County promises faster, more accessible Internet

Two separate but related Internet projects will increase speeds at Wi-Fi hot spots and bring high-speed to some previously unserviced county areas.

County of Haliburton CAO Mike Rutter and manager of IT Mike March, along with Eastern Ontario Regional Network (EORN) CAO David Fell, discussed the projects with The Highlander recently.

Rutter said the county is spending \$350,000 with Bell to bring fibre to 20 municipal buildings.

While people are already using the hot spots at some of these locations, for example, the Dysart and Minden branches of the public library, a move to fibre from DSL means quicker service.

In fact, March said it will be ten times faster at several hubs. These include: The Rails End Gallery 'caboose,' Dysart Arena, West Guilford Recreation Centre, the Haliburton, Gooderham, Minden, Wilberforce and Stanhope libraries, the

Dorset Recreation Centre, Algonquin Highlands Fire Department Oxtongue Lake, the Minden Hills Arena and the Lloyd Watson Community Centre.

Other areas that have no Wi-Fi today but will in the immediate future include the Harcourt Community Centre, the Dorset Roads Garage and the Highlands East fire department at Paudash Lake.

The Dysart township office, county administrative office, EMS Tory Hill station, EMS Minden branch and the

Minden Hills township office are getting fibre but high-speed Internet there will not be for public access, March said.

"The purpose of the free Wi-Fi being offered ... is for members of the public who want to drop by a library, arena, or other Wi-Fi location and check e-mail, do some work et etera," March said this week.

He added that people can access the Wi-Fi outdoors as well.

"For example, in the case of the Rails End

Gallery, it can be used for major events such as Art in the Park."

Rutter said the work is underway now and the public may have noticed more Bell vehicles and technicians in the area. March said some of the hot spots could be online as early as this fall and all of them will be up and running by the spring.

He explained that the county has signed a 10-year master services agreement with Bell Canada. The county's municipalities are being asked to pay for annual operating costs, as well as maintenance and replacement costs for some of the equipment, while the county covers the cost for its sites and certain municipal sites as well. The monthly cost for its four

municipalities will increase from \$1,373 to \$2,897. Work includes provisioning two new sites with DSL and upgrading 16 sites from DSL, or similar services, to 100 Mbps fibre

March said the speed is 100 Mpbs symmetrical, which means they get 100 Mbps download and 100 Mbps upload.

As for the EORN component, Fell said the county's project will potentially benefit the businesses near the municipal locations with high-speed service.

Fell said the fibre to municipal buildings will be available to surrounding businesses. It is different from the municipal Wi-Fi that the county is going to provide for free. He said the county will pay for the operating costs for the fibre – but business can get similar connection speeds on fibre

at costs similar to each municipal location.

Specific businesses identified by Bell will be able to connect to the new fibre. They will have no capital costs, just usage fees. Fell estimated eligible locations would be in about a 200-metre

radius of municipal buildings Bell is doing quick facility checks to see which businesses will qualify.

Fell added that once the fibre is installed, the possibility of future extension of high speed into the community increases.

Rutter agreed. "The idea was that there was really no one solution in Haliburton

a lot of incremental steps and this is one of them. We're not ISP providers but we are doing everything we can. We're working on a number of different things. This is an offshoot of the EORN project."

EORN was created by the Eastern Ontario Wardens Caucus (EOWC) as part of a \$175 million project to bring high speed Internet to Eastern Ontario.

"It is a good news story for Haliburton County," said Fell. "We are opening up public Wi-Fi spots and allowing businesses and residents to connect to these clusters."

Forest buildings to meet code 'within a few months'



With the help of engineers and architects, buildings without permits in the Haliburton Forest should meet code within a few months, says general manager Malcolm Cockwell.

The latest developments in the Forest saga come months after an Ontario judge, in February, ordered Haliburton Forest to demolish several buildings due to a "flagrant and unjustified violation of the Ontario Building Code Act.'

A heated exchange between the municipality of Dysart et al and Haliburton Forest owner Peter Schleifenbaum in March resulted in the cancellation of one of Haliburton's most prominent summer events, the Forest Festival, and Schleifenbaum announcing he was appealing the court ruling.

That appeal is still before the courts, says the township's building planner, Dan Sayers, and it is a process that can take up to a year.

But an agreement between the township and the Forest was reached a few days after Schleifenbaum's announcement, which gave a group of engineers and architects more time to submit drawings and permit applications for the Forest's Logging Museum, EcoLog Mill, Stocking Lake structures and Chip Processing Plant.

The group consists of four individuals with backgrounds in engineering and architecture.

