## Dysart takes steps towards economic development

Dysart et al is one step closer to developing an economic development strategy for the municipality.

On June 16, about 35 people attended a follow-up economic development workshop at the Haliburton Curling Club to help further (OMAFRA). the process.

"You've provided us with a lot of information that's all been tabulated, to give us that comprehensive overview of what's happening," said Judy Coward, development advisor with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs

The workshops are being hosted in partnership with the municipality

At an April 2 meeting, participants identified 46 initiatives they felt were important to the municipality.

"In reviewing all of that information submitted, under the action plans, the material sorted itself into five themes," she said. Participants were asked to work in groups to further discuss those themes which included culture and recreation, environment and economy, housing, business retention and expansion, and youth retention. A category

## Minden solar lease agreement mystery solved

The confusion surrounding a solar power agreement in Minden Hills has been resolved.

Township CAO Lorrie Blanchard confirmed that in December of 2012, the previous council authorized former Reeve Barb Reid and then CAO, clerk and economic development officer Nancy Wright-Laking to sign a lease agreement with Solar Power Network Inc . The lease was executed Jan. 17, 2013.

In the fall of that year, the company requested the township sign an amended lease due to changes in Ontario Power Authority rules. However, after receiving various proposed revisions, council denied the company's request to use the roofs of the S.G. Nestbitt Memorial Arena and curling club for the installation of solar panels.

Raubia Elahi, partner relations manager for the Ontario-based company, attended a June 11 council meeting to seek a blanket support resolution that would grant the company priority points through the Feed-in-Tariff (FIT) program for such an installation on both buildings.

"We've partnered with the township at the 55 Parkside Street location, which is the arena and the curling club," Elahi told council.

It was then that current Reeve Brent Devolin

indicated he was unaware of the agreement and when it materialized.

"I'm unaware of that partnership in any shape or form," he said.

Later in the meeting it was revealed that previous councillors denied a 20-year lease agreement in a recorded vote. The meeting minutes show that councillors Ken Redpath, Larry Clarke, and Deputy-reeve Cheryl Murdoch all voted against the proposal, a decision that fell in line with a recommendation from former interim director of community services Darren Levstek. Councillor Lisa Schell was absent from the meeting.

"We're looking to move forward with that

plan," said Elahi. "We're here to ensure there's visibility on the project and that we can answer any questions you may have."

The Highlander contacted Reid for comment regarding the lease agreement.

"I have no recollection of signing a lease for a solar installation on the arena roof," she wrote in an email.


Despite clarification, Blanchard is still trying to determine whether or not the original agreement is still legally binding.

"We're still communicating with the company to determine if the original lease is relevant to the most recent FIT [Feed-in-Tariff] 4.0 guidelines," wrote Blanchard in an email on July 15.

for volunteer and community capacity was also added to the exercise.

Each group spent half an hour to identify the current gaps in each category and offer possible strategies and solutions for the future.

"I thought it was a pretty positive day," Andrew Hodgson, chair of the Haliburton County **Development Corporation** (HCDC), told The Highlander.

"It's always good when our politicians want to hear our

ideas. I thought it was a hands-on meeting." Hodgson's table tackled housing in the municipality.

"I think we had some really good discussion about some ... very real things on the ground, not just 30,000 feet in the air," he said.

Hodgson said he believed more progress was made at the second meeting. As chair of the HCDC, he committed to being a part of future sessions.

"We're excited to help."

Rosemarie Jung, manager of the Haliburton Highlands Chamber of Commerce, also felt it was a productive workshop.

"From my perspective, the process is going well," said Jung, who commended the municipality for providing an open and transparent opportunity for members of the community to get involved in the process.

Although fewer people attended this session, Jung said it was very effective in drilling down what some of the challenges are in the community.

Dysart Reeve Murray Fearrey said that an "outstanding amount of information" came out of the meeting.

"I think we stand in a good position now to move forward with an overall committee and then break out into special interests," he said, referring to subcommittees.

Fearrey believes that some of the items discussed can be acted on immediately while others will require more time.

"We can prioritize those, hopefully, and then work on the longer term strategies. I'm very excited about today.' He said that a couple of council members will likely be

part of the initial committee. Fearrey told those at the meeting that he hoped to appoint

# Editorial opinion

### A step forward

Economies rarely grow without active planning and action, and it looks as though Dysart is starting to understand that reality.

