## Lightning sets off fires in Dysart et al

Lightning strikes are suspected of causing two separate fires in the Haliburton area on Aug. 11.

The most serious of the calls resulted in \$60,000 worth of damage to a cottage at 1171 Old Browns Camp Lane when a fire started in the basement around 4:30 p.m.

Ten Dysart firefighters responded to the scene and a call was placed for mutual aid from Minden Hills.

According to a press release, the two occupants were able to control the blaze with a fire extinguisher before firefighters arrived. They made it out safely, but were assessed for smoke inhalation by paramedics.

"It [lightning] probably hit the ground

someplace," said Dysart fire chief Miles Maughan, who was at another call during that time.

Although the building isn't a writeoff, Maughan said that some wiring and plumbing will need to be repaired. There was also smoke damage.

"[There's] probably \$20,000 worth of cleaning," he said.

The owner wasn't at the property

and Maughan was unsure if they had insurance. He planned on visiting the scene the following day.

Earlier that day, the department received a report of a lightning strike at Red Pine Lake. However, their search turned up nothing.

"It's a water access lake, so there's no roads around it," he explained. "Somebody

## SIRCH cancels bus tours ahead of schedule

The "Hop On Hop Off Bus" has come to a halt two weeks ahead of its eight-week schedule.

The pilot project, which was led by SIRCH Community Services and the Thrift Warehouse, drove through town for the last time this summer on Aug. 4.

"It was [a decision] made by our board and

it was because of additional costs that we hadn't known about, which had to do with mostly gas," said Gena Robertson, executive director of SIRCH.

Using a 14-seat bus from The Rural Overland Utility Transit (TROUT) out of Bancroft, visitors and residents were able to visit a number of businesses and other popular destinations in West Guilford, Minden and Carnarvon. The bus travelled the loop three times every Tuesday.

Riders paid \$12 (children 12 and under

were free).

Each trip included on-board entertainment from conductor George Farrell, who provided interesting facts along the way.

The project was made possible, in large part, due to sponsorships from local businesses.

When sponsors were notified of the early cancellation, they responded positively to the news.

"They are all like so incredibly positive," said Robertson. "They want to do it again

next year ... and people have already offered to help with it."

SIRCH's board will do an in-depth review of the pilot before making any plans for next year.

"We'll look at the whole thing and see whether there's better routes, whether there's better times, if there's other partners for next year," she said.

SIRCH is looking for feedback from riders that will help them going forward. To contact them directly call 705-457-1742.

## No charges in Bobcaygeon death

Details about a suspicious vehicle that was stopped in Algonquin Highlands on July 15 – and closed the highway – are still vague. However, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have confirmed the vehicle was linked to an incident on Fall's Bay Road near Bobcaygeon, where an intruder died at a residence there.

"The car was linked to the intruder but it was a non-issue," said OPP acting sergeant Lynda Cranney. "It was just to put a hold on it and check it."

The police investigation determined a homeowner encountered an armed intruder in the home. The intruder died after what police described as a brief interaction. The deceased was Robert Leslie Martin, 43, of Spruce Grove, Alberta.

No charges will be laid against the homeowner.

Further details about the suspicious vehicle have not been released.

Highway 35 was closed from Little Hawk Lake road to Kushog Lake road for about eight hours from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on July 15.

## Minden planners host community energy meeting

A public meeting to gather feedback from community members about the future use of renewable energy options in the Minden area was attended by 20 people, but organizers and council members weren't discouraged by the small turnout.

"Sometimes it takes a first meeting to get it out that this will be a perpetual type of input," said attendee Brent Devolin. "[People not in attendance] haven't missed the only opportunity."

The meeting was hosted by the Minden Hills' planning and development committee with the support of council on Aug. 5. Attendees heard from town planner Ian Clendening about the renewable energy projects being proposed under the Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO) and broke into groups to discuss suggestions and ideas council might use to move forward in making decisions.

"We'd like advice and help on how to choose which [projects] are in the public interest and which are not," said Devolin.

Organizers were able to collect feedback from attendees to better gauge public opinion.

"People believe it has a place in our life, but they're careful about it and want to be active partners in what 'good' looks like here," said Fay Martin. "They don't want it done to them.'

Councillor Pam Sayne said a suggestion to help residents have easy access to input by making a survey from the meeting available online will go to the next planning meeting and might be implemented in the future. She said such a survey would benefit interested people who weren't able to attend the meeting due to schedule conflicts.