Cockwell was tasked with overseeing the process while Schleifenbaum stayed in Ireland.

"Drawings and descriptions of the buildings have been submitted, and the architects will be submitting formal building permit applications later this week," Cockwell wrote in an email, adding "we feel good about our relationship with the municipality at this point."

He also pointed out that Schleifenbaum has returned to Canada.

Sayers hasn't seen any of the engineers' drawings, but he said if they prove satisfactory, the two parties can discuss what exactly needs to be done to each individual building to ensure it meets code.

The township does not have any original plans for those buildings, Sayers said, which is partially why he applied to the Superior Court for an order in the spring of 2015, directing Haliburton Forest to comply with the Building Code Act.

He also cited health and safety concerns regarding the Logging Museum, which despite the absence of a proper building permit, was often used as a concert venue during the popular Forest Festival.

A closed council meeting later this summer will address the Forest's permit applications further, Sayers said.

Although the conflicts between Schleifenbaum and the township go back many years, the ongoing discussions between the township and the Forest represent a "new level of trust and compliance," says Dysart Reeve Murray Fearrey.

"There is definitely progress being made," he wrote in an email, adding, "It's a mutually positive relationship moving forward."

In an interview from March, Fearrey said the township had made several exceptions for Schleifenbaum to help with his projects, and the ensuing conflicts were often about building permits.

"That goes back 20 years," he told The Highlander.

The Forest Festival's manager, Lesley English, told *The Highlander* last week she is hoping to discuss the future of the festival with Schleifenbaum in the coming weeks.

Time for long-term Internet plans, not Band-Aid solutions

I'm trying to wrap my head around all of the Internet-related stories that we have encountered over the summer. I have to say that it is leaving me somewhat dazed and confused.

Take today's story on the county spending \$350,000 to bring fibre optic to municipal buildings. It isn't just a county story. The Eastern Ontario Regional Network (EORN) is also involved and is talking about how businesses too can take advantage of the latest county dance with Bell.

Don't get me wrong. I am happy that Wi-Fi is going to be supposedly ten times faster at the Dysart branch of the Haliburton Public Library because I sometimes work from there. However, it would be far nicer if the service was available in our office, about 200 m away. I am not happy that I am struggling to find an Internet provider that can offer the same service to my house. And while it sounds good that businesses may benefit from the county's arrangement with Bell, it also sounds like they will have to pay through the nose for it.

Last week we had North Frontenac kind of holding a gun to the head of the Municipality of Dysart et al, saying if they don't get the green light by Labour Day to proceed with their plans, well, all bets are off. They also do not have a lot of experience when it comes to laying fibre.

It seems that the more we ask questions the more confusing the answers become. I suspect that is because the sources of some of our stories may be a bit confused too.

What seems to be lacking in the county is an overall plan to improve Internet services. It would appear that no one has sat down at a table to map out the Internet game plan from here. And, so, we are relying on bandage solutions from the likes of the county and EORN, or placing our bets on companies such as Bell and North Frontenac. This can be dangerous.

A lot of what is being proposed to date appears to be short term reaction kind of stuff. I mean, really, as a county, do we want to boast that people can drive down to the local library and park to use the Wi-Fi? Nobody's going to find that impressive in 2016.

Shouldn't we aim to have a county where residents can get real high-speed Internet in their homes without having to sell a kidney? And shouldn't we strive to have an Internet service that allows our businesses to compete with businesses the world-over?

Don't get me wrong. I'm not knocking the county. I think it is great what they're doing. Bringing high-speed Internet to residents for free is fantastic.

Nor would I ever take a shot at EORN. It has done a wonderful job of bridging

the Internet gap here in the county as well. Am I calling out North Frontenac? Maybe. No company should threaten Dysart et al by

saying it will pack up its bat and ball and go home if they don't get a yes by Labour Dav.

What about Bell? Most definitely, this mega-company has gotten away with overcharging customers for pretty ordinary service in rural Ontario for a very long time. They are not alone. There are a whole lot of ISP's that could be added to the list.

What we would like to see is North Frontenac, Bell and other service providers come to the table along with the county and EORN. We need real, long-term solutions for Halburton county's long-standing Internet woes. Rather than coming and simply looking for another financial agreement, it would be admirable if these companies joined in some serious round-table discussions about how to bring good service for a reasonable price to our municipalities.

Chances are they stand to make some money, but at least we wouldn't feel as if we just paid for dinner and drinks and they left the table without so much as a thank you and a goodbye.

