# Hirstwood sentenced to five years

Keith Hirstwood of Minden has been sentenced to five years in jail.

Hirstwood was sentenced after he pleaded guilty to two counts of sexual interference with a person under the age of 16 (Section 151, subsection A, of the Criminal Code), and one count of invitation to sexual touching with a person under the age of 16

(Section 152 of the Criminal Code).

The sentence was handed down in the Lindsay Courthouse on Aug. 21.

Hirstwood received 18 months for the first count of sexual interference, 24 months on the second count, and another 18 months for sexual interference. According to the Criminal Code, each of those charges had a minimum sentence of one year, up to a maximum of 10 years in prison.

However, Hirstwood will not serve the

entire five years. According to a clerk in the criminal department, Hirstwood's sentence will be credited back for days already spent in jail during the trial.

The exact amount of time he will spend in jail will be determined once he is transported to the prison.

In addition to jail time, Hirstwood received a DNA order and will be placed on the sexual offenders list for the rest of his life.

Hirstwood was charged in September 2014 with two counts of sexual assault against a person under the age of 16, two counts of sexual interference with a person under the age of 16, two counts of invitation to touching with a person under the age of 16, and two counts of luring a person under the age of 16 by means of telecommunication.

He pleaded guilty to three of those charges in a Lindsay courtroom on July 3.

## Head Lake Bridge puts two projects on hold

Haliburton County will pull funds from the Dark Lake Bridge and Walling's culvert projects to help cover unforeseen costs required to complete Head Lake Bridge's rehabilitation.

At the Aug. 26 county council meeting, treasurer Laura Janke said the Head Lake Bridge project would cost more than what was anticipated and planned for prior to the March 2015 budget.

"We've got almost a \$600,000 problem," said Janke.

The county was awarded more than \$782,000 through the Ontario Community

Infrastructure Fund (OCIF) and built up reserves to cover Greer Galloway Consulting Engineers' initial estimate of just over \$1 million. In August, the consulting firm revised the estimated cost of the project to \$1,375,425 before taxes after determining additional work would be necessary.

Bob Galloway, the company's president, said the unforeseen additional costs were found after the bridge was observed in the spring, compared to the initial estimate done in the winter.

"Generally our estimates are good," he said. "This time it didn't work."

Minden Hills reeve Brent Devolin said he tender with the lowest bid of \$2,164,123.

supported the treasurer's motion to move money in order to support the Head Lake project, but said he had boated under the bridge for 45 years and was aware of the structural damage.

"I'm not very happy," said Devolin. "I'm not sure I buy that these are unforeseen costs.'

Five tenders were received for the project. Each came in over \$2 million, far higher than the initial cost estimates.


"You can all imagine how shocked some of us were in that room at the time," said Janke.

Carlington Construction Inc. won the

A revised scope of work for the project will further reduce the cost to \$2,053,575.

To cover the cost of the Head Lake Bridge project and avoid losing the OCIF funding by not meeting the December 2016 construction completion date, Janke recommended borrowing \$330,000 from the Dark Lake Bridge and Walling's culvert projects, and an additional \$264,000 from the bridge reserve.

"Nothing's happened on those [projects]," she said. "I don't think anything's going to happen in 2015. I feel [the Head Lake Bridge] project is important enough and big enough that we need to take that money from reserves to do it."

## Dysart seeks advice on natural gas

Dysart councillors are waiting a month before deciding whether or not the municipality should enter into a franchise precedent agreement with a company looking to bring natural gas to Haliburton.

Energy gas consultant John Wolnik attended a council meeting on Aug. 24 to bring council up-to-speed on the project and make his request.

"In order to proceed to construct a natural gas distribution system, you need to enter in to an actual franchise agreement with the municipality," explained Wolnik, who attended the meeting on behalf of Northeast Midstream, a company based out of Toronto.

The precedent agreement outlines the intended outcomes of the project, timelines and a number of conditions. Once this document is signed, it would enable the company to undertake a variety of studies to determine the feasibility of bringing natural gas to homeowners and businesses, as an alternative to other energy sources such as propane and fuel oil.

The gas that would be provided to local customers would be extracted from the TransCanada Pipeline and cooled to -162C, turning it into liquefied natural gas. It would be transported to the community via a truck and dropped off at a storage facility. A distribution system would be connected to storage tanks to provide gas to customers.

