Province tells Minden to clean up its act

The Township of Minden Hills has been told to clean up its act at the Scotch Line

The Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MOECC) issued the municipality a Provincial Officer's Order on June 19, giving it until Aug. 2 to submit a plan to

rectify a number of suspected violations and offences.

The order is posted at the township office at 7 Milne St., but its accompanying provincial officer's report and a report from a surface water specialist are not. These have been obtained by The Highlander.

According to these additional reports, leachate, both in and outside of the landfill's current footprint, is a concern.

Leachate is water that has travelled through a solid and leached out some of its contaminants.

Cambium Inc., which consults to the township, noted leachate and other issues in its annual monitoring report to council in late April.

The order came after MOECC staff visited the landfill May 17 and June 7. In addition to leachate, they found improper material,

such as plastics and upholstered furniture, in the construction and demolition pile. That pile is chipped to be used for alternative daily cover. However, these items are not approved for daily cover. MOECC staff also found waste tumbling down steep slopes that were too steep to be covered.

The reports also document litter in the woods around the landfill.

Order issued for Scotch Line landfill

Glenn Rutherford, a provincial officer with the Peterborough District Office, said the findings, "are all indicative of poor landfill operational practices."

Rutherford, in the provincial officer's report, says, "the large pile of uncovered waste is likely allowing precipitation to enter the waste pile, become contaminated with contaminants from the landfill and subsequently discharging to the leachates seeps ..."

During the May 17 visit, MOECC staff found black liquid pooled inside the entrance, staining on the interior landfill road, and near the toe of the construction and demolition pile. The municipality put sand down to absorb it.

They also found dark, discoloured, odourless liquid between the toe of the active dumping area and internal road and a bit just outside the gate. The roadside ditch was stained orange, characteristic of leachate. In addition, three large leachate seeps were found outside the current landfill footprint flowing towards the landfill boundary and surface water features southwest of the landfill.

By June 7, some of the black liquid had been cleaned up near the front of the site, and a berm had been placed at the waste pile, but a small pool of black liquid had collected behind the berm.

"During both site visits, I noted the leachate is flowing overland on the property for a significant distance from the landfill footprint ... the weather was warm and dry. I reasonably believe that it is possible the leachate could reach the property boundary during a large rainfall or snowmelt event," Rutherford said.

Surface water specialist, Lauren Forrester, agreed. In her report, she said the leachate is not new, with water

monitoring at the Scotch Line landfill since 1981. She said water quality downstream of the site is not significantly impacted by landfill operations at this time, however, there have been changes this spring.

The seeps are flowing towards the southwest property boundary and Beaver Creek. Beaver Creek eventually flows to Balsam Lake and the Trent River within the Gull River Watershed.

"I reasonably believe the requirements specified in this order are necessary to prevent or reduce the risk of any discharge of contaminants, namely landfill leachate, into the natural environment from the site, and/or to prevent, decrease or eliminate an adverse effect that may result from the presence or discharge of such contaminants in, on or under the site," Rutherford said.

Minden Hills Reeve Brent Devolin discussed the order with *The Highlander* in a telephone interview June 30.


"Obviously, you're never happy when the circumstances lead to an order," he said.

Devolin said they have asked Cambium to develop a plan to remedy issues outlined in the order. They have also asked for a report from Cambium on the circumstances that led to the order and whether it is operational or otherwise.

Devolin said a special meeting of council will be called once Cambium has its plan so that council can review it and make any necessary revisions in time for the MOECC's early August deadline.

Devolin said the municipality has submitted its 25-year asset management plan to the province detailing what it will be doing at Scotch Line in the future and is awaiting approval.

"So I would just say this expedites things somewhat."

County shares spending plans with townships

In 2017, the County of Haliburton collected more than \$15.5 million from the four lower-tier municipalities, the majority of which came from taxation.

County CAO Mike Rutter and Warden Brent Devolin recently visited Dysart to let council know how the money is being spent.

"You sent millions of dollars our way and I think that it's only fair that we come to the chamber and say what we're doing with your money this year," said Devolin.

The most money is going to the roads department. About \$2.35 million is being allocated for major projects, including \$1 million for the hot mix program. A total of 4.4 km of County Road 1 and about 1.5 km of County Road 18 will be improved.

A total of \$125,000 will go toward the municipal building fibre optic project, which was spearheaded by the Eastern Ontario Regional Network last year. It's connecting 24 public buildings to highspeed internet.

The total investment is about \$375,000, said Rutter.

When it comes to the paramedic service, more than \$142,000 was spent on a new ambulance. And since the county's defibrillators are nearing the end of their lifespan, about \$250,000 will need to

be spent on eight new ones. A total of \$40,000 was set aside this year.

"We're looking at options, whether it's leasing them or purchasing them and financing them," he said.

The county has seven, but another unit needs to be added to an EMS vehicle due to changes to the Provincial Equipment Standards. All vehicles that regularly respond to ambulance calls must have them.

Two county bridges being rehabilitated

Two single-lane steel bridges dating back to the 1920s are going to be rehabilitated.

