# School board takes stand against union tactics

The Trillium Lakelands District School Board (TLDSB) is calling out the union representing local high school teachers for the effect its bargaining position might have on students.

The board recently filed an application with the Ontario Labour Relations Board (OLRB)

to seek a decision on whether the 15 demands of the local Ontario Secondary Schools Teachers Federation (OSSTF) district are a "legal negotiation position."

"We're hoping to have a quick response," said TLDSB chair Louise Clodd, who is expecting a decision this Thursday.

The OSSTF has instructed the board's


high school teachers to boycott traditional activities such as determining scholarship and award winners. They will also be boycotting graduation ceremonies.

District 15 of the OSSTF represents all secondary school teachers in the TLDSB, which includes Haliburton. Under the School Boards Collective Bargaining Act, the OSSTF successfully negotiated a central agreement last August. However, it has not been able to complete a local agreement.

"We ... have been bargaining with our local school board on local items since last February," said local president Colin Matthew.

# Prices are high in packed housing market

Toronto's hot housing scene seems to be leaking into the county.

Haliburton real estate agent Jeff Wilson is surprised by a deal he recently closed, and it's something he will have to get used to this spring, he says.

A few weeks ago he sold a home for \$195,000, but Wilson wasn't expecting more than \$180,000.

"I'm surprised at what people are getting for their properties," he said.

As the demand for housing outpaces supply, sellers are confident that buyers will take the first offer, Wilson said.

It's a trend that's going to continue for the next several months, says Royal LePage broker Anthony vanLieshout.

"The number of listings is down but the number of sales is up and the market seems to have started a little bit earlier than normal," vanLieshout explained.

"I'd say we're already in a seller's market."

The strong fall market has carried into 2016, vanLieshout said, and it's created strong cottage sales.

Out of the 35 residential waterfront units sold this year in Haliburton County, 22 sold in March for a median price of \$377,500, according to marketstats.ca.

The high-level of activity is also reflected in the Toronto Real Estate Board's recent report which shows a 15.8 per cent increase over last year's first quarter sales in the Greater Toronto Area.

In Haliburton County, the numbers level out when it comes to residential non-waterfront properties.

Sixteen were sold last month at a median price of \$184,500, which is on par with last year's figures.

Century 21 broker Andrew Hodgson said more boomers are deciding to move to the county where prices are lower.

The average selling price across all housing types in the Greater Toronto Area for the month of March was \$688,181.

"They move up here for the better value ... and Haliburton County is a beautiful place to live," Hodgson said.

Rental properties, however, are still missing, he added.

"We get hit with rental questions all the time," he said. "And unfortunately we have a real shortage of rentals."

Anyone looking to sell during the spring market is going to be pleased with the results, but waiting a few weeks to see if prices go up is also a good option, says vanLieshout.

Buyers should enter the market and sign as soon as they can before prices go up.

"You want to jump in while the market is at the bottom end," vanLieshout said.

# OSSTF declares impasse at bargaining table

The act states that both the central and local components must be completed.

On Nov. 4, OSSTF declared an impasse at the bargaining table. It imposed some limited sanctions against the board the following day, said Matthew.

On Feb. 4, the two parties entered into what was supposed to be two days of mediation. But negotiations were quickly called off by a Ministry of Labour mediator.

"What the mediator fairly quickly got to the conclusion was that the two parties weren't ready to come an agreement yet," he said.

The board's response was to offer arbitration, whereby both parties would give up bargaining rights and a decision would be made by an arbitrator.

"They essentially write the new collective agreement. Whatever the arbitrator comes up with becomes the new deal."

The OSSTF, however, wasn't interested.

"We continue to believe at, at this point, that we can continue to negotiate a successful, local deal that really meets the needs of the school board and meets the needs of our OSSTF members."


Clodd calls the impact of the OSSTF's sanctions "troubling." "Their actions are affecting students and could have an impact on upcoming graduation and award ceremonies," she

According to the TLDSB, some of the union's demands include easier access to paid time off and a request to make it more difficult for principals to conduct teacher performance appraisals every five years. The latter is an item the board believes is an attempt to override provincial legislation.

Clodd said there will be no teacher comments on report cards this month and the letter "S" for "satisfactory" will be listed beside all nine learning skills regardless of performance.

"We do not believe this is an equitable and respectful way to treat our students," she said.

