural

We communicate that out relocating in the province, and looking to come to a community that has events and culture and out-of-the

box thinking.

Devolin said the role would also involve looking at the future of housing in the town, ... to entice people that are from clusters of tiny homes to a mix of downtown retail and accommodation.

Whoever they hire will also liaise with the Minden BIA that is about to start up again.

They'll also talk to town planners. Then, "we communicate that out ... to entice people that are relocating in the province, and looking to come to a community that has events and culture and outof-the box thinking."

As for the tourism aspect, Devolin said, "we're going to create some product and content that's going

to feed into the construct of the tourism committee and Amanda [Virtanen's] staff and what they're doing so we have more good stuff to feed in through that existing framework."

Devolin said he is a fan of what they have done in Prince Edward County, for example. He says they're a few years ahead of where Minden is but if Minden can copy and paste what they've done with a Haliburton County twist "that will be a very good thing."

"So this position is pretty key in my mind ... and somewhere those worlds all converge."

A kaleidoscope of authors at Wintergreen





Haliburton Curling Club vice president Kent Milford talked about the integral participation of the club (200 of its members volunteer) and the strength of the show they put together year in and year out.

"The demographics of the community have a lot to offer the show. You get a significant portion of people that attend this show who are permanent residents of Haliburton and permanent residents of the county, but then you have an equal or a larger number of people this time of year that are seasonal people who live around the lakes," said Milford. "The cottagers' demand for the products here are every bit as strong as the residents if not stronger. And that really allows you to have a strong

market for the show. You put all that together and this show is as strong if not stronger than shows in towns with six or seven times the population of this county.

"Thank you in advance for committing to pause for a moment and recognize the past, the present and the future," said Ashall.

Over the weekend, more than 2,000 people attended the show, which Milford said represented "a significant portion of the community." There were more than 150 exhibitors, showcasing furniture, appliances, renovations, landscaping, cars and more. One of the most popular attractions was a shipping container converted into a tiny home.

Walker hosted a barbecue and there was a café/lounge for hungry patrons.

Ontario chamber head talks election

In 2012, half of Ontario's chamber of commerce members were extremely confident about the future of the province.

This year, that number has dropped to 23 per cent, Rocco Rossi, president and CEO of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce said Tuesday. He was the keynote speaker at the Haliburton Highlands Chamber of Commerce's 57th annual general meeting at Rhubarb Restaurant June 5.

He said that in recent years, government and other public discourse would have people believe that businesspeople "were billionaires with private jets, heading down to numbered accounts in Panama with bags of money they've chiseled out of the little guy ... That is the public demonization campaign that's been going on and it's insulting and it's dangerous. Because we all know that the vast majority of businesspeople in Ontario are small and medium-sized businesses trying to build some independence for their family and create independence for the community. We are the backbone of the Ontario economy and of every single community in every corner of this province."

He blamed dwindling business confidence on rapidly increasing costs, such as hydro and the fallout of Bill 148, fears over the future of NAFTA, and enormous tax reform in the US that disadvantages Canadian businesses.

When it comes to government, he said businesses often think, "we really don't have to worry about whoever goes into power at Queen's Park or elsewhere, because we'll be okay, we'll kind of figure it out. And we would be absolutely incorrect in that assumption."

"Public policy matters. Decisions matter. Elections matter. You can't leave it to [the chamber] to worry about it."

Rossi said the OCC, which is nonpartisan, has issues with all of the party platforms. For example, he said they have debated the Liberals and New Democrats about their call for the business community to give "just a little bit more." But, at the same time, "I'm appalled at how little detail we're getting from the Progressive Conservatives.

"Everyone needs to be pushed to come up with answers and directions that we can be comfortable with ... we will work with whomever gets elected to build the best Ontario we can."

And, he said addressing the number one concern of chamber members – the skills mismatch – will be a huge piece of the puzzle going forward.

Getting down to business at 57th Chamber AGM

It was also outgoing chamber manager Autumn Wilson's last meeting. Wilson said some of the year's highlights included: 43 new members, increasing the chamber's profile, more than 25,000 website page views; the business and community achievement awards; establishing community partnerships; increased out-of-county advocacy and enhanced benefit packages. She said the accomplishments were not hers, but a group effort.

Her replacement, Jennifer Locke, said she was "super excited" to continue the work, including an upcoming shop local campaign, #buycloseby.

Board president Richard Wannan agreed it had been a year of growth and development; that they want to be a chamber that is inclusive of the entire community, and in an area that is growing in population, want to bring in younger people, too.