Horseshoe Lake bridge (County Road 20) and Hawk Lake bridge (County Road 13) were identified as priority projects by the County of Haliburton. A partial contribution of \$150,000 has been transferred to the bridge reserve as part of the 2017 budget.

Based on a preliminary assessment, it's anticipated that the Horseshoe Lake bridge will require major improvements next year, according to Craig Douglas, director of public works. The Hawk Lake bridge is being reviewed at the same time "to evaluate any risks associated with the bridge and how best to carry out preservation techniques."

On June 28, council awarded the contract for engineering services to C.C. Tatham & Associates in Bracebridge. It's expected to

"[They] will provide us with the best long-term financial strategy to proceed with these two structures," Douglas told The Highlander.

The full budget for rehabilitation is yet to be determined, said CAO Mike Rutter.

"This project will provide a much more detailed assessment than the 'high level' assessment that is completed every two years," he said. "Once we know the extent of the rehabilitation that is required a budget will be developed."

That will be part of the 2018 budget

Children's museum looks for more than \$100K

Sometime in the future, children and families will be able to explore interactive displays at a children's museum beside the Old Victoria Street School in Haliburton.

In October, 30 people completed a survey as part of a feasibility study for the launch of the Haliburton Children's Museum. Only one person was vehemently against it and a couple were doubtful it would work, according to project liaison Leora Berman.

"The data we collected from all the statistics, research and the community survey was overwhelmingly supportive of having a children's museum," she said. "That was really great news."

For the past 10 years, it's been her dream to bring a museum to Haliburton. It would not only unite children and their parents but also engage them with the senior population.

The museum will be on property owned by Community Living off Victoria Street. Its theme is growth—from one's own physical changes to the transformations that occur in the environment around them.

In an earlier interview, Berman explained it would also tie into the organization's mandate, part of which is to integrate people with disabilities in the community.

The project will be feasible, but only if it operates three days per week, she said.

The total cost, including the first year's operating budget, is estimated at between \$147,000 and \$177,000. This includes \$50,000 to erect a 400-square-foot portable structure and \$30-60,000 for the interactive exhibitions. The annual operating budget is pegged at \$67,000, which includes two fultime staff. Community Living will cover overhead expenses, she said.

Berman will try to secure \$110,000 of that with annual endowments and sponsorships. She said the Trillium Lakelands District School Board is interested in the project. Admission will be \$2 per child (ages six

to 14) and \$3 per adult.

Berman has partnered with Museum Planning Partners in Waterloo. Their team has experience working in museums, and arts, cultural and heritage organizations.

"We're part of this network, so that's a really cool thing," she said.

There is no target date to open at this time. It will depend on how the fundraising campaign goes.

Community Living will issue tax receipts

for donations, said Berman.

"It's been wonderful," said Cook, reflecting on her career. "When you come from the city, it's a refreshing change."


What she will miss the most is the team she has worked with at the municipality.

Dysart council denies church zoning change

Dysart council has denied a zoning bylaw amendment that would allow the Lighthouse Pentecostal Church to open its doors in the former Millennium Lifestyles gym on Harmony Road.

Planning director Pat Martin recommended council turn down the application during a June 26 meeting. According to her report, the applicant hadn't provided "sufficient information to assess impacts with respect to traffic" or demonstrated the church is compatible with the residential neighbourhood, a requirement of the official plan.

Martin told council the church decided not to proceed with a traffic study because of the feedback they received.

"MTO requested a traffic brief to determine if improvements are necessary for Harmony Road and [Highway] 118. The planning department also asked for information on traffic for Harmony Road," she said.

Three public meetings were held in recent months and neighbours expressed concerns about increased traffic, car speed, pedestrian

safety, overflow parking and traffic at the intersection of Highway 118, among others.

The municipality's planning committee recommended against the zoning change last month.

Andrea Roberts, deputy reeve and a member of the committee, said that even if the traffic study results were favourable for the owner, they believed the extra traffic would have a negative impact on the neighbourhood.

The plans included seating for 140 people and 50 parking spaces, according to a report.

On behalf of fellow residents, Janice Lewis reiterated their concerns and thanked the planning committee for their recommendation.

The property is owned by Ken and Sandra Stevens. They entered into an agreement of purchase and sale with the Lighthouse Pentecostal Church several months ago and made the application.

"The sale will not be taking place with deep disappoinment," said Sandra in a text message.

Their home is on the market.



Alex Coop


It's difficult to pinpoint what exactly makes the Highlands, the Highlands. Its lakes and rolling plains are just a surface level introduction to the uncontainable levels

Minden farmers' market wants to stay downtown

The Haliburton County Farmers' Market wants to stay in downtown Minden, not move to the fairgrounds.

Former president, Angel Taylor, came to council June 29 to say their request for more space in future had only been "exploratory" and they did not want "unfettered growth."

