

#### Businesses forecast winter of discontent

#### Chamber considers **Support Local initiative**

Despite ongoing community support, the owners of Baked and Battered have decided to close their business for the winter months. As they head into their sixth year, it's the first time they've had to do so

because of a growing number of challenges.

"We spent a lot of time thinking about it over a period of about two months," said Colby Marcellus, who owns the Haliburton business with Craig Gordon. "It was towards the end of the summer that we started to realize that this was the only thing that we could do.'

They will close the restaurant and café Oct. 17 and reopen March 1.

One of the main reasons for the closure is the provincial government's decision to increase minimum wage to \$14-an-hour on Jan. 1, 2018 and \$15-an-hour the following January. On Sunday, minimum wage increased by 20 cents, from \$11.40 per hour to \$11.60.

Overall, it's a jump of 32 per cent in less than two years.

"This just kind of hit us from left field,"

said Marcellus. "We could have kept going on without something like this happening.'

Payroll is their single largest expense. They have 20 full-time employees in the summer. That number drops to nine staff in the winter, five of whom are full-time.

But it's not just the wage hikes that make it difficult. Rising expenses include hydro, food supplies and winter maintenance.

And that's difficult to manage when there is an 80 per cent drop in business in the winter, Marcellus estimates. In the past, they had to resort to using their lines of credit to pay the bills.

In talking to other local business owners, Marcellus said they are "scrambling to get ready." There are others that plan to close, though he wouldn't say who they are.

Fortunately, his staff won't be left in the cold. McKecks Tap & Grill has offered to hire staff for that four-and-a-half month period.

"We just like to keep people employed," said Karen Frybort, the restaurant's general manager.

Frybort's management team often holds its meetings at Baked and Battered.

"We support their decision," she said. "It's difficult for any business, particularly restaurants. You have to grow your business but pull really tight during the off-season."

A recent analysis of Bill 148, otherwise known as the Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act, shows if the government were to simply implement the wage increase over five years, jobs at risk would decrease by 74 per cent in the first two years. An interim report in August, also conducted by

the Canadian Centre for Economic Analysis (CANCEA), indicated that 190 local jobs could be on the chopping block.

The Haliburton Highlands Chamber of Commerce and the Ontario Chamber of Commerce have called on the government to phase in the increase.

Richard Wannan, local chamber president, was aware of Baked and Battered's decision, but didn't know of other businesses that might be closing shop. He called it "a very unfortunate situation."

"They're a valuable business and a valuable member of the community," said Wannan. "We have to all sit back and look at how we support each other."

Should the increases go ahead as planned, the Haliburton chamber will push for a support local initiative, he said.

"The community needs to support each other should this go through. I won't say stop shopping out of town, but reduce it and support the businesses that are here."

The chamber has been discussing the initiative for the last month, said Wannan.

While he says the chamber supports liveable wages, they hope the government will adopt a common sense approach. The chamber is encouraging the public to contact Premier Kathleen Wynne and share their concerns.

#### Ministry shuts down two septic spreading fields

#### Confusion over MOECC's stance

The Ministry of Environment and Climate Change's (MOECC) process for evaluating hauled sewage disposal sites is undergoing "progressive development," according to a ministry official, but that's providing little comfort for two companies who have until Nov. 30 to find new spreading fields after recently losing their environmental compliance approvals (ECA).

The MOECC recently decided not to renew ECAs for both Haliburton Septic Pumping and Francis Thomas Contracting, and instead grant them short-term extensions until Nov. 30, according to David Bradley, the district manager for the MOECC's Peterborough office.

The ministry has recently undertaken more "thorough technical assessments to ensure environmental protection, as well as, an increased public consultation process," Bradley told *The Highlander*.

The decision to not renew his ECA approvals for his spreading field in Algonquin Highlands off Highway 118 has frustrated Dave Elstone, owner of Haliburton Septic Pumping. He said he's going to appeal the decision, and expects the hearing with the Environment and Land Tribunals Ontario to take place this month.

"The ministry is telling us that Haliburton is facing a sewage dumping crisis, but then they're closing us left, right and centre," he

The proposed expansion faced a lot of backlash from Maple Lake residents in April when it was posted on the province's environmental registry website. Many residents cited environmental concerns, the fact that the lake was at capacity and the field's proximity to surface water. More than 110 public comments were submitted.