Some departing board members were honoured, specifically Jerry Walker, who sat on the board for eight years and the new board of directors for 2018-2019 was introduced. They include:

Bee lovers get a buzz at pollinators workshop

Participants learned all about bee gear, honey bee swarms, bee colonies and more at a 'bee & other pollinators' workshop at Abbey Gardens May 26. Ray Martin and Juliette Arsenault, owners of Eco-choice Pest Control and Honey from the Hills, presented the workshop. Martin has an environmental biology degree from the University of Guelph and has been keeping bees for roughly 10 years, while Arsenault teaches about trees at Fleming College

in Lindsay and has a formal education in ecology, urban forestry and communications.

Participants tried on different types of Personal Protection Equipment worn by beekeepers, including gloves, full-body suits, nets and more to guard themselves from bee stings. They also learned about different types of bees, the makeup and dynamics of a bee colony, how to support pollinators and what a year in the life of a honey bee hive is like. They were also taken on a tour of Abbey Gardens' bee yard.

Martin and Arsenault founded Minden's largest honey producer, Honey from the Hills, in April 2016 as a passion project. They have been networking with several local beekeepers to help them get started and provide consultation throughout their first years of beekeeping. They have plans to continue working with Abbey Gardens at their apiary in the coming months and participate in their Honey Week from August 27 to Sep. 1. "Lots of sweet stuff coming up ... and honey!" said Arsenault.

Notice of Sewer Flushing

Please note that regularly scheduled sewer maintenance will be taking place throughout the Township of Minden Hills Wastewater Collection System and Storm Water Systems from June 4, 2018 to June 22, 2018 to remove settled and accumulated material.

During this process, pressurized water will be released at each manhole on the roadway through the sanitary sewer/storm water lines to remove any buildup.

A bubbling and/or vacuum effect may be noticed in your drains and/or toilets due to the sanitary flushing. It is recommended to keep toilet seats closed and cover any floor drains. Internal plumbing consists of "P" traps which hold a volume of water to prevent sewer gases from migrating into the home. During the flushing process, this water could be drawn out of the traps by negative pressure created in the sanitary sewer line. For this reason it is important to refill all plumbing traps by running the water in your sinks and floor drains after work is completed.

We ask for your patience and understanding during this process as it is necessary to eliminate the potential for sanitary sewer main surcharging or storm water backups which could result in damage to property.







Whether you're five years old or 50, this weekend's Haliburton County Fair will delight all your senses.

Now in its 154th year, the fair kicks off with a beef barbecue fundraiser on Friday evening. Doors open at 5 p.m. and the dinner starts at 6 p.m. Musical entertainment will be provided by Bar Haven, a Celtic group. Tickets are \$25 for adults, \$15 for children 12 and under, and kids six and under are free.

"It's our major fundraiser for the fair," said Cathy Fisher, vice president of the fair executive.

The rest of the festivities take place at the Minden fairgrounds and community centre on Saturday. It's a jam-packed day that runs from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. In addition to the usual attractions, the fair will host Minden's first-ever Comic Con at the community centre. For those who don't know, that's a comic book convention. Visitors are encouraged to dress up as their favourite superheroes and villains. There will also be a video game centre.

"People are saying they're going to come fully dressed," said Fisher, who has received several inquiries about it.

In the past, the most popular attraction has been the horse pull. Crowds fill the bleachers to witness these powerful animals drag serious weight along a dirt path. Visitors will also want to check out the wood processing and sawmill demonstrations, mutt show, inflatable rides, classic car show, beer tent and the many vendors.

There's a major emphasis on live music this year, with acts hitting the stage between noon and 6 p.m. They include: Trina West, Algonquin Highlands Jazz Quintet, Raven Mad Crow, Sheri Hawkins and The Tent Shakers, Bill Candy, Northbourne, and County Road One.

Best of all, once you pay admission, everything is free except food and vendors' products. Tickets, which are available at the gate, are \$10 for adults and \$7 for kids 12 and under. A family pass is \$25 (four people).

About 30 volunteers, including fair board members, will make it all possible.

"Thank goodness there are people who help out," said Fisher.

She believes the fair is becoming more versatile and going back to its roots. It promises to be a fun day for everyone—rain or shine.

"You meet so many people you know and you have a chance to visit, relax and talk." Fair goers can bring their own chair to

watch the bands. It's also wise to pack an umbrella in case of rain.
