



### Third time unlucky for condo site

It appears a third attempt to build a condo at 1 Sunnyside St. in Haliburton has failed.

A 'for sale' sign recently appeared on the property and the players involved in the project aren't talking. Several email and phone messages left with consultant Sharon Snitman were not returned. Real estate agent Mark Dennys said he was unable to comment.

In an interview, Dysart Reeve Murray Fearrey told *The Highlander* he has spoken to the owners about the property.

"They've had two or three buyers, but the economy doesn't work so they're looking

at other proposals now," said Fearrey. In July of last year, Snitman along with builder Peter Schoettle and business partner Stephen Lee told council about their plans for the development, dubbed One Sunnyside. It was set to feature 83 units facing Head Lake and many amenities such as a 3,500 sq. ft. "Art of

Living Centre" for activities and exercise classes, and a lap pool.

In 2015, Stephen Mak, owner of an architectural firm in Toronto, presented his plans to build a four-storey condo on the property, called Bluewater. It didn't happen because he couldn't get financing, said

Snitman in a previous interview.

But long before Mak and the most recent builders arrived, Snitman was involved in trying to bring a condo to town. About nine years ago, a much larger 150-unit development known as Watercolours was in the works under Mady Development. In 2013, the company listed the property for \$1.95 million, saying it "no longer fit" with their corporate strategy.

Dysart's planning director Pat Martin confirmed last week she hasn't had any communication with the

developers since their presentation last year. They intended on tearing down the old Fleming College building—but it still stands.

"The building is still there and the site plan agreement file has been inactive for several years," said Martin.

The property is currently listed with Chaim Talpalar of Harvey Kalles Real Estate Ltd. Brokerage for close to \$2.5 million. It's about four acres, according to the description, and is located across the road from Granite Cove, one of two existing condo developments in Haliburton by Greystone Construction.

### Deal allows biochar project to go forward

### Haliburton Forest pleased with outcome, some residents disappointed

After a rocky start to an Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) hearing at the Dysart council chambers Aug. 29, appellants opposing the municipality's decision to grant a zoning amendment for a wood-processing facility on Kennaway Road, reached an agreement with the municipality, allowing the project to proceed.

OMB chair Mary-Anne Sills had a strong message for the general public and legal counsel during the hearing Tuesday morning, a day before the settlement was reached between both parties.

"I don't want the public to be misled about the board's jurisdiction," said Sills Aug. 29.

The point was raised after Peter Pickfield, legal counsel for the four appellants, continued to raise potential air and noise impacts associated with the proposal.

"The board has no authority to say 'I don't think they've [Haliburton Forest Biochar] met those conditions.' That's out of the board's hands," she said.

Sills repeated the point several times during the first day of the hearing, and at one point, asked how the facts presented to the board by Pickfield and his witnesses, were relevant to the zoning amendment.

After the hearing Tuesday, all parties met to reach an agreement about the zoning amendment, which Dysart green-lit earlier this vea

"We're really happy to get back to work and are ready to do what we're supposed to be doing ... I think we've been very transparent throughout this process," said Malcolm Cockwell, managing director of Haliburton Forest, after the second day of the hearing, which lasted no more than five minutes.

The change to the amendment is minimal, but now restricts Haliburton Forest Biochar (HFB) to build the facility on the southern portion of the property currently zoned extractive industrial, and further limits it to the manufacturing of wood products and wood processing.

The initial amendment would have allowed HFB to build on the northern part of the property if they wanted to.

Laurie Wheeler, one of the appellants from Drag Lake, said she's very disappointed with the outcome.

"By moving back [further from the road] it allows them to build something much bigger. We have a major chemical manufacturing plant coming to Haliburton," she said.

Wheeler maintained there are still many unanswered questions surrounding the project, especially when it comes to environmental impacts relating to air and noise

Land-use planning expert Allan Ramsay,

who represented the appellants, said during the hearing Aug. 29 that there hasn't been enough information presented by HFB that would prove the zoning amendment will "not create land-use conflicts with existing nearby permitted sensitive land uses."

In addition, he said the proposed rezoning of the subject lands from extractive industrial to industrial does not conform to the land-use designation policies outlined by the municipality's rural land use designations.

"The proposed use would not represent good planning and should not be approved," he told Sills.

Environmental Compliance Approvals (ECA) for air and noise are being reviewed by the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MOECC). If they don't satisfy the MOECC, the project, which Haliburton Forest introduced to the public last November, will not go forward.

Cockwell said he expects those approvals by mid-September.

That means a two-day hockey festival culminating in a live broadcast Sunday of the Vegas Golden Knights versus Boston Bruins TV match-up.

