County raising racket over court move

Council requests reversal of decision to relocate hearings to Lindsay

For an entire year, effective July 1 until the same date in 2018, local residents will have to travel to Lindsay to deal with speeding tickets and other provincial offences.

The ministry's regional senior justice of the peace, Brian Norton, recently made the decision to move these matters from the courthouse in Minden because of a lack of manpower.

"There is a serious shortage of justices

of the peace in the Central East Region which is negatively impacting our operations," said Karen Dunn, manager of court operations for the City of Kawartha Lakes in a letter to county council. "This shortage is due mainly to the fact that the ministry [of the Attorney General] has not been replacing justices of the peace on a regular basis when they retire or are unable to work."

In the region, there should be 48 full-time presiding justices of the peace, said Dunn.

But there currently are 11 vacancies and three justices on long-term disability.

"In March alone there will be 80 court closures in our jurisdiction due to this shortage, and it is expected to get worse in the upcoming year," she said.

Matters dealt with at the Ontario or Superior Court of Justice will not be affected by the decision and will remain in Minden.

Dunn asked council to support a recommendation that the ministry "be

encouraged to provide, and in the future maintain, sufficient justice of the peace resources" for courts in the area.

Councillors expressed their frustration with the decision, one that was made without consulting them even though provincial offences revenue goes to the municipalities, according to CAO Mike Rutter.

"I'm constrained by the decorum of this chamber to limit myself to language that's appropriate," said County Warden Brent

OPP nab sledders for speeding on Rail Trail

Police caught several snowmobilers speeding on the Rail Trail last month.

Many tickets were handed out during the second weekend of February, said Craig Douglas, the county's director of public works. A total of 15 snowmobile-related charges were laid in February, according to OPP Const. Tim Negus. He did not provide a breakdown of those offences.

"Right now, I'm comfortable with the enforcement we're getting," Douglas told council recently. "I think as a snowmobiler or ATVer ... you have the knowledge that there might be OPP out there."

The speed limit on the trail is 50 km/h for snowmobiles and 30 km/hr for all-terrain vehicles.

From April 2 to May 1, the trail is only open to non-motorized users such as walkers and cyclists. The county's bylaw officer will frequent the trail to ensure people aren't breaking this rule.

"At this time, staff are not pursuing a more proactive, costly trail enforcement plan," said Douglas.

"In terms of enforcement, I think we're in better shape than we were years ago," said County Warden Brent Devolin, adding "signage and brushing will all help."

"I'm comfortable with the status quo." Motorized and non-motorized users share the trail between May 1 and Nov. 30.

Devolin. "This is wrong on a whole bunch of levels."

Devolin encouraged his fellow councillors to "raise as much racket about this as I intend to."

Although the decision has been made, he cited the example of the ServiceOntario centre in Minden, which the province was going to close but decided not to after the community rallied against it.

"The fact they can't replace individuals within their organization speaks to their competency," he added.

Councillor Murray Fearrey also criticized the ministry's aptitude.

"Once again we're at the bottom of the food chain," said Fearrey.

"Certainly council will be right behind you [Devolin] on this one—I think we all

Council discussed the potential negative impact to the local economy. For example, people who would go to the Minden courthouse and would shop in the area will

now spend their money elsewhere.

Those on a fixed income, with limited transportation options, might find it more challenging to travel to court.

And they are worried about the cost impact on policing services if officers have to drive an extra hour, or about 75 km, to Lindsay.

"I think we need to put a financial package together to show the implications," said Fearrey.

Council voted to send a letter outlining their concerns to the regional senior justice of the peace, as well as a letter to Ontario's Minister of Community Safety and Correctional Services requesting the county and its municipalities be reimbursed for any additional costs incurred.

MPP Laurie Scott and Premier Kathleen Wynne will be copied on the correspondence.

Devolin said he would seek a delegation at the Association of Municipalities of Ontario.

Man dies in ATV accident

He was able to brighten anyone's day, and was a close friend to many in the area.

But on March 19, while driving his ATV near Contau Lake Road in Gooderham, Michael Anthony Bunn, 41, of Haliburton County, died in an accident sometime before 8 a.m.