Elstone said the status of the field or the surrounding area, including the lake, has not changed, and he was confused why the ministry provided ECA approvals for the same site more than two years ago.

"We covered all the angles back then and ensured we weren't impacting the lake at

all. So, for the ministry not to approve it again, I think it has to do with the pressure from Maple Lake residents," said Elstone.

A report from the ministry obtained by *The Highlander* said there was no evidence of sewage running off the site during heavy rain in May. A ministry official inspected the site after receiving a call from a resident who was concerned about potential flooding impacts.

Joe Cox, a controller at Thomas Contracting, said the absence of their spreading field, which was located in Algonquin Highlands, means they can't serve regular clients along Highway 118

"We'll have to refer them to someone else," he said, and pointed to Total Site Services as a likely candidate.

The company has been looking for another spreading field, but said that is becoming increasingly difficult with ministry requirements becoming more stringent.

Until a new property is found, the sewage lagoon system in Dorset, which Algonquin Highlands is looking to expand, will help fill some of the gap for clients in the township.

Cox's biggest concern is if residents continue to have a hard time finding someone to pump their septics out, they simply won't.

"I know a lot of people in the area pinch pennies to get by, and if the cost of a septic pump out goes up to where Dorset is at now, which is \$400, you may end up with people who don't pump their septic tanks and, essentially, what will happen is it will spill out onto their lots."

The township's mayor, Carol Moffatt, said landfills and sewage management are quickly becoming priorities for townships across the county.

She pointed to the county's population growth, which according to the latest census, was above the provincial average.

"All those people create garbage and flush toilets," said Moffatt. "We need to be attentive and know what's happening next."

### Minden Hills joining the mayors' club

Minden Hills has become the second municipality in the County of Haliburton to change the title of its heads of council to mayor, from reeve.

At a regular council meeting Sept. 28, councillors endorsed the change, as well as deputy reeve to deputy mayor.

The modification has not formally been made, with a further report expected on the procedure and cost, if any.

Councillor Jeanne Anthon brought the discussion to the council table. Ironically, she raised the very same issue 20 years ago when she was reeve. She said it "fizzled" then because her fellow councillors thought it was a case of selfaggrandizement.

This time around, her motion was successful.

She said that historically, reeves were heads of council in smaller municipalities. But, following amalgamation, she said they now have the same legislated authority as heads of larger municipalities.

She further noted that the Township of Algonquin Highlands has already made the change.

And, she wanted to expedite the process because, "I don't want it to become an election issue."

Anthon added the titles will now match the heads of council across Ontario.

"There's a confusion out there that doesn't have to exist," she said.

Councillor Jean Neville asked if there would be any cost to taxpayers and CAO/ treasurer Lorrie Blanchard thought it would be minimal, including some legal fees and new business cards.

Councillor Pam Sayne thought the change was long overdue and said "it will improve our communications with the rest of Ontario."

Reeve Brent Devolin said every time he represents the township outside of Haliburton County, he has to explain why he is called a reeve and it takes time away from actual municipal business.

"It's a huge impediment to getting on with the substance of what you're talking about," he said.

Devolin added he doesn't even refer to himself as a reeve outside of the county since there is no context for the term elsewhere.

"I would be very happy to see this [change]," he said.

Deputy Reeve Cheryl Murdoch joked that "over the years, I've been called many things" and deputy reeve was one of the more flattering ones, she said. She added that more important than the title is "what you do while you're here. I'll be your deputy mayor if you wish. I'm okay with it."

Highlands East council also discussed the topic on Wednesday. They decided to give the public an opportunity to provide feedback before their Nov. 1 meeting.

### Fed-up cottagers target short-term rentals

A Lake Kashagawigamog Organization complaint to Minden Hills council – that people and corporations are providing short-term rentals of lakefront properties contrary to bylaws – won't be dealt with, at least for now.

In a letter dated to council late this summer, Gary Wiles, president of the organization, said they had two concerns. The first is the potential for overuse of septic systems installed for private family dwellings. The second, improper shoreline alterations, such as docking, to make the units more renter-friendly.