"The number of people there certainly doesn't represent the interest because all of us have been getting lots of emails from people," she said. "We're very excited about getting feedback so more people can engage."

With so much technology all around us fueling an instant-gratification-orientated society, it's no wonder that it's easy for kids to get bored these days.

Even before social media was "in" teens were taking up habits that weren't the healthiest for them when options were limited. To this day, I can still recall one of my high school classmates telling me that he picked up smoking because "there wasn't anything else to do" in Haliburton.

He was just one of the many other teens who could be found in the designated smoking area during break and lunch hour. It sure was a social spectacle, but one I couldn't comprehend at the time.

Although it's an activity I don't condone amongst the teenage population, I can see where they're coming from. Back then (which was 15 years ago) students had limited options when it came to their free time. Most seemed to roam around the school on lunch break or hang out in the hallways in organized cliques. Those fortunate enough to afford their own sled were able to spend countless hours enjoying this outdoor activity in the winter months.

We need more Postis and Cochranes to bring their action plans forward, and keep up this momentum. It's not only what's best for our youth, but it's what's right for our community.

## **Wood piles**

Ah, August. The seasons are changing. It is a bit cooler at night and the mist lingers a little longer in the morning. Occasionally you can catch the hint of wood smoke in the air.

For those of us who heat with wood, the deadline for getting this year's burnables under cover is long passed. Of course, the clever ones always have at least a year's worth of wood banked ahead. Those who like living on the edge believe that Aug. 1 is the absolute last date for securing material for next winter's burn... any later and you spend a lot of energy boiling off the water before getting the wood to ignite.

The purist will tell you that Aug. 1 is way too late, but considering the last log will be burned in the spring, there's lots of time for the drying impact of minus 30 degrees to work its magic. As a matter of fact, there's nothing I like better than stepping outside on a frigid January night and hearing the snap of trees in the moonlight and wondering if the piled wood is doing the same.

August also marks the start of the visits by the woodpile inspection team. This little known program has been active in the Highlands for decades. Starting Aug. 1, inspectors fan out through the county to inspect wood piles. Theirs is no easy task, and often these hardworking inspectors find themselves at odds with the good citizens of the community. While some have objected to their visits as an intrusion on personal rights and freedoms, others have questioned the need for enforcement of what they describe as archaic regulations. Still others have recognized the intrinsic value of orderly wood piles in a county such as ours.

Wood pile inspectors are looking for a number of infractions. First and foremost they want to see sharp corners, corners that are within a few degrees of 90 in all three directions. And, of course, from precise corners come straight edges tops and sides. The inspectors are searching for uneven corners, sloping ends and, well, a wood pile that just seems to peter out. A well-constructed pile of wood can in fact be a thing of pristine beauty, so endearing that one is tempted to not break the symmetry by tossing the components into the blazing hearth.

Another infraction high on their list is moisture content. Old timers can generally tell how much moisture there is in a chunk of firewood by holding the split side of the piece up to his or her cheek. Ready to burn firewood will feel dry. There are more sophisticated methods of checking on

firewood, including checking for checking (the fine lines that appear at the ends of a log, much like the wrinkles on the faces of individuals who are equally well-aged). A good rule of thumb is: the greater the checking the drier the wood. And

there is also the moisture meter, employed by most dedicated aficionados. Utilizing the probe like end, the operator inserts it into the freshly opened gash on a log and hopes the meter does not go past 20. High scores in this endeavour are not desirable. Lower scores are often difficult to achieve without employing the often overlooked benefits of oven-drying. I'll let the reader decide how much effort they want to put into impressing the inspection

Thank goodness that at least one of the regulations has been recently struck from the books.

For many years it was a serious misdemeanour to pile different wood species together. In the early days, those who carelessly co-mingled maple with beech and oak, for example, were often made to dismantle their pile and reassemble it with like species next to like species and a discreet, but noticeable separation between the groups. You can still find examples of this in central Blairhamption (please: always carry flares and some extra food). No one really seemed to understand why this was considered such an abomination, but after some devil-may-care radicals on the Irish Line dared to pile not only various species of hardwoods together, they even threw in an occasional slice of softwood, did the authorities capitulate and withdraw this pesky part of the ordinance.

The wood pile inspection team is still on the job. Plumb bob, hatchet and moisture meters on their utility belts, they scour the back roads of the county in search of miscreants who think they can get away with anything when it comes to wood piles. We salute these upholders of this ancient code and wish them Godspeed.