Haliburton Highlands OPP have not released the circumstances behind the accident, but media relations officer Tim Negus confirmed he was found by a passerby shortly before 8 a.m. and that no other vehicle or ATV operator was involved in the accident.

The local detachment and the OPP Technical Collision Unit were called to the area Sunday to investigate.

The cause of the accident is still under investigation.

"Mike was an awesome guy and will be missed by all who knew him," said Chris Coumbs, a friend of Bunn.

"He had a heart as big as Haliburton." Stuart Taylor of Gooderham, another close friend of Bunn, says Bunn loved the outdoors

"Fishing, road trips, pig roasts, we did it all," he said. "He was a real friendly

Taylor also knew Bunn's brother Kevin while working as the fire chief at the Gooderham fire department.

Michael's brother Kevin died in a

snowmobile accident 15 years ago. "It's another good guy taken away too early ... it's heartbreaking," he said.

Locally produced show to tee off on TSN

The small community of Lajitas, Texas, resonated so much with Haliburton's Wayde Greer, a self-admitted homebody that he began to envision himself retiring in the small border town.

This self-discovery took place while shooting Highways to Fairways, a passion project he shared with a few determined locals highlighting unique and affordable golf courses and the cultures surrounding it.

The show, whose target audience is the 90 per cent of golfers who can't break 90, took Greer, Charlie Teljeur and a small camera crew across 13 golf courses in North America.

It's been almost 10 years in the making, and on March 30, will debut on TSN.

Greer admits driving a working Sherman tank from the Second World War was a thrill, but Lajitas stood out the most.

"It was the first time in my life I was able to visualize where I could end up as an old man one day," Greer said, adding a breathtaking golf course, located a stone's throw from the town, crosses over to Mexico on hole 15.

It's these types of moments that have

stuck with Greer, Teljeur and the rest of the crew during the show's production, in addition to meeting the various "local legends" inhabiting these communities.

Viewers will discover who these legends are during the show, but Teljeur smiled and said he was able to try on a Super Bowl ring during one of these encounters.

While describing the long journey that began in 2008, Teljeur's excitement was palpable.

"There was a lot of personal growth on this journey," he said, while recalling the show's initial form as a straightforward golf show.

It lacked a clear identity early on, he said, pointing to the absence of storytelling and culture sampling. They had travelled to various golf courses across the country and their proof of concept series received some airtime on TVTropolis and Fox Sportsworld Canada in 2011.

But they also needed more resources. That gap was filled a few years later with the help of Digital Reno, a storytelling agency based out of Toronto with an office in Haliburton County, and Sticks and Stones Productions.

With their support and production chops, and help from the Haliburton County Development Corporation, they revitalized the show and pitched it to TSN.

The sports channel liked what it saw and gave them a primetime slot.

Digital Reno president James Roy said Teljeur and Greer are the show's biggest draw.

"They're unique, a couple of small

town guys who play off each other very well," he said. "The show always had this unique idea, and was specifically aimed at the bulk of golfers who don't do well and don't play to win. They play because they enjoy the social aspects of the game."

Greer echoed Roy's thoughts about the show, and pointed to recent drop-offs in TV ratings and golf equipment sales, attributing them to a lack of diverse voices representing the golf industry in mainstream media. According to the National Golf Foundation, there's been a 30 per cent decline in the number of golfers aged 18-34 over the last 20 years.

"We wanted to finally give a voice to people in the golf industry nobody wanted to talk to," he said.

Highways to Fairways will not only appeal to the average golfer, but can be enjoyed by anyone interested in different cultures.

"Along the way, we find out more about these local legends ... sample some of the local activities ... it all provides a very interesting backdrop to the game of golf," Roy said.

The crew had no intention of bringing the show back to life unless it got the attention of a broadcast company like TSN, Greer said.

"What this tells us, with a primetime spot, is that they liked the show," Greer said. "They're not going to put a show up that they don't think has potential."

A total of 14 people worked on the show, all of them from Haliburton.

"This idea is being presented to the world because of Haliburton," Teljeur said.

McKecks Tap and Grill will host a viewing party March 30 during the show's debut on TSN, which starts at 9:30 p.m.