Recent economic development meetings are a good start in the municipality's bid for a more robust, sustainable economy. While Dysart has yet to set up an official committee of council, they have brought in some local business owners and community leaders to talk about the economic challenges of the area – and possible solutions.

The problems we all know very well. Lack of housing is an issue up here, and so is the seasonable nature of our current economy. We have an aging population and we struggle to keep our young folks around, or to attract new ones. Seasonality and low population put a strain on businesses, sometimes fatally, as seen by the five or more that have closed this spring in Haliburton Village alone.

In the past, it seemed like the municipality's attitude was to let things be as they will be. It's a laissez-faire attitude that considers businesses and ideas only as they come, rather than laying out a plan and actively setting goals that will see it become reality. It has merits in keeping government out of things but leaves the serious business of economic development to the random decisions of businesses. Assuming they make decisions, or even come to town.

This hands-off approach may be changing. During these meetings, all of Dysart's challenges are being discussed, along with possible solutions. More importantly, as the talks are a government initiative, they seem to be getting buy-in from local politicians. Take housing, as an example.

We know there is insufficient housing for older people who can no longer maintain their homes, or who want a more convenient lifestyle. When they're ready to trade lakes and backroads for an apartment, they don't have any good local options and so leave the municipality, taking their pensions, volunteering and other assets with them.

It's not enough just to hope a developer comes along and builds a condo. Instead, what's needed is a proper plan for where these housing units should go to maximize

the benefit for the town and its seniors. Residents should be able to walk or scooter to and from the grocery store, and the doctor and the Legion, so they can leave their car at home or get rid of it altogether – especially those with low incomes or mobility issues.

It doesn't make any sense to have lowincome housing out past the Tim Hortons, for example. Isolating people on the highway seems almost cruel.

If we decide what kind of community we want to be, and what our goals are, we can develop a plan that will help us get there, piece by piece. All of these various things like recreation and culture, and housing work together.

One example is the Haliburton County Development Corporation which wants to help grow tech businesses in its business incubator. Generally, people in that industry are younger. And, if you want to attract them, you need affordable places for them to live. You then need things for them to do and you have to offer the amenities they expect – like high speed internet at home. It's all connected.

That's why these meetings are exciting, because if we can finally get all our oars pulling in the same direction, we might actually get somewhere. It won't necessarily be easy - and why should it be? At least with a plan and a commitment to execute it we have the opportunity to build the community we need and want. Without one,

Right now the municipality has taken a big step forward. Let's keep that momentum going.

### Strengthening the community

A chapter in the community of Minden's history is all but closed.

Last week, John Rogers, the project manager for the Minden Disaster Relief Committee, delivered the final report to Minden Hills council and requested that the ad hoc committee be formally terminated. Council accepted the report and will, at its next meeting, bring this committee's mandate to an end (I was a member of the Disaster Relief Committee over its twoyear term).

The committee was formed following a series of occurrences in the spring of 2013. Heavy rains, lakes filled to capacity, the spring melt and frozen ground that was unable to absorb the run-off combined to send water coursing down the Gull River system and quickly overflowing its banks. While the village of Minden provided the most dramatic representations of the flood, there were similar problems upstream and along the Burnt and Black Rivers, particularly at Irondale.

The nature of this flood was somewhat out of the ordinary. The water rose and stayed high for a long time. It was weeks before any significant drop in water levels could be seen and initially, even that was a tediously slow process. This stymied remediation efforts and frustrated home and business owners who were trying to get into their properties to assess the damage and begin the clean-up. As well, access to the downtown core was limited and even those businesses not impacted by the rising water saw a dramatic dropoff in trade. It was as if a month's worth of business activity was wiped off their books.

When the water did recede, the real challenges began. The damage to properties along the river was crushing. Water soaked basements, destroyed personal belongings and family treasures, oil tanks overturned and foundations shifted. But beyond the physical damage was the turmoil created in people's lives. Shut out of their homes, witnessing years of family history being destroyed, the emotional toll was serious and often the unseen but traumatic part of the flood. I met with friends and people I know along the river and could see the tension etched in their faces. Tears were often not far from their eyes. It was in talking with these people that I realized that even though the water had receded, it had left behind raw scars that would take a long time to heal.

