Economic study says 200 local jobs at risk

Ontario Chamber's experts say Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act will cause unintended harm

Ontario's proposed changes to the Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act could put nearly 200 jobs, across all sectors in Haliburton County, at risk, according to a report from the Canadian Centre for Economic Analysis (CANCEA).

That's above the provincial average, and included in the 185,000 jobs that would also be at risk across Ontario.

The changes to Bill 148 are sizeable and sudden, said Paul Smetanin, founder and president of CANCEA.

"A theme that businesses and economies don't like is shock. So we would recommend that [the government] create more of a runway on this," Smetanin told The Highlander.

"With this bill, there's a lot of money trying to be redistributed in Ontario."

The bill, specifically the plan to raise the

minimum wage to \$14 in January and \$15 a year later, spurred strong reaction in the

Local business owners cited job cuts and higher prices on sold goods.

CANCEA's report echoed those concerns, and said the province could dig itself into a \$23 billion hole in two years, 29 per cent of which would be passed on to

"It's the biggest change to the minimum

wage we've seen in 45 years," said Smetanin, and pointed to the fact that small businesses are likely to be affected five times more than larger ones.

Richard Wannan, director of the Haliburton Highlands Chamber of Commerce, said layoffs would only be one side effect.

"Employers might be able to keep employees, but they aren't going to expand

and bring in new staff," he said. "They might reduce hours ... it's not just about how people might get laid off"

The report says more than 16,000 food service and manufacturing jobs would be at risk.

A statement from Kevin Flynn, Minister of Labour, said the province isn't backing down from its bill, but that it does recognize there are "concerns from the business community."

"Many businesses across the province have come out in support of our plan because it helps them attract

employees, reduces their labour turnover and encourages employees to become more invested in the business," the statement read.

In early July, 53 economic experts across the country claimed in an open letter that Kathleen Wynne's proposed minimum wage hike made sense and would create "substantial benefit to low-wage workers, their families and the economy as a whole."

Wannan said it's not about disagreeing with the notion of a living wage, but the timetable for its implementation.

"We're going to continue to work with the Ontario Chamber of Commerce (OCC) to have our voices heard. This is one of the biggest pieces of legislation that really has an influence on our area," he said.

The government should revisit the implementation schedule, and consider phasing in probationary periods

for workers to determine equal pay for equal work, said Karl Baldauf, vice president of policy and government relations at the Ontario Chamber of Commerce and spokesperson for the Keep Ontario Working Coalition (KOWC).

The OCC has not provided an alternate timetable for implementation.

Local MPP Laurie Scott told *The Highlander* it was irresponsible of the

government to introduce the bill without fully exploring its economic impacts.


"The ripple effects would be incredible ... and it would affect the most vulnerable people, the very people they're trying to help," said Scott.

The bill and its amendments will be a high priority when she returns to Queen's Park in September, she said.

The OCC, along with KOWC, awarded CANCEA the bid to measure the bill's potential impacts last month.

New guardrails block lake access

For 28 years, Dan Sauve has been able to access his Kushog Lake waterfront.

He's come down the driveway from his house, crossed Highway 35, and walked down to the lake. In recent times, due to ill health, he's driven his truck.

But that all ended last week when new guardrails went up that now block the dirt access road that leads to Sauve's docks, ramp and watercraft.

"I can no longer go to the lake I've used for 28 years," Sauve laments. "I've been cut off after getting the okay from the MTO (Ministry of Transportation) 28 years ago."

Sauve and his neighbour, Art Morley, do cross under the guardrails and walk onto the access road for a photograph but it isn't something Sauve can do often, or easily.

Due to a "terrible lung problem," Sauve can't walk up and down the driveway anymore and must take the pickup. So, for him, there isn't an option of climbing under the guardrails or over them on a regular basis. Others in Haliburton County have simply built steps to get over guardrails and Sauve said he'll do the same. At least that way other members of his family can get to the lake.

Sauve said the guardrails also came out of

"There was no warning. One day we had access and the next week we didn't."

He is trying to figure out why other openings along the stretch have remained while his has been cut off. He said he even put up a sign imploring "please don't block my access to the lake" but claims was cast

Morley, who's lived on Kushog since 1984, has also used the access road in the past. He used it to go swimming and fishing. He, too, cannot understand how the MTO has blocked the road without any consultation with residents.

Sauve said he is also paying waterfront taxes of about \$4,000-a-year, despite

now not having access to the water. He is also worried that his property value will plummet.

"It's very upsetting."

Algonquin Highlands Mayor Carol Moffatt said she sympathizes with Sauve that his access to the water has been restricted or denied but there is nothing the township can do about it.

"It's not within our jurisdiction. It's not our land. It is fully an MTO decision," she

An MTO spokeswoman said the guardrail being erected on Highway 35 in the Kushog Lake area "is intended to protect, or redirect wayward traffic from the existing lake."

As for people, such as Sauve and Morley, being cut off from their access road, she said property on the east side of Highway 35 is private property owned by the MTO.

