Driver turns himself in after Minden hit-and-ru

A 28-year-old Minden man has turned himself in to police just hours after a hit-andrun incident Sunday morning. According to Haliburton Highlands OPP, Andrew Bull has been charged with failing to stop at the scene

of an accident involving bodily harm contrary Road, around 2:30 a.m. Haliburton County to the Criminal Code of Canada.

On Sept. 13, the victim, whose identity has yet to be released, was found unconscious, lying on the side of the road by two people passing through town. Police were called to the area of Bobcaygeon Road, near Deep Bay EMS and members of the Minden Hills fire department were also in attendance.

The seriously injured man was first transported to a local hospital before being airlifted to a trauma centre in the Toronto area. He was in critical condition as of yesterday.

Officers at the scene were able to retrieve debris, which was believed to be from the suspects vehicle. Technical Traffic Collision investigators from the OPP were also involved in the investigation.

Bull is scheduled to appear at the Minden courthouse on Nov. 4.

Sex-ed gets parents talking

The Trillium Lakelands District School Board hasn't received any formal complaints about the new health and physical education curriculum, but some local parents are questioning changes made to its sexual education component.

The curriculum, in particular it's human development and sexual health component, has been a hot topic in the media due to parent protests across the province. Revisions to the curriculum—the first since 1998—include updated sections about online safety, mental health, healthy relationships and the risks of sexting. Parent groups in Ontario have spoken out about the age-appropriateness of the information, which includes optional prompts about the concepts of masturbation, and oral and anal sex as they relate to sexually transmitted infections. Some have pulled students from class. The province has responded with public service announcements about the curriculum, which is available online.

"We have had no formal complaints or concerns from Trillium Lakelands District School Board (TLDSB) parents," said Catherine Shedden, TLDSB manager of communications. "We have received a couple of letters and some emails that were mass communicated to all school boards across the province from groups protesting the curriculum."

Shedden said students can't opt out of an entire curriculum, but parents can discuss concerns with teachers or principals to be dealt with on a case-by-case basis. Teachers also have the opportunity to delay teaching updated components until formal training has taken place. Training has not taken place due to the current labour action situation.

"The updated health and physical education curriculum is relevant and age-appropriate," she said. "Parents and educators play critical and complementary roles to support students learning about human development and sexual health."

Archie Stouffer Elementary School (ASES) principal Traci Hubbert said the school has always been open and available to discuss curriculum with parents. Teachers at ASES send letters home to parents prior to discussing human development in class. She said the local health unit has been a helpful partner in coordinating additional resources for students and teachers. Hubbert also thought the material in the curriculum was age appropriate and said the school council chair was asked to give feedback on it prior to its implementation.

"We want our kids to have the best information possible to make informed decisions," she said. "With social media and things kids are seeing on TV, to pretend those things don't happen, I think, would be doing kids adisservice."

Tammy Henry, a parent of students in grades 5 and 8, doesn't agree with the new curriculum.

"I think it's wrong. For example, my daughter is in Grade 5and she does not need to be learning it. We didn't until Grade 9, and only a little in health ed class," said Henry. "I think the children should talk to parents about it."

While she doesn't mind kids being informed about sexually transmitted diseases, she believes it's too much information

"It's fine to teach kids about right and wrong, but they don't need to explain everything to young kids."

Parent Pasi Posti said he's aware of the message being seen in the media but believes some topics should be a parent's responsibility and should be taught at home when parents feel it's the right time.

"We value our children's innocence," said Posti. "We just do our best to help maintain it and help protect them from having it taken from them. We just want it to be on our terms, these are our kids."

Posti said it's essential for parents to understand what children are being taught. He noted that some parents might avoid conversations, but he and his wife take time to speak with their kids each day.

Hubbert agreed that parents have an important role in teaching kids at home, and said ideally parents and schools can work together to help educate kids.


"I think parents always have a right to look out for their children's well-being," she said. "As a school, we have a responsibility to play a role and hopefully the roles can complement each other. Kids will be way more successful if the parents are talking about it, too. Then it's a safe topic."