# Terror on Wonderland Road needs help for next scare

Halloween is six months away, but the organizers of a popular annual event are looking for support now in order to keep the tradition going.

Cathy Barnett, co-founder of Terror On Wonderland Road, recently turned to crowdfunding website GoFundMe to raise enough money to purchase a 1,600-squarefoot tent for the scary event.

"I've already put tons of money into it; I just can't keep pumping [my] money into it," said Barnett.

The cost of renting a tent for an extended period of time wouldn't be feasible, she said.

Eight years ago, Barnett and her late husband, Alex Bell, began turning their backyard at 1280 Wonderland Road into a frightening display of ghosts, ghouls and goblins. They borrowed two tents, one of which is no longer available, to create a haunted house full of animatronics characters.

In recent years, the event has been a fundraiser for the county's four food banks.

Barnett launched the online campaign two weeks ago with a target of \$10,000 (the average price for an 800-square-foot tent). However, the goal has been reduced to \$6,000 with a deal on a used tent.

"That's a steal," she said, adding her source is willing to part with it for less because it is no longer rental- worthy. "[Apparently], it's

just not visually pleasing enough [to rent for] weddings."

Barnett is adamant the volunteer-run event won't continue without a tent.

"It holds all the stuff that would get damaged outdoors," she said.

The tent will cost almost \$3,000 with tax. Anything collected beyond that will help pay for recurring expenses such as makeup, props and other items. If there is money left over, a second tent will be purchased.

They will need the tent by the end of August to allow for adequate preparation

As of Tuesday afternoon, a total of \$250 had been donated by four people.

Following Bell's sudden passing last April, the event was relocated indoors to the Pinestone Resort. Based on feedback from the public, Barnett decided to bring it back to

"People who attended it said they enjoyed it, and it was fantastic. But it didn't have the same oomph to it as being outdoors. [Outdoors] gave [it] more of an eerie feeling," she said.

Barnett and Bell also started Haliburton's Zombie Walk, now entering its third year.

Terror On Wonderland Road is scheduled to take place on Oct. 29 and 30. The Zombie Walk will be held on Oct. 29 in Head Lake

# The business of being in business

I don't have the statistics to back this up, but it seems there are more new businesses opening up in the county.

This leaves me with contrasting feelings of hope and apprehension. Hope is obvious. This area badly needs revenue and as many job opportunities as possible. The apprehension I feel is a little harder to explain. Amongst a lot of reasons, I worry that the people starting up their company think there's a difference between running a business and running a business in Haliburton

One of Haliburton's more notable business people has a line he likes to use when talking about social enterprise in the area: Do you want to know how to make a small fortune up here, he asks. Start with a large one.

This sentiment is historically accurate but slightly dated. We don't exactly roll up the sidewalks on Labour Day the way we used to but we are still certainly a service-based economy and the economic climate here is still largely dictated by part time residents and visitors to the area. In simplest terms we need to remind ourselves that service is most of our economy and we need to conduct ourselves accordingly. This comes back to my first point. Some people simply don't know how to run a business. It's not that they start with a bad idea, it's just that they forget about the customer.

There are bad business people everywhere, but I would contend that there are a fair number of people in this area running enterprises that have no business being in business. A large part of this blame can be attributed to the false economy we have here. By that I mean the area, in a lot of sectors, really doesn't reflect the true nature of that sector. Restaurants for example don't fight for business in the same way restaurants in larger centers would, and because of that, some businesses here tend to have lazy business practices. Evidence of this would be a story or two everyone has about arriving at a place to eat, only to find they have closed early. Sure there's a cost-cutting argument

to be made here but how long would your business last in a larger center with that kind of attitude? With six more eateries on the

same street vying for the same customers, it would be like signing your company's death warrant. Not being open during your posted hours is a violation of the most basic business principle. You do so at your own peril.

There is also the captive audience principle. Here – the thinking goes – there are only so many customers and so many providers locally which (to those who follow this sort of thinking) allows you to both corner the market and dictate price. If you want a deck built the contractor often assumes he is free to dictate when it will be built and how much it will cost. Again these are really short-sighted and dangerous ways to conduct a business.