As poet Robert Frost once observed, in his much quoted poem The Wood-Pile:

It was a cord of maple, cut and split

And piled – and measured, four by four by eight.

And not another like it could I see.

called it in ... that there was a lightning strike and then he thought he saw smoke coming up. We couldn't find it."
Shortly after 7 p.m., a tree was struck by lightning off Whippletree Lane in the Little Redstone Lake area.
Maughan said that firefighters were able to locate the fire with the help of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry.

"MNR were flying over it with their helicopter and a report had come in to us."

Six Dysart firefighters responded to the call and were able to extinguish the fire before dark.

Maughan said it's unusual to receive multiple calls about lightning strikes in one day.

He advises the public to stay indoors and off the water during a thunderstorm. When a storm has ended, it's wise to look around for signs for damage.

## Wasps intended to protect garlic crop

Hundreds of parasitoid wasps have been released in the Minden area to help reduce the spread of the leek moth, an invasive species that has wreaked havoc on local garlic crops.

Senior research technician Andrea Brauner and research scientist Peter Mason, both with Agriculture and Agrifood Canada, travelled from Ottawa to the Highlands on Aug. 6.

Their recent visit is part of a three-year research project to find ways to protect garlic crops from pests. The project is being led by the U-Links Centre for Community-Based Research in partnership with the Haliburton County Garlic Growers' Association and the Haliburton County Farmers' Market Association.

"The strategy here to introduce a parasitoid that attacks one of the life stages is very helpful," explained Mason. "The parasitoid will actually go and find them and put its eggs in there, and it kills them basically."

According to the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs, the leek moth, also known as Acrolepiopsis assectella Zeller, is an invasive alien species of European origin that damages garlic, leeks and onions. It does this by feeding on the leaves of the plant, which affects the growth of the bulb below ground. In many cases, the damage is so extensive that the plant can't be sold for consumption.

Based on their early findings, U-Links applied for funding from the Agricultural

Adaptation Council's Growing Forward 2 Fund, which supports research around agriculture. They also received support from the Haliburton County Development Corporation. The scope of the project was then expanded to include bulb and stem nematode, which are microscopic pests in the soil.

Over the past several months, local volunteers have monitored several sites to document the impact of these pests. There are currently seven sites in total.

"All of the monitors are garlic growers and three of the seven sites are actual garlic patches," said Emma Horrigan, U-Links director and community researcher. "Initially the project started with 15 sites but over time we reduced the number of sites so that we're only monitoring those that have the highest leek moth population."

By releasing the parasitic wasps near plants where the leek moth is present, the hope is that they will reduce the number of leek moths at the site.

Similar studies conducted in Almonte and Waterloo have shown promising results.

"We have had success with finding populations that have overwintered," said Mason

Over 500 females and about 400 males were released on Angel and Richard Taylor's property. The local farmers have experienced, first-hand, the devastation caused by the leek moth

"About three years ago we planted 10,000 [garlic cloves]," recalled Richard. "I would

When released, the wasps quickly made

their way to the garlic stalks and got to work. "They don't mess around," said Brauner. "They get right to business."

Mason pointed out that several releases would occur in one year at the same site over a period of years.

"We would constantly try to determine whether or not there's evidence that this is hanging around and attacking the pests."

Mason made it clear that this particular wasp won't sting humans.

"There's relatively few that people know about and are afraid of," he said.

Moving forward, volunteers will continue to monitor the plants for leek moth pupae as well as adults. Pheromone traps are used to determine the number of adult leek moths at each site.

"If the wasps are doing their job and reducing the leek moth population, we will hopefully see a reduction in the total number of moths caught in the traps," said Horrigan.

She noted that this research will "expand our understanding of the impact of garlic pests across a wide range of environmental conditions, and most importantly engages growers in the development of tools to help reduce damage that are both practical and scientifically sound."

The research will continue into next year and results will be shared widely through field days, workshops, events and articles.

In addition to the release, Mason and Brauner visited the other sites with wild leek traps that capture the leek moth. The traps enable them to see what the total population is and their flight patterns.

## Art vandalized at Agnes Jamieson

It's understood to most art gallery visitors that touching the work is strictly prohibited.

But someone forget to mention that to one – or possibly several – Agnes Jamieson Gallery visitors who decided to vandalize one of the installations there, not just once, but several times.