While the flood knocked the pins out from under the community, coincidentally resulted in some positive outcomes. Like all small communities, Minden rallied to the support of those inundated by the water. Immediately, shelter and food were offered by friends and neighbours. At the municipal vard a contingent of volunteers from across the county filled sand bags as quickly as others threw them in trucks to be delivered to where they were needed. The municipality activated its disaster plan. Then longer term care and relief kicked in with service

agencies on site. The local food bank opened its doors to help the residents cut off from their homes. There are many, many stories of people helping people through the worst of this disaster and they all illustrate the values that underlie small town life.

As the clean-up began, so did the fundraising. From every corner of the county and beyond, donations flowed in. Once the Disaster Relief Committee was in place and a formal procedure and accounting was established, groups and individuals found ways to reach out and help their neighbours. From children's cookie sales to high profile golf tournaments and music concerts, funds flowed in to support those impacted by the flood. The students at the high school dedicated half of their annual fundraising drive to the cause. Lake associations dug deep or held special events in support of the fund. Service clubs and organizations found ways to contribute. Businesses donated time, labour and goods, and encouraged their employees and others to

In the end, some \$710,115.19 was raised. That is a phenomenal amount for a community with 5,500 permanent residents, but obviously many more friends. When matched with provincial assistance it was enough to cover the claims submitted to the Disaster Relief Committee. The total claims approved by the committee for payment was \$1,107,365. Worth noting as well was that the claims presented to the committee could have been much higher if the insurance companies (cajoled by their local agents) hadn't shouldered more of the burden.

It is hard to believe two years have passed since the flood. The photos and the statistics that were part of the presentation to council vividly brought back the memories of that troubling time and how far we have come since then.

After the anguish and heartbreak of the flood we have learned a great deal about ourselves and our community. First and foremost, as much as it is in our grasp to do so, we should never allow something like that flood to happen again. I'll leave it to experts who study these things to work out how to make the community safe from flooding, but that has to be the top priority. Secondly, while the community took a major body hit, it came back and demonstrated a resilience that we should all be proud of. And third, when disaster strikes, no one stands alone. The outpouring of support, in its many forms, proved that we care about our fellow citizens. They are all neighbours, even when they don't live next door or down the

Let's hope the Gull River, which adds so much to the beauty of Minden Village, will continue to do just that and nothing more.



### Lucky escape in Tory Hill

Three people are lucky to be alive after their vehicle was struck by a transport at the intersection of Highway 118 and County Road 503 in Tory Hill on June 16.

The accident happened at around 5:20 a.m. The 17-year-old female driver, from Alberta, was travelling east on Highway 118 in her Honda Civic and failed to stop at the intersection's stop sign. As she drove through the intersection, she was hit by the transport. Both the driver and two other occupants were taken to hospital and treated for non-life threatening injuries. The driver was charged with careless driving. Both the transport's driver and passenger were uninjured in the collision.

On the scene, the transport driver told The Highlander that he saw the Civic go through the stop sign and just had enough time to swerve over onto the opposite shoulder of the road. As a result of his actions, the transport clipped the Civic instead of hitting it directly, and he was able to maintain control of the truck and park it safely on the side of the road.

### Telehomecare coming to county

Haliburton County residents with heart health issues are about to receive access to technology that will allow them to stay healthy at home.

The Telehomecare (THC) pilot launched by Ontario Telehealth Network (OTN) in 2007 will be rolled out to targeted local patients, most likely this fall, according to Varouj Eskedjian.

The CEO of Haliburton Highlands Health Services (HHHS) presented the news to participants at the Economic Innovations in the Haliburton Highlands conference, hosted at Pinestone Resort by the Haliburton County Development Corporation (HCDC) June 10.

The THC program provides the patient with a scale, a blood pressure monitor, a pulse oximeter to monitor oxygen saturation in the blood, and a tablet-style computer.

Patients perform the tests and transmit the information to a THC nurse, who monitors their health and provides education and coaching. The information is passed on to the patient's care team.

"The technology is pretty easy to use," said Eskedjian. "I think a lot of seniors do use technology and are pretty innovative ... but the other thing is that we can train individuals

if the technology is easy."

"We'll be recruiting a nurse that will deploy the technology, train the individual and be the local person so that if the cardiologist ... says there are some issues here that need to be monitored, the nurse can go into the home."

Eskedjian reported that 87 per cent of patients already participating in THC would definitely recommend the program to others, and at the six-month mark following THC patient discharge from hospital, the program has shown sustained reductions in emergency department visits of between 56 and 71 per cent, and in inpatient admissions of between 56 and 76 per cent.