You might have hometown convenience advantage on your side the first time, but after making a customer wait an inordinate amount of time and following that up with some price gouging (since "he's rich and can afford it") don't be surprised the next time you see a trades vehicle driving through town "taking work away from the locals." You need to realize that if bringing someone in from out of the area is preferred by the client because of price, scheduling, quality or any of the other factors, it says more about business in the area than it says about the

Is this sort of business an epidemic up here? Probably not, but if enough of your competitors are utilizing shoddy business practices, it's not long before your company becomes guilty simply by association. You've unfairly garnered a bad reputation.

If you're in the service industry, as so many are, you need to remember that it's the customer you're there to serve. That principle is the same regardless of where you choose to set up shop. Smart business people know that and smart business people everywhere, including here, are successful because of it.



# White helmet passes from Miles to lles

After 25 years as fire chief for Dysart et al, Miles Maughan will soon relinquish the white helmet to Mike Iles.

Maughan announced his retirement earlier this year, after nearly four decades with the Dysart fire crew.

"I just picked that date," Maughan laughed, adding his retirement date was not sentimental.

Maughan joined the Dysart Fire Department in November 1977 and became the chief in January 1991. A plaque on his office wall recognizes him for his years of service. It's a framed photo of him with a certificate. A silver medal of honour adorns it.

When Iles discovered Maughan was retiring, he decided to apply for the job. He started in the same department in 1993, as a volunteer firefighter, in hopes of following a family tradition.

"There is some family history there, my father was a firefighter," Iles said.

His dad Joe Iles was a fire chief in the same department in the 1970s – part of his 40-year career as a firefighter – and Mike Iles' son, Chris, volunteers for the Dysart crew.

Mike Iles is currently the service

manager at Curry Chevrolet Buick GMC Ltd. in Haliburton, where he will be retiring from a career he started nearly 30 years ago. Iles said it's the job that brought him back to the place where he grew up.

For the past 23 years, Iles says he's been fighting fires to serve the community. Twenty-six other volunteer firefighters will look to him for guidance when he starts officially on July 1. He will learn the office duties from Maughan over the next two months, starting May 2.

"Job shadowing will mean going over all the duties and responsibilities," Maughan said, "because it's more than just the fires. There's paperwork that needs to get done."

Looking back, Maughan noted the worst fire he saw was the Haliburton Stedman's in August 1986. One of the fire crew was injured, and another suffered smoke inhalation. It was a very large blaze to battle.

Iles remembered when he was called to a blaze at Sir Sam's in August 1994.

"It was a large building and difficult to put out," he said.

"But that's just fires," Maughan adds.

"There were [also] medical calls that required the fire crew, some [were] horrible scenes. I remember there was one car [that] had two young girls ... trapped underneath."

Maughan has decided that he will stay on as firefighter after retiring as chief, and thus, he's not really leaving the team.

When asked if he was nervous about Maughan staying on as a firefighter, Iles'

reaction was surprise.

"Me? No! I think it's wonderful. [It would be a shame to lose] the years of experience he has."

# Haliburton Forest team working with Dysart to keep permit-less buildings

Almost a month after the 2016 Forest Festival was cancelled, Haliburton Forest and Wild Life Reserve has assembled a team to examine the buildings missing permits.

That team has submitted preliminary proposal has been given to the Municipality of Dysart et al.

"It essentially outlines the process for evaluating the buildings moving forward," said Malcolm Cockwell, general manager of Haliburton Forest.

"It does not say 'this building will need this and that', but rather, 'we looked at the buildings and they look pretty good, so here's what we're going to do to ensure they are in compliance with the [municipality's] building code."

In addition to several specific measurements, concrete samples from the buildings will be tested as well, Cockwell said.

The proposal was put together by Duncan Ross, an architect from Huntsville, who is one of four people, including Cockwell, examining the buildings at Haliburton Forest.

Tim Kieffe, a professional engineer, Lauren Spivek, who works with Ross, and Claude doughty, who Cockwell

described as an "advisor and friend" of Haliburton Forest, make up the rest of the team.

Their goal is to find ways to bring several buildings, including the Forest Festival's concert venue, the Logging Museum, to building code.

In the spring of 2015, Dan Sayers, Dysart's chief building official, applied

to the Superior Court for an order directing Haliburton Forest to comply with the Building Code Act. He said he requested the order due to health and safety concerns relating to hundreds of people in a concert venue that was missing proper building permits.

A judge ordered Haliburton Forest to cancel any plans at the Logging Museum in February, while giving Dysart the right to demolish the buildings which were lacking permits.

A public meeting between Haliburton Forest owner Peter Schleifenbaum and Dysart council on March 18 resolved little between the two parties.