Currently, Northeast Midstream does not have an operating facility. They are in the development stages of two facilities, one in Thorold and the other in northwestern Ontario near Nipigon.

In May, Joshua Samuel, president and CEO of Northeast Midstream, made his pitch to both Dysart and Minden Hills councillors—with a sense of urgency.

"It is critically important that we move right now to get the support in place," he told Minden council on May 28.

The company is looking to capitalize on the provincial government's recent \$230 million commitment to expand natural gas service to communities throughout Ontario (\$200 million is coming from the Natural Gas Access Loan while the remaining \$30 million is flowing from the Natural Gas Economic Development Grant).

If they are successful, grant funds would help alleviate the conversion costs for residents.

If the company determines that the project is doable, the municipality would be required to enter into a franchise agreement.

To date, the company has received signed precedent agreements from four communities in northern Ontario.

"They're quite excited about this," he said, pointing out that the company would like to move the process along with several communities on board at the same time.

Reeve Murray Fearrey asked Wolnik if there was a deadline attached to his request.

"Had the other communities not signed there probably would be, yes. But I think given that they have signed, we're beginning to move forward. It wouldn't be very efficient for us to have various municipalities on different tracks," he said.

Councillor Derek Knowles wanted to know if the construction of the plant in Thorold is dependent on the participation of all the municipalities.

Wolnik said that as far he knows, construction will go forward but probably not until next year.

"In terms of first service, 2017 would be the earliest, most likely, that we could do this."

In a phone interview, Fearrey told The Highlander that the municipality would be seeking further legal opinion before making a decision.

Minden Hills is also in a similar position. Wolnik will attend Minden's council meeting on Aug. 27.



## Striking a balance

This past weekend, over 100 racers zoomed around Head Lake as part of the Haliburton Outboard Powerboat Races.

While they were rather noisy (I could hear the action at my home, located four kilometres away), that didn't deter spectators from gathering as close as they could to take in all the action. Boaters on the lake had to keep their distance, but they were still located at a good vantage point.

Based on what race organizers and Dysart councillors were hearing, the majority of people around town gave the event two thumbs up. Racers ate at local establishments, purchased fuel for their machines and a few probably discovered Haliburton for the very first time.

The event went so well that the organizers expressed their desire to return, and council agreed to welcome them back next year.

But there might be a few people out there wondering if it's actually such a good thing for racers to be ripping around the lake for hours on end.

The outboard engines are mounted on the rear of the vessel and the exhaust goes into the air, not the water.

According to a case study submitted to the paper by event organizer Barb Hammond, this type of powerboat racing "actually improves and maintains the lakes water quality and its ecosystem, provided an alternative energy source like ethanol, methanol, solar, hydrogen or electrical energy are used as fuel."

The study was conducted by a limnologist and environmental scientist in 2007 at a similar boat racing event in Lake Henderson, Florida. The lake was sampled before, during and after the races.

"Studies reveal that dissolved oxygen content of the lake increased after boat

racing while carbon dioxide content decreases; this is an unusual and very positive phenomenon and has a very positive impact on the lake water quality and

its ecosystem," states Solomon's report. While the same conclusions might be drawn from the Haliburton event, we can't say for sure unless a similar study is done here. Not to devalue the findings, but it would also be valuable to look at other, more recent studies (if there are any) to make a comparison.

What we do know is that the boats barely created a wake - unlike wakeboard boats, which are regularly traversing the lakes in the summer – and all of the racers were required to use spill pads when refueling.

Although they aren't for everyone, motorized activities have grown to be a part of the Haliburton Highlands identity. For example, just this past weekend dozens of ATVers hit the trails in Highlands East for an annual poker run. One group of 13 riders from Windsor took part in the full-day ride.

That translates to dollars being spent right here, during a time when businesses and locals heavily rely on them to make it through the coming months.

There's no doubt that we must do our part to protect the natural environment for future generations to come. It's at the core of what brings visitors here in the first place.

Together, we can and must strike a delicate balance between environmental responsibility and the recreation that continues to attract visitors to the Highlands.

## Casting your ballot: nationally or locally?

I would really like to know from our candidates: If elected in the Oct. 19 federal election, whose interest would be represented in Ottawa? Your party's or the riding's?

Not an easy question to answer methinks and I suspect the answers would slide back and forth from one topic area to the other and back again, and then not end with a definitive response.