It also means hockey broadcasting legend Ron MacLean is coming to town with co-host Tara Slone.

With an assist from Haliburton hockey hero Matt Duchene, the nation's hockey spotlight will fall directly on the county – with claims it will pump \$1M into the local economy.

The Highland Storm Minor Hockey Association, for one, can't wait.

"This is great ... great for our communities ... great for our kids," Rich Smith told *The Highlander* this week.

"I look forward to seeing our children getting involved as much as possible to celebrate our towns, and our national game. Can you imagine the thrill of seeing

rich hockey history and we're so proud to have NHL players, both current and alumni, hail from our beautiful community. We look forward to sharing our region with the rest of Canada during the broadcast this fall," he said. The game will be broadcast on Sportsnet.

In addition to Colorado Avalanche centre, Duchene, who is an Olympic and world champion, the area's hockey alumni include Cody Hodgson, Bernie Nicholls, Ron Stackhouse and Dysart Coun. Walt McKechnie. Of course, it is also home to former NHL referee and past head of Hockey Hall of Fame Ian "Scotty" Morrison.

Full details of the weekend have not been announced but director of tourism, Amanda Virtanen, said, "the whole thing is free, with the exception of some food, which I think will be a low cost. It's a community gathering. No tickets required." She said she would be meeting with Rogers' representatives again today (Aug. 31).

Autumn Wilson, manager of the Haliburton Highlands Chamber of Commerce, is the volunteer coordinator of the event. She said she is looking for about 40 helpers.

"There are different positions available, such as people

for the ball hockey tournament, people to serve hot chocolate, parking attendants, etc. Volunteers have to be a minimum of 16 years of age," she said.

Niagara Falls is the first stop on the Oct. 7-8 weekend. "This tour is about discovering all the ways that hockey is woven into the fabric of our nation, and these opening communities will set the stage for a phenomenal season of doing just that," McLean said in a press release.

County CAO Mike Rutter tells us that Rogers Hometown Hockey first approached the county in February or March about hosting one of its shows. Warden Brent Devolin said it took the county about "two milliseconds" to say "yes."

Then, there were complications.

First up was the Feb. 28 NHL trade deadline. We all know that Matt Duchene was perhaps tops of the rumour mill. Avs GM Joe Sakic said he'd entertain trade offers and Duchene said he was open to a trade. The Columbus Blue Jackets were supposedly in hot pursuit but the asking price may have been too high. The trade deadline came and went and Duchene remained an Av.

Next up was a decision about whether or not NHL players were going to compete in the 2018 winter Olympics in South Korea. If they were, what kind of disruption would that mean for the 2017-2018 season? It was really only after that question was answered – they're not going – that the NHL could announce its upcoming schedule and Rogers its season's

Through it all, a lot of local people had to keep it under their hats although we've heard there may have been leaks.

Officially, it was embargoed until last Friday morning's announcement.

### Dysart cat bylaw mooted after complaint

Eagle Lake residents are hoping for swift action to eliminate a cat odour problem in their neighbourhood, but according to the Municipality of Dysart, a quick solution is

Sandra Grove spoke to councillors during a council meeting Aug. 21 and explained how a neighbouring home – which according to her and other residents may be housing up to 20 cats – is affecting people's ability to enjoy the outdoors because of the extreme odours.

It's been a recurring problem for more than a decade, said

"Spring is when the smell got really bad," she said. "We can't spend time outdoors because of the smell."

But there's nothing that can be done about it now, said Kristen Boylan, Dysart's bylaw enforcement officer.

"The municipality does not have a bylaw in place with respect to cats," Boylan told The Highlander.

This was her first formal complaint about cats since being appointed last year.

If a bylaw is passed – which would only happen if the house in question doesn't take immediate steps to mitigate the problem – fines will likely be implemented.

"I cannot determine what future fines might be when council at this time has not directed the draft of a bylaw,"

Limiting the number of cats in a household is another possibility, said Dysart Reeve Murray Furray.

"We'll look at those options," he said.

The Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge District Health unit (HKPR) is unable to do anything about it either, said Neha Gandhi, the area health inspector for Dysart.

"The responsibility falls back to the owner to clean it up," said Gandhi, referring to cats defecating on private property.

Bites and scratches from a feral cat, however, is something the health unit can follow up on, because of the potential for rabies, she said.

The Health Protection and Promotion Act demands anyone with a pet that has bitten, is suspected of having bitten a person, or is suspected by the medical officer of health of having rabies, must "provide the medical officer of health with such information and assistance with respect to the animal as the medical officer of health requires."