The installation belongs to Minden artist Michael Bainbridge. He, along with fellow artists Gary Blundell and Christy Haldane, created the *First Kingdom: Art of the Canadian Shield* exhibition currently on display at the Agnes Jamieson.

Bainbridge's installation is housed in a private room off of the main gallery. The vandalized portion is part of the Three Kingdoms installation. A silver platter rests upon a pedestal, and on the platter are materials meant to represent antimony black, ceruse white, and vermillion. In reality, the materials are grease black paint, white ground marble, and a solid stick of real vermillion.

"The installation is meant to represent three poisonous pigments that were used commonly in haute couture in the Victorian Era," said Bainbridge. "It's a cautionary tale about being careful when messing with nature. We don't always know what we're doing."

It was only a day after installation the piece that Bainbridge's work was first vandalized. A carefully placed pile of sale on one of his installations was flattened, and in it, a smiley face was drawn.

"That sort of made me rethink the whole thing," he said. "Maybe people just think this is supposed to be interactive. I had a moment of maybe that's ok ... and then I thought some more about it, and thought no, I don't want people in my artistic statement contemplating a smiley face."

"They're going to be looking at the smiley face and wondering what I intended by it."

But that was only the beginning. After repairing his installation several times – someone had poked and prodded at the salt and the paints – he was appalled when his work was truly vandalized.

"I went into the gallery to prepare a couple of prints that had been sold to go out of the gallery to the customer, and discovered that someone had decimated, essentially, a part of

the installation I had which consisted of three different types of mineral pigments on a silver platter," Bainbridge said. "They had taken black paint and smeared it all over the plate. There's a little pile of white powder, there was black grease in that, and it had been smeared all over the plate. And in particular there is a grinding dish with a vermillion ink stick in it, which had been broken free from the dish and it was covered in black grease."

"It was completely ruined."

For Bainbridge, it's one thing if the vandalism only affected a single installation. However, the entire exhibition, including the work of the other two artists, is impacted by these acts.

"Every piece in there is carefully considered to present an individual statement for the piece, a larger statement for the body of work each of the three of us had put in, and then an overall concept the three of us are working together towards," he said. "That any one of those pieces, be it mine or anyone else's, should be inconsistent with any of those messages means that whoever goes into the gallery doesn't have the opportunity to get fully from it what we intended."

As a result, Bainbridge said he's going to have to put up a sign that instructs visitors not to touch the exhibit. He said that impacts his artistic statement, as he purposefully left a sign out of the exhibit so as to keep the installation approachable.

"I don't ascribe any blame to the [Agnes Jamieson] Gallery," said Bainbridge. "It is an unfortunate trend in society that seems to be growing, and that's why I got so upset."

Bainbridge said his anger is aimed at this societal trend.

"I don't care who it was or what their motivations were, that just isn't ok and I think there just aren't enough people in society reinforcing that message," he said. "I consider it possible there was some mal intent, but I think it's just as egregious if somebody were to go in there and be so oblivious to not pause for a moment to think of the consequences of such an act. That even if they didn't mean to do harm, that they should not give enough thought to their actions to consider that it might be harmful, I think is just as bad."

He said this trend is not just in the art world, but can be seen anywhere across society where people no longer know – or just don't care – about others and the consequences of their actions.

"It's not so much I'm angry at someone or about my piece, but rather it's just disappointing in a much larger sense that this is the state of affairs, and for the love of God we've got to do something about it. It starts by talking about it and calling it out for what it is."



## Arts Council chair resigns over SPARC project

After serving less than a year in the role, Laurie Carmount has resigned as chair of the Arts Council~Haliburton Highlands (ACHH).

Carmount officially withdrew from the board on July 17 because she wasn't in favour of a recent decision to provide increased support to Supporting Performing Arts in Rural Communities (SPARC).

"After serious consideration I was not in support of SPARC," wrote Carmount in an email. "The board voted to now become the lead for this project over three years for a considerable amount of money."

Carmount, who works for the Township of Minden Hills as curator of the Minden Hills Cultural Centre, felt that the decision didn't support a majority of the organization's members, nor was it the right time considering their current financial position.

"[If things] were to go awry or they had an issue where they were held responsible ... I don't know where the money would come from to cover any potential errors. Not to say that there would be, but to me that was too much of a risk," she said, adding "they're working at a point where they're trying to get the books balanced."