The expectation has always been that when you get to Ottawa you are there to toe the party line. After all, even before the voters selected one candidate to represent them, the party leader must sign the nomination papers. Without that initial endorsement, the individual would not have even risen to the rank of nominee and then candidate for their

Not doing the party's bidding quickly relegates an MP to the back benches, to uninteresting committee assignments and the power brokers will have little time for your constituency problems. Toeing the line means being in attendance when a vote is called, standing for your two seconds of on-camera time and announcing your preference on the issue and sitting back down. It is unquestioning subservience to what the leader says in the House, and carrying that position to committee meetings, back to the riding and when questioned by the press or the public. It could mean abandoning personal beliefs on moral issues like the right to choose or banning abortion. But on less black and white questions, it relieves the member from weighing the evidence, and making up his or her own mind on the question, and simply following the dogma of the day. No room for compromise, no opportunity to see another point of view, just instruction filtering down from above

I am sure I am not the only one to have written to our MP promoting a position contrary to his party's and have received in return a form letter thanking me for bringing the matter to his attention. The MP, the letter from an assistant assures me, is always interested in the opinions of his constituents. No rebuttal of my stated opinion, no talking points even, just a polite acknowledgement

of my inquiry. Subsequently, the MP stands on cue to vote with his party, the deed is done, and I can't help but wonder, did he even read my email?

Of course an individual shouldn't be seeking office without first considering the party's stand on the issues of the day. How strongly do you care about the environment? Are you willing to vote against your party's wishes to demonstrate that passion? Health care, election reform, taxes... there are many issues where one's point of view may not dovetail with the party's stance. Are candidates prepared to take a stand different from that of their party's or is the fear of retribution too overwhelming?

With national parties and high profile leaders, it is often difficult to see what makes this country tick when it happens at a local level. That is surely the MPs' basic job, reflecting the community they represent in the nation's decision making. Sure every MP says they are going to Ottawa to represent their riding, but how often can they deliver on that promise? Vote for the party that will rule the country for the next four years or vote for the candidate who has the best understanding of our community and appears to be best equipped to take that message to Ottawa.

I sense most people have chosen to vote nationally and keep their fingers crossed, hoping for the best when our representative gets to the capital.

#### **Corrections**

In "Maple Lake case highlights sewage issue" (The Highlander issue 199, page 7) it was reported that off-site odours were responsible for a Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change (MOECC) decision not to extend a permit for hauled sewage spreading on a property near Maple Lake. The MOECC has confirmed that the decision was made based on a finding that "odours from the site were adversely impacting neighbouring residents and odours were one of the reasons the application was not extended."

The ministry also confirmed that a quote from a ministry hydrologist's memo dated Oct. 28, 2014 "appears accurate". In that memo the hydrologist noted that the site "has caused groundwater impairment to the well water supplies located at [three addresses] due to elevated levels of bacteria" and that septage spreading from the site "is responsible for the majority of groundwater impairment observed to date". Incomplete information was reported originally.

In "Algonquin Highlands commits to Bear Lake study" (The Highlander issue 199, page 2) it was reported that the township voted in favour a resolution to fund a study this year. The township voted in favour of a resolution to defer the study to next year's budget deliberations.

The Highlander regrets these errors.

Second, when each of the ladies said their


piece about boobs their size, their shape, their weight for Pete's sake - I was prone to look at the objects of conversation. It's hard not to. I mean, if I

## Dysart council looking at crosswalks

As downtown Haliburton continues to get busier, Dysart council is looking at how they can ensure pedestrians are provided safe options when it comes to getting around town.

On Aug. 24, they reviewed the findings from a study conducted by Tranplan Associates. The company examined several possibilities for the intersection of Highland Street, York Street and Cedar Avenue.

"There are three things that are important to the study recommendations," said William Copeland, principal of Tranplan Associates. "The first is that the specific area that we're looking at is close to the business district, it's close to the Head Lake Trail, and of course it's close to Head Lake Park where the Farmers' Market is."

The study team collected traffic counts and pedestrian volume data at the end of July during a 12-hour period while the Farmers' Market was running.

"Tuesdays are considered to generate the overall peak vehicular and pedestrian traffic demand outside of summer holiday weekends," states Copeland's report.

The findings of two separate signal analyses indicated that traffic signals are warranted under peak summer conditions.

Consideration was given to installing a pedestrian crossing by the entrance to the government docks entrance from Highland Street, which is less than 100 metres away from the Highland Street and York Street intersection. If a signal were installed, a crosswalk at the government dock entrance would have to be removed to meet current Transportation Association of Canada and Ministry of Transportation guidelines.