The program is best for patients in terms of improved health care in the home, and for the health care system in terms of overall cost, Eskedjian concluded. Haliburton Highlands Health Services will benefit as a smaller system serving an aging patient population over a large, sparsely populated area.

In a later interview, Eskedjian said HHHS will fund the THC staffing, equipment and any supply costs.

Under its strategic plan, HHHS is positioning itself as a leader in innovative rural health care, and Telehomecare is a strong fit. Eskedjian said the HCDC agrees and will provide some funding at an amount yet to be determined.

## A Boshkung brew above the rest

After a year in business, Boshkung Brewing Co. has proven their worth by taking home two awards at this year's Canadian Brewing Awards.

The local craft brewery, which is located in Carnarvon, won gold for their North Country Kellerbier and silver for their 35 & 118 Cream Ale at an event in Niagara Falls on June 6.

"Winning gold was a complete shock," said Terri Matthews-Carl, who owns the business with her husband Christoph.

"I would say there was a fair bit of surprise, especially being such a new brewery," said brewmaster Johnny Briggs.

According to their website, the Canadian Brewing Awards are "the premiere competition for judging the quality of Canadian brewed beer." A panel of about 25 certified beer judges tested each sample for aroma, appearance, flavour, mouth-feel, and overall impression when judging the beer.

Breweries of all sizes, from across the country, are able to enter the 40 available categories. Although they are unaware of how many competitors they

faced. Matthews-Carl said a total of 195 breweries entered all of the categories combined.

"It's the largest judged beer awards for Canada," said Briggs.

For doing so well, they were asked to attend the grand opening of the Niagara Brewing Company the following day. They also were given a 1.5-litre golden cup for the brewmaster.

Their two award-winning beers were the first beers they created when the business first started, and they continue to be the brewery's two most popular selections amongst customers.

"They are our most popular beers to begin with," said Matthews-Carl. "It's just confirmation that they're as good as our customers always tell us."

Within the same building, the couple also owns and operates Rhubarb Restaurant. Christoph said the recognition is good for that establishment as well as the county.

"[We've had] lots of great feedback. Lots of congratulations and people excited," said Matthews-Carl.

Since opening, Briggs said the brewery has produced 11 different beers.

## Local Bitcoin wallet launches in Haliburton County

A Bitcoin digital currency wallet has arrived in Haliburton County with the birth of Cancoin, a Bitcoin wallet and marketing company established by Shawn and Tyler Butchart.

The brothers announced their new county-based enterprise at the Economic Innovations in the Haliburton Highlands conference on June 10. The conference was hosted by the Haliburton County Development Corporation (HCDC) at Pinestone Resort.

Bitcoin is a global digital currency that is passed directly from person to person, which means money changes hands electronically without the aid of a traditional financial institution.

Bitcoin users keep their coins in a virtual "wallet" guarded by highly encrypted security and use a secure "key" — a series of 256 digits chosen by the user — as a password. The brothers said no personal information is required, including credit card numbers, and the key cannot be linked directly to the user.

For their Cancoin wallet, launched on June 1, the Butcharts have implemented additional multi-signature security which requires a second key.

The brothers advised attendees to consider a Bitcoin as a gold coin that can be emailed, and the wallet as a safety deposit box requiring two keys. The value of a Bitcoin changes like that of gold – a Bitcoin was trading at \$281 Canadian that day – and one Bitcoin can be used for multiple transactions.

The Butcharts label themselves among the 12 Bitcoin experts in Canada. Shawn, a user-interface specialist, has worked with top Canadian companies. Tyler's credentials include creating highly secure, scalable applications for Scotiabank that are still in use.

The Bitcoin system is public, so no one can own it. Tyler noted the Canadian senate recently decided to wait five years before regulating Bitcoin to avoid stifling innovation or risk losing it to another country.

"I think what that means is that Canada's going to be a great place for Bitcoin," said Shawn.

He said daily Bitcoin transactions have reached about 100,000 between Canada and the US, and 100,000 globally, including sales from Microsoft, Dell, and other major companies. That doesn't include transactions with brick-and-mortar stores, which are increasing.

So why set up shop in Haliburton? The

brothers love it and already spread their time between Haliburton and Toronto.

As well, they want to bring the "phenomenon called Bitcoin tourism" to the county, said Tyler. "Bitcoin boulevards" are popping up around the world, where streets market themselves as accepting Bitcoin via small, easily established payment terminals.