The Guilford dozen

There are many ways people mark summer's mid-point. There is the calendar, of course. When we slip into August, there is a sense it is downhill from here. The arrival of cooler weather is a good indicator, but that hasn't happened yet. The first sign of fall colour which shows itself in a single branch on a tree that wants to be ahead of it seasonal rhythm is often a harbinger of the change to come.

For me, I know we have turned that summer corner when I see Dale McConnell selling his corn at the side of the road in Haliburton Village. Sitting under a tent beside the entrance to the Pump Shop, with several tables littered with bags of freshly picked corn and other recently harvested vegetables, his arrival marks the start of the slide toward autumn for me.

Dale has been growing and selling corn in the Highlands since 1986. His property, Dunloe Farm, is located on the Barry Line near West Guilford. The land was first farmed in 1905 by the Barry family. The sandy loam soil is ideal for growing corn, but like much farmland in the Highlands, Dale notes it is "spotty" in some locations. In fact, the corn crop occupies only 15 of his 130 acres. The remainder is vacant fields and maple bush.

Dale was an elementary school teacher for 35 years. He retired a number of years ago and up to this year did a little supply work in area schools. He likes to say that farming provided the "therapy" he needed after a day in the classroom. He recalls

being interviewed by Principal Doug Hodgson for the job in what was then the Haliburton County School Board. His first question after landing the position was whether there was any good farmland for sale in the county. Before then, he had never been to Haliburton. Farming obviously runs in his blood. He has traced his family history back to Ireland, noting when the McConnells arrived in Canada in 1837 and immediately took to the land. It was on a visit to Ireland that he toured the Dunloe Gap in County Kerry and thought that would be an ideal name for his farm. For the most part, Dale farms without the aid of machinery. His one big piece of machinery is a tractor. In the spring, using a locally made implement, he scratches out the rows in the soil where the corn will be planted. Then, with a pail of corn seed slung around his neck he follows those trails dropping three seeds every three feet and kicking the dirt over on top of the kernels. He has calculated that to plant his 15 acres he walks about 30 miles to complete the task. Sometime later he retraces his steps to hand spread fertilizer over the fields.

He plants 15 different varieties of corn, all with varying maturation days. These include two acres of yellow corn, the same of white and the remaining 11 in peaches and cream varieties. It takes about 75 days and the right combination of weather before the corn is ready to pick and sell. That is if he can deter the deer, who love

the young seedlings, and the crows and raccoons who go after the cobs once they have formed on the stalks. If all goes according to plan and there isn't too much loss during the

75 day growing period, and the weather co-operates, his effort should yield 36,000 ears of corn, which he picks by hand, of course, and bags and brings into Haliburton Village to sell.

While we were chatting under his tent last week, there was a steady stream of customers, many of whom know him by name, stopping by to purchase a bag of corn. Many were obviously regulars who had a story to tell or wanted to catch up on local goings-on. Dale sells by the cob, but most people were buying six or a dozen at a time and would often discover later what he meant when he said he gave them a "Guilford dozen" a couple of extra cobs in the bag. One thing they all knew and appreciated, the corn was as fresh as it could be, hand-picked that morning and it was grown just 15 kilometres north of where they were standing.

Dale thinks he'll be growing corn until he is into his 90's, a reflection of his love for the land and farming. For those of us who enjoy fresh picked, locally grown corn on the cob with a little chat on the side, that is indeed good news.

Rainfall brings relief to lake levels

The Trent Severn Waterway (TSW) is expected to release a revised water level forecast for the entire Trent watershed later this week after heavy rainfall provided relief for most of the reservoirs in Haliburton, says the latest report from the Coalition of Equitable Water Flow

The TSW's Aug. 22 water level forecast for Haliburton County, which predicted drawdowns of up to 30 cm, is no longer valid after Tuesday's steady rainfall.

Reservoir water is not needed on the Kawartha Lakes, says the CEWF, and flows in the reservoirs are being adjusted back to minimum levels.

Once it becomes available, the updated forecast will be posted on Parks Canada's

The CEWF, formed by cottagers and

lake associations in 2006, seeks "The implementation of an equitable water management policy for the TSW that accords equal consideration, along with fair and just treatment, to everyone in the entire Trent River Watershed," according to its website. (Alex Coop)

Dorset upgrades could cost up to \$4.7M

Dorset could get waterfront improvements of up to \$4.7 million if the most costly elements of a new plan are implemented.

Delegates from the Township of Lake of Bays (LoB) presented Algonquin Highlands council with the new Dorset Waterfront Plan & Downtown Study on Aug. 11.

The study was created by private consultants, the Lake of Bays Marine Museum & Navigation Society and the Dorset Community Partnership, with input from AH.