Teachers at ASES generally wait until the end of the year to discuss topics students might feel uncomfortable about, so that a relationship between student and teacher has been

"These are normal parts of human development and we don't want that to be something that's scary," said Hubbert. "We want kids to feel okay with who they are as people."

Posti stressed he and his wife aren't opposed to the curriculum.

"We have a responsibility as parents to not accept everything that comes our way," he said. "But I don't fear it. We're not battling, we're not challenging it, we're just trying our best to work through it. We're just for good parenting."

Let's talk about sex

The provincial government has revised the sex-ed curriculum, and not everyone is happy about it.

The curriculum has been deemed controversial after coalitions of concerned parents began objecting to it, with thousands of people descending on Queen's Park in protest this year. The Trillium Lakelands District School Board received letters from groups across the province that complained about the appropriateness of the sexual education section of the curriculum. Some parents think it's graphic and some say it's "too much, too soon, too young."

There's a lot of misinformation out there about the curriculum. Staunch protestors make it sound like kids will be exposed to pornographic images and will be encouraged to start having sex at a young age.

But a look at the curriculum, which is available online and was reviewed over eight years by thousands of parents, teachers and groups like the Ontario Public Health Association, show that it's not so different from the previous 1998 version. Previously, kids were also taught the correct names for body parts in Grade 1. Studies show kids who can properly identify their body parts are better able to tell adults when someone is abusing them. Grade 7 students learned about sex and the negative consequences that might be connected to it.

The reality is, times have changed in the past 17 years, as they have from the 1940s when sex-ed was first introduced in schools. In 1998, cyber bullying and sexting didn't exist, nor did social media platforms that allow photo uploads and private conversations like Facebook and Snapchat. In 1998, same sex marriage wasn't legal, and reports show that kids were physically maturing later than they do now. The curriculum includes updated information about mental health, personal space, acceptance and respect of differences and how to deal with social issues like alcoholism.

In older grades, it also includes information

about oral and anal sex-not how to perform itbecause the rates of chlamydia and gonorrhea have increased since the '90s, and studies link this increase to

students thinking oral and anal sex are safer alternatives to avoid pregnancy. It provides answers for kids who have been asking teachers about masturbation to the point that teachers felt they needed guidance in answering appropriately. These topics are all included as optional examples in the curriculum, to be used if the teacher feels it is necessary and appropriate for the students in the class.

The teachers—and in some cases, school nurses—responsible for teaching the curriculum have access to training prior to teaching the material. We trust our teachers to engage our kids in thoughtful discussion and to relay information about other heavy topics like the holocaust, war and racism. We even trust them to be with our kids more than we're with them ourselves. There's no reason to believe teachers would relav information regarding sexual health or any other topic inappropriately.

With factual information from a professional, kids will be better able to understand and filter through the images and messages they see every day and have a better chance of being health literate for life. If we avoid "taboo" topics, we miss the chance to discuss critical issues with trusted, trained professionals and open our kids up to learning about them from the playground, older siblings or the media.

Sheltering our kids from information is not the answer. If we really want to protect our kids from misinformation and help them preserve their innocence, the best thing we can do is arm them with knowledge and the opportunity to ask questions.

The politics of why not

Call me an idealist but I firmly believe that everyone enters politics for the right reasons. Every single person. It may be to start a change, to add their voice to a cause or to stem the tide against something that shouldn't be happening, but politics are not, and should not, be entered into lightly. It's a tough job, and despite the common misconception, they're not in it for the money, initially at least (the greed comes for some after the first few mouthfuls from the public trough).

About now you're probably wondering (a) what got me all kerfuffled and (b) what planet am I from for me to expect more from politicians. Well, it all started while I was keeping an eye on America's current grueling, elongated and sensationalized search for its next president. What got me most was the complete juxtaposition of complete polar opposite candidates who are vying for the Republican and the Democratic nominations.