"We recognize that this may be an inconvenience, but alternate facilities are available on the lake," she said. "Access to Kushog Lake is available from a private boat launch, at the Ox Narrows Resort, along with docking and parking. Kushog Lake can also be accessed via St. Nora's Lake. There is a public boat launch, a dock and free overnight parking at the Frost Centre/Haliburton Highlands Water Trails on Highway 35."

When it comes to existing docks and stairs placed over guardrails, she said their presence and the use of the highway rightof-way to access the lake represents an unacceptable potential liability for the MTO and it is an offence punishable by fine.


The spokeswoman said the MTO will review the location of the docks and other structures to determine whether there is an immediate safety concern. If there is, the ministry will remove the docks and structures. If not, the ministry will allow the docks to remain in place.

The ministry will not issue any new permits for docks or associated structures within the highway right-of-way, she said.

Cottage resort braces for fall colour takeover

One business cites Algonquin Park visitors for 30 per cent drop in revenue

White Birches Cottages, a family-run cottage resort minutes from Algonquin Park on Oxtongue Lake, is bracing itself for the fall colours and the thousands of visitors they attract.

But it's not planning to roll out the red carpet.

In addition to the closure of nearby roads during the months of September and October – a motion passed by Algonquin Highlands council in June – the resort's manager, Jason McGuire, suggests a 110 lbs. German shepherd and 24-hour surveillance might be needed as well.

"It's reached that point ... come September I'm not sleeping. It's like we have a resort on Yonge Street, downtown Toronto," McGuire told *The Highlander*. "It's the most stress I've ever been through."

That's because in September, thousands of visitors travel up Highway 60 to enter Algonquin Park for the fall colours.

But over the past two years, entry to Algonquin Park through the highway has slowed to a crawl, and many visitors have chosen to exit the highway, just a few kilometres short of the west gate, and take a detour through the hamlet of Oxtongue

And that's when problems occur. Strangers overrun the resort, walk across private property and peer into rented units, frightening paying customers, said McGuire.

On more than one occasion, visitors have paddled the lake in a canoe or kayak reserved for paying customers, adding liability concerns to the list of problems.

It's caused a 30 per cent dip in business during the month of September since 2015.

"I'm neglecting my clients because I'm trying to keep my property safe. And with the lack of business we're getting through September now, we're losing money. It's a stressful time," he said.

His mother and resort owner, Jenny, said five regular clients have already told her they won't be returning during the Thanksgiving weekend, equating to approximately \$3,000 in lost revenue.

"And the two weekends prior to Thanksgiving are busy, too," she said, adding some customers have told her they might abandon visiting the resort in September altogether.

Mahendranath Tiwari isn't one of them. He and his family from Toronto have visited the resort every Thanksgiving for a decade.

"It's a nice and friendly place where our kids are able to play and the rest of the family could relax, talk to each other and watch the children," Tiwari told *The Highlander*. "When we first travelled there, there (were) no strangers coming onto the

property."

But for two years, Tiwari has been helping guide strangers off the resort. Many of them are dropped off by bus.

"I've had to shoo a few of them away," he said.

It's baffling how blatantly people ignore the "no trespassing" and "private property" signs, he added. "I'm pretty sure they don't care."

Jenny emphasized it's not about being anti-tourist.

"We are tourist-friendly ... we appreciate tourists, but this is crazy," she said.

During a council meeting June 15, Algonquin Highlands Mayor Carol Moffatt said the road closures are necessary to protect residents.

"It's a bizarre situation," she said. Coun. Marlene Kyle agreed.

"Folks aren't saying they don't want business ... they just want private property respected," Kyle said.

The additional traffic on Highway 60 can impede first responders, said Algonquin Highlands fire Chief, Mike Cavanagh.

"This will increase our response times to emergencies. The increase of travellers in the area also increases the likelihood of an emergency," he said. "We monitor the situation annually, have some contingency plans in place and we continue to plan as our partner organizations continue to make changes to help alleviate the situation."

Master's student tackles food insecurity

About 60 per cent of low-income earners struggle to put food on the table, according to the Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge (HKPR) District Health Unit. For many, half or more of their income goes to pay rent. With many other monthly bills in the mix such as hydro and transportation, eating healthy usually ends up at the bottom of the list.

Findings from last year's Nutritious Food Basket study reveals that more than one in 10 households in the region are food insecure. This means they don't have enough food or worry there isn't enough to eat.

But the HKPR isn't trying to lower food prices; they believe the solution is to boost income.

"It's not the cost of the food that's the barrier to people accessing food," said Rosie Kadwell, registered dietician with the HKPR. "It's more a lack of income."

To raise awareness of food insecurity and its implications, they will host a presentation at their office on Highland Street on Aug. 23. It will feature a presentation by Jessica Knot, a master's student in public health at Brock University.

Knot is doing a co-op with the HKPR.

"When we were talking about projects, we thought it would be really great for Jessica to do a little bit more on our Nutritious Food Basket work," said Kadwell.

All health units are mandated to complete the Nutritious Food Basket survey. It consists of 67 food items that are in Canada's Food Guide and commonly purchased by Ontarians. HKPR staff visit local grocery stores and determine the cost to eat healthy. In 2016, the cost for the average family was \$886. It was \$286 for a single person on Ontario Works or disability.