Passion drives YWCA Terry Carr fundraising campaign

Community raises \$35,000 so far

Bonnie Roe hosted a YWCA HERS fundraiser while nursing an awful cold. Georgia Shank gave birth the day after her money-making event. And, volunteers turned up for a tag day on a bitterly cold March Saturday – all showing the kind of passion that has driven a community to so far raise \$35,754 for a local women's shelter and its services.

Coupled with a County of Haliburton pledge of \$25,000 over two years, that brings the total to more than \$60,000.

"And we're still going," Jen Cureton, director of philanthropy and communications for the YWCA Peterborough Haliburton, told *The* Highlander this week.

The fundraiser for the YWCA HERS (Haliburton Emergency Rural SafeSpace) continues until March 31.

Cureton said that since announcing Susan and Keith Hay's donation of \$10,000 in matching funds, two other matching fund donors came forward. An anonymous couple put up \$4,000 and an anonymous woman \$5,000 to put matching funds at \$19,000.

Cureton said that they had been "really pleasantly surprised by the outpouring of support." They've had new donors, people who hadn't given for a number of years come back, and people who always give, continue.

Initially, the organization said it needed a minimum of \$120,000 to continue operating the shelter and its programming. At the time, they had raised \$90,000 and had a \$30,000 shortfall.

However, Cureton emphasized this week that the \$120,000 was a bare minimum calculation. She said the actual costs are \$180,000 to \$200,000-a-year and what

has been raised to date will now allow the shelter to remain open – and offer its services – over a two-year period while it works on a plan towards long-term sustainability.

The shelter had to be closed for five months in 2015-2016 due to a lack of funds.

Cureton said they would like to see base increase funding from the province, but are not confident. In the meantime, they are using provincial government money to hire a consultant to map out future plans. Cureton emphasized they will never be 100 per cent funded by government so will always have to fundraise for some money. However, at the moment they have been trying to raise \$80,000 to \$100,000 and that is too much

While relieved at a two-year cushion, Cureton said this campaign isn't only about

"We're just inspired by the women who've been inspired to tell their stories, and the woman who might know about us now that didn't know about us before ... just the awareness built for our services and the issue in the county of violence against women."

She reiterated that money raised locally stays local.

As for the review, they've put out an RFP for a consultant and have been getting responses.

"We will be engaging in that work soon ... to help us frame how we build the business going forward."

As part of that process, Cureton said they would be reaching out to the community for its input.

In the meantime, she said, "We're so happy with the outpouring of support from so many people, and the passion that so many people have shown."



Jillian Hawley sits in House of Commons

Jillian Hawley's journey with the Daughters of the Vote program continued recently, this time with a week-long program in Ottawa.

In addition to a surprise breakfast with Canada's first female Prime Minister Kim Campbell, Hawley pointed to the main event on International Women's Day March 8 as the highlight of the week.

Hawley was one of 338 young women between the ages of 18 and 23 — one from each of the federal ridings — in Ottawa that day participating in the Daughters of the Vote, a program created by Equal Voice to promote the participation of women in politics and government.

"It was the epitome of why we were there," Hawley said. "Some of the speeches really brought me to tears." She pointed to delegate Lianna Rice's impassioned speech about the frequency of suicides on reserves. Rice talked about her brother's suicide and her own attempt to end her life.

Rice is an Inuk woman from Labrador and was one of 70 Indigenous women in

Hawley said more than a dozen delegates made speeches, and each one was met with a standing ovation.

"It was pretty funny, even the Speaker of the House commented and said the MPs could learn a thing or two from this," she



Province drops ball on hiring JPs

On one day a month, for as long as we can remember, there's been a Minden court.

That's where people charged with provincial offences come before a Justice of

Examples of some of the things this court deals with are Highway Traffic Act charges, such as speeding or traffic violations; municipal bylaw charges relating to excessive noise, animal control, or garbage disposal; and charges laid under provincial legislation such as the Environmental Protection Act, the Occupational Health and Safety Act, the Dog Owners' Liability Act or the Trespass to Property Act.