On the one hand you have a person merely acting like a politician and saying all the right things to fire up the electorate in business magnate/reality TV star Donald Trump, and on the other you have the most unpolitical, genre-bending, truth sayer in frumpy yet smart Bernie Sanders. If you haven't heard of Sanders you're not alone, but not likely for long. This straight-talking, fire-breathing, idealist of a politician is railing on the wealthy, the privileged, the corruption of partisan politics, the embarrassment of U.S. healthcare and anything else that needs a swift kick in the butt.

But here's the interesting part: he's actually gaining traction and real credibility in his bid for the Democratic nomination. Those who

sought to marginalize him are seeing full well that he won't go away that easily. His truth is starting to get through. Why? Because he's rallying the very people he's fighting for. The disinterested and disheartened electorate

Get into their head and hold their feet to the fire. If something they parrot from Parliament Hill doesn't sit well with you then phone, write or email them to challenge it. You control their destiny, they don't control





Missing hiker located after extensive search suspension

Several police resources were used to locate a hiker who was reported missing by his family.

The 55-year-old Mississauga man departed for a hike to Loon Lake from Black River Road, and was expected to return on Sept. 13. His family phoned police the following morning to report he hadn't returned as expected.

OPP from the City of Kawartha Lakes were called in to help locate the hiker. Members of the Emergency Response Team used ATVs and a helicopter during the search.

Police located the man's campsite with the helicopter and retrieved a detailed note explaining that he left the site at 9:30 a.m. and was trying to hike out. Calls to his cell phone had gone unanswered throughout the day.

The man was able to contact his family around 8 p.m. when he reached Devil's Lake Landing in Haliburton County. Police assisted the man, who declined medical treatment, back to his vehicle.

On Sept. 12, police stopped a grey Plymouth Voyager van at the intersection of County Road 507 in Highlands East around 4 a.m. The officer determined that the driver, 22-year-old Abdul Mills from Scarborough, had been drinking alcohol.

Mills was issued a three-day driver's license suspension and charged with several provincial offences including driving with a blood alcohol level above zero contrary to the Highway Traffic Act (adult novice driver) and driving a motor vehicle with open liquor contrary to the Liquor License Act.

The Haliburton Highlands OPP reminds motorists that any amount of alcohol or drugs can impair one's ability to drive. Always make alternative plans, such as arranging for a designated driver, taking a cab or staying overnight.

Minden man nabbed for stunt driving

A 25-year-old Minden man has been charged with stunt driving, among other charges, in Haliburton.

Just before 6 a.m. on Sept. 9, police observed a black Ford Fusion travelling eastbound at a high rate of speed on County Road 21. The officer measured the vehicle travelling at more than 50km/h over the posted speed limit.

As a result, Matthew Eno has been charged with racing contrary to the Highway Traffic Act. His vehicle was impounded, and his driver's license was seized and suspended for seven days, under stunt driving legislation.

Speeding more than 50km/h over the limit is considered stunt racing, which was added to the Ontario Highway Traffic Act in 2007. The penalties for this offence include a fine between \$2,000 and \$10,000, and a possible driver's license suspension up to two years for a first-time conviction.

Candidates tackle poverty in riding

Jamie Schmale

- "Poverty unfortunately exists in small towns and big cities, it's a sad reality of life."
- Schmale said the Conservative Party has been working to create incentives for people to be able to go back to school to retrain. "This will allow people to learn a skill they may not have for jobs they hope to get."
- The current federal government invested \$250 million into the Trent-Severn Waterway, including \$17 million for infrastructure in Haliburton County plus an additional \$1 million for water management models and monitoring equipment. "In some cases," local tradespeople will be employed to help with this work. The Building Canada Fund and Canada 150 Community Infrastructure Fund will benefit local projects.
- Conservatives have been working with community groups including Community Living, either by investing or bringing awareness to services available to seniors in the area.
- Increasing access to high-speed Internet will allow people to work from home to cut down on the expense of a commute, or to start a home-based business. Schmale said he "knows there's gaps still" in high-speed Internet access in Haliburton County, particularly in the Algonquin Highlands, and that better access to Internet is an initiative he thinks will help the community.
- Conservatives have been working alongside former MP Barry Devolin to help encourage businesses to invest and to keep business tax low to ensure businesses can hire more employees.
- "We've been working to keep businesses in Haliburton and to create opportunity for people there."