The local, not-for-profit arts organization has been involved with SPARC since its inception in 2011, along with Highlands Performing Arts and Canadian Heritage. A

working group was then formed with various collaborating partners, including the Arts Council, under the auspices of the Haliburton County Community Co-operative to launch a four-day symposium in April of last year. At that time, the SPARC acronym stood for the Symposium for the Performing Arts in Rural Communities.

"After the successful SPARC Symposium in 2014, SPARC and the Arts Council were encouraged by Canadian Heritage and [the] Ontario Trillium Foundation to continue to grow the project, including networking with other regions of the province and beyond, with respect to the performing arts, hosting a second symposium and creating an online network that will connect arts presenters, producers, creators and animateurs," said interim chair Erin Kernohan-Berning.

Kernohan-Berning explained that the co-operative was the main fiduciary partner for SPARC during the previous round of grants. Funders included the Haliburton County Development Corporation (HCDC), Canadian Heritage and the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF), which provided the initiative over \$100,000 over a period of one year.

Now, however, the Arts Council has agreed to take on this role for the next round of grants.

"It is seen as a natural progression in the role of ACHH with its performing arts community members," said Kernohan-Berning.

The board has already applied for Canada

Arts Presentation Fund Grants under Canadian Heritage "to grow the network component of SPARC" and will be applying for \$500,000 over three years from the OTF, part of which would cover expenses for the next symposium in 2016. The money would also support the growth of the network, staff expenses, and office and administration fees incurred by the Arts Council.

"If successful, the Arts Council will be responsible for administering that grant and will work in partnership with SPARC to ensure that expenditures are made within the funding guidelines, that the required reporting is done and that the project meets its objectives," she said. "SPARC has demonstrated sound administrative and financial management in previous undertakings and the Arts Council will ensure that this continues by providing an additional layer of oversight."

Kernohan-Berning added that this decision is in line with a section of the organization's mandate, which identifies one of their objectives to serve as a "catalyst for community economic development through the arts; and, through the facilitation of collaborative relationships among artists, organizations, businesses and government, contribute to the vibrancy of the arts and community life."

"It's not changing the Arts Council's mission or mandate, rather fulfilling it to a greater extent."

She noted that several Arts Council members

have started volunteering on committees because of SPARC.

"These members are working alongside other arts-related people from across the province to advance performing arts in rural communities and are learning from their colleagues. Together, we are creating a symposium framework and sustainable communication network and providing professional development that is being encouraged by provincial funding organizations."

According to their website, SPARC's mission is to "connect creators, producers, presenters and animateurs to sustain and grow the performing arts in rural and remote communities."

Despite Carmount's comments, Kernohan-Berning said the overall financial picture "looks good."

"We did have a loan from HCDC a couple of years ago because of a cash flow issue, and this has been paid off. We are sitting on a healthy surplus right now, but continue to keep a tight operating budget."

The Arts Council currently has one staff member who works 20 hours per week.


Longtime board member Jennifer Bain also resigned in July; however, her decision was based on personal and professional reasons.


"I spent a great deal of time with the Arts Council and was no longer able to meet the demands that were necessary," she wrote in an email.



## Abbey Gardens talks about carbon

The search for ethical

*guidelines* for human

endeavour is age-old.

"In the decade of the third millennium, is there now a national cabinet anywhere in the world that is guided essentially by the impact of its decisions beyond the next elections?"

This thought-provoking question was one of several posed, and often answered, by the keynote speaker at The Carbon Conversations, a sustainability seminar held Aug. 7 at Abbey Gardens.

Moderated by Dr. Suresh Narine, director of the Trent Centre for Biomaterials Research at Trent University, the seminar was one of a series held by the centre to date to address carbon-related sustainability issues and the world's future.

Scheduled speakers at the Abbey Gardens event included journalist Alana Mitchell, author of *Sea Sick: the Global Ocean in Crisis*; bio-based materials chemist Dr. Jonathan Brekan; retired Major General Joseph Singh, author of *The Role of the Military in Environmental Enforcement*; and Dr. Peter Schleifenbaum, adjunct professor with the University of Toronto's Faculty of Forestry and owner of the Haliburton Forest and Wildlife Reserve.

Keynote speaker Sir Shridath Surendranath "Sonny" Ramphal, 86, received a standing ovation for his remarks. Ramphal served as Guyana's foreign minister from 1972 to 1975 and then as Commonwealth Secretary-General until 1990. He has also held several influential environmental protection roles, including president of the World Conservation Union, and wrote *Our Country, The Planet:* Forging a Partnership for Survival.