"If we could convince a number of merchants in Haliburton or Minden to start accepting Bitcoin, then maybe we'll have some more tourists coming here, specifically to spend their Bitcoin," said Tyler.

"There's a lot of people that are holding a lot of Bitcoin and they're looking for ways to spend them," said Shawn.

Haliburton will also be an "amazing spot" for their support team when the Butcharts are ready to launch their global marketplace, which will serve as a central transaction hub for Bitcoin users and

businesses

Jim Blake, a consultant with HCDC, notes that for many in Africa and India, banking is done by cell phone, including their paycheque deposits, due to lack of traditional banking and phone infrastructure.

"So something like Bitcoin – wow," said Blake. "It actually could be the future of currency ... And if we just happen to have a business here who are Bitcoin experts, that gives us an edge."

"The kind of tourists you're trying to attract are folks who will travel the world, who do try new things, so they're used to using their technology, but they're also looking to be in a beautiful place," said Blake

He added that being able to say we accept Bitcoin will be a great marketing tool

"All we ask them to do is have a good sale for people," said BIA administrator Gail Stelter.


Businesses only need to be located within the BIA's boundaries to participate.



## Turtles stay safe thanks to barrier wall

The Haliburton Highlands Land Trust's (HHLT) turtle project is helping protect the local turtle population.

According to Sheila Ziman, a founding director of the HHLT, a barrier wall that has been erected on both sides of an existing culvert on Gelert Road is serving its purpose.

"Within the first 20 hours we were able to document four turtles using the culvert as an underpass," wrote Ziman in an email. "And just as important, turtles are not walking around the ends of the fence (which they could easily do), but are turning back into the

The barrier wall was erected in October 2014 as part of a three-year study on turtle road mortality mitigation. Turtles are able to use the culvert in both directions, moving with a field as England and Australia," said Ziman. the current and against it.

"We are very excited and pleased that the design of the barrier wall seems to be doing what was intended – keeping turtles off the road while still allowing them to move from wetland to wetland," said Ziman.

Volunteers have been integral to the success of the project thus far. Last year, 120 people logged 2,800 hours as monitors to help determine the most suitable location for

the observations from our turtle monitors," she said.

A press release from the HHLT states that road mortality is the leading cause of population declines in turtles. In Haliburton County, five out of six species are at risk.

The main objective of the project is to "test a unique mitigation design for keeping turtles off the road while they travel from hibernation sites into feeding, mating and nesting sites."

Three sites are currently being monitored daily for turtle activity, including the test site and two control sites.

The unique project has drawn interest from near and far.

"This is a unique design and has never been done anywhere else. We have had a lot of interest in this project from other conservation organizations, businesses, scientists and government. There has been interest as far

It's also raised awareness about turtles in the area, and what people can do to ensure their safety.

"I really believe that turtle road mortality was reduced last year because so many people saw our monitors on the roads and slowed down. Many shared stories about helping turtles cross the roads."

Turtle monitoring opportunities are available immediately. Training is provided.

## Food for Kids celebrates volunteer commitment

About 140,000 healthy meals are provided to children across Haliburton County each year because of their commitment.

## Emmerson digs deep into county history

It's a story that needed to be told.

Kim Emmerson is a bit of a local history buff. So when he stumbled upon a missing chapter in the county's history books, he decided to do some digging.

"I am kind of interested in local history," said Emmerson. "I'm somewhat connected a bit to this history because this property [Emmerson Lumber] was integral to the founding of the community, and this person was part of that process. It's kind of my roots, in a way."

That person was Alexander Niven, who came to Haliburton in 1868, four years after the first settlers arrived.

Emmerson, having read up on the county's history, was aware of Niven. But there was a conspicuous lack of details about who he was and the things he accomplished.

"I didn't know if I'd have enough to make a book when I started out, but in the end, I had to discard some stuff because I had so much," he said.

The result of Emmerson's year-long project is a book titled *Alexander Niven: The Biography of an Early Haliburton County Surveyor*. He started researching the book in January 2014 and had it to press just after Christmas the same year.

"When readers have a chance to understand what this person did for the community, they will see it's a story that needed to be told," he said.

The most concrete document anybody had related to Niven was a personal diary from 1869.

"I was able to get a hold of the diary and also I discovered a few more diaries that no one had seen."

This was a good start for Emmerson, as it provided the source material he was looking for.

"I really didn't want to interview people because there's no one living who would know [him], and any stories they know would be passed down and inaccurate," he said. "So I went for source documentation."