ANSWERS

David Marquis

- "It's certainly a problem. I've knocked on a lot of doors and it's obviously a problem to be dealt with."
- Marquis said the Liberal Party plans to "lift" 315,000 children out of poverty through the creation of the Canada Child Benefit.
- Much-needed jobs will be created through infrastructure funding over the next five to 10 years, he said. "The federal government is going to invest \$125 billion over 10 years. … It's so important that there be job availability for people looking
- Up to \$20 billion of the infrastructure funding would be used for subsidized and non-profit housing across the province.
- "The main thing I can do, as a federal MP, is to support policies that will help support our communities."
- Marquis noted that the Liberal Party promises to invest \$1.3 billion over the next three years—"which is like 13 times more than the NDP [party]"—to create 40,000 jobs for young people. They plan to make an annual investment of \$300 million in a youth employment strategy, and create more "green" jobs.
- He believes that Liberal policy is focused on supporting middle class Canadians. "We have said we're going to take more money from the wealthy in this country—people that make over \$200,000 [per year]—and refocus it on the middle class.
- The party plans to lower the qualification date for Old Age Security back to age 65 and boost the guaranteed income supplement by about \$920 per year for those who qualify.

ANSWERS

Mike Perry

- Perry worked on the Haliburton, Kawartha Poverty Reduction Plan, chairs the Bobcaygeon Food Bank and the Food Coalition for Kawartha Lakes. "I've been working to help all of our local residents and I know that Haliburton County is thriving and dynamic, but poverty is a big issue."
- He said housing prices have increased more than 90 per cent over the past decade and almost 10 per cent of children are living in poverty.
- Poverty costs each household between \$2,300 and \$2,900 per year, said Perry. "For a variety of reasons, including economic, it's in all of our interests to end poverty.'
- Putting an end to poverty has been a goal of the NDP's ever since the party was formed.
- If elected, he plans on implementing "a local, good jobs strategy." This includes improved access to education and training, entrepreneurship opportunities for young people and providing employment resources.
- As a member of parliament, Perry sees himself as an advocate for those in need, especially those on the Ontario Disability Support Program.
- The two things that are keeping people from getting to their jobs in the county are child care and transportation. The NDP is proposing a \$15 child care program. They've also announced \$1.3 billion for transportation to municipalities. Perry wants to advocate for rural transportation.
- The party would increase the guaranteed income supplement for seniors, "close tax loopholes at the top income level around stock income and provide relief at the lower
- The NDP has been calling for a national affordable housing strategy with new funding.
- Through Sport Canada, they would provide direct funding to help reduce the cost of sports so kids can participate.
- They would re-introduce the long-form census.

William MacCallum

- "I've heard that Haliburton County is one of the poorest, if not the poorest county in Ontario. That strikes me as quite a big problem. It strikes me as something that should really be addressed to a greater extent than it has been in the past."
- MacCallum said the Green Party would introduce a guaranteed liveable income that would replace programs like old age security and welfare. The guaranteed liveable income would be granted to "ensure no one is slipping through the cracks." The income, MacCallum said, would ease people back into the workplace and be on a sliding scale so as not to act as a disincentive to work.
- "We would make sure that no one who made less than \$20,000 paid any income taxes at all," he said.
- The Green Party would extend the Employment Insurance (EI) benefits.
- "The Conservatives have a huge surplus sitting in an EI fund, about \$2 billion. There are Canadians who should really be getting more than what the Conservatives have been
- The Green Party believes poverty is a significant issue and doesn't believe that creating better food banks is the only answer to help people in need.
- "We can't stop having [food banks], but there's more that we can do. We shouldn't be relying on food banks and the charity of people who run them."
- MacCallum said as a Green Party member, unlike other parties, he has the advantage of being able to vote regardless of how his leader votes.
- "I would be able to vote for things that help our poorest people in our riding, even if my leader wasn't voting the same," he said.