And according to a study by the Ontario Association of Food Banks, poverty costs the average household \$2,300-2,900. This represents the extra costs of health care, crime and social assistance, among others.

Knot, who is from Omemee, will present a report on food insecurity and talk about what the HKPR plans on doing in the future. Residents will be able to write to their local politicians if they wish.

The event goes from 2:30-3:30 p.m. and is free to attend. To RSVP, call Kadwell at 705-457-1391 ext. 3238.

Demonstrators want their portage back

Parks Canada says the work isn't finished, will talk to stakeholders

With demonstrators blocking traffic, it took about a minute for three men to portage across Highway 35 near Moore Falls.

The group's message was clear: they want the boat rollers back.

"It's really important to us that we have a safe passage because we don't want to take eight or nine-year-olds across the highway. That's why we're out here supporting the cause," Trevor Wright, leader and training director at Camp Kilcoo, told *The* Highlander Aug. 12.

He and three others were cheered on by more than 100 people nearby as they made the portage.

In addition to dozens of young campers, members of the Moore Falls, Gull Lake and Black Lake property owners' associations lined the bridge with signs.

The demonstration in Minden Hills came

two years after Parks Canada removed the boat rollers on the portage, replacing them with hydraulic booms on both sides of the dam.

In preparation for dam upgrades on the Trent Severn Waterway (TSW), Parks Canada introduced new regulations that included a mandatory buffer zone around each dam.

But Parks Canada's actions make little sense to Nick Evans, treasurer of the Gull Lake Property Owners' Association.

"The fact that you have buoys at the bottom of the rapids doesn't make any sense. No one is being sucked up the rapids. We've been using the boat rollers here for a long time ... it's been pretty safe," he said.

He pointed to the fact that anyone using a tin boat with an engine will now have to turn around upon reaching Moore Falls.

Public safety was at the heart of the decision, said Jewel Cunningham, director of Ontario Waterways for Parks Canada.

While there wasn't a specific public safety assessment for Moore Falls, other assessments for dams on the TSW indicated a pattern of unpredictable currents and water levels, she said.

"There was a long boom system that was tight to this dam and it did not adequately protect people from the significant amounts of water travelling through that area in the summer ... especially on the upside of the stream. Installing these new booms and moving the distance back [from the dam] mitigates that risk by taking people further away from where the danger is and the in-flow.'

She said in 1975, two women died while crossing from one side of the dam to the

"It was the subject of a coroner's inquest, and the conclusions from it were quite clear, with regards to risk at that particular

dam, and the necessity of a long boom system that would protect people from the risk associated with the intake of this dam," she said.

There was little feedback from the public when notifications were sent out in 2015 regarding dam infrastructure changes at Moore Falls, said Cunningham.


That's changed in the past several weeks. As a result, she's scheduled meetings with cottage association members and Minden Hills councillors, specifically Coun. Pam Savne.

Cunningham said she understands the concerns around portaging across Highway 35 and that the government wants to mitigate them.

That will require discussions with cottage associations, municipal governments and the Ministry of Transportation.

Phase in the Fair Workplaces bill

According to the most up-to-date figures from Stats Can, Haliburton County has a 9.3 per cent unemployment rate.

Unfortunately, "up-to-date" in this case means 2011, so it's difficult to know where we are, six years down the track.

However, it's safe to say that Haliburton County can't afford any more job losses or jobs placed at risk.

The Ontario Chamber of Commerce (OCC) and the Keep Ontario Working Coalition (KOWC) recently contracted the Canadian Centre for Economic Analysis (CANCEA) to measure the potential economic impact of the province's Bill 148 – that's the proposal to raise minimum wage, among other things. The centre revealed its findings this week.

As reported in today's *Highlander*, it says proposed changes in the Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act could put nearly 2.7 per cent of jobs across all sectors in Haliburton County at risk. That's above the provincial average and included in the 185,000 jobs that would be at risk across Ontario.

Autumn Wilson of the Haliburton Highlands Chamber of Commerce told us the estimate, which equates to 190 jobs, includes both current and potential new jobs. In other words, that 185,000 figure isn't just referring to job losses, but jobs that will not be created by businesses worried about the impact of the changes.

Lots of folks are focusing on the minimum wage increase in this bill. The plan is to raise it to \$14-an-hour this coming January and \$15-an-hour a year after that. But there are a number of items in the bill that will cost employers even more, such as an extra public holiday and new rules around holiday pay: a minimum of three weeks' vacation for employees who have worked for five years or more. There's also "equal pay for equal work" and additional leave provisions.

We've heard from a number of businesses in Haliburton County who say these extra costs will be onerous and will affect jobs and prices. They say they may be forced to lay people off, won't hire as many and will have to raise prices to cover the additional payroll costs.

As an economy of small businesses, no wonder the changes will hit Haliburton hard. Paul Smetanin of CANCEA says small businesses will be affected by a factor of five times more than larger ones. Food service and manufacturing jobs seem especially vulnerable.

The message from everybody this week –the OCC and the Haliburton Highlands Chamber of Commerce – is that nobody is against labour reform - they just want it phased in.