For those in the community who have gotten themselves in hot water, it is a place in the county where they can have their matters dealt with without leaving the area.

For Minden, court day can also be a boon to the local economy as people making appearances often spend a bit of money, whether it's grabbing a bite to eat or doing some shopping.

So, a report tabled at County Council yesterday is worrying on many fronts.

Karen Dunn, who's manager of court operations for the City of Kawartha Lakes, sent council a letter informing them that due to a lack of judicial resources, the Minden Provincial Offences Court is being transferred to Lindsay from July 1, 2017 to July 1, 2018.

In her backgrounder, Dunn lavs the blame

on the province, saying the shortage is due mainly to the fact that the Ministry of the Attorney General has not been replacing Justices of the Peace on a regular basis when they retire or are unable to work.

In Central East, which covers Barrie, Bracebridge, Cobourg, Lindsay, Newmarket, Orillia, Oshawa and Peterborough, they should have 48. But, they have 11 vacancies and three off on long-term disability.


So, the province has dropped the ball... again. One can only surmise it has been trying to save money by deferring hiring. Full-time presiding Justices of the Peace are paid \$131,123 a year, complete with comprehensive pension and insured benefits package including vacation of 22 working davs.

Dunn said the ministry is currently in the process of hiring more JPs and hoping to have new appointments assigned by the end of May. Once these appointments are made, it will take a year or more to fully train incumbents.

Just out of curiously, we jumped on the ministry website and there are no current advertisements for Justice of the Peace

However, Dunn said the Regional Senior Justice of the Peace, Brian Norton, says that on July 1, 2018 there should be a full complement of trained JPs in the Central East Region.

We hope that things go back to normal then but are always fearful that when the province removes a service it will never return.

Having to travel to Lindsay will be a real hardship for many.

We've attended court docket days. It's a bit of a cattle call atmosphere. Everybody shows up at 9.30 or 10 a.m. for their matter and sometimes wait hours for the call.

Not only here, but across the region, the lack of judicial resources is also causing court closures. Dunn said this month alone, there will be 80 court closures in our jurisdiction due to the shortage of JPs. It is expected to get worse.

Court closures mean matters get adjourned and an already slow judicial process slows to a crawl.

It means more trips to Lindsay for people before the courts.

The County of Haliburton isn't happy. It wants the decision to be reversed and any additional costs to the municipality reimbursed.

We're also not happy. What is the province doing? It is things like this that again fuel the argument we don't need a provincial level of government at all.

Remembering Stephen Patrick

There is often an odd relationship between a publisher and a managing editor. While they both work for the same company and presumably share the values that will see the newspaper succeed, often those visions are not always running on parallel tracks. The publisher must always have an eye on the financial bottom line while encouraging the editor to attract circulation by presenting stories that would appeal to readers and writing editorials that will both inspire and challenge.

When I was brought on as the publisher of The County Voice in 2010, managing editor Stephen Patrick was already in place. Stephen and I knew each other long before that moment, as editor of The County Voice and previous publications and as the owner of a bookstore on Haliburton's main street. So, our relationship from day one was collegial and friendly and, through previous discussions, we knew that we shared many of the same values. When The County *Voice* closed, we continued to be in touch until he moved away from the community

Stephen died March 13, 2017 in Toronto. During his time in Haliburton, I came to

know him as being keenly interested in the arts, the owner of a book store, Patrick Books, of course, a sports and outdoors enthusiast and just an all round pleasant person. We shared an understanding of the news business, although his experience was much broader, having worked with the BBC, TVO and CBC TV in producing current affairs programming. While our publications were rivals, we always had time for each other and I always appreciated his insight into the local, provincial and national political scene. He was one reporter who always knew someone "he could call" to get the real scoop on what was going on.

Journalism ran through his blood and he never missed an opportunity to talk to people. He made time for individuals from a cross-section of the community. As his wife Holly Hutchison remarked earlier this week, "He knew there was a story in everyone," and he enjoyed finding that story and bringing it to light.