Dorset sits between AH and LoB, and the two townships have a shared services agreement encompassing several properties. The federal funding partner for the project is FedNor.

The result is a long-term vision for the waterfront and downtown to stimulate tourism, economic development and job creation. Cost estimates range from \$1 million to \$4.7 million, but there is no financial burden on anyone now.

The consultants did community surveys, stakeholder interviews and public workshops in February and March, and set up an information booth at Snowball Winter Carnival. Sixty per cent seasonal, 30 per cent permanent and 10 per cent visitors responded. Twelve per cent were in business and workshops saw a lot of permanents.

The consultants reviewed existing plans and studies, including the AH municipal cultural plan.

Prioritizing improvements to the former Clayton building at 1090 Main St. came out of the consultations. However, the consultants noted the structural and

cosmetic improvements, as well as septic and parking work, would likely be too expensive for an investor. This would leave full replacement of the building as the most financially feasible solution.

The consultants broke the options down as follows:

• Modest (\$1 million): extending the Marine Museum dock for additional public use, creating a protected space for the SS Bigwin ferry and building a bridge underpass at the Narrows. The Clayton building would be modified, and a natural path formalized between the Dorset Pavilion and the eastern trail to the Dorset Lookout Tower.

• Transitional (\$3 million): builds on the modest approach, including an extended all-season covered structure for the Bigwin, modifying the former Clayton structure (keeping the heritage front façade), and an underpass to the Dorset Parkette beneath Highway 35.

• Transformative (\$4.7 million): also builds on the modest approach, including more docking in three areas and an additional underpass south of the Narrows. The Clayton building would be replaced, an electric vehicle charging station installed, and a paved surface and shade canopy created for the existing ice rink to enable all-season use.

The consultants advised that the cost estimates are preliminary and require more focused studies and detailed design. They added each land use concept will affect the various partners in regard to legal and insurance liability. Certain developments, such as the former Clayton property, would require flexibility in areas such as zoning requirements. The report also addressed potential roles and responsibilities for the partners.

AH reeve Carol Moffatt called the study a "great project" and added "there's a ton of opportunity" for anyone who wants to pursue aspects of it. She said AH may be able to source funding and LoB should keep them in the loop.



Drones rising in popularity in the Highlands

Drones are pretty cool, but for some people they are more than just a toy; they are an essential part of their tool kit.

Several local filmmakers and even real estate agents are utilizing these flying quadcopters to capture never-beforeseen photos and video to enhance their productions.

"It's a tool for realtors that are starting to see more and more of it," said Andrew Hodgson, broker of record of Century 21 Granite Realty Group Ltd.

Since the operation of drones, also known as unmanned aerial systems, is governed by Transport Canada, the Aeronautics Act and Canadian Aviation Regulations, Hodgson has hired a local video producer with experience flying drones to do the work for him

"Then my clients don't have to worry about any issues," said Hodgson, who turned to drones to showcase his properties just this year.

Quite often, he sees photos taken by drones that don't present a property in the best light. This is another reason to hire a professional, he said.

"I found it [to be] a useful tool. I don't think it works for every property—or helps every property. But if done properly, it's another tool in our tool box."

Hodgson isn't aware of any accidents or mishaps with drones in Haliburton County, but there has been some reckless use reported in the media. For example, close calls have happened with drones and emergency helicopters, such as police and medical transport.

According to Transport Canada, failure to follow the rules in the Canadian Aviation Regulations can result in up to \$25,000 in fines and/or jail time.

"Transport Canada is developing new regulations that will address the safety requirements, growing popularity and economic importance of UAVs and

integrate them safely into Canadian airspace," states the website.

If a drone weighs more than 35 kg (77 lbs), the operator must obtain a Special Flight Operations Certificate that details how and where it can be used.

The OPP currently owns and operates seven drones for investigations involving traffic and crime scenes in a "timely, costefficient manner."

The organization is mandated to abide by the country's laws and ensure it is following the Government of Ontario's Freedom of Information and Protection of Personal Privacy Act (FIPPA) and related policies in all of its operations.

Pasi Posti, owner of local business

Positive Media, has been using drones for two years. They have become an integral part of his video productions.

"We're late adopters," said Posti, who first hired drone operators before purchasing his own.

"We used to hire out drone operators when the prices were so much higher for them. ... there were very few professional grade, affordable drones to begin with."

He currently owns two drones that shoot 4K video and are made by DJI, a Chinese manufacturer.

A quick search on Best Buy shows drones ranging in price from \$80 up to \$2,000.