Schleifenbaum left the country for a few weeks the day after the meeting, and instructed Haliburton Forest staff to ensure the buildings remain standing.

As of press time, Ross' proposal hasn't been fully analyzed by the municipality

"I know their lawyer has submitted a proposal to our lawyer but I am waiting for our lawyer's response," Sayers wrote in an email.

Ross said that about 40 per cent of his work comes from building renovations

and additions. A lot of the time, he's working with buildings that have no building permits, requiring him to develop proposals similar to this one.

"I've worked on some projects that didn't even have the correct zoning application," he said. "Unfortunately this happens more often than people might like to think."

He said it doesn't take much for construction to trigger the need for a building permit.

Certain townships, he said, require residents to obtain building permits when replacing windows in their home.

"Most of the time, it's just a matter of phoning in and making sure you have all the information you need before going ahead with something."

Ross said he hasn't dealt with this many buildings at the same time for a single project.

"No one wants to see these buildings torn down," he said.

Cockwell agreed.

"Everyone here is working hard to find a positive way forward."

# Flood warning still in effect for local lakes

# Significant snowpack remains in upper regions: MNRF

While much of the ice and snow has melted, water levels could still rise in the Gull River watershed.

As of Monday, a flood warning was in effect for the watershed and the Village of Minden. It is expected to remain in place until Friday.

"Flooding is still occurring in some locations," said Kris Windover, integrated resources management technical specialist with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF). "It would be a little premature to lift that [warning] at this point in time given that there's certain areas still experiencing difficulties."

Water levels have receded slightly since last week, said Windover on Wednesday.

"Currently, they look to be stabilizing. We haven't seen much fluctuation over the last 24 hours," he said, adding levels will likely remain high for the next week or two.

There still is significant snowpack in the upper regions of the watershed despite the warm weather, he pointed out.

The MNRF advises residents to closely monitor conditions, and stay away from fast-moving rivers and streams. Those who use forest access roads for outdoor activities should exercise caution because these areas are "seasonally inundated with water, prone to washouts and may be impassible due to current water levels."

Most reservoir lakes are at or above the

targeting operating levels for this time of year, according to Monday's advisory.
On Tuesday, the following roads in Minden remained closed and were only

open to local traffic: St. Germaine Street, Invergordon Street, Anson Street, Orde Street, McKnight Street and Spring Valley Road. Milburn Road is closed to through traffic until further notice.

# Ontario Nature wants you to keep an eye out

Animals have started to come out of hibernation. A few reptiles and amphibians have already been spotted in the Highlands, and the flood is about to begin.

And it's music to the ears of Erin Mallon a conservation biologist with Ontario Nature, a company located in Toronto. She is part of a team working to enlist citizen scientists for the Ontario Reptile and Amphibian Atlas, a seven-year-old Ontario Nature project.

"People are going to start hearing frogs," Mallon said, "and some people are aware of what frogs sound like, but others may just recognize that it's the sound of spring [and] are not quite sure what it is."

As soon as the weather is above five degrees Celsius in the evening, frogs start calling each other in preparation for mating season.

Ontario Nature is a charitable organization representing more than 30,000 members and supporters and more than 150 member groups from across Ontario. Its aim is to "protect wild species and wild spaces through conservation, education and public engagement."

Established as the Federation of Ontario Naturalists in 1931, Ontario Nature has been a champion for nature in Ontario for the past 85 years.

Every year it maps the whereabouts of some of the provinces rare and at risk creatures using data submitted by people of all skill levels. The atlas highlights the key data gaps where there have been no recent sightings.

"While you're enjoying the nice weather this week, keep an eye out for reptiles and amphibians," she said. "They have fascinating traits and adaptations, and you can help their plight simply by reporting your sightings."

Mallon said that in the coming weeks, you may spot a midland painted turtle or

a wood frog. If you turn over a log, you may find a red-spotted newt or a blue-spotted salamander.

"Spring is one of my favourite times of year and is distinctively marked by the unique calls of different species of frogs and toads," said Emma Horrigan, Ontario Nature's citizen science coordinator. "The early season calls of wood and chorus frogs as well as spring peepers bring the night alive with sound."

Horrigan also said the onset of spring is an exciting time of year for outdoor enthusiasts. But she said that sadly, reptiles and amphibians are experiencing global declines of 20 and 40 per cent respectively.