Council has voted to leave the market where it is, in the municipal lot at Milne Street and Pritchard Lane, until the end of this market season, but has indicated there will be talk about its future in the fall. Director of Community Services, Mark Coleman, in a report to council June 8, suggested a permanent move to the fairgrounds, citing concerns around vehicle and pedestrian traffic, access for emergency services vehicles with the market being so close to the fire hall, blocking lower level parking to the nearby condominium and rear entrance to Bobcaygeon and Milne Street businesses.

However, Taylor said they conducted a formal poll of market vendors and they overwhelmingly said they preferred the downtown location. She said when flooding caused them to move to the fairgrounds earlier this year, visitor numbers decreased, but when they moved back to the downtown on June 3, numbers virtually

"We do very well in that downtown lot. From the get-go, we did not want to be in the fairgrounds," Taylor said. She said it's simply too far away and not visible.

She acknowledged the market brings more pedestrian and vehicle traffic to the downtown but rather than seeing it as a negative, thinks it's "cool." She said downtown businesses champion the market and no one had witnessed "intolerable congestion."

She questioned whether there had been a traffic study and if council could share information on what incidents had occurred, where, when and how many times.

She said the market was keen to work with Coleman to address any safety concerns. The issue of safety came to council last July.

Taylor said their request for additional space could be accommodated on-site, with a new fire hall being built off of Highway 35 this year. She wondered if the empty building could then be repositioned into a pavilion. She added the former Dollo's Foodland site on Bobcavgeon Road could be turned into a municipal parking lot if parking is the issue.

She said much could be explored "short of relocating 20 businesses to a new location." She said vendors do not like to move, even within the market itself. She emphasized they are making their livings, not running lemonade stands.

She noted the Artisan's Market is separate from the farmers' market. She said that at one time, the artisans were located at the Minden Hills Cultural Centre. "A solution for one may not necessarily be the solution for both."

Coun. Lisa Schell inquired about vendor numbers and was told the farmers' market averages 15, but can be as high as 20 on long holiday weekends, while there are 14 at the artisans market.

Reeve Brent Devolin said that in the autumn, "This definitely will be an expanded conversation."

So far, they say it is going well.

"Better than projected. If it's raining at the cottage, people want to be out and about."

Seedhouse says they've met more people since opening last month than they have in 23 years of cottaging. "I love it. The people are so amazing."

She tells the story of a Maple Lake cottager who came in and spied a quilt she liked. However, she wasn't sure if it would fit in with her bedroom décor. So, the proprietors simply let her take it home to try it. Needless to say, they got a sale. It's something they wouldn't do in the city. "It's a small community."


More than half are cottagers while the rest are friends of cottagers, said Wakefield.

Rehabilitate, release and repeat

Timothea, a curious red fox at just five weeks old, decided to explore someone's backyard near Bobcaygeon in April.

It ended up costing her a broken leg after she jumped onto a chair and managed to get her front right leg stuck between the slats.

She struggled free, but the damage was extensive. Timothea broke several bones and sustained multiple wounds on her leg.

That's where volunteers from the Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary (WWS) in Minden Hills stepped in.

"She'll have to stay with us until this winter, maybe longer," said the sanctuary's president Monika Melichar,

while Timothea, also known as Timbit, sat quietly a few feet away with one of the sanctuary's volunteers. Unfortunately, Timothea's bones have not fused correctly. Melichar had to take Timothea to the Mississauga/Oakville Emergency Veterinary Hospital for orthopedic surgery.

"She will need to have a steel plate put in, and then ultimately removed, so she is looking at two surgical procedures, for now," Melichar said before the surgery mid-June.

The first surgery cost the volunteer-based organization more than \$2,000. The second one will cost a bit less, Melichar estimates. A GoFundMe page has been set up to raise money for her procedures. A house pet with a similar injury would have had to have the leg amputated by now,

while Timothea, also known as Timbit, sat quietly a few feet delichar added. But the damaged bones still have a long away with one of the sanctuary's volunteers. Unfortunately, way to go, according to her GoFundMe page's latest update.

Linda Schumacher, one of the sanctuary's newest volunteers from Haliburton, described Timothea as a sweetheart who loves to play. Because Timothea is unable to walk correctly, she has been isolated from the other foxes until she's more mobile. Until then, several chew toys are keeping her busy.

"They're very grateful, you can tell," she said. But Melichar emphasized the animals' interaction with humans is very limited. Their mission is to rehabilitate, not domesticate. That is why amputating Timothea's leg is currently not an option.

The sanctuary is legally allowed to keep an injured animal for a year, Melichar said.

And it's during the summer when the calls become frequent. Birds, fawns, otters, squirrels and foxes have made several appearances at WWS. Most animals show obvious signs of distress when in need of assistance, but Melichar warns, especially this time of the year, many fawns are left temporarily unattended by their mothers and are often thought to be abandoned or injured by passersby. People can also call the sanctuary directly if they're unsure how to approach a potentially injured animal. WWS takes in approximately 500 animals per year, and is currently looking for volunteer drivers.

"There's no obligation to assist if you put your name on the list. We will just call you and ask you if you are able to help at that time," Melichar said.