Posti says he has had extensive experience watching professional pilots operate drones.

This was invaluable when it came to learning how to operate the device safely and artistically.

He spent countless hours flying drones in open areas before providing the service to clients

"It makes no sense to fly them in built-up areas unless you know exactly what you're doing," he said.

In his words, drones are like a limitless selfie stick. He is able to live stream and record images right to his smart phone.

"It's really changed the game for sure."

Fire chief thanks residents for compliance

County-wide fire ban lifted

The first county-wide fire ban since 2012 was lifted yesterday morning, and although Haliburton County's fire coordinator, Bill Wingrove, received complaints about people not obeying the ban since it started Aug. 10, many residents took it very seriously.

"People are great that way," he said, pointing to a story he heard about a man who boated around Miskwabi

Lake while the fire ban was in effect, asking people to put out their fires.

"This year, we actually took more complaints for not doing the fire ban sooner," Wingrove said.

But the wait was appropriate, he added, since many green lawns still dotted the landscape, and unlike neighbouring communities, Haliburton County doesn't have to worry about farmland, which poses a huge fire threat in dry conditions.

The deciding factor for the fire ban announcement Aug. 10, however, was the ferocious wildfire outbreak in Algonquin Park, which as of Monday, was being held at 48 hectares by firefighters from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, according to the Northeast Aviation, Forest Fire and Emergency Services (AFFES).

The Municipality of Highlands East sits right below the park, and can be accessed by Elephant Lake Road.

Wingrove said if the wildfire had worsened, his department may have been asked to control the fire at the park perimeters.

"Organizing a fire ban is a lot of work," Wingrove said.

The recent rainfall has made controlling the Algonquin Park fire much easier, Tuesday's update from the AFFES said.

The wildfires of Fort McMurray are still fresh in people's minds, and it has contributed to the heightened sense of awareness around fire safety during dry weather.

"It opened their eyes about how quickly a forest fire can move," he said.

Rain and cooler temperatures appreciated by outdoor workers

It was a tough go for construction workers last week, as they endured temperatures of up to 35 degrees, with little to no cloud cover.

"We are fortunate here in the Highlands that a lot of our customers are located on a lake or a public beach is nearby," said Frank Packard of Algonquin Roofing Inc, who said work crews have had to quit by noon six times this summer. "Sometimes a lunch time swim is all that's needed to cool down."

But there is more to beating the heat than taking a dip in the cold water, Packard said, adding his workers pushed to arrive at job sites by around 6:30 a.m., allowing them to work through a cooler morning and wrap things up by the early afternoon when the sun was at its peak.

Some of his workers also got a little creative.

"A couple of the guys like to wear headbands that can be put in the freezer to help keep them cool and the sweat out of their eyes," he explained.

This summer has been much hotter and drier, says Irene Merritt of Rodco Construction Ltd.

In fact, one of their workers has had to take multiple days off recently because of the extreme heat.

"We don't want any of our guys to suffer from heat exhaustion," she said. "We provide our workers with cold water, encourage them to take more breaks and to wear sunscreen."

Safety meetings are held every week to emphasize the importance of managing heat stress, Merritt explained.

Hospitals have also been feeling the heat.

"We have seen an increase in emergency room visits for heatrelated issues over the past few weeks," said Carolyn Plummer, Chief Executive Officer at Haliburton Highlands Health Services.

"But the heat hasn't affected our long term care homes or our inpatient unit." (*Alex Coop*)

Bateman gives pro-British talk to fans

It was likely the most well-attended Art Talk that the Haliburton School of Art + Design has ever hosted.

And that shouldn't come as a surprise since the featured speaker was one of the country's most well-respected and beloved artists.

Robert Bateman, a former high school teacher who became known for his realistic nature paintings, just scratched the surface when it came to his masterpieces and instead focused most

of his presentation on England.

"In the beginning I'm going to get quite politically incorrect and be very pro-British ..." he warned those who packed the college's Great Hall on Aug. 10. "If you're politically correct, you may get up and leave if you want."

The 86-year-old artist and his wife, Birgit, live in Salt Spring Island, B.C., but they cottage in the Highlands on Buckslide River. He was born on May 24—the same day as Queen Victoria, but more than 100 years after her. Although Bateman was born in Toronto, he describes

himself as "an Anglophile at heart" and a monarchist. Bateman also did some bragging, sharing some of the rare experiences he has had during his career.

He recounted the time the governor general asked him to produce a painting to give to Prince Charles when he

married the late Princess Diana.

"I didn't know what to do," he said. "I didn't know how big to make it."