Ramphal spoke about the need for sustainable global development in which all nations work together to help Third World countries develop while maintaining the planet's health.

"The search for ethical guidelines for human endeavour is age-old, but it is my premise that never before in human history has the need for these guidelines been as great as it is now," said Ramphal.

We have evolved as "world states, separated by frontiers" and our loyalty and solidarity have developed in relation

to our individual communities, he told participants. Recognizing the planet as our country does not mean that we need to end nation states, but that we do need to work together. Ramphal spoke of the Gulf War and the Suez Crisis and other events in which

greed over "black gold" – oil

– harmed the environment.

However, he noted that
such circumstances are not
new and that in the

past, similar events occurred over commodities such as gold, silver, and sugar.

"Future

generations
must be at the
forefront of our
attention as our
carbon conversations
consider the challenge
to human survival,"
said Ramphal. "In a
very real sense, we
do borrow the present
from the future."

The world's indigenous peoples have much to teach us, "particularly in their evolved respect

for nature, their caring for the earth, and their intuitive understanding of the value of sustainable living," said Ramphal.

He noted that when the early Iroquois met in council, they began with the commitment to consider the impact of their decisions on the next seven generations.

The "ethic of human survival" requires us to consider that we stand poised between a new globalism that can bring a more civilized society that is governed by worldwide, enforceable laws, and a return to "old instincts of power, arbitrariness and self-centred nationalism," said Ramphal.

Yet that ethic also helps us "to shape our responses, and to lead us to the right choices...accepting that all must care for earth if the future is to be secure for any."

Ramphal noted that many have recognized this, and that younger generations are increasingly willing to act to ensure they inherit a habitable world.

"The ethic of survival is evolving in manifold ways. We need to nourish it and to let it guide us as we begin our carbon conversations."

One attendee asked Ramphal if there is one thing each person can do.

"There is no one thing," said Ramphal. "Indeed, I urge you not to think of 'What is the one thing I can do'... I urge you to think that 'I am part of the universe. What can we all do? What can I do as part of the human race? ... 'I' alone can do so little, but 'I' as part of the bigger whole that inhabits the planet...can change the world."



The 64-year-old Community Living resident returned to the area this past winter after living in Kingston with family for about 10 years. His time in Kingston wasn't enjoyable and while there he had an accident in which Watt broke his hip.

"It was the biggest mistake of my life going down there," said Watt. "I had to make a decision so [coming back to Haliburton] was my decision. I was raised here and this is where my mother wanted me to stay, in Haliburton."

Karen Code drove to Kingston to greet Larry and bring him back home. She is now his primary support worker.

"The hospital staff there were very fond of Larry, and happy he was getting a new beginning," said Code. "They were even more grateful that we, as an organization, were doing all of this to assist him."

With the help of Community Living, Watt has relocated to the area and quickly become an active member of the community again.

He's a member of the Full Gospel Lighthouse Church, and attends a cooking group and current events group with Community Living. Staff there have helped him get back on his feet.

"They've helped him get his finances done, and his teeth done," said Community Living team lead Phyllis Baker.

Community Living staff helps Larry with a variety of tasks so he can live independently. They help him book and attend medical appointments, budget his finances, shop for groceries and get involved in special event days held by the agency.

"Larry likes to be independent but likes to keep us in the loop of what he's up to," said Code.

Watt is living with roommates through the agency's Independent Living Support program.

"It's his dream to have an apartment all by himself," said Baker.

Watt would like to have a job to help him raise some of the funds he needs to live comfortably. Despite these needs, Watt is happy being back in the area.

"I think it's nice here. I go for walks. Sometimes I stop in at the Kosy to have a coffee," he said.

Watt is also thrilled that he found love with a fellow resident once he returned. He attends a 'circle,' or meeting, to help discuss and learn about relationships.

"Well, she loves me a lot and I love her," he said. "There's not a problem we can't work



Marshall became a resident of Haliburton almost 30 years ago, when he arrived in the Minden area from Toronto and started being supported by Dawn Brohman, a social worker. Brohman helped Marshall settle in Haliburton, and helped advocate and care for him for more than 20 years.

"He was really an icon, definitely a special part of the community," said Brohman.

Initially, Brohman said the outgoing and friendly Marshall, who she said was a real character, might have taken some people

aback. But soon he became well-known for his generous spirit and goodwill.

"This community is a very loving and inclusive community," she said. "I think people knew and recognized him as a special person and went out of their way to get to know him. The community was just so relaxed with him."