"Many of these 'cottages,' most of which are two to four bedroom units, are being advertised on cottage rental sites as having capacities of 12 to 18 people," Wiles said.

"It appears this practice started many years ago with people renting out their cottage for a couple of weeks to help with expenses but has now morphed into many cottages on the lake existing solely for the rental income potential," he said.

Wiles said the organization thinks most

people don't know about municipal bylaws and the risk to the lake, and called for a public education piece by council.

He said if it's allowed to continue unchecked, with sites such as Airbnb, the potential effects on lake health "will be difficult if not impossible to reverse."

The item was addressed at Minden Hills' regular council meeting Sept. 28 by way of council accepting it as information only.

Reeve Brent Devolin said once the County of Haliburton Official Plan is approved, Minden Hills will be having a zoning and land use conversation. He said short-term rentals are one of about a dozen topics that will be discussed.

He said it was an "unbelievably complicated" area of planning, however, "in the next year, it will be part of some serious conversation."

Councillor Pam Sayne said it should be on the planning and development department and committee's radar.

Devolin, agreed, and said, "I expect most interest groups are going to weigh heavily in [on this], including the cottage associations."

### Long-time Dysart planner reflects on position

#### Colleagues and developers say Pat Martin will be hard to replace

Greg Bishop recalls a time when his company was able to perform up to 350 severances per year. Since the early 90s, that number has dwindled to about 70 or 80, he says.

Bishop, owner of Greg Bishop Surveying, says the downloading of additional planning controls and policies from the province to rural municipalities has made his company's, and many other companies', life slightly harder over the years.

But it would have been much harder without Pat Martin around.

Dysart's director of planning and development for the past 25 years is retiring at the end of this year, and Bishop says filling her shoes is not going to be easy.

"She's helped deliver a high level of consistency within the planning department in Dysart. It's really made our jobs easier dealing with the planning process through this township, over others," he says. "She has kept a pulse on the community for a while."

Maintaining that pulse and listening to public feedback is critical to her position, says Martin.

"It helps us filter out planning policy," she says. "If you looked at each individual policy in the official plan, you'll see a lot that are competing. [Public input] helps us

prioritize how to come to a decision that best addresses the policy regime."

Martin points to consistency within the municipality's staff itself, specifically Reeve Murray Fearrey, who has been in that role during Martin's entire time with Dysart.

"Having that consistency makes it very easy to provide information to council," she says. "I have a very educated council that understands the intricacies of our official plan ... they understand they work within a hierarchy where there is a policy framework we have to draft our own policies within."

Prior to hiring an official planner, the municipality was challenged on various decisions, which led to multiple Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) hearings and back-and-forths with hired consultants, who sometimes didn't understand the community's specific needs or challenges, says Fearrey.

Bringing Martin on-board was critical to Dysart's success in navigating challenging jurisdictional waters and new planning responsibilities handed down by the province.

"She does her homework," he says, adding she's never lost an OMB decision with Dysart.

Martin's leadership in developing an official plan for the municipality, and spearheading the creation of policies around water setbacks and shorelines in the county,

well before the province began mandating 30 m setbacks in 2005, are just a few reasons why she excelled as a planner, says Fearrey.

She was also immensely professional, he says.

County planner Charlsey White compliments Martin's strong communication skills and ability to disseminate information without all the

planning jargon.

She also has a great sense of humour, White adds, and it's helped foster an incredibly positive relationship.

"Her and I have had some very serious belly laughs," she says. "I joke all the time that I know where you live."

Martin lives down the street from White.
Applications for a new planner are still circulating.

#### It's time to leave small business alone

One local business has indeed been baked and battered by the provincial and federal government's nonsensical approach to reform

The owners of the popular Haliburton eatery, Baked & Battered, announced on their Facebook page Sept. 25 that they're closing for the winter.

They specifically alluded to Ontario's *Fair Workplaces*, *Better Jobs Act* in the post. They didn't talk about the federal government's plan to eliminate or restrict how some business owners save on taxes, but it may well have factored into their decision as well.