Bateman contacted
Sir Peter Scott, the
prince's patron, to
find out what size
he should make
the painting. Scott
contacted the couple's
butler, who took
measurements in the
couple's home and
prepared a report.

"Mr. Peter came back to us and said you can make it any height you like, but don't make it any wider than 11

inches," he recalled, generating laughs from the audience. He didn't listen and created a much larger painting of two loons set in Killarney Park.

Bateman waited in line for three hours in Kensington Palace to get a glimpse of his work along with the many extravagant gifts that came from all over the world.

In more recent years, he made a painting for Prince William (Charles's son) and his wife, The Duchess of Cambridge. He wanted to deliver the artwork in person, but had to wait a few years before being able to hand it over to the Royal couple's assistant.

After his talk, Bateman signed copies of his memoir "Life Sketches."

He taught a three-day workshop at the college titled "Passions and Practices." Thirty-six people were enrolled in the course.

Ticket prize a 'jaw dropper' for cottage artist

Cottager Karen Stoskopf Harding won tickets at the Arts and Crafts Festival to the three-day Robert Bateman workshop at the Haliburton School of Art & Design. While not a painter, Harding works with sculpture and acts as the archivist for the Sculptors Society of Canada. "It was a real jaw dropper," said Harding of winning the prize and her experience at the workshop. "I gained every bit as much knowledge and inspiration as the participants who were painters," she said. Harding praised the Rails End Gallery and thanked them for making the opportunity available to her. "It's pretty awesome," Harding - who was given a unique opportunity that she won't forget – said. "Bateman was very open and uplifting." (Justin van Lieshout)

Put mouthguards on your hockey season list

It's an image we've all seen on TV; professional hockey players chewing on their mouthguards while on the bench or in between play. It would seem the professionals can afford to chew them up.

That isn't the case for most Haliburton County hockey players, however, who would like to see them last.

With the shinny season quickly approaching, hockey players of all ages are making trips to area dentists to make sure that they can check mouthguards off of their pre-season shopping list.

"We get a lot of people coming in this time of year," confirmed local dentist, Dr. Ed Smolen, who runs a family dentistry practice out of 235 Highland St. in downtown Haliburton.

It's not just kids and adults getting ready for hockey try-outs, either, he said, but also high school football players getting ready for another fall of gridiron action.

"There is a definite increase."

And why not, says the dentist, since mouthguards are a very cost effective way of preventing potentially painful injury or loss of not just teeth but the bone around them as well.

Dr. Smolen said he did not have a lot of hockey players coming in requiring emergency work due to mouth injuries. He noted that is because mouthguards are mandatory for children and adult players are becoming smarter and getting equipped with the plastic protectors as well. His practice promotes their use.

He thinks they should be mandatory for all ages and most sports, not just hockey, but also basketball, rugby, soccer, any sport where there is contact or the prospect of getting hit with a stick, ball or errant elbow.

He was taught to make mouthguards in dental school and made his first-ever device for himself. He has gone on to make and fit mouthguards for about 24 years and everyone in his practice knows how to too.

Basically, a mould is taken of the teeth and supporting bone to make a plastic mouthguard. The trick is to try to have it extend as far up as the patient will tolerate. Trimming is sometimes involved for different comfort levels.

He has two machines in his office and can make standard or higher end mouthguards. A higher end model could have dual layer thickness, for example. For boxers, he makes multiple layers.

He can have them turned around in a couple of days.

He said their longevity is based on people's habits. He mentioned the guardchewing hockey players but people also have to clean their mouthguards, including brushing them and using a solution.

Adults are easier to fit he said as childen's teeth change. "You have to predict where the teeth are going to be." As such, children's mouthguards often don't last as long as adult ones.

Dr. Smolen estimates he fits hundreds of people every year for mouthgurads. He intentionally keeps the price down (they range from about \$45 to \$150) as he wants people to have them made and to use them. The alternative, after all, isn't pretty.

"If you lose a tooth or teeth, you may also fracture the supporting bone around it, or them which can be painful and lead to expensive tooth replacement."

Head Lake powers up this weekend for boat races

If high-speed boat racing is your thing, then look no further than Head Lake this weekend as the Toronto Outboard Racing Club (TORC) comes to town.

The event was staged last year, for the first time since the 1960's, and obviously went well as it is back again for 2016.

"It went really good. The town was great and the venue was good," TORC president Rob Dixon told The Highlander.

Organizers are expecting up to 100 boats and in the neighbourhood of 300 people for the powerboat races.

There isn't much broken, so they aren't about to fix the sport's offerings this weekend.