In Ontario, 75 per cent of reptiles and 22 per cent of amphibians are listed as at-risk.

These turtles, snakes, lizards, salamanders, frogs and toads have unique, specialized and fascinating life histories. But they suffer from habitat loss and fragmentation, road mortality, persecution and pollution.

A recent press release stated that a growing network of individual members, volunteers and other groups help to ensure Ontario Nature's mission gets out every year. To do this, they run a few citizen scientist programs.

"For a long time it was researchers and biologists who were taking any of their observations of reptiles and amphibians and sharing it," Mallon said, adding that they have now decided to open it up to those in the province interested in nature to keep watch in their areas and report their findings.

In the future, they hope to map the distribution for everyone to access. They have designed an app for downloading, along with providing a form for those who just want to print it and take it on a walk.

"You can report your sightings and use it as a guide," Mallon said. "If you are walking through the forest in the evening and hear something and think, 'hey this might be a spring peeper, but I am not sure what they sound like,' you can actually play through frog calls and match it."

# Scott calls suspension of Trillium Foundation's grant program a 'devastating blow'

Laurie Scott, MPP for Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock, is voicing her frustration with the Liberal government's decision to suspend the Ontario Trillium Foundation's (OTF) \$25 million capital grants program.

And she is asking Michael Coteau, Ontario's Minister of Tourism, Culture and Sport, to reverse the decision.

"Selfless and hard-working volunteer groups rely on the OTF capital program," said Scott in a press release. "The government's suspension of the OTF capital funding is a devastating blow to so many local groups."

Ann Ariyadasa, Communications officer for OTF noted that no completed applications had been received from organizations in Haliburton County.

"Our local staff [members] haven't received any calls from applicants from Haliburton County," she said, when asked if there has been reaction to the news.

The government's decision came two weeks before the OTF's April 6 application deadline. The funds for the program will be reallocated to a new community capital program, which is yet to be finalized.

The OTF is an agency of the provincial government that receives annual funding from the ministry. The capital grants investment stream provided capital funding to "broaden access, improve community spaces and promote energy efficiency," said Ariyadasa.

A notice was posted to the OTF's website on March 24. It informed applicants they would no longer have access to the application form for a capital grant and noted that the OTF would follow up with those who already applied.

"We regret the inconvenience it may cause to our applicants," the post read.

According to Scott, the \$25 million is being directed to a new "Ontario 150" program, which would tie into Canada's 150th anniversary next year.

She is concerned that organizations will be forced to spend more of their valuable time fundraising to maintain their facilities as a result of the decision.

"The fact that the government can't fund a new program that represents a mere 0.02 per cent of province's budget, without raiding Trillium's capital fund, shows just how broke the government is," she said.

This isn't the first time the OTF has faced budget changes. In 2013, it

cancelled the Future Fund program, a \$5 million initiative which focused on social entrepreneurship and fostering economic opportunities for Ontarians.

"By taking immediate decisive action two weeks before the deadline, we ensured that we disrupted as few applicants as possible as the vast majority of them apply only a few days before deadlines," said Ariyadasa, of the OTF announcement.

Last week, the OTF announced \$48 million in funding for 314 non-profit initiatives through various other grants.

A lack of funding has led to the cancellation of a local program that prepares children for kindergarten.

Gena Robertson, founder of School's Cool and executive director of SIRCH, said the program has

never received base funding and has relied on grants and fundraising.

"This year those sources were tapped out and we were not able to obtain grants or other sufficient funding to run a program," said Robertson.

This year's fundraising has focused on the Community Kitchen and bereavement programs run by SIRCH, a nonprofit organization

that provides a variety of programs. Neither receives government funding.

School's Cool prepares children ages three to five for school. The six-week, 72-hour program features a playbased curriculum, skills building activities and parent involvement strategies. Children develop their language, math, self-help, psychological and social skills.

Three trained instructors provide a low teacher-

to-student ratio so all children receive quality time, according to SIRCH's website.

Over the past five years, 168 children in Haliburton County have completed the program. Robertson estimates that more than 500 children have graduated in the past 15 years.

"Those attending have typically had developmental

delays or other concerns for the parent," she said, pointing out that six weeks in the program equals a year's worth of development.

The program has been such a success that other organizations in communities across Canada have offered it.