Minden denies eight solar projects

Minden Hills councillors denied a third proposed power project at a special meeting on Sept. 10, but stressed they are not against renewable energy and approved a task force committee to help plan policies for future proposals.

"Everyone wants solar. Everyone wants renewable energies. There's no question about that," councillor Pam Sayne told The Highlander. "I'd like to be out there championing alternative energy but the economic models and the development model that's being handed to us by the province is not fair to everybody."

The six councillors voted against eight proposed projects by Abundant Solar Energy Inc. a Toronto-based company that was looking to build feed-in-tariff projects on private properties. Property owners were offered private lease agreements, which would benefit them with annual payments of about \$5,000 and the opportunity to profit from a buyout after 20 years. The projects would receive more points to aid in obtaining provincial approval with municipal support.

Reeve Brent Devolin was in support of the proposed installations.

"If we categorically refuse renewable energy,

there's going to be political consequences for this municipality," he said.

Councillors said they were uncomfortable and required more information about the projects.

"I don't see any significant benefit to the ratepayers of Minden Hills unless you own the land," said councillor Lisa Schell. "None of our delivery charges are going to go down, none of this Hydro is coming to Minden Hills residents. It's all going to be shipped to Toronto. I understand they're smaller projects but it all adds up and I'm not comfortable."

Abundant Solar Energy representative Stephen Tunks told councillors the projects were small—about five acres in size—and offered the municipality a \$5,000 cheque to donate to a local charity for signing up to the project and \$1,000 per property annually which would be paid through the company's community co-op. He said the smaller scope of each project differed from the 87-acre Algonquin Power project denied by the township in August and that the projects would remain out of sight. The Abundant Solar projects total more than 460 acres throughout the county.

"I think we also have to be very careful about what we're doing because the technologies are changing so quickly," Sayne told The Highlander. "We could be putting old-fashioned typewriters in people's yards when in fact they're going to be, in 10 years, replaced with roofing shingles that are solar effective, as an example."

Sayne said the task force committee supported by council would provide a strategic design to help review projects and create a plan enabling the council to make confident decisions about proposed projects or potential possibilities for the township to generate energy as other municipalities have.

Tunks was disappointed after the special council meeting and said the planning department had asked the company to do further legwork than most municipalities.

"I had expected a unanimous vote in the other direction," he told The Highlander. "Naturally, you think, okay, we've done all the things they wanted done."

He said the company received approval for similar projects in numerous communities including Dysart, Algonquin Highlands, Highlands East and Kawartha Lakes. He said the only other community to deny their proposal was Muskoka Lakes.

"This is disappointing, but as the company, it's seven out of hundreds," he said. "For the landowner that's here, it's one out of one. We're more concerned for the landowners than we are for the company."

"So what's your angle for the story?" Michelle asked. 

Plein air painters find subject matter

All they needed was their paints, brushes and easels to capture the pristine beauty of the Highlands.

Eleven artists, including two local painters, took part in the Highlands East Plein Air Arts Festival, held between Sept. 10-13. The festival placed an emphasis on painting outdoors.

"I have high hopes that in the future this event will grow and prosper," said event coordinator Gary Blundell.

In its previous incarnation, the event was run by Highlands East artist Tracey Lee Green and known as "A Brush With the Highlands."

Since taking over last year Blundell said he has tried to include artists and hobbyists of different abilities, from across Ontario

"We've got people from Ottawa, Toronto, Hamilton, Pembroke ..." he said. "It's a small quality group."

Each artist received a list of 14 suggested locations. These included camps, farms, lakes and historic sites. A number of local accommodators were also recommended to them.

At least half of the pieces they entered in the closing show at the Lloyd Watson Centre in Wilberforce on Sunday had to be completed during the previous three days of painting.

Doug Ware, a painter for the past 40 years, thoroughly enjoyed taking part in this year's festival. After participating last year, his work was chosen as the cover art for the festival's website and brochure.

"It's great, because I know a group of people here," said Ware, a resident of Ottawa. "It's very sociable, so we have a lot of fun."