While it was a family cottage connection going back to 1947 that brought him here, once he had decided to make the Highlands his home, he chose a spot in the middle

of the woods to live, off-grid, close to the nature he loved. The trek from the house provided an opportunity for this avid birder to connect with his avian friends. Stephen and his wife

were big supporters of the local arts scene. Stephen served on the board of directors of the Rails End Gallery.

He took great pride in the fact that he was on the board when curator Laurie Jones was hired. While many people were involved as well, it was during this period that the arts achieved a much higher profile in our community.

However, it was as editor of *The County* Voice and the early days of The Highlander that he will be remembered.

He used his position to challenge the status quo and support those members of the community who needed support ... exactly what one expected of a community newspaper editor.



Go purple to raise awareness for epilepsy

Geri Woudstra wants to paint the Highlands purple on March 26.

From T-shirts and ribbons to fingernails, hair and cupcakes, she's hoping individuals, businesses and schools will embrace Purple Day and help spread awareness about epilepsy.

In 2010, Woudstra's daughter, Katie, had a sudden, out-of-the-blue, seizure. That was the beginning of a journey her family wishes they never had to take. Since then, the Woudstras have met many other families travelling a similar road. This was due in part to the launch of Katie's Run for Epilepsy in 2012.

This event has raised more than \$100,000 in five years and has brought together many families from across the country, all sharing the same hope that one day they will uncover the brilliance that will end epilepsy forever. Woudstra spoke at a recent Rotary Club meeting, where Rotarians learned that March is Epilepsy Awareness Month and March 26 is Purple Day. Many business owners jumped on-board, eager to help spread the word and share what they had just learned, that epilepsy can strike anyone, anywhere, at any age.

One in 100 Canadians has epilepsy, and that means there could be as many as 200 in our community alone.

"Surprising, isn't it? Until you learn that many suffer in silence because they're afraid what people might think or that they could lose their job," Woudstra said.

Purple Day was started in 2008 by a young Nova Scotia girl who was motivated by her own struggles with epilepsy. Her

goal is to get people around the world talking about epilepsy, dispelling the myths and informing those with seizures that they are not alone.

"We are asking everyone to wear something purple, sport a purple ribbon, decorate your place of business, and collect donations for epilepsy research," said Woudstra. "We will have ribbons, balloons and literature to assist with hosting your Purple Day."

There's also a photo contest. Put your purple on and post a photo on the Katie's Run Facebook page for a chance to win a free entry to Katie's Run on June 24 or a \$50 Ultimate Dining Card. Woudstra said anti-seizure medications are the first

However, about one in three people have drug-resistant epilepsy, and medication comes with side effects. Other treatments include surgery, diet and brain stimulation. Research continues for new and better ways to treat epilepsy. She said that in 2017, all donations received through local Purple Day initiatives and Katie's Run will go to EpLink, the Epilepsy Research Program of the Ontario Brain Institute. Highlands East extends recycling contract

Highlands East has extended its recycling haulage contract for another year with Progressive Waste Solutions in Bracebridge.



Spring is back and so are the snakes

With the first day of spring in the rear view mirror, reptile expert and founder of Scales Nature Park Jeff Hathaway is reminding everyone to keep an eye out for reptiles roaming the Highlands.

The message was reiterated during the Reptile Road Show at the Fish Hatchery in Haliburton March 18, where Hathaway and his crew showed off several snakes and turtles. It was hosted by the Haliburton Highlands Land Trust.

The sold-out event was attended by dozens of children and adults.

There are more than eight species of snakes in rural areas like Haliburton County, some of which are threatened, like the hognose snake.

Reasons for becoming a threatened species can vary, but for the hognose snake, there are two main reasons, says Hathaway.

"One is direct persecution, people killing them, and the other big one is road mortality, being run over by a car," he

Habitat loss is a big problem for other reptiles.

The five-lined skink, a smooth, slender lizard is a species of special concern in most of Ontario, meaning they live in the wild and are not endangered or threatened, but may become threatened or endangered due to a combination of biological characteristics and identified threats.

According to the Committee on the Status of Species at Risk, an independent committee of experts who determine which plants and animals should be listed as at risk, more than 200 species of plants and animals are at risk of disappearing from

Hathaway also gave guests pointers about how to pick up a snapping turtle if one is found on the road.