The Ontario government has so far opted not to slow things down. Why? One can

speculate the Wynne government is looking for Brownie points going into next summer's provincial election. And while that will work for many unions and

workers' rights groups, she risks alienating the business community, the engine of Ontario's economy.

It will be interesting to see how the province responds to all of this. Labour Minister Kevin Flynn has said the province isn't backing down from the bill. He says they've heard from employers who think the changes will help them attract employees, reduce turnover and get employees more invested in the businesses they work for. However, he has acknowledged concerns from others in the business community.

The most prudent thing for the province to do now is sit down with stakeholders - both for and against the bill - to plan a phase-in that is amenable to all parties.

To date, the OCC has not provided an alternative timetable for implementation. This should be their next step now that they've determined the economic risks of rushing through these changes.

Waiting for my windfall

Harvey Lake, in the heart of the beautiful Dorset area, and in direct contravention of the township's official plan.

Their proposal is to blast and dig well within the permitted township bylaws. Rather than one kilometre from any lake, they are relying on the MNRF's power to override the wishes of the township and be within 170 metres of Harvey Lake.

Now, all of our surrounding lakes like Kawagama, Fletcher, Otter and Harvey are facing noise, environmental destruction, and potential for water and air pollution. My family and I have loved and enjoyed the Dorset area for many years and chose first Kawagama Lake, and now Otter, because of the abundant Crown land and clean water. This really isn't about any one person's character — this is about the land, the community, and the lakes.

And, while gravel may be needed in this small area, the need is small and the permit should reflect the 10,000 tonnes per year John Bacher Construction states the market requires, and if at all, the permit should be for the small five acres that this would use versus the 53-acre mega quarry proposed. We should all be opposed to a quarry so close to residences and so close to a lake. Let's not make the Algonquin Highlands the quarry capital of Ontario.

Minden Home Hardware changing hands

After 13 years, Jodi Patterson and David Staley have decided to sell the Minden Home Hardware and retire.

In an interview with *The Highlander* this week, Patterson confirmed that they had sold the store with a closing date of Sept. 1.

While she declined to name the new owner, *The Highlander* has learned it is Dan Moulton, who already owns Home Hardware stores in Bowmanville, Alliston and Hanover. He's been with the franchise more than five years. He did not return a phone call as of press time Wednesday.

Patterson cautioned the deal won't be finalized for another two weeks.

She said the business was not up for sale, and never has been during their ownership, but there's been several interested parties wanting to purchase it over the last three to four years.

"It's in a good area. Let's face it, Minden is growing, it's a great spot," she said.

The fact it was another member of the Home Hardware family that approached them, as opposed to another hardware store franchise, make it an easy decision.

Patterson said that with everything falling into place for her and Staley, when they were approached about selling, "we just said okay, sure. The offer is what we would be looking for so we just decided to go for it and retire."

Patterson said they will be staying in

She said the new owner's "got his feet wet and there's no training involved there for him, which is kind of a good thing." She added that "the bonus is the staff remains the same, keep their seniority, none of them will lose any of that.

The status quo for them, which is a good

thing. "She said the timing of the takeover is perfect. "We do start to slow down for winter so it's a really good time for him to take over as we're finishing our busy season and kind of looking for a break. It's all going to work out."

Haliburton gas bar under new ownership

Haliburton's Independent Gas Bar is under new ownership and will soon be converted to the Mobil brand. It's one of 213 stations recently sold by Loblaw to Brookfield Business Partners for \$540 million.

The station, which includes a small convenience store, will get new signage, lighting and signs on the pumps, confirmed Joseph Calderone, CEO of BG Fuels, a new company owned by Brookfield.

"We'll assess the image change and customer response, and rollout the rebranding [around October]," said Calderone.

His company is bringing the Mobil brand

to Canada through a supply agreement with Imperial Oil, a Canadian subsidiary of ExxonMobil.

In addition to gas bar operator Christine MacAusland, the business employs two full-time employees and one part-timer. No jobs will be lost and customers who utilize PC points at the pumps will be able to continue doing so. The loyalty rewards program gives customers points on their gas purchase that can be used to save money on groceries at Loblaw stores.

Continuing the program was a condition of the sale, said Calderone.

Once they've rebranded, they will offer Synergy fuels, which "contain special

additives for better engine cleaning and performance," he said.

This is BG Fuels' first time in the retail gasoline business, and Calderone hopes people will give them a try.

"We are honoured and delighted to be serving the public in Haliburton."

Brookfield is a unit of Brookfield Asset Management, a publicly traded company. It had a total of \$14.4 billion in assets this year.

A sneak peek at opera in the making

Balfour refers to this public workshop as a "trailer" to the full performance, which will be staged in Haliburton on Dec. 21-22. The evening will begin with a traditional welcoming, followed by Balfour


addressing the audience about the creative process. The audience will then get the opportunity to view a portion of one of his previous works, titled Wa Wa Tey Wak, which translates to Northern Lights, which will flow directly into the live portion of Mishabooz's Realm.

Balfour says this unique opportunity to see into the window of the opera world will "give people a flavour of exactly where we are going."