Unless a light is installed in combination with a crosswalk,

pedestrians would still need to yield to traffic under the Highway Traffic Act, he said.

"We've suggested that a pedestrian crossing should not be located at the government dock entrance."

The preferred location for such a crosswalk is at York Street and Cedar Avenue.

Copeland recommended that before any decisions are made, traffic and pedestrian volumes should be collected at non-summer levels in September.

"The findings of this additional analysis would provide further information to be used to assess the potential timing of future signalization of the Highland/York-Cedar intersection," stated one of the recommendations.

In the interim, Copeland suggested setting up a courtesy crosswalk across Highland Street at the west approach to the intersection of York and Cedar.

Reeve Murray Fearrey raised the issue of drivers turning right and going up Cedar Avenue in the winter months if they are to stop at a traffic light.

Copeland's answer was that maintaining the road is generally a responsibility of the municipality.

"Cedar is already a challenge to some degree," said roads superintendent Brian Nicholson, adding that county roads crews usually salt that section of road.

Deputy-reeve Andrea Roberts reminded council that the Business Improvement Area (BIA) has been asking for a crosswalk for quite some time.

"People will still jaywalk, no matter what," said Roberts. "But the majority stop at the courtesy crosswalk."

Nicholson suggested that council vote in favour of the September review.

## In depth: septic fields explained

With county-wide and provincial measures in place to protect our water sources, Highlands residents and visitors could expect to feel confident about the future health of our more than 600 lakes and numerous wetlands.

And yet a decades-old practice of spreading sewage on fields continues in the county and across Ontario.

Field spreading, or land application, generally occurs in two formats. The most well-known is the application of biosolids, or sludge, onto farmers' fields as agricultural fertilizer. Biosolids are what remain after raw sewage has been treated with chemicals in municipal wastewater treatment plants to remove pathogens such as bacteria and viruses, and the water content has been returned to the water source.

This practice is sanctioned by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Farming (OMAFRA) as a means to add "valuable" nutrients (chemicals and minerals) back into the

The second format is the application of raw, untreated sewage onto fields, whether for agricultural purposes or not. In rural communities this is often the main option for disposing of septic system waste, which is known as septage once it leaves the septic tank.

The Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Farming works closely with the Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change (MOECC) to administer both practices under the Nutrient Management Act. A Biosolids Utilization Committee (BUC) advises both ministries with support from the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care and from agricultural and industrial organizations, municipalities and service industries. These include the Rural Ontario Municipal Association (ROMA) and the Ontario Association of Sewage Industry Services (OASIS).

In the Highlands, Minden Hills and Dysart et al manage sewer systems and sewage treatment plants for central areas. Remaining property owners use septic systems. Algonquin Highlands operates a fee-based septage treatment lagoon and Highlands East provides a septage trench at no charge, but these options don't have enough capacity to absorb all available septic system waste.

This leaves all four municipalities to rely on field spreading for septage disposal.

Provincially, the Environmental Commissioner of Ontario (ECO) works as an independent officer to monitor and report annually on the government's compliance with the Environmental Bill of Rights.

The ECO's 2000-01 annual report advised that untreated septage is likely to have much higher concentrations of live pathogens such as bacteria and viruses than does municipal sewage sludge.

This lack of treatment also means that medication residues and disinfectant chemicals may also be present in septage. Locally, organizations such as the Coalition of Haliburton

Property Owners' Associations (CHA), which represents 50 lake associations on 100 lakes, are working to help property owners maintain healthy septic systems and to monitor lake health.

All four municipalities provide septic installation inspections, and are either developing or investigating formal septic re-inspection programs.

However, it appears municipalities have no real jurisdiction over field spreading. The MOECC is not required to notify property owners or municipalities when field spreading permits are requested or granted. Algonquin Highlands recently obtained a legal opinion regarding a current field spreading site application, in which the township was advised not to pursue a request for zoning and official plan amendments due to a recent, negative Ontario Municipal Board ruling.

As a result of residents' concerns over the Algonquin Highlands site application, groups such as the Maple, Beech and Cameron Lakes Area Property Owners' Association (MBC) have begun investigating alternative methods of septage disposal.

Their president, Andy Muirhead, contacted the Federation of Ontario Cottagers' Associations (FOCA) for support on Aug. 10, and later received permission from FOCA executive director Terry Rees to release his response.