"We know the teachers can recognize children who have gone through School's Cool and are grateful for it. In many instances, parents clearly state that their child would not have been successful in kindergarten without School's Cool," she

Although the news is disappointing, Robertson hopes to acquire funding to offer the program next summer.

"We have heard from parents who are very disappointed but understand the circumstances," she said.



# 'Here' is at the Agnes Jamieson Gallery

Chris Hanson and Hendrika Sonnenberg, an artistic couple who recently moved to Minden, have an exhibition at the Agnes Jamieson gallery, appropriately titled *Here*.

"Using photography and collage we plan to create a body of work that explores the relationship between our past practice and where we find ourselves now. In a sense, what 'here' means for us," they say in introducing the show.

When I first entered the gallery I was struck by was the starkness of the presentation. The walls are bright white and all the artwork is contained in white frames. The immediate effect is somewhat clinical, enhanced by full-intensity lighting. All the numerous images are presented in portrait aspect and most are contained in small frames with the occasional larger work inserted to break up the uniformity. There is a precision to the presentation, each piece exactly equidistant from its neighbour, and this precision and attention to detail carries through to the art itself.

Within each of the white frames is a collage comprised of manually cut pieces of ink jet photographs. The images consist, in the main, of cityscapes and corresponding accoutrements, twisted street lamps, garbage cans and abandoned bicycles. Others depict silhouettes of skeletal trees, and globe-like structures, from which emanate more trees, perhaps emblematic of rural skyscrapers. Some of the images blend urban buildings and street lamps with rural trees and rock formations.

The cityscapes, especially, have an eerie, cartoon-like quality to them, vaguely reminiscent of a Tim Burton movie set. This is due in part to the colour palette of the photo fragments which have a faded Polaroid feel and consist of muted blues, browns, shades of grey and black. Even so, set against the severity of the white walls, each frame has the tendency

to draw the viewer in. The effect is the opposite of being in a darkened room looking out a window into the brightness beyond. With *Here* you are in total brightness and are persuaded to enter the manufactured darkness within each frame.

Even though I was persuaded to enter each image, once there I felt a little like an intruder. There is a curious uninviting emptiness to each collage, due in part, to the lack of bold, or warming colours, and also to the absence of life forms within the cityscapes. No people, cats, rats or raccoons or any other being. They seem like set pieces waiting to be populated. The overall effect was somewhat unsettling but other visitors said that the images were calming.

I think everyone would agree however on the couple's compositional skill and creativity in constructing more than 80 pieces for *Here*. It's a tremendous amount of work, and although the overall effect in the gallery is impressive there is a production-line look to the exhibition. That might be due to cogitating life experiences over a period of years and then creating the appropriate imagery before having to cut, paste and frame the fragments in a drastically condensed period of time for this exhibition,.

One room of the gallery is dedicated to an animated video called *The Way Things Are*, which is written, directed and animated by Hanson and Sonnenberg. It's very much in keeping with the look and feel of the still images because the fragments used in the framed collages are taken from photos used in the video.

The video features the coming alive of stop signs, the ubiquitous street lamps (one of which appears to urinate), a driver-less Zamboni, and wandering recycling bins and grocery carts. The

animation comes with humour inherent in its DNA, and what separates 'The Way Things Are' from the still images on the walls, is the sort of languid humour perhaps best personified in silent movies by Buster Keaton. In my mind's eye I could see an animated Keaton rolling around alone in the desolate sets, wondering where all the people were, while fighting with drunken and urinating

The animation of objects gave the video a 'life' and a warmth, born of humour, that was lacking in the still images of *Here*, and was more compelling.


lamp posts and avoiding the runaway

Zamboni.

The video and exhibition are meticulously crafted presentations from artists recognized and respected by the international arts world. So if you're interested in looking at one example among the many streams of contemporary art on display in big city galleries, this is an exhibition you won't want to miss.

After travel to various hot spots of art around the globe Hanson and Sonnenberg find themselves, for the time being at least, settled here in Minden, and it will be interesting to see how a prolonged stay in this particular environment will affect their artistic output.


Winnipeg-based trio The Crooked Brothers stopped in Haliburton for their latest performance.

Local act Raven Mad Crow Society (Albert Saxby and Sian Wilson) opened for the band.







Outfits that weren't picked up on the weekend will be included in next year's giveaway.


Lowes and Abbott were inspired to start the event after hearing about a successful giveaway in another community. They gathered most of the donations by turning to social media.