Marshall was very active with the Baptist church and was a strong supporter at the 4C's, where he would help lift, carry and load bags. When celebrating his birthday, he would pick up a cake and bring it there to share. He was known to shovel walkways for those who needed the extra hand, and his annual Christmas cards are legendary.

"He collected Christmas cards by the thousands, and delivered hundreds and hundreds of cards to people and businesses each year," said Brohman. "Sometimes he'd forget he had delivered one to someone and so he'd go back and deliver another the next day. He just had a wonderful spirit."

Marshall's enthusiasm to help anyone in need was matched by the community in return. Local businesses would greet him with a gift at Christmas, and when a fire destroyed his apartment, people were quick to step forward and help him to get reestablished.

"He had a heart of gold and just loved to socialize," said Brohman.

The waitresses at the Kosy said their Cowboy and his Pony – his pet name for the carriage he was usually seen pushing in front of him – were a part of their daily lives. They said he was always friendly, and often called them 'sweetheart.'

"He always told us to be good," said Thalia Nash. "It's just weird now, just like... something's missing."

Brohman retired a few years ago but was by Marshall's side when he died as a result of a stroke.

"I was with him, and honoured to be with him," she said.

A photo of Marshall shared on Facebook by Trudy Bacon was shared 84 times not long after it was posted online.

"He will be missed," wrote Gord Kidd. "Always part of Haliburton's unique personality."

"So sorry to see a Haliburton icon pass," wrote Jean Clegg. "He was certainly one of a

Many residents spoke to Marshall's kind heart, hardworking demeanour and presence

"Sad to see Cowboy ride into the sunset," wrote Laurie Jones. "The whole town will miss him.

Brohman said Marshall will be buried in Toronto alongside his mom, and that a public celebration of life would be an ideal tribute to a man who made such a contribution to the



## Scarborough kids get trained the Haliburton way

You can take the hockey player out of Haliburton, but you can't take Haliburton out of the hockey player, especially when he becomes a coach.

So believes David Storey, who grew up playing goal for the Haliburton Huskies in the early '80s.

Storey has been coaching hockey for more than 20 years. He said his early start in Haliburton from Peewee to Midget was so unique that he trains his players in Scarborough using a unique philosophy he considers to be Haliburton-style.

"There's a cohesiveness the kids in Haliburton have with each other," he said. "They all go to school together, they're all on the same athletic teams, and they have to do more with less people."

Storey said coaching a team made up of teens who go to different schools and have different backgrounds is challenging so he tells his players early about the Haliburton way of hockey.

"Our team always believed we could do it if we worked together," he said. "Any game was winnable if we had the

"They just wanted to watch good hockey," he said. "It doesn't happen like that down here."

Instead, he said his team often plays to quieter arenas with just parents and siblings of team players. Unlike a small town team in which families of players often know each other, the stands are quiet and families might sit separately from each other.

Storey knew he had to do something to combat that lack of collective spirit if he wanted his team to best enjoy the game. So for the past three years, he has brought his team to his cottage on Beech Lake for pre-season training.

The girls camp in Storey's yard while their parents stay off-site, often at the Pinestone. Even the camaraderie gained while the girls try to pitch a tent together brings better play to the ice, according to Storey. They camp, bonfire, enjoy water sports and team building exercises, and they begin their pre-season training on the ice at the AJ LaRue arena. The girls are impressed with the quality of players that have come out of Haliburton, including their coach, whose banner still flies at the arena. Meanwhile, Storey is impressed with the renovations done to the arena he grew up in.

"Even in August, the ice at the arena is as good as any I've been on," he said.

Storey said the girls' experiences in Haliburton translate to a better team that works well together on the ice back in Scarborough. They're more familiar with each other, as are their parents, who are more apt to cheer together from the sidelines. One girl is no longer as shy after experiencing a particularly memorable wipeout on a tube on the boat.

"Everybody's got a story to tell because of being up north for the weekend," he said.





The seven-year-old Oshawa boy proudly accepted the second place ribbon for the scarecrow he created at the 31st annual Wilberforce Fair. The fair took place from August 7-8 at the Wilberforce fairgrounds.



## Stunning flowers at Minden show

Sandria Garry loved her plant.

She fed it vitamins, she watered it, she talked to it, and by her own declaration, she loved it.

Garry even let the plant take the front seat of the car on the way to the 36th annual Minden and District Horticultural Society Flower Show while she sat in the back, to ensure it was transported safely.