Owners Craig Gordon and Colby Marcellus spoke out publicly about the provincial changes when they wrote a letter to the editor of *The Highlander* earlier this year. They said the coming \$15-an-hour minimum wage increase was going to impact their business.

It comes to a place where the seasonal nature of business is a real challenge. We boom during the summer, and many bust during the winter

The owners said, as a start-up, in a century old building with lots of expenses and maintenance, steadily increasing supply costs and a significant jump in the minimum wage about to come about, they're finding that they need to take

action to make sure the business remains solid and healthy so that they can continue on as a Haliburton destination we can all be proud of.

They've said their four-and-a-half month closure will help other Haliburton restaurants who struggle in winter. There'll be less competition. As a display of business camaraderie, McKecks said it will hire any Baked & Battered staff who are looking for work.

Premier Kathleen Wynne and her Liberals have to take a hit on this one. When her party moved on sweeping labour reforms, the business community warned it would be badly hurt, and it has been. Some businesses said they would be forced to close altogether. In the case of Baked & Battered, thankfully, it's only a winter break. Others said they will have no choice but to raise their prices to deal with the first phase of the minimum wage hike, which comes into effect this January. We'll soon see if those predictions come true.

And, now, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and his government have appeared to jump on the small business-bashing bandwagon. In short, the feds' plan is to eliminate or restrict how some business owners save on taxes. What's irksome about this is small business in Haliburton county isn't getting rich, and they're hardly squirrelling away

money to dodge the tax man. The federal government has time to turn the clock back on these proposed changes and, simply put, it must.

As for the province's Bill 148, the Wynne government must take note of CANCEA's peer-

reviewed analysis that came out last week. It says if the minimum wage increase was implemented over five years, instead of the next 15 months, jobs at risk would decrease by 74 per cent in the first two years.

The interim report released this past August found that 190 jobs would be at risk in Haliburton County. Slashing that by 74 per cent could mean 140 fewer jobs at risk. While that still leaves 50 jobs on shaky ground, it's better than nearly 200.

As other businesses begin to announce seasonal closures, complete closures and higher prices, we dearly hope the premier is paying attention.

It's time to leave small business alone.

#### Support kidpreneurs

"Build your business around passion because there is no sense running a business you don't enjoy."

These wise words come from Erik Morrison from Wilberforce who owns Erikord Survival. The company makes paracord survival bracelets. Erik started his business at age 10 and his story is an example of how a kid can be a successful entrepreneur with just a little help and a lot of drive.

Nearly two years ago, I wrote a column about children whose parents own small businesses. I talked to these kids about what it's like to be living with parents who are their own boss. The ins and outs of running your own company, setting your own hours and learning how to make it all work. Well, in this article, I switch from the parents owning the shop to the kids. I re-interviewed these youth and a few new ones, to see what it is that drives them to be their own boss.

These companies are an interesting range: lemonade stand, car wash, dog walking and petting, babysitting, jewelry-making, face-painting, cutting grass and yard work, tutoring, soapmaking, acting and modelling.

We all need a bit of help and running a

kid's company requires a helping hand from the adults in your life. From start to finish, you need their support and their deep pockets. The loan in the beginning to purchase your materials and get things rolling is a necessity. Once you have your prototypes and posters ready, you need help advertising and getting to and from your new job, be it a ride to babysitting or into town to pick up more supplies. Parents and adults will be your number one fans and customers. I have appreciated all the adults in my life for their support and encouragement, even when they didn't need yet another elastic snake or that time I washed an adult friend's car with a wire scrubby and I still got paid with a smile.

After chatting with CRA (Canadian Revenue Agency), I learned that there is no age limit on being a kidpreneur. You can start your business when you're six or when you're 16. Did you know that buying from a kidpreneur is good for your wallet? Kids do not have to charge HST unless they make over \$30,000 annually. #### Insurance change makes it easier to rent Minden facilities

It might soon be easier for individuals, businesses, service clubs, and groups to rent out municipal facilities, such as the community centre, in Minden Hills.

The cost of insurance has acted as a deterrent in the past. However, the township is looking into changing its insurance policy in future to allow more weddings and Jack and Jill's, writers groups, service clubs, fitness providers, quit shows, figure skating and tournaments.