Rees wrote in part that the MOECC has in the past asserted that it is "committed to a phase-out of land application of all untreated septage", although Rees said this has been deemed impractical "...based on not enough capacity at municipal treatment plants to meet demand, and lack of information about suitable treatment technologies for septage."

Having been "intimately involved" with development of the Trent Conservation Coalition Source Protection Plan, which includes the Haliburton County watershed, Rees said the source water protection approach "...deals very peripherally with rural water issues, and almost not at all with anything beyond health issues related to municipal water systems."

So what options are available to concerned citizens?

Rees advised that municipalities, other provincial Planning Act approval authorities, developers and haulers working together can develop municipal septage plans and determine the amount of septage generated, the number of septage treatment facilities available, and septage management

For the MBC's part, Muirhead has released an information paper called "The Next Septic Issue: Where Does It All Go and What Do We Do About It?"

authorities "...not only to make the application process for septic disposal sites more open and responsive to all our concerns, but to make it easier for our municipal governments to provide safer, better monitored sites with the capacity to receive and treat the wastes we produce."



The Group of Seven captured the imagination of locals through their plein air paintings of the Highlands.

Now, decades later, another group of artists will attempt to do that same through the Highlands East Plein Air Festival from Sept. 10-13.

The participating artists will travel throughout Highlands East to areas of magnificent beauty or cultural relevance. Through their work, they will try to capture the essence of these places on canvas. And those works will be on sale at an art show in Wilberforce on Sept. 13.

"This year, we've changed half the locations from last," said Gary Blundell, the festival's organizer. "We've new and exciting locations for people to come to."

Locations include flowing waterfalls, creeks and lakes, and cultural sites that include barns, two century-old churches and a mill.

Blundell has travelled across the province and into Quebec promoting the festival and sale. He said already the number of artists participating is greater than last year's, and he expects to have some last-minute registrations as well.

"The sale was good last year, but I'm hoping it's going to be a lot better," he said. "Already we've had way more sign-ups for the event."

People interested in attending should expect the bulk of the work to be acrylic paintings, though there may be some oil and water colours. They can also attend the sites and watch the artists in action.

"The public is more than welcome to visit all of the sites and go around, take a look at what the people are doing," said Blundell. "There's no guarantee if you go to a site that somebody will be there on that given day."

"It's a really good opportunity for people to come see work that's been made about their community."





# Lucky loon gets a second chance

Despite a severely damaged leg, Luna the loon has a fighting chance thanks to a team of volunteers.

For several weeks, the injured adult female loon was spotted on Balsam Lake in Coboconk. She wasn't flying, and she didn't seem capable of diving for long periods of time.

When she swam into the Gull River in Coboconk, residents tried to catch her but she eluded their grasp. She was welcoming, however, of the fish that two teenaged boys caught and fed to her, and before long, she swam close enough to them that they could rescue her from the water.

Immediately, a volunteer group sprang into action to help save the loon. A volunteer driver transported her to the Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary in Minden to be cared for by sanctuary owner Monika Melichar.

"Because of the efforts of those teenagers, she was in really great condition outside of her broken leg," said Melichar. "She was a good weight and really healthy in all ways."

Luna's broken leg was making it impossible for her to hunt, and because loons need to be able to run off the water to fly, she was unable to go far. A vet told Melichar the loon's prognosis was poor.

Melichar didn't give up and consulted with Dr. Sherri Cox, a volunteer veterinarian with the National Wildlife Centre.

"I begged her to do what she could for this loon because the loon is incredible," said Melichar. "Luna knew she was getting help, and she was a fighter but not defensive. Just a beautiful spirited animal."

Cox agreed to perform a three-and-a-half hour surgery on the loon that would potentially give her a second chance. Though Melichar said the surgery and post-op care likely cost about \$3,000, Dr. Cox performed it free of charge.

To get the loon to the Shades of Hope wildlife refuge in Pefferlaw, Melichar turned to her list of volunteer drivers. She sent an e-mail out, and Minden resident Kim Switzer quickly responded. Switzer and her kids have been long-time supporters of the Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary and have collected acoms to feed the shelter's guests, collected donations of animal feed from

local businesses and transported animals in the past to help.

"I do it simply because we don't own this land, nature does," said Switzer. "And I want to teach my kids to respect nature and to help wildlife."