Other municipalities in the county don't have specific bylaws in place for cats either, but do require dog owners to tag their dogs.

Highlands East will deal with feral cats on an "as needed basis," according to Wayne Galloway, the municipality's bylaw enforcement officer.

"Any feral cats that are trapped are turned over to Cottage Country Cat Rescue, and the costs to have them spayed or neutered are paid for by the municipality," he said.

### Master's student says wage increase critical

Despite the worries of some local business owners, Jessica Knot believes research supports a minimum wage increase and says it's critical to help those who struggle to put food on the table.

"Food insecurity is caused by poverty," said Knot during her presentation on Aug. 23 at the Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge District Health Unit (HKPR) in Haliburton.

"It's not an issue of not knowing how to cook or how to budget; it's an issue of income."

Knot, a master's student in public health at Brock University, helped develop an advocacy campaign on food insecurity during her internship with the HKPR. It will launch this fall.

Based on a Peterborough report, the living wage for their area is \$17.65 per hour. This is \$2.65 per hour more than the provincial government's plan to increase to \$15 in 2019. Minimum wage is currently \$11.40 per hour.

Local business owners have spoken out against the future increases, saying it's too much too soon. The Haliburton Highlands Chamber of Commerce, an advocacy group for businesses, wants to see a more gradual phase-in.

But Knot says if these low-income earners are paid more, they will spend that money locally.

"We know that people who are living on a low income spend more," she said. "They spend more than high income earners, especially in a local area. Boosting the minimum wage ... that extra \$4 is going to be spent on food, clothes and entertainment. It's going to be spent on things here."

She cited a letter in which more than 50 Canadian economists support a minimum wage increase of \$15.

"We need a change toward a wage that allows people to

pay their bills and still afford to buy food," she said.

Knott adds that other changes to the Fair Workplace, Better Jobs Act will improve working conditions for people who face precarious employment, such as parttime, temporary or contract workers. These jobs generally pay low wages and have little or no benefits.

Food insecurity is defined as the "inadequate or insecure access to food due to financial constraints," explained Knot. In Canada, more than four million people are affected. One in six children live in a food insecure household. A total of 13.5 per cent of households in the HKPR region are food insecure, which is higher than the provincial average of 11.7 per cent.

While they are important, charity programs like food banks aren't the solution and in fact, give people a false sense that something is being done, she said.

Food insecurity often leads physical and mental health issues, she said.

Knot touched on the basic income guarantee, a threeyear pilot project being rolled out by the provincial government in Hamilton, Lindsay and Thunder Bay. It will ensure eligible families or individuals meet a minimum income level, regardless of employment status. The guaranteed minimum for a single person is just under \$17,000 annually and \$24,000 per couple. People with disabilities could get an additional \$500 per month.

"People who are part of this pilot are going to have the opportunity to gain an education or start working," she said.

It will measure food insecurity, the health of participants, education, employment and labour market participation.

The HKPR's campaign will launch at hkpr.on.ca. A video called "Rethink Poverty," featuring local stories, is on their YouTube channel.

# Councillors push for progress on county transportation project

It's been about 18 months since a rural transportation project launched in the Highlands. And nine months ago, a transportation summit was held in Haliburton to turn talk into action.

Since then, a transportation task force has been working on developing a long-term transportation plan for the county. It's up to them to figure out what transportation models are best for the area to help solve an age-old dilemma.

"We have come together believing that transportation is an issue of health, equity and independence," project coordinator Tina Jackson told county council on Aug. 23. "All of us are contributing expertise to continue to move the needle on an issue that has been part of a community conversation for many years."

The task force is comprised of businesspeople, concerned residents, the Haliburton Highlands Chamber of Commerce and government officials, among others.

But County Warden Brent Devolin wants to see some tangible results soon.

"This has been studied for a long time and it continues to be studied," said Devolin. "There's some great things ... but it's time for the rubber to meet the road."

He said council would "like to see a good plan" before next spring.

Coun. Murray Fearrey added it's time to "see something concrete"

"Is there one specific thing that's happened to help transportation or are we just meeting?" asked Fearrey. "I'm not trying to be critical here, but, yes, I am."

In May of 2016, the Rural Transportation Options (RTO) committee launched the Haliburton County Community



Transportation Hub website and phone line. It connects people with existing transportation services in the county. A few months later, they created a website called Haliburton Rideshare. It's a place where residents can find lifts and offer them to others.

Since it went live, the rideshare website has had more than 7,000 views. A total of 154 rides have been posted and as of Aug. 23 there were 110 registered users.