"Don't put them back where they came

from ... pick them up and put them on the other side of the road in the direction they were heading," he explained, while carefully holding a small snapping turtle.

Monika Melichar, president of the Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary in Minden, says the sanctuary gets a lot of turtles, especially in the spring.

Oftentimes, people bring in turtles with damaged shells.

"We do our best to care for them, but if they require more extensive care we'll send them to the Kawartha Turtle Trauma Centre in Peterborough," she



Those who knew Stephen Patrick, remember a highly intelligent man with many interests.

They also recall someone who cared deeply about the Haliburton Highlands and

On March 13, Stephen passed away at home in Toronto after a lengthy battle with Idiopathic Pulmonary Fibrosis, a lung disease, at the age of 72. He was surrounded by friends and family.

Prior to leaving Haliburton in 2013, Stephen was very much involved in the community. He was the first managing editor of this very paper, and before that, led the editorial team at the now defunct *County Voice* newspaper.

During those years, he was supportive of

the local arts scene, serving on the board of the Rails End Gallery & Arts Centre.

"He was always a great sounding board for me," said Laurie Jones, the gallery's executive director.

"He had a very keen intellect and an understanding of people."

Stephen always saw great value in the gallery and the programs it offers. A sugar maple on the property will be dedicated in his memory and they are accepting donations

she said. Donations can also be made to Cabbagetown Community Arts Centre, which is where his daughter, Sarah, is the executive director.

"I think it was a wonderful gesture to

earmark the contributions toward artistic programming," said Jones.

Andrew Hodgson, a local resident who first met Stephen 33 years ago, very much valued their friendship.

"We had a great time," said Hodgson, adding the two had many in-depth conversations about current affairs and political issues. They had different viewpoints, but that made it interesting.

"He had a real breadth of

interest. What I really enjoyed about him was that he'd listen and he'd give his opinion, but he was never arrogant."

Hodgson touched on Stephen's many accomplishments in the journalism industry and other ventures. His lengthy resume includes positions with CBC, BBC and TVO.

In addition to being a writer, journalist and television producer, he was a businessman. In 1989, he and his wife, Holly, opened Patrick Books. They ran the business for three years.

Stephen was a "wonderful conversationalist, interested in everything and everyone," states his memorial card. And Hodgson adds, "He had a real

HHSS student rises in sea cadet ranks

Sonora Plumb says cadet program a place of growth and acceptance

Sonora Plumb, 18, has piloted a steel-hulled patrol vessel, contained a rapidly-flooding room with her peers from the Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps Viking in Bancroft and travelled the country free of charge.

And, that's just scratching the surface. Adding to her long list of certifications and accomplishments, the Haliburton Highlands Secondary School (HHSS) student was recently promoted to chief petty officer (first class).

It's the highest rank a cadet can achieve in the organization, but not one Plumb imagined she'd get when she first joined in 2011.

"My mom was telling me, 'I know you aren't liking it right now, but just stay in it for one year and go to the cadet summer training,'" Plumb told *The Highlander* about her first few months. "After that summer training I wanted to stay because it was so much fun."

Her commanding officer, Lt-N Stephane Richer, recalled Plumb's skills on the shooting range.

"She was a good shot right off the bat," he said.

The sea cadets can lead to many unexpected careers, Richer said, including engineering, becoming a captain of a cruise ship, and even athletics.

In addition to cross-country, and occasional border-crossing travels,

organized through the sea cadet program and Cadet Summer Training Centres (CSTC's), Plumb looks in the mirror every day and sees a confident young woman reaching her maximum potential.

"I've learned to be very independent while forming a sense

of camaraderie with peers," she said. "You get so much out of it [cadet program] for nothing."

There are no fees attached to the program.

Plumb said that kind of personal growth wasn't something she could obtain from school.

"In school, you do what you're told ... do the assignments and go home. You don't really learn how to think for yourself and

make important decisions. In cadets, you're treated like an adult."

The cadets, which are often misinterpreted as a military recruitment program, is a youth program that develops citizenship, leadership, athletic fitness and an interest in the various elements of the Canadian Armed Forces, Plumb explained.