New horse therapy academy wins \$10K

A therapeutic riding academy in the Highlands has been gifted \$10,000 through a bank's Facebook contest.

Walkabout Farm Therapeutic Riding Academy Haliburton Highlands learned it had won the money on Aug. 9, said owner and operator Jennifer Semach.

She said the bank, Tangerine, in celebration of its 20th anniversary, offered a contest to nominate and vote for people's favourite Canadian charitable organizations for a chance for those organizations to win cash prizes, ranging from \$2,000 to \$20,000.

Local supporter, Amanda Duncombe-Lee, nominated them.

Semach said they were notified in July that their not-for-profit was one of 20 organizations chosen from more than 400 applications submitted from across Canada.

From that point forward, voting was opened and it was announced Aug. 9 live on Tangerine's Facebook page that Walkabout had won their requested amount of \$10,000.

"That was a very huge boost in confidence for us, that we have so much support and encouragement from many people from a rural community like ours, who want to see our newly-founded therapeutic riding academy succeed, filling a void in recreational services for people with exceptionalities and through mentoring youth at risk," Semach said.

She said they'll use the money to buy an all-terrain utility farm vehicle.

"This much-needed, but previously financially out of reach piece of equipment, will guarantee our participants with limited mobility and complex medical conditions full access to our farm without restrictions," Semach said.

She said their next goal is to raise \$200,000 to bridge the gap on purchase and

special needs modifications for their own farm. They are currently renting.

Semach said having their own farm would enable full-time residency, allow them to offer longer hours, a youth outreach headquarters, greater access to their therapeutic animals and structured predictable programming for participants who thrive on routine.

They currently operate out of Briarwinds Farm in Ingoldsby. According to their website, they aspire to be a non-profit charitable organization. They offer therapeutic riding, non-riding and horsemanship programs for children and adults in need, through individualized riding programs, volunteerism or work placement.



Teen cyclist goes from student to teacher

Nick Emsley was keeping up with Canadian marathon champion Cory Wallace for the first five kilometres of his Canadian Marathon Championship in Quebec last month.

The two weren't in the same race, but during marathon events, all age groups start at the same place, same time.

It was exhilarating, Emsley told *The Highlander*

"He's an inspiration," he said. "He's one of the best marathon racers in the world."

Wallace eventually left the competition behind - and finished second in his race category - while Emsley finished second place with a time of just under five hours.

The small town of East Hereford, Que. was a beautiful race venue, said the 18-year-old.

"If I had more time I would have showed up a week earlier, taken in the sights, rode a bit of the track ahead of time ... but it was a great atmosphere and the residents were really nice."

And time isn't something Emsley has a lot of.

Not even two weeks later, Emsley was in Albion Hills, Ont. racing in this season's sixth Ontario Cup.

The 50 km race pushed Emsley and his teammates from AWI Racing – who are coached by Andrew Watson, a four-time Canadian champion – to the limit.

Emsley recalled a teammate being so dehydrated he needed medical attention and an IV.

Dehydration can creep up on you quickly if you're not careful, he said.

"I lost three pounds during a race three years ago ... it was so cold, my hands froze halfway through the race. It was a bad day," he said.

Leading up to the race, Emsley took on the role of instructor at Sir Sam's Ski and Bike's Advanced Camp for mountain biking.

The camp, which went from July 26-28, teaches children ages 11-15 various mountain biking skills.

Emsley has been helping with the camp for more than four years. The program has been offered to children for seven.

"More than half of the kids from last year's beginner's course showed up again this year," he said, adding most of them are from the Greater Toronto Area.

Chris Bishop, owner of Sir Sam's, praised Emsley's strong mountain biking and teaching skills.

"Nick is pretty much at the top of his game for his age in the mountain biking scene in Ontario," he said. "He's the expert."

The final Ontario Cup event of the season will be at Sir Sam's from Aug. 25-27.

It's always a good feeling racing near your hometown, said Emsley.

Riders from the upcoming race have




Nick Emsley competes in the 50 km Ontario Cup race in Albion Hills. Photo submitted.

already visited the course for a pre-ride, and the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, said Bishop. "Some say this is the best venue in all of Ontario," he said.

The race begins at 9:30 Sunday morning.

Powerboat races roar back into Haliburton

If you're a fan of boats, speed and loud motors, Head Lake is the place to be this weekend.

More than 80 racers, including competitors from the U.S. and Ontario, will take part in the third annual Haliburton Outboard Powerboat Races. The two-day event is once again being hosted by the Toronto Outboard Racing Club (TORC).

"The hotels are getting all booked up," said event coordinator Barb Hammond in a recent interview.

Hammond's son, Wes, 21, and daughter,

Andrea, 25, will be competing. They spend their summers and winters with family on

Haliburton Lake. Another racer who spent time growing up on the lake is Brandon

Boats in 13 different classes will reach speeds of up to 85 mp/h as they zoom around an oval-shaped track. The featured vessels include hydroplanes, runabouts and T-boats. Spectators can gather around the lake to catch all of the action at no cost.

On Friday at 6 p.m., the pit area will be open to the public. It's an opportunity for people to meet the racers, learn more about the sport and get a closer look at their highpowered machines.