In a report to the Sept. 14 committee of the whole meeting, director of community services, Mark Coleman, said it's known as the annual low-risk facility program.

"This would be an additional premium to the township's general policy and directs liability away from the township's main policy," he said.



Coleman added, "the annual low-risk user facility program provides coverage for low, municipality is \$2,484. medium and high-risk events controlled by third party renters of municipallyowned facilities. The policy automatically covers the third party renter as the named insured and names the municipality as the additional insured. These user groups would not have to seek out and potentially incur additional/prohibitive insurance costs to cover their activities."

Coleman said the additional cost to the

Council officially moved on the recommendation at its Sept. 28 meeting – for the provision of a local community general liability policy, providing \$5 million coverage. It still needs to figure out where the money will come from.

Coun. Jean Neville said "it's been painful in the past, to try to explain to people that unless they have insurance, they can't use

our facilities."

Coun. Pam Sayne agreed, wondering if the township could cover the additional cost in its budget. She thinks the change will benefit a lot of Minden Hills ratepayers.

And Coun. Jeanne Anthon was anxious to know when the expanded insurance would be in place.

Coleman told the Sept. 28 meeting it would be two weeks to a month.

#### Hometown Hockey comes at a price

County officials said they got a surprise last week when they found out they had to contribute to signage for Hometown Hockey.

Director of tourism, Amanda Virtanen, told the Sept. 27 county council meeting, there were two quotes, the lowest for about \$10,000, but she didn't think they would have to spend the entire amount.

Dysart et al Reeve Murray Fearrey, while supportive of the event and keen to have it promoted, also said his municipality would have staff available 24/7 from Thursday to Sunday of the Oct. 14-15 weekend that Hometown Hockey is coming to Haliburton.

Algonquin Highlands Mayor Carol Moffatt said when the county first discussed hosting Hometown Hockey, she was led to believe it was "a well-organized machine that does all the work."

Other county councillors queried who would pay for security.

County CAO Mike Rutter said the county always expected some costs associated with the two-day hockey festival. However, he said he thought it was worth the investment since millions of people will be

exposed to the "Haliburton brand" during the event. He said it was an opportunity too good to be missed.

Rutter said Rogers is taking care of most of the event costs and organization.

"Our job is to get people there. We need to create an atmosphere. It's a big event. It's a stretch for us. I think we have to rise to the challenge."

Moffatt said she thinks the event is "great ... but there had been a bit of an information vacuum.'

But Virtanen said they were at the mercy of Rogers' schedule.

Fearrey said it would be the biggest thing ever for Haliburton ever and Rutter enthused "it's going to be great."

County council also formally endorsed the appointment of a local organizing committee for the event. (Lisa Gervais)

#### Housing plan will offer incentives for builders

#### By Mark Arike

With the help of a consulting firm, the Kawartha Lakes Haliburton Housing Corporation recently wrapped up its brainstorming sessions with stakeholders to develop an affordable housing framework for local municipalities.

And it's been a very valuable exercise, according to corporation CEO Hope Lee.

"Progress to date has been successful and what we were aiming for," Lee told *The Highlander*. "It was an important step in a

variety of ways."

Using "some administration dollars" from the City of Kawartha Lakes, Christine Pachini and Johana Hashim of SHS Consulting were hired to help develop the framework. Lee explained it's a toolbox of incentives available to private developers to establish more affordable housing in Kawartha Lakes and Haliburton County. Some examples include waiving or reducing municipal planning and building fees, offering municipal grants or loans,

and dedicating surplus lands to affordable housing projects.

Five sessions were held between August and September with municipal staff, councillors, builders, developers and representatives of non-profit organizations.

"Municipal staff needed to help us analyze and prioritize close to 30 different tools, and non-profit and developers helped us to understand if we were recommending tools they could use," she said.

The framework, along with the cost

and impact to the municipality, will be presented to councils for adoption at the end of next year or early 2019, said Lee.

Although Lee didn't elaborate on the cost of the project, she called it a "significant project for the city and the county" that "will assist to encourage a range of affordable options in the rental market and hopefully within the ownership market as well."

The project is part of the 10-year Housing and Homelessness Plan.