"It's pretty much the standard. It's one of those things. It is what it is. We could try to make the event bigger but you end up getting into a time issue."

Dixon said they want to limit the on-water component to about five to five-and-a-half hours per day, both Saturday and Sunday. It used to be about a seven to eight hour program which was too long according to Dixon. He said the new schedule is achievable as long as they don't have too many "wipe outs and tangle ups."

What is new and different is a 'powder puff' class this year. "We haven't done that for about 40 years," Dixon said. Not a full-blown race, it is being classed as an exhibition. Dixon explained that a few of the wives, girlfriends, and sisters of competitors, who may not have raced before, get to drive their significant other or sibling's boats. As of last Friday, there were seven women registered to race in the heat. Some have raced before, Dixon said.

Overall, there is no doubt the races provide a boost to the local economy.

"I would assume it makes a good impact," said Dixon. He noted there are 100 boats, and possibly 300 people with families "and they all have to eat and they all have to drink, they need gas, accommodation. It benefits the town as well as us."

This is the fourth Canadian race in the season series.

Fralick out for Haliburton event

Beauty by the water and unique experiences

Lakefront lodges offered freedom and comfort for 100 years

Total freedom.

That is what guests visiting one of Haliburton's shoreline lodges more than 50 years ago were promised upon arrival.

That, and a plate full of food for \$3, says
Tim Hagarty of the Highland Boat Tours,
as he guides eight residents down Lake
Kashagawigamog where a number of old
lodges and resorts

activities

His eyes light up as memories of all the teenage hijinks come rushing back.

Hagarty loses count of how many times he and his friends paddled down to the Golden Slipper, a small dance hall not far from Birch Point, to dance the night away.

"It was quite the thing to do at the time and I was lucky to be here as a kid to enjoy it," Hagarty said during a brief stop at the Bonnie View Inn, which was

the halfway point of the tour that started at the town docks in Haliburton.

Members of the once-thriving lodging community in Haliburton were "pioneers of tourism," Hagarty adds, and they placed a heavy emphasis on the thick green trees and crystal clear waters that surrounded them.

It began with Robert and Anne Gould renting their home out to paying summer guests in

1903. Business quickly flourished, so they decided to name their lodge the Wigamog Inn, an abbreviation of the lake's lengthy name.

The couple also purchased Birch Point and

Bonnie View lodges nearly 20 years later.

The escapism in Haliburton was in heavy demand, and it took no time for others to purchase property along Lake Kashagawigamog and tout the scenic vistas surrounding it.

"It blew up in the 1920s and carried itself on and off until about the 70s," Hagarty said

The recent two-hour tour aboard the Lady of the Lake provided Hagarty an opportunity to point out nearly 20 old shoreline hotels while the boat's captain, Paul Dillon, gently guided the launch down the lake.

Many lodges are closed, repurposed or fell victim to fire, but Hagarty says the ones left standing represent an era that few can fully understand.

"It was such a relaxed lifestyle, but it was so exciting looking forward to the new people you knew you were going to meet that summer and catching up with friends

you met the year before," he said.

The Bonnie View Inn, ran by his niece, Andrea, offers guests a brief glimpse into that past, complete with outdoor activities, big meals and plenty of music.

"It wasn't fancy but it felt like home," Hagarty said, while pointing to an old slip of paper that echoed his thoughts.

"Although there is golf, tennis, shuffleboard and horseshoes, we have no organized activities," says the front of an old pamphlet for the now-demolished Birch Point Lodge.

"Your time is yours to do with as you please."

The small piece of paper is accompanied by dozens of other photos and clippings relating to the township's old lodging community. A thick binder keeps all of it neatly organized.

A similar document for the old Royal Kushog Hotel, dating back to the 1920s, advertised weekly rates that started at \$12, and a Canadian National Railway train that shuttled guests to Toronto and back each weekend.

Weekly rates climbed steadily as the decades went by, museum records show, but the message was consistent.

"There is a delightful, informal club-like atmosphere and you can have as much or as little activity as you wish," says a pamphlet for the Chateau Woodland Lodge from 1961

Although it closed in 1996, Dillon thinks the Chateau would make for an excellent jazz concert venue.

"Some of the larger lodges can hold up to 250 people," he said.

Shuttle boats often took people to golf courses, dance halls, and to Haliburton itself. It was normal for guests at a resort to enter a float for a parade, or visit Haliburton as a group.

"A lot of cottagers now come up here, hang out at the cottage, and that's it," Hagarty said. "I've talked to a lot of cottagers who have no idea what's going on in town, and I tell them, we have all kinds of concerts and activities throughout the summer."