Ware has no doubts about returning next year.

"I think every year it's going to get better and grow," he said, adding that it's a good project for the municipality if there is economic spinoff.

Blundell pointed out that he received financial support from the municipality to promote the festival outside of Haliburton County. In the coming weeks, he plans on discussing future plans with the municipality.

"I've been talking to all the artists, trying to get their feedback and some suggestions about how we might make the event better."

Helpful tools make life a breeze

When the late '50s and early '60s roll around, it's time for people to start looking into equipment to help them live comfortably.

So says Susan Whitaker, staff member at Highlands Medical Supplies in Haliburton. Whitaker is a former personal support worker who now helps seniors choose equipment to help ensure safety and comfort at home.

"When we have someone come into the store, we tell them it's important to think about their safety," she said. "As we get older our bones get brittle and our skin gets thin, and we need to be more careful."

Whitaker said seniors can be assessed for specific needs through an occupational therapist who can help connect seniors with equipment they need and funding to help with the cost of devices.

Highlands Medical Supplies is an authorized vendor for many insurance companies, as well as an authorized assisted devices program (ADP) vendor and an authorized department of veterans affairs vendor. With approval, these programs can help seniors who need financial assistance.

"Walkers are important for seniors and ADP can help with

that," said Whitaker. "They pay for three quarters of the walker and the senior only needs to pay a quarter of the cost."

Whitaker said every home can be equipped to help those who need it. The bathroom is a trouble spot for many with mobility issues.

"Bath safety is certainly a big issue for seniors," she said. "It's important their bathroom is totally equipped."

Whitaker said safety bars and a mat in the bathtub are essential components to bathrooms to protect seniors from falls. She said a raised toilet seat with arms helps tall people better stand up, and helps seniors be more independent after surgery.

She also recommends a lift-out chair for adults who need some assistance getting in and out of a chair. Newer models are electric with a battery backup, are controlled by a remote, and can provide heat and massage for aching muscles. They're also now built so seniors can nap or sleep in them for extra comfort

For seniors who continue to enjoy walking, Whitaker said anti-slip shoes provide additional support and can be offered in different widths and sizes. Besides walkers, canes are available to help with balance.

"If mobility is off, that's when they should be speaking to us," she said.



World record swimmer takes a dip in Boshkung

Boshkung Lake might be a smaller lake than other open water swims Annaleise Carr has taken on, but the world record swimmer said she looks forward to getting in the water in Algonquin Highlands each year.

Carr was the headliner at the third annual Variety Village Open Water Swim on Sept. 13 that started on the shore of Buttermilk Falls Resort. Swimmers took on an Olympic distance 1.5 km swim or an Ironman distance 3.8 km swim to raise funds for the all-ability facility in Scarborough.

"I think it's beautiful, it's definitely one of my favourite swims coming up here for the weekend," Carr said. "I love it and wouldn't miss it."

The teenager was the then-youngest person to complete a swim across Lake Ontario at age 14, and completed a marathon swim across Lake Erie last year. She has raised more than \$400,000 for Camp Trillium, a camp for childhood cancer. But her weekend in Haliburton County is devoted to Variety Village.

Volunteer coordinator Kathryn Haggis

said the local support to make the swim happen has been overwhelming and thanked Buttermilk Falls owners Dale and John Rider, the Stanhope fire department, the OPP and the lake association for helping each year.

"It really does take a village, so we've got a lot of people who have worked on this," she said.

The event raised \$18,000 for Variety Village in its first two years. It has been added to the Global Swim Series, which promotes open water swimming around the world.

Haggis grew up waterskiing on the lake and said it's a perfect venue for swimmers who want to take part in an open water swim in the province.

"We don't do the race in July or August because we don't want to take away their Saturday afternoon on the lake," she said.

Haggis said it's essential to keep Variety Village open, as the centre provides respite and eliminates the barriers for people with disabilities. It also supports integrated sports teams so para-athletes, developmentally delayed athletes and able-bodied athletes can all participate together. The open water swim funds directly assist those athletes.