Switzer said transporting animals is a simple way to make a lasting impact on the lives of creatures that need care, and volunteer drivers are essential to help non-profit organizations like Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary and Shades of Hope so they can continue running smoothly.

"That's what makes it work," said Switzer.
"You don't have to drive hundreds of miles

– you can be that one short pit stop that
makes a difference. Even a small effort
brings everyone one step closer to having a
healed animal. You're not wasting anyone's
time by making an effort to help. I don't
have to go out of my way, but I will."

With her kids in the backseat, Switzer drove Luna to Cox in Pefferlaw where the surgery took place on Aug. 22.

"A lot of people were involved in this, it was really a town effort," said Melichar.

"Without intervention, she would have no chance at survival," wrote the National Wildlife Centre on their Facebook page. "She is not out of the woods yet, but now she has a chance."

Melichar said the loon will need extensive rehabilitation and it is essential the bird has recovered in time for migration, which is generally around September. She hopes Luna will steadily recover at the Shades of Hope facility, which has an indoor swimming pool, and then return to the Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary for practice in the outdoor pond. The plan is to release the loon back into Balsam Lake where she likely has a mate.

Melichar has rehabilitated many loons at the sanctuary, most which she said have been entangled in fishing line. Thanks to calls from watchful residents, Melichar knows there is a loon on Kennisis Lake with fishing line around its beak, and a loon on Catchacoma Lake in Gooderham dragging fishing line and sticks behind it. She does what she can to help rescue the birds, but very often relies on the public to capture the loons and bring them to the sanctuary for help.



"It's sometimes an effort of futility, because they are very elusive animals," said Melichar. "They do understand though that humans aren't necessarily all that bad, and they know they sometimes need human hands to help them."

Melichar warns would-be rescuers that loons use their beaks for defence, but believes loons understand that humans might help when necessary.

"There are people on these lakes who are really attached to their loons — the loons might have lived on the lake for 20-30 years so they look for them," she said. "I think the loons know this, and so when they become hurt, they will actually ask people by getting close to people in their boats."

The Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary is always looking for volunteer drivers. The fourth annual Loonies for Loons lemonade stand fundraiser that earns donations for the Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary will take place on Sept. 5 at the boat launch at Hillside drive and Birch Glen drive in Kawartha Lakes.

# Golf drives in \$40K

Dental care can be prohibitively expensive. But thanks to another successful Volunteer Dental Outreach (VDO) golf tournament on Aug. 20, the charity organization can continue to provide free dental care to families in need through the Highlands.

Board member Lisa Kerr said the tournament raised around \$40,000, but donations are still coming in. The tournament went off despite some poor weather.

"The rain added a few new challenges," said Kerr. "We were all soaked but it didn't dampen our spirits."

She said 139 golfers played during the day, and 155 participated in the lunch.

"Our sponsors and private donors are incredibly generous and most of them continue to support the VDO every year," she

said. "The base of our support is growing for what we are doing, and people are realizing that with the VDO, hundreds of patients would have no means to obtain dental care."


To date, the organization has provided over \$1.37 million in free dental care.

When Jerry Corby passed away on December 9, 2014, the reaction to his death was overwhelming.

His sister, Connie, said there was a rush of support for her family when Jerry died of cancer just five days before he turned 64. She hopes the kindness can be returned to the community through the Jerry Corby Foundation benefitting Community Living.

"He'd be so proud to know he's still contributing in some way," said Connie. "I wish it could have come through before he died so he could see and realize the impact he had on people."

The first Ride for the Jerry Corby Foundation will take place on Sept. 12 and is promising to be a big event.

"It's a first time for our group," said Mike Corby of The Highlanders Motorcycle Club, and Jerry's brother. "It's going to be fun."

"Everyone's looking forward to it," said Connie. "It's going to be a great attendance."

The event kicks off at 10:30 a.m. and the ride begins with a police escort from Community Living at 73 Victoria Street in Haliburton. It will take participants through the Highlands to see the sights and remember Jerry's life. There are refreshments and a 50/50 draw planned for the riders return at 3 p.m.

The ride is one of four events that could potentially happen in Jerry's name throughout the county each year. Due to Jerry's athletic

interests, Corby said she also hopes for a nod to Jerry through the Special Olympics bowling team, a fishing tournament and a snowboarding club initiative.

"I think it's absolutely fantastic," said Cindy Sedore of Community Living. "It keeps his name alive, and supports an organization that supported him over the years."