Although seasonal residents often visit Haliburton, Hagarty says he thinks a gap exists between the cottagers who now come every summer and the municipality.

"Lodges helped people integrate themselves into the community," he said. "They were much more involved, and not because they had to be, but because they wanted to be."

It was a unique tourism experience, says Kate Butler, Haliburton Highlands Museum director, and highlighting on it through the Lost Haliburton Boat Tours has been a big hit with residents.

"It's taken off beyond our wildest dreams," Butler said, adding even when the museum decided to introduce a \$20 fee to help cover the cost of the boat, people were still lining up to register.


The museum is always seeking historical items, and no one has to part ways with their treasured photos, tickets or diaries because the museum can scan them.





Low water levels worry Grace Lake residents

Despite being graced with glorious summer weather during the August long weekend, members of the Grace Lake Association (GLA) opted to spend some time indoors to attend their annual general meeting. The event was held in Wilberforce at the Lloyd Watson Centre.

Grace Lake is located north of Wilberforce off the 648 "Loop" highway. It is formed by the Irondale River flowing in from the north and out through the Grace River and Dark Lake to the south, ultimately into the Trent-Severn Waterway.

At the AGM, the board of directors reported results of the association's ongoing participation in several programs aimed at protecting the lake's water quality and charm, including the Invasive Species Watch Program and the Lake Partner Program. Results from both programs are monitored closely but currently show no warning signs. Additionally, during the meeting, membership approved participation in the

Loon Survey conducted by Birds Study Canada.

As a reservoir lake in the Trent system, Grace Lake suffers erosion from high water levels in the spring, and dock and boating restrictions from low water levels in the late summer. At the meeting the board announced the association had joined the Coalition for Equitable Water Flows in order to help focus on this issue.

Development is another area of concern. There are tracts of undeveloped land at the north end of the lake. A lake study prepared by the association in 2006 recommended that approval of future development should consider the fragility of Irondale River wetlands and the load placed on the lake by visiting boaters from downstream. Grace Lake is the boating destination for cottagers on the Grace River and Dark Lake, creating heavy boat traffic.

Garlic Festival relocates to Abbey Gardens

Haliburton County's annual Garlic Festival is on the move again, this time relocating to Abbey Gardens.

And organizers hope this is the start of a long-term partnership.

"We like a partnership with an organization and we've moved it several times now because of the challenges with location," said Ron Reid, coordinator for the Haliburton County Garlic Growers Association (HCGGA) and local garlic grower. "We hope this will be a more permanent and stable location."

The one-day festival takes place on Aug. 28 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

In its first six years, the event was held in Carnarvon at the intersection of Highways 118 and 35. It outgrew the high-traffic area and was moved to the grounds of the Stanhope Community Centre.

Last year's event drew around 1,200 visitors, said Reid. In recent years that number has fluctuated between 1,000 and

This is more than double the attendance in its first year when 500 people showed up.

The benefits of the new location include plenty of room for parking and space for

"They're [Abbey Gardens] focused on local products as well," he said.

There will be 25-30 vendors in attendance, six of whom will be selling a variety of fresh garlic in the parking lot around the Food Hub. Other products will include preserves, honey, baked goods and art, among others.

Reid estimates that 90-95 per cent of the vendors are from the county. Vendors must grow or produce their products and priority is given to local growers and producers.

Another highlight are the featured workshops and demonstrations, including two cooking demonstrations—one from Janine Papadopoulous and the other from Marilynne Lesperance of the Minden Community Food Centre.

"I think that's another advantage to being at Abbey Gardens—they have a commercial kitchen we can use to prep for the cooking demonstrations," he said, adding that the Food Hub will be open for breakfast and

Another significant change is that the event is happening on a Sunday instead of a Saturday, as in previous years. This decision was made because of the many other events and a few vendors will be selling their products at the Haliburton County Farmers' Market in Minden on the Saturday.

The Stanhope volunteer firefighters will be hosting a barbecue fundraiser throughout the day and other food vendors will be

Reid believes the event is successful because of its focus on local garlic and the growing appeal of the bulbous plant.

"I think garlic is becoming one of those products that is more prevalent in our cooking today. It seems to be a product that people really go for," he said.

Heather Reid, operations director for Abbey Gardens, is equally as excited about partnering with the HCGGA.

'Obviously we're thrilled that they're coming to Abbey Gardens," said Reid.

"I think it's a good fit because it's a community-driven festival and part of what we're working towards with the Abbey Gardens' site is to be inviting to those community groups."

She looks forward to "a long, prosperous future together."