The 10,000-word bibliography is testament to Emmerson's success. After reading the

diaries, he ordered documents from Library and Archives Canada in Ottawa, and the museums in St. Marys, Ontario, and Niagaraon-the-Lake. He also found numerous relevant source documents online.

So who was Alexander Niven?

"Everybody thought he surveyed Haliburton County, but that's not true," said Emmerson. "He was a surveyor and did surveys here, but did he survey the county? No."

In actuality, Niven was the county's first real estate agent. He sold land on behalf of the Canadian Immigration Company. But that's not all.

"Today we have to be so careful of conflict of interest, but there was no conflict of interest back then."

Niven was also the county's first warden; he spent 10 years (not consecutively) as Dysart's reeve; was the local insurance agent, loans officer, and surveyor; was the stipendiary magistrate (a district judge); he was responsible for the railway coming to Haliburton; he was Haliburton County's biggest farmer and the village's largest landowner; and he was responsible for bringing the Presbyterian church to the county.

"He did so much," said Emmerson. "So much."

Another of his jobs, and the one that links Niven and Emmerson, is that he used to count logs as they flowed over the dam. That same dam is owned by the Emmerson family today.

Haliburton County was developed over logs, Emmerson said.

"A telegraph reproduced in the book says there's 100,000 logs coming over that dam this spring. I read in a previous history book that the logs would come out to Head Lake, and you could actually walk across the lake and get to the other side without getting wet."

It wasn't unusual for people in the community to wear several hats, he said, but Niven wore more than most.

"Actually, that led to his marital demise. Too much work. He would be gone all the time, so she took the kids and left. This is the 1800s, that didn't happen a lot."

While he had a general sense of the man when he started the book, Emmerson said he had no idea just how important Niven was to the county.

"I was happy I was able to make a story out of it that wasn't going to be boring, because who wants a boring history book, right?"

According to Emmerson's research, Niven was anything but boring.

As the founding member of the Survey Association of Ontario, Niven would attend surveying conventions and galas. One document found in Emmerson's research was the seating plan for one such gala at which Niven was in attendance. Seated directly next to him at that dinner was Sir Sanford Fleming.

"That's kind of cool. Nobody knows that stuff."

During Niven's time in St. Marys, Niven would often communicate via telegraphs from the railway depot.

"The telegraph operator was Thomas Edison. *The Thomas Edison*."

These are just some of the stories that are told in the book, which is written in such a

way as to appeal to readers both young and

"I've written it as a story, so it's readable, instead of a bunch of facts and figures," he said. "It's about a person. The human factor will keep readers interested."

Alexander Niven died in 1911 and was buried at the Evergreen Cemetery in Haliburton, the very same cemetery he surveyed for \$2, 30 years earlier.

The book's cover is a portrait taken by famous Canadian photographer William Notman. Emmerson is proud of that photo, and many others that are found throughout the book

Alexander Niven: The Biography of an Early Haliburton County Sureyor is available in hard cover, soft cover, and in e-book format. Emmerson will be signing copies of his book at the Haliburton Museum on June 23 at 7 p.m. Proceeds from the sale at the book signing will benefit the museum. The book goes on sale at Master's Book Store in Haliburton on June 24.



"My coach will be racing as well, which will make it more challenging," he said.

That sentiment was shared more than once during the 37th annual Haliburton Highlands Secondary School Athletic Banquet held in the Northern Lights Performing Arts Pavilion on June 10.

Throughout the night, high school students in a variety of individual and team sports were handed awards for their outstanding dedication, leadership and results. Although not everyone walked away with some hardware, each athlete had the opportunity to step on stage as their coaches looked back on some of the highlights from the season.

Ron Yake, event organizer and head of the physical education department, spoke of how participating in athletics offers many benefits.

"Students involved in athletics get a chance to grow," he said, adding that the school's coaches are well aware of the value to students

"People get a chance to grow through their physical activity, but also through their social interactions."

While winning is the ultimate goal, growth

is also achieved through defeat.

"They get to relish on the sweetness of victory and they try to understand their shortfalls and the agony of defeat. To win is not everything: an athlete that strives to win is always the winner," said Yake.

The two highest individual honours of the night went to Grade 12 student Erin Little and Grade 11 student Ryan Hill, both of whom were named Athlete of the Year.