Fearrey admitted transportation is a very challenging issue to solve in such a large county.

"I don't envy what you're trying to do; it's not simple," he said. The committee has developed a one-year work plan. Its priorities were identified at the summit along with input from several stakeholders

They identified a gap in employment transportation in the county, "largely because the people who are in that age group (30-55) often fall between the cracks for services that are currently available," said Sue Shikaze, transportation task force co-chair. "It's been identified as a priority for business and employers, and to address outcomes of the Poverty Reduction Strategy."

Employment and literary service clients are being surveyed to identify their transportation needs, according to a report. In July, RTO submitted a funding application to the province's Local Poverty Reduction Fund. They are seeking more than \$600,000 over a period of 28 months. The money would be used to examine ways to support people to access employment, education and training.

"If we're successful ... that's specifically to fund a service, and to evaluate its effectiveness," said Shikaze.

In September and October, they will survey chamber members about transportation challenges and opportunities, she said. A public awareness campaign will be launched soon via social and print media.


A business case with transportation model recommendations will be presented to council "probably in September," she said.

The transportation project has received \$127,000 in funding—\$77,000 from the Ministry of Transportation for its first two years and a \$50,000 grant extension in the spring. The County of Haliburton applied for the latest installment.

The task force isn't a committee of council, but it reports to it and develops options and recommendations. Devolin and Coun. Liz Danielsen said the county needs to continue to be kept in the loop.

"Ultimately, when it comes to money, it comes back to us," said Danielsen. "When that's the case, I think it's important that we continue to be involved in ongoing discussions and planning."

# Rail trail detour expected to cause delays

County councillors and staff are concerned about cars travelling along the Haliburton County Rail Trail next month because of construction work on two bridges.

It will take about six minutes—at a maximum speed of 20 km/h—for motorists to take the 2.1-kilometre detour, according to Craig Douglas, director of public works.

"I'm certain that there are some people within the county that will be extremely unhappy to hear about this," said Coun. Liz Danielsen during an Aug. 23 meeting.

Brent Devolin, county warden and reeve of Minden Hills, said he expects his phone will "light up."

"We're all concerned about how this is going to work," admitted Douglas.

There are two one-lane bridges on Ritchie Falls in Minden that must undergo rehabilitation. The township has explored other options such as installing a temporary bailey bridge, but the trail ended up being the only possibility, reported Douglas.

The county will work with the township to open up the edges of the trail to allow drivers to pull over if they encounter an oncoming vehicle.

"We are currently performing some work on [the trail] to allow safe passage," Travis Wilson, road superintendent for Minden Hills, told *The Highlander*.

This includes brushing about five feet on either side of the trail.

The county owns the trail and has outlined a few requirements the township must meet. For example, they have requested additional insurance coverage and that the township look after traffic control and safety.

Coun. Suzanne Partridge asked if the detour would be wide enough for emergency vehicles. Douglas said it will be.

The work, which will begin mid-September and is expected to take two to three weeks, to complete, said Wilson.

### West Guilford bridge in need of urgent repairs

It will cost about \$100,000 to replace expansion joints on the West Guilford bridge, located on Kennisis Lake Road. County council recently awarded the job to MTM-2 Contracting Inc., a company based in Milton.

"It's a fairly urgent project," said Craig Douglas, the county's director of public

The joint "is the assembly that allows the bridge deck to expand or contract without affecting the rest of the structure," according to Douglas's report. It's been an "ongoing maintenance issue." Last winter, a plow caught a piece of the metal joint, resulting in the emergency removal of a large piece of it.

The work will begin late fall, and workers will tackle one side of the bridge at a time. This means only one lane will be open to traffic for about a month, confirmed Douglas.

Only two proposals were received for the project. The other bid was \$170,000.

"The scope of work varied slightly but the cost to carry out the work [was] significantly different," he said.

Cost savings from repairs to the Dorset bridge are being allocated to the project. (*Mark Arike*).

### Tourists make good use of info centre

There are just as many people making their way to Highlands East's information centre as last year.

There were 184 visitors between May and June, which is two less than in 2016. Last month, up to July 24, there were 227 visitors compared to 316 for the entire month in the previous year.

The majority of visitors were tourists—a total of 248 in June and July compared to 147 permanent and seasonal residents. There were also about a dozen telephone inquiries.

"We have great teams in each of our organizations. I don't think that will change in Minden."



What I've sort of done with that is I really focus on my time in the car being proactive and using that time wisely so, I do a ton of business on the phone, making contact with different contractors, vendors and staff through the day. When I'm in the store, I'm in the store."