The event is a fundraiser for the Haliburton Hospital Auxiliary and the Haliburton Lions Club. Last year, a raffle with items donated by the community raised \$1,200 for the auxiliary, which donates the money to the Haliburton hospital for medical and non-medical items.

"To me, it was logical [to support the auxiliary] because everyone can benefit from the hospital," said Hammond, who has been involved in fundraisers with the organization's past president, Judy Skinner.

The raffle will happen again at the auxiliary's table, which is where visitors can also find TORC merchandise and race programs.

The Lions Club will run the food booth, and by doing so, will take all of the

There won't be a beer tent because it didn't raise much money for the auxiliary last year.

Normally, racers test their boats prior to races. But since the government docks will be closed to the public on Saturday and Sunday, Hammond decided against it.

"We are just trying to be respectful of the people who don't want the noise and the people who access the government docks,"

The races start at 10 a.m. and go until 5:30 p.m. on Saturday. On Sunday, they will begin around 11 a.m., after church services have finished.

About 20 volunteers will pitch in to help and the majority of last year's sponsors are back on-board. The municipality continues to be supportive, said Hammond.

An awards presentation will take place at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday. There are no cash prizes for racers.

"They're doing it because they love it. They would be doing it whether there's a spectator there or not."

Spectators will enjoy the event because the races are fast-paced and run on a tight schedule, added Hammond.

"The more spectators the better it is for racers and the community."

This is the last TORC event of the season, but racers will head to one more event in Redwood, New York. Haliburton' races will go ahead if it rains, but thunder and lightning would force organizers to cancel.

Founded in 1952, TORC is a non-profit organization devoted to people with an interest in boat racing.





Still not enough supply to meet buyer demand

It's been a busy year for realtors in the Haliburton Highlands. Many desirable, well-priced properties have disappeared from the market in a matter of days. In some cases, they've sold for more than asking price.

"We've definitely had a phenomenal year and sales are up significantly [over last year]," says Jeff Strano, who's a realtor with his wife, Andrea Strano. This is their fourth summer in the business.

Waterfront properties continue to be extremely popular, but so are in-town homes near all the amenities, he says. Families moving to the area want to be close to town. The problem is there's not enough supply to meet demand.

"You could build 10 of them [houses] and you could probably sell all 10 of them," says Strano.

The local housing market is affected by what happens in Toronto. And that market has cooled. According to the Toronto Real Estate Board, residential transactions dropped more than 40 per cent in July compared to last year.

"We definitely have fewer listings, but we consistently have fewer properties sold. That wasn't the case six months ago, when our listings were way down and overall the sales were up," Strano says, adding it's become more of a balanced market.

Now, buyers are waiting to find the ideal

property and sellers aren't getting what they want, says Strano. The average listing currently sits on the market for about a month, whereas last year, it was two months.

"We had a great spring up here, but things have definitely changed."

Lee Gauthier, a realtor in the area for 33 years, says she's had just as many sales as last year. But she has seen the volume of residential non-waterfront properties rise—and prices across all categories go up too.

One of the biggest changes, she says, is there are bidding wars on cheaper waterfront cottages.

And just like Strano, she agrees there aren't enough properties to meet the demand.

"The inventory has been lower than the same time last year," she says.

Blake O'Byrne, a realtor for 21 years, says his sales are on par with last year—his best year ever.

"Even though it's been a challenging year because of steep price rises in the spring and lack of inventory, when places have been priced right we've been generating good sales," says O'Byrne.

He says the market has picked up in recent weeks and buyers are coming forward.

"The buyers are starting to come forth instead of waiting for prices to keep going down."

He's noticed price drop for existing listings and new listings pop up for "a more

reasonable price."

In the last five months of the year, waterfront sales plummeted 26 per cent while the number of listings fell 9.5 per cent compared to the same period last year. The average sold price is up 20 per cent and days on market is down 46 per cent. Sales of residential properties are down 30

per cent, listings are down 24 per cent and the average sold price is up 11 per cent. The average days on market is down 51 per cent.

The statistics are from The Lakelands Association of Realtors and include Muskoka, Haliburton and Orillia.







Between 2008 and 2015, it was easier to buy an existing home than to build, he said. Construction costs had gone up, but resale values remained stagnant.

But a recent 25 per cent spike in property values has made the option of buying land and building a home much more popular.

"There's also a shortage of existing product on the market, so now you can buy the land and build, and know you're still within market range," said vanLieshout.

Similar uptake is taking place in residential areas on the outskirts of Minden as well, he added.

Most people interested in these properties are 50 and older, or retired.

Harold said people he's spoken to are retired residents who are looking to move into areas like Calico, from Kennisis and Redstone Lake.

"It's more affordable," he said.



County applies for digital mapping funds

The County of Haliburton is seeking federal funds to assist them with the high cost of digital terrain model mapping to mitigate floods


County council recently gave planning director Charlsey White the green light to apply for 50 per cent funding from the National Disaster Mitigation Program (NDMP).

"We've had significant discussion of whether to bring this forward," said CAO Mike Rutter. "There are a lot of unknowns and not a lot of certainty around this report."