#### Few show up for recycling workshop

Recycling information sessions held in Highlands East in August were poorly attended. Six people, including two councillors and the municipality's environmental supervisor, attended an event in Cardiff. A lone municipal employee showed up to a session in Gooderham.

"It was unfortunate," said Joanne Vanier, community economic development and committee coordinator, at a recent council meeting. "It seems that the people who do recycle don't come out to information sessions and people who don't recycle aren't interested in learning more

information."

Coun. Cam McKenzie was one of the councillors who attended the Cardiff event. As a self-described "average recycler," he said he learned some valuable information.

"It's unfortunate that we didn't have a better turnout," said McKenzie. "We tried and I don't know how we turn that around."

He suggested spreading the information through a newsletter. Reeve Dave Burton recommended passing out material to landfill attendants to hand out.

Deputy Reeve Suzanne Partridge, the other councillor in attendance, said it offered "really good education for us."

"I took my recycling with me and I put some things in that I was sure weren't recyclable, that I don't ordinarily put in there, and found out they were," she said, adding she's passed on tips to others since then

Partridge thought it would be wise to get Waste Connections Canada to better educate landfill attendants about recycling. A representative from the company provided information at the sessions.

According to its website, the company offers waste collection, transfer, disposal and recycling services in the U.S. and Canada.

## Essonville church gets new ramp

The elderly and people with disabilities will now find it easier to get into the Essonville Historic Church in Highlands Fast

In early August, two part-time municipal staff designed and installed an accessibility ramp with the help of two summer students. It cost the municipality \$3,700 but \$5,000 was budgeted for the project.

"They've done an excellent job," said property supervisor Jim Alden during a recent council meeting. He was also involved in the project.

The ramp makes it safer for visitors to enter the church, he told *The Highlander*.

"We put the ramp in so you could get to the church from the parking lot. This way you don't need to go on [the] highway as there is a bad corner there."

Alden said he's received "nothing but positive feedback regarding the improved accessibility and appearance."

Wheelchairs and walkers can fit on it, said Alden.

Located on County Road 4, the church was established in 1888. It was the first church build in the township of Monmouth, according to the municipality's website. The property is owned by the municipality.

#### Official Plan close to being finalized

The County of Haliburton is close to finalizing its Official Plan.

Director of planning, Charlsev White, told the Sept. 27 county council meeting that the Ministry of Municipal Affairs had returned the county's draft OP with 13 modifications.

"For the most part, I do not see anything contentious," she said of the changes. She did say one big provincial policy shift means municipalities must require

30-metre septic setbacks for new lot creation and development.

White said that overall, the reaction to the draft document was good news and the county anticipates it can make the changes quickly and return the plan to the ministry by the end of this week.

#### County building needs new roof

The county administration building on Newcastle Street in Minden is in need of major roof repairs.

#### County in brief

Director of public works, Craig Douglas, said one section has about 10-year-old asphalt, another 30-year-old rubber membrane roofing. He said they'd been leaking for about two years.

The estimate to fix up the flat roof is approximately \$37,800 plus tax and the job will go to ICI Roofing Ltd. of Peterborough.

He recommended funding come from the unused budget for the overall building renovation, a result of the social services department relocating to the administration building. (County council briefs compiled by Lisa Gervais)



#### **Province** and Carillion to part ways

This will be the last winter that Carillion plows highways 35 and 118 in Haliburton County.

The province and the multinational company recently cancelled their 11-year contract for the Huntsville district, which includes the county, five years early. It's been described as a mutual decision in media reports, but further details have not been revealed.

In recent years, local residents have expressed their displeasure with the company's winter maintenance of these roads. In 2015, MPP Laurie Scott took their concerns to the company and Ministry of Transportation (MTO)

In an interview, County Warden Brent Devolin said he has more questions than answers at this point.

"Obviously in this part of Ontario, we have been unhappy. That's no secret," said Devolin.

He wants to know why the province is getting out of the contract and expressed concern with its duration.

"That's a very, very long time," said Devolin. "I'd have been much happier with five [years]."

Craig Douglas, director of public works for the county, doesn't anticipate this will impact his department's operations.

'MTO and county operations are mutually exclusive," said Douglas.