Corby would also like to see donation boxes throughout the county that elicit donations to Community Living from shoppers.

"I'm going to fight hard to do it," she said. Jerry was a member of Community Living for more than 40 years and barely missed a day there. He was known to be motivated and determined, and was a strong worker who helped at the Haliburton LCBO and Head Lake Park.

Sedore said Jerry became part of her family, and was always willing to do anything and everything.

"He just fit like a glove no matter where he went," she said. "He's really missed here."

Corby said Jerry was a people person full of life and joy.

"People will have stories about him until they die," said Connie. "He had the nurses all cracked up in the hospital. He had some pretty profound language."

Corby hopes the ride will keep her brother's memory alive and will become an annual event in celebration of his active life.

"He touched the heart of everyone who met him," said Connie. "Everyone knows him. Everyone always will."



# Tryouts underway for Storm rep teams

Tanner Crang is one of a group of young bantam players hoping to make this year's Highland Storm rep team.

The left-winger has played for the Storm in the past, and hopes to make the team again this year. After his first tryout on Aug. 25 at the A.J. LaRue Arena, the young player said he was feeling a little tired, but he was doing his best out on the ice.

And that's all that the team's coach, Travis Walker, is looking for.

"[I'm looking for] hard work and heart," he said after the team's first tryout. "We've got to be able to skate and not quit. We've got to be able to handle the puck and be aggressive, too, not be afraid to go into the corners. Battle."

This is Walker's first year as head coach of a Highland Storm rep team, but it's his fourth year with the organization. Last year he was an assistant coach.

Walker said it's too early to tell what kind of team he's going to have on the ice.

"Honestly, I don't know yet," he said. "It's still early, this is the tryouts. That's something I'll have to discuss with the

coaching staff, what kind of team we want to have and system want to implement."

It will take a few practices, and hopefully some exhibition games, for the team to find its identity, he said.

Before that, he and his staff first have to narrow the field down to two goalies, six defence and nine forwards. So far, Walker feels good about the players he has to pick from.

"I feel fine," he said. "It's the first skate. I know the first skate is always the roughest skate. It's always good to get the first one out of the way. They'll get better as the tryouts go on. You can't determine your team after the first tryout. If they had one bad day today, they still have a few more."

Some of the players worked in the offseason, he said, including renting some ice for scrimmages. Others did some exercises, but Walker said he doesn't expect his players to do any kind of heavy weight training. Instead, he recommended core strengthening workouts like running, sit-ups and push-ups.

There are three tryouts remaining for the Bantam team, and players in other age groups are also competing for spots on their respective rosters.

After an extremely successful weekend, the organizers of the inaugural Haliburton Outboard Powerboat Races are looking forward to bringing the event back to Head Lake next year.

According to event coordinator Barb Hammond, over 120 racers, including some from the U.S., took part in the event held from Aug. 22-23.

"[It was the] best turnout in over 10 years of registered racers for our club," wrote Hammond in an email.

An average of 80 riders have participated in other races hosted by the Toronto Outboard Racing Club (TORC).

"All [of the] racers want to come back next year," she said.

Throughout the course of the weekend, hydroplanes, runabouts, T-boats and drag boats could be found racing at speeds of up to 100 miles per hour around a 3/4 mile course.

In addition to the high-speed action, a food booth was set up by the Haliburton & District Lions Club.

"[The] Lions Club served over 500," Hammond pointed out.

The Haliburton Hospital Auxiliary raised about \$1,200 through the sales of raffle tickets for prizes, she said.

While most aspects of the event ran smoothly, the schedule ran late on Saturday for a few reasons. Hammond noted the races started later than planned, there was an accident on the course, boaters got in the way of the course, and the action had to be stopped to accommodate an incoming float plane.

On Sunday, the schedule was pushed back

half an hour to respect local church services. Nearby businesses appeared to be happy with the traffic flow that the event created.

"Finally, finally something that was good for everybody," said Diana Gomes, owner of The Head Lake Grill. "The customers were happy, the boat racers were happy, people were stopping. Everybody made a little bit of money because they were willing to spend it." Her business was one of the event's 38

sponsors.

On Saturday, Hammond thanked the community, sponsors and spectators for making the event possible.

"The whole community of Haliburton supported us from day one," she said. It was "nice to see people supporting us, standing there clapping. We like to perform





75-80 bikes over the next few years. If we can get up to that number it will be a great event for the whole area, not just the club."