But staff decided to present it because of recent conversations with the Upper Trent Watershed Management Partnership and the fact there have been two major floods in four years.

These techniques will assist in the visualization, mapping and modelling of flood scenarios and protection or mitigation management.

"We really wanted council to make that decision," he said.

There are different types of digital terrain mapping, but White recommends airborne scanning in the form of Laser Detection and Ranging (LADAR) or Light Detection and Ranging (LiDAR).

"These techniques will assist in the visualization, mapping and modelling of flood scenarios and protection or mitigation management," White said in a report.

They use optical remote sensing technology that measure the properties of scattered light to determine the range of a distant target and other information, she said. The information collected is extremely accurate

"We've talked a lot ... about the necessity of having much more detailed mapping showing the contours of our region so that we can better predict where flooding is going to occur," said Rutter.

The county's application will include the Gull and Burnt River watersheds, as well as the reservoir lakes and channels.

The NDMP is a five-year, \$200 million program that was established two years ago as part of the government's "commitment to build safer and more resilient communities," states Public Safety Canada's website. Flood mitigation is its primary focus.

The county is partnering with the province

on the application. If they are successful, the province will flow the funds to them.

The cost of the project will be determine

The cost of the project will be determined by the size of the area and the number of partners, said White.

The county contacted companies that do LiDAR mapping to get an "order of magnitude estimate," said Rutter. One company responded, saying the total cost would be about \$200,000.

The deadline to apply is the end of October. Projects must begin no later than March 31, 2019 and be completed by March 31, 2020.

Beware the solar lease

What if someone showed up at your door and offered you a few thousand dollars – every year for twenty years? All you have to do is let a company set up and operate solar panels on your property.

It sounds like easy money, and you get the added bonus of helping the province grow its clean energy grid.

Not so fast

Sometimes these leases get registered on your property's title. That can make it difficult to sell your property in the future. One company actually claims that owners can't sell unless they approve the buyer – essentially a veto on your most basic property rights.

Other times you'll have a signed lease and nothing happens, as was the case with one client recently; no solar panels were installed and no money paid. But the lease was still registered on title.

This is a problem, as it can be very difficult, if not impossible, to get out of these contracts. It's an area crying out for consumer protection, a provincial responsibility.

But it gets even worse. What's likely to most disturb homeowners, and the municipal councils that sign letters of support for some of these projects, is this: many of these solar leases are being bundled together and sold as financial assets to foreign companies.

One solar lease company I spoke to recently said their leases are being sold to the Chinese. So rather than helping a budding Ontario solar industry, the property owner in this case will end up with a Chinese company as their tenant. And, thanks to the provincial government's feed-in-tariff program, the province will pay those companies from Hydro and taxpayer dollars to produce energy.

Yes, you read that correctly. The Ontario government pays a Chinese company up to 30 cents per kilowatt hour to produce energy sold here for as little as 5 cents. Only our province could come up with that.

What should you do? Simple: don't sign a solar lease, or for that matter, any document that could affect rights to your property, without having your lawyer review it first. You could end up with some serious regrets.

It's a good example of how a little caution can save a lot of heartache.

Dysart looks for feedback on septage treatment

Dysart residents will have opportunities this fall to chime in about septage treatment services in the area, Andrew Vitaterna, manager of ASI Water, recently told *The Highlander*.

The provincial government's ongoing attempts to ban land application of untreated holding and septic tank waste has prompted the municipality to examine alternative solutions.

ASI Water, which specializes in water and wastewater operations and engineering, has been hired by Dysart to evaluate septage treatment options.

After a successful application to the Clean Water and Wastewater Fund Program (CWWF) earlier this year, Dysart is eligible for more than \$69,600 and \$34,800, in federal and provincial funding, respectively.

"We have to start from scratch and look at all the final options," said Vitaterna. "There are a number of factors, not just cost, that we have to narrow down."

Possible sites for treatment options include the Cooper lagoon off Highway 118 near West Guilford, a piece of vacant municipal land north of the Haliburton Landfill and the sewage treatment plant along the Drag River, said Rob Camelon,

the municipality's interim public works director.

"Costs for the facility are unknown and are dependent on type of technology and location," he said.

Dysart is undertaking a Schedule C Class Environmental Assessment (EA) study to establish the preferred option for waste management services.

"Initially we thought a Schedule B would be suffice, but after some discussions with the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change, our consultants felt it was better to work under a Schedule C," said Camelon.

Various levels of municipal class EAs

determine the amount of planning and consultation required for proposed projects.

Projects labeled Schedule C have the potential for significant environmental impacts and must go through all phases of planning and consultation as outlined by the province.

Schedule B's are ranked lower, and require less planning and consultation with the public.

Work on Drag Lake south dam to be re-tendered

Work on the south dam at Drag Lake has been paused and that part of the project re-tendered, Parks Canada said in a press release this week.

Parks Canada said as damaged concrete was chipped away from the northerly dam, it became apparent that the concrete of the structure required significantly more work than originally estimated. They said that as a result, the repairs to the northerly dam required more time and resources than anticipated.