"Last week we had a coaches meeting to decide on this athlete [to add him] to our top athletes, and there was an overwhelming response to the person chosen," said track and field coach Bruce Griffith, referring to Hill.

"It's not an easy task to decide on which one individual in our school amongst such great athletes deserves this award, but when you think about what this young man has accomplished this year you'll all agree that this person is an elite athlete," he said.

Griffith described the recipient as "a wild child" who was "always running, jumping, throwing."

This past year, the senior track star won COSSA gold and advanced to OFSAA. He set a record for the school with a 48-metre throw in javelin. He was a member of the Kawartha and COSSA A/AA championship-

winning varsity boys hockey team. He also earned the Most Valuable Player award for his performance with the senior boys football team.

"He wants to be the best and he works to get there," said Griffith, who called Hill "a wonderful young man" with big dreams after high school.

Hill kept his acceptance speech short and sweet, thanking his biggest supporters.

"First of all, I'd just like to thank Griff for that amazing speech," he said. "And I'd like to thank all my amazing coaches ... and especially my parents. Thanks for everything, so much, and my sister. [I'd like to] thank her, too."

Field hockey coach Caley Sisson used a quote from baseball legend Babe Ruth to sum up some of the character traits of this year's female recipient, Little.

"It's hard to beat a person that never gives up," reads the quote.

"Hard work, determination and persistence are key ingredients with this attitude that can make the difference between an average athlete and an elite athlete," said Sisson.

Little fits in the latter category. Over the past four years, she has represented the school in field hockey, ice hockey, badminton and track and field.

"She was the workhorse that played not only offensively but defensively as well," said Sisson of Little's role on the field hockey team.

In the sport, she represented HHSS at two all-Ontario OFSAA championships, achieved four Kawartha championships, and was a two-time COSSA champion and a COSSA finalist this year.

"Her commitment to athletics and fitness is second to none."

Little thanked all of her coaches for helping her grow as an athlete, and her teammates who have become her "family and best friends."

She fought to hold back tears as she gave special thanks to her family.

"I would like to give a big thank-you to my family, especially my dad because he's always been there for me and he's encouraged me," she said.

Both Hill and Little were presented a trophy, which will have their name engraved on it. This, along with their photo, will be permanently displayed in the athletic hall of the school.

A number of athletes were given cumulative awards through the four-year program.



be overwhelming and we all experience it differently," she said.


Roe said the program provides "compassionate care for those who are grieving.'





## Exciting changes at this year's Mud Bog

With a bigger mud pit and the introduction of trucks to the event, this year's Mud Bog and Show and Shine event hosted by the Kinsmen Club of Minden is going to be more spectacular than ever.

Jim Carrell, treasurer for the club, said this year's mud pit is going to be longer and wider, and he's excited to see the trucks go through it.

"It's a big deal for us," he said. "It's something we did years ago but we haven't done for quite some time."

The trucks will be split in two classes:

modified and unmodified.

"There's a contingent of Jeeps that want to come, so we may have a separate class for the Jeeps if they come in the numbers they're talking about," he said.

Every year, the mud bog draws hundreds of spectators.

"It's the competition and the mud flying and people having fun with their ATVs," said Carrell. "That's the attraction."

Registration happens the morning of the event. The ATVs begin their mud bog competition at 9 a.m. The trucks will start at noon and run simultaneously with the truck pull event.

"The truck pull itself, everything from pickups to log trucks, and everything in

between, will take a stab at the pull sled. It's done by distance, how far they pull it."

The truck pull track and bog pit are side-byside, making it easier for spectators to enjoy both events without a break in the action.

"As the pull sled is pulled back, that's when one of the mud bog trucks will go," explained Carrell. "Basically, they're running at the same time. It's better for spectators, they won't have to sit and wait between each run. They'll have something to watch."

When spectators are tired of watching dirty vehicles, they can walk the grounds and enjoy the show and shine entries. Trucks of all sorts will be on display, looking their best and cleanest. The Minden Time Travellers will also be on hand with some of their vintage

vehicles.

Camping is available on the grounds for those who want to stay the night. It's \$20 per night, or \$30 if you want hydro. There will be a food booth and beer tent as well.

"It's a full day of entertainment," said Carrell.

Money raised through the event will help the Kinsmen support the local community and its projects, and cystic fibrosis initiatives.

The Mud Bog and Show and Shine is happening at the Minden Fairgrounds on June 20. Tickets are \$12 for adults, \$6 for kids and seniors, and children under 12 enter for free.