Although following commands is an

integral part, there's room to ask questions and dig further into tasks.

"There is a balance of trust," Plumb said. Her social skills are better and she's made genuine connections, she added. The cadets are for 12 to 18-year olds.

Those types of connections are almost impossible to form in high school, said Plumb's mother Gillian, who is a sub-lieutenant within the corps.

"It's like having a built-in family ... you're thrown in with complete strangers but once you're there you have common goals and you're in it together, supporting each other," she said.

"You don't have an adult constantly telling them what to do ... Sonora is teaching 12-year-olds every week.

Only two years ago, the sea cadets corps had less than 10 participants, including Plumb. She was sure it would be cancelled, but they're now up to 18.

Richer encourages anyone to join the program.

"There's not a whole lot out there in this area, but through this program, you can travel almost anywhere in the world."

Province funds safe haven for family pets

Sometimes victims of domestic violence don't leave their abuser because they are worried about their animals.

However, your pet or farmyard animals can flee domestic violence too, Kawartha Haliburton Victim Services says.

"Under the Victim Quick Response Program, victims of domestic violence can leave their abuser and their animals can also be kept safe," said Whitney Rickard, client services co-ordinator.

Rickard said animal assistance is a new service that the Ministry of the Attorney General is now funding as of September 2016. Victims are eligible to receive \$200 for 10 days of animal care. "This (has been) a big obstacle for victims as animals are like children and pet owners do not want to leave their animals behind, or abusers sometimes abuse or neglect the animals as a way to get to the victim while they are looking for other accommodation or staying in our local women's shelter, and/or hospital," Rickard said. She noted that women's shelters do not take animals in so it is a real issue.

The funding means people can lodge their pets or other animals with the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (OSPCA), a local veterinarian clinic, or a private animal shelter. Blind storyteller shows film at Doc(k) Day

When he was a child, Lawrence Gunther began learning about aquatic ecosystems by observing a pond on his family's vacation property near Flesherton, Ont.

"I watched that pond sort of evolve over the years," said Gunther in a phone interview. "I studied that pond, the shoreline of that pond."

His appreciation and passion for the environment remained strong, and he went on to earn a master's degree in environmental studies. While he was in school during the summertime, Gunther took a job hand-line fishing for cod on the east coast.

But what makes his story incredibly remarkable is the fact he did it all while losing his sight. At eight years old, Gunther was first registered blind when doctors discovered his central vision had failed. His eyes deteriorated over the years and he became functionally blind in his 20s. It is unknown why this happened.

He learned to rely on his other senses, and his desire to learn more about the natural environment around him, especially the water, only grew stronger.

"I said, 'What's happening to the fish?' What's happening to our oceans? What's happening to our lakes and rivers?'" he recalled. "It got me thinking and exploring that—and I never stopped."

With the help of his guide dog, Gunther gathered stories from people across Canada who are closely connected to the water. This was part of a five-year project, which gave life to a documentary called *What Lies Below*.

"I interviewed about 80 people," said the 53-year-old, who now lives in Ottawa. "Eleven stories made the final cut."

He interviewed them about their concerns and hopes for their local fisheries, according to the film's website. The 80-minute documentary explores what they are doing to ensure the future sustainability of the country's water and traditional fisheries.

"They all share a feeling of responsibility," said Gunther.

What he learned is that oftentimes, shortterm, economic interests win out over what's best for locals.

The film made its premiere at the Planet In Focus Film Festival in Toronto last October. To date, it has been shown at seven festivals, and recently signed a deal with CBC's documentary channel.

It will be shown in Haliburton at the

Northern Lights Performing Arts Pavilion on April 8 as part of the sixth annual Doc(k) Day documentary film festival. The screening starts at 4:15 p.m., and afterwards, Gunther, joined by his guide dog, will answer audience questions.

The avid angler is no stranger to the area; he fished in local lakes as a youngster, exploring water bodies from Bobcaygeon northward.

"It was where my friends and I would go camping and fishing. It had such a diversity of opportunities for fishing."

Passes to see all five films at the festival are available at Sassy Digs in Minden for \$30. Individual movie passes are \$10 (if available).