Based on that, Parks Canada has adjusted its plans for remaining work on the south

"In order to effectively incorporate this new information, the remaining work on the south dam will be retendered resulting in a pause to on-site work," Parks Canada said.

It's anticipated the project will go back out to tender in late summer or early fall and work will resume in the fall.

"Current estimates would have this second construction phase concluding

early in 2018. As some work, such as replanting, is warm weather dependent there would be additional activity at the site in the spring of next year," the release said

The overall project calls for major concrete repairs to both dams – removing damaged concrete and then resurfacing the structures. A raised walkway will be added to the site linking the two dams. New guard rails will be added to enhance visitor and operator safety and post tension anchors will be installed to provide

additional strength.

The Drag Lake dams are surrounded by property that is privately owned. Access across the dam and to the immediate area has been and will continue to be restricted during construction. Following construction, the dam will only be accessible with the permission of the neighbouring landowner.

Waiting for the wolf magic to happen

Dozens of feet stop suddenly as Marena Wigmore holds up her hands. She walks ahead of the pack and stops. All eyes, but mostly all ears, are on her.

She cups her hands to her mouth and emits a low, long howl into the gathering dusk as mosquitoes dance about the gaggle of adults and children standing on the road.

There is silence.

Wigmore makes another attempt, then another. Then the magic happens. First the alpha male, Fang, begins to howl and is quickly joined by alpha female Luna. The rest of the pack joins in, including the pups with their higher pitched yips.

Some hold up their cell phones to record. Others just close their eyes, searching for some connection to the animals, and indeed, the earth around them.

Another successful wolf howl for Wigmore, just one of many employees at the Haliburton Forest and Wild Life Reserve. The wolf howl happens every Thursday night, between 8-9 p.m. until Aug. 31. It is by donation.

Before setting out, Wigmore presents a slideshow concentrating on the first year in a wolf's life.

Fang and Luna are the only mating wolves in the Forest. Between the end of January and the end of February they mate. A wolf has a gestation period of exactly 63 days and the average litter is three to five puppies. They arrive in early May at the Forest, born blind and deaf so they can adjust to the stimulating world around them for a couple of weeks. They lie in a den dug by Luna that can be as deep as eight

feet. They open their eyes after a couple of weeks and from there, "grow incredibly quickly" according to Wigmore.

At six to eight weeks old, they begin to eat solid food, including meat off the carcass.

She projects a photo of a wolf named Quinn, who at six months old, is almost full adult size.

At eight months, they join the pack hunts. This year, seven puppies were born, although three have been adopted out.

The Forest has a contest running to name them with the first letter being 'R.'

The alphas are about six years old and already there is speculation about the beta male, Onyx, and when he will become top dog.

In the meantime, they will continue to eat the beaver, deer and moose provided to them, and hunt small game in their large

Venue and volunteers ready for Forest Festival

There's one thing Lesley English can't control this week: the weather.

So she's been crossing her fingers and doing her anti-rain dance for the return of The Forest Festival.

"I am knocking on wood like crazy right now," said the festival manager in a phone interview Tuesday, a day before the first show. "So far, they're only calling for rain on one day—and it's a day we have inside

The five-day festival (Aug. 16-20) is back at the Bone Lake Amphitheatre and Logging Museum for its 10th year. It was abruptly cancelled last year after the Haliburton Forest and the Municipality of Dysart et al wound up in a court fight, resulting in an order to demolish several buildings, including the museum.

But since then, the forest has been working with the municipality to bring these buildings up to code. The forest recently received its Change of Use permit, allowing up to 400 people to gather in the museum for the festival's concerts.

Four of the seven concerts will take place at the museum, which is located at the Forest's base camp. The outdoor amphitheatre, which is a few kilometers away, seats 600.

The festival kicked off on Aug. 16 with Buffy Sainte-Marie and opening act Annie Sumi. Sainte-Marie is a Canadian icon who was inducted into the Canadian Music Hall of Fame and is an officer of the Order of

Another big name, Jimmy Rankin, hits the amphitheatre stage Aug. 17. The country artist was a member of The Rankin Family, but eventually left the group and Celtic

music for a solo career.

Other concerts at the museum include Stuart Laughton's Radio Dial on Aug. 18, Alison Young Quartet on the afternoon of Aug. 19 and Angel Forrest in the evening, and The O'Pears on the afternoon of Aug.

The festival will end with a bang as Jim Cuddy of Blue Rodeo returns to the amphitheatre for a sold-out show the night of Aug. 20. Joining him are guitarist Colin Cripps and violinist Anne Lindsay, who together form the Jim Cuddy Trio. They performed together at the venue in 2012. Cuddy also played the festival with fellow bandmate Greg Keelor in 2014.

The festival is made possible with a team of about 40 volunteers. This year, English had to find a new volunteer coordinator.

"You lose people through natural attrition," she said, adding she has a great team in place. "They're all really keen and excited."

Merchandise and CDs will be sold at the concerts and some artists will give out autographs. A snack stand will be set up and food is also available at the Cookhouse for shows at the museum.

Patrons are encouraged to carpool for the shows at the amphitheatre.

"It makes our lives easier, but it does make it easier for them too."