In the winter, his staff are responsible for maintaining county roads 21, 121, 503 and others.

In mid-September, the ministry posted a request for proposals for a new service provider. A new provider is expected to start Sept. 1, 2018.

Devolin said county council will discuss the matter at a future meeting.



#### Third SPARC symposium moves to Cobalt

For the first time, the SPARC symposium will take place outside of Haliburton County.

The third event of its kind will be held in Cobalt, Ont. from May 24-27, 2018.

SPARC, which stands for Supporting Performing Arts in Rural Communities, put on its first symposium in the spring of 2014 at the Haliburton School of Art and Design. The second symposium took place last year at the Pinestone Resort. Both events united people involved in the performing arts to discuss opportunities and challenges they face in rural areas. Participants came from across Canada and the U.S.

SPARC's mission is to "connect creators, producers, presenters and animateurs to sustain and grow the performing arts in rural and remote communities."

Chris Lynd, chair of the SPARC committee, believes Cobalt will be a good location for the symposium.

"Our committee had a chance to visit Cobalt and loved the enthusiasm of the planning group we met," said Lynd. "The area is deep in history and the community is embracing it in many ways, including the performing arts. The fact that they have connections with French and Indigenous people is very important in reaching performing arts people from across the province and growing the SPARC network."

Cobalt, Brockville and Simcoe County all applied to host the event. The committee chose Cobalt for several reasons, said Lynd. For example, the host organization, Pied Piper Kidshows, has been around for many years and the community has a "deep cultural history that has influenced

In the past, several representatives from Haliburton County's performing arts scene have attended the symposium. At this point, Lynd isn't sure if the move will result in a lower turnout from the area.

"I'm not sure how it will impact local people in the performing arts, but I do know that if they can make it they

#### Hydro costs continue to hammer local health services

Despite a \$31,000 surplus after the summer, the Haliburton Highlands Health Services (HHHS) continues to be hammered by hydro costs.

"We are the only hospital in our [Central East Local Health Integration Network] (LHIN) that continues to face cost pressures from hydro," said finance committee member Kathy Newton, the board's chief financial officer and director of finance, at a recent board meeting in

Mitigation strategies to curb hydro costs are being explored, Newton said.

After the meeting, hospital CEO Carolyn Plummer said examples could include identifying high-use appliances, fixtures and equipment and whether or not the hospital can upgrade to a model of "higher efficiency" or alter how staff use them.

"We are the only hospital in the LHIN that deals directly with Hydro One; all the others are in communities that benefit from local or municipal utility companies," Plummer told The Highlander.

Over the past two years, she added, the hospital has seen an increase of 60 per cent in hydro rates, despite an increase in usage of only 11 per cent, coming from overall growth and expansion of services.

Meanwhile, emergency room visits were up in both Haliburton and Minden, according to a report from the medical advisory committee.

Plummer also highlighted the hospital's new chief nursing executive, Laura Green, whose experience in rural health centres

will be a great asset.

"She's worked in both small and large hospitals, and has a strong understanding of the type of work we're trying to do," said Plummer.

The board also received the resignation of long-time board member Dale Robinson. Members acknowledged his "significant and invaluable contributions to HHHS.

HHHS receives annual funding from the Central East LHIN through the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care.

### Fashion Fallies back on the catwalk

After a seven-year hiatus, Fashion Fallies is making its return to the runway.

On the evening of Nov. 10 at the Haliburton School of Art and Design, models will sport wearable art made by members of the community. In addition to the choreographed show, the event will include surprise performances and a silent auction of unique hand-painted garments.

Erin Lynch, a member of the organizing committee, helped revive the popular event.

"Even now that the Art Hive is closed, there are people in the community that would say to me, will there ever be something like that again," said Lynch, who is also a board member of the Arts Council Haliburton Highlands and works at the college.

The annual show got its start at The Art Hive in Carnarvon. Lynch was a founding member of the organization, formed by the Maple Lake Artisans Collective. It was a gallery and venue for events such as Fashion Fallies. It permanently closed January of 2015.

The non-profit arts council was recently looking for a signature event, and that's when Lynch approached Fashion Fallies founder Sandi Luck.