And when she entered the community centre to see how the plant had fared, she was overcome with emotion to see it had won best in show.

"I walked in to see how it had placed, and my friend pointed me toward the best in show table and said, 'turn around, Sandria, you won,'" she said. "I couldn't believe it."

Garry had nurtured the Crown of Thoms plant – so named for its thoms and its likelihood of blooming around the Easter holiday – since her friend had given her a piece of one a few years ago.

"She's president of the Horticultural Society in Orillia and we've been friends since we were 15," said Garry. "She's going to be so excited to see I won because of the plant she gave me."

For the past three years, Garry's same plant has won first prize in its category. This year the judges said they were impressed by the number of flowers and

colour of petals on the plant.

"They told me they've never seen one like it before, not like this," she said.

Garry's house is filled with flowers, which was a similar trait of many of the members of the horticultural society at the flower show. The society's president, Mary Jane Irwin, talked about the variety of gardens in her own yard – from annuals to perennials to vegetables. But the planting prowess of the members shouldn't intimidate anyone who wants to join the society, said Irwin. Instead, the group hoped the flower show might welcome more people into the world of gardening.

"We have to showcase what we do, and continue to educate people," said society president Mary Jane Irwin. "The Minden show is the biggest show in our district of 17 societies. The judges [from other districts] gave us really good feedback about the size of the show and quality of the plants."

The show was filled with entries — dahlias, calendulas, hanging baskets, even photography — from members of the society, as well as displays by local children, a tea party, and a table for gardening consultations. It was as busy as the members of the society themselves, who participate in youth education programs, workshops, plant sales, tours, and the beautification of Minden with plants, all while maintaining their personal gardens.


"I came to see who won the prizes, and to see all the hard work that went into it all," said Irene Alexander of Minden. "It's a nice evening."

However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

NO PERSON OR PUBLIC BODY shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Municipal Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.



# Air Dogs headline festival

There will be running, jumping, splashing and... barking?

That's right, it's time for the second annual Cottage Country Dog Festival.

This year, providing the weather is better than it was last time, will prove to be a fun day for dogs and their owners, said organizer Tanya McCready of Winterdance Dogsled Tours.

"I'm looking forward to the whole thing," she said. "We [think] it's awesome to bring people to Haliburton for a dog event, and give people here an excuse to get out and come to town, and bring their dog for a fun day."

The highlight of last year's festival, the Ultimate Air Dogs, are back again.

"They do four or five different jumps throughout the day," said McCready.

A dock is set up in the park, overlooking a big pool. The air dogs run down the dock and jump after a toy that is tossed into the pool by the owner. The dog with the longest jump

"The one that won last year, Rockin' Reggie,

is coming back this year. He's been invited to go to the world championships. He's quite the dog, that's for sure."

The Ultimate Air Dog competitors would love to see the competition as a two-day event, as it is throughout the rest of their circuit. That's something McCready would love to see in the future, if the event continues to grow.

Dog agility will also be on display during the festival. Dogs and their trainers run an obstacle course and the pair with the fastest time wins. The obstacles include jumps, weaves, high walks, a tunnel and more. While there isn't a competition planned for the festival, agility dogs and trainers will provide demonstrations.

"We have the agility demonstration again like we did last year," said McCready. "The demonstration we've added this year is disc. They're like mini-Frisbees, and these dogs are flying, diving and flipping to get these Frisbees."

The dogs will jump off of shoulders, knees, and use the handler's body to leverage themselves to get the discs.

"Next year we would love to bring agility and disc, and have those pro dogs competing,"

she said. "A lot of the dogs do different events. If they can come to one spot and do agility, disc and air dogs, then the owners are thrilled because they don't have to choose which event to go to."

New this year is a partnership with the Lion's Club.

"A big thing this year is the Lion's Club has joined us with their guide dog walk," said McCready. "We saw that advertised and thought it would match nicely with the festival."

Participants in the walk help support the service group's guide dog program.

The festival happens on Aug. 15 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Head Lake Park. Admission is \$2. The air dogs compete throughout the day, and the Lion's Club dog walk registration is at noon. Also on the schedule is a performance by Gord Kidd at noon.

This is a dog-friendly event, but please keep your dog on a leash. There's an opportunity to enter your dog into several contests, including best trick, best costume, and most like owner.

"[The dog festival] will just get better and better," said McCready. "We're very excited where it can go."