He isn't afraid of competition, either, and thinks they can find their niche because, "we believe in having great teams, providing excellent customer service and competitive pricing ... and we want to offer new and exciting things."

### SIRCH finds new home base in Haliburton

Five months after selling their property on County Road 21, SIRCH Community Services has found a new space in the village of Haliburton. The organization will relocate to unit four at 49 Maple Avenue in

"I'm happy," said Gena Robertson, executive director of SIRCH.

An internal committee explored different locations and they looked at them before making a decision, explained Robertson. Although *The Highlander* has been unable to confirm who purchased their longtime property, realtor Andrew Hodgson said an existing business would be moving in. The deal is expected to close at the end of next month. SIRCH, a non-profit organization that runs more than 20 programs and services in Haliburton County, has been

operating from the County Road 21 location since the late 1990s. But it got its start in the village, next to the ambulance base.

They will be renting the new space, which is the former location of the Haliburton County Development Corporation. It's on the second floor of the building.

"I think it will be great," she said. "We have sight vision to SIRCH Central. We are in the same little complex as Ontario Works/City of Kawartha Lakes [Social Services] and Fleming CREW. It's perfect."

It will be easier for people to access their services once they are in town, she added. The move won't affect the services they provide.

"We'll have all the same services and there's some new stuff coming up."

A move-in date hasn't been set but they will be able to start painting and setting up in September, said Robertson.



#### Money for Howland Junction bridge and Wilberforce Curling Club

Mayor of Trent Lakes Bev Matthews, Jamie Schmale, MP for Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock, Kim Rudd, MP for Northumberland-Peterborough South and County Warden and Minden Hills Reeve Brent Devolin pose Aug. 24 in front of a projected image of the recently-repaired Howland Junction bridge on the Haliburton Rail Trail. \$100,000 of the \$300,000 repair job came to the County of Haliburton from the federal government's Canada 150 Community Infrastructure Program. The two MPs also visited Wilberforce, where Highlands East received \$23,888 in federal funding for a \$47,775 improvement at the curling club. Matthews was in attendance as the Municipality of Trent Lakes got \$74,920 to put towards \$224,760 in repairs to the Galway Community Hall HVAC. Lindsay's Academy Threate Foundation also got \$110,000 to put towards rehabilitation of theatre seating, a \$261,879 job. Money goes towards renovations, expansions and improvements of existing community and cultural infrastructure. (Lisa Gervais)

#### Most HE septic systems pass test

This summer, two student inspectors in Highlands East visited 910 properties on seven lakes as part of a new septic re-inspection program.

And the results are positive: the majority of residents have septic systems deemed low risk. At the beginning of August, after completing 666 inspections, Rob Carter and Adam Bird reported that about 74 per cent of properties were in the low risk category, 12 per cent were moderate risk, eight per cent were high risk and four per cent made the very high risk category. A damaged or corroded tank, damaged filter bed and visible effluent are part of the high risk criteria. The program included Little Glamor Lake, Glamor Lake, Billings Lake, Stormy Lake, Tamarack Lake, Trooper Lake and Koshlong Lake. During a recent council meeting, Coun. Cecil Ryall said he's received lots of positive feedback.

"I'm getting really great reviews from how you've handled it," he said.

Laurie Devolin, chief building official,

recently echoed that sentiment.

"We have had a lot of positive feedback from property owners, even those who realize that their systems need to be upgraded," she said on Monday.

Initial assessments have been completed with pictures, site plans and site reports. Results have been sent to property owners. Bird is staying a bit longer to help with re-inspections and distributing letters. People are urged to return their questionnaires. The municipality plans to work with property owners in the high risk category.

"Our goal is to work with the property owners to achieve compliance with the building code without taking any action against them unless it becomes absolutely necessary," said Devolin.

The program is to help keep the municipality's lakes, rivers, streams and groundwater pollution-free by examining existing septic systems since they can impact the surface and groundwater environment. (Mark Arike).

#### Water system repairs moving slowly

It's been about two months since Cardiff's water system began undergoing repairs. The project is supposed to be completed in early October, but only 25 per cent of the 240 or so connections had been replaced as of Aug. 15. "At this time the plan will be to get the connections along the school entrance complete before the school year begins," said Stewart Hurd, environmental

property supervisor for the Municipality of Highlands East. "Hopes are to have a second crew along with the existing crew in the near future to increase production."

The \$1.2 million project is being paid for through a combination of government funding, reserves and the system's 261 users. It was awarded to Fowler Construction. (Mark Arike).

### Learning bagpipes 'part of our tradition'

There's no shortage of activities in the Haliburton Highlands, and through my jobs in the community, I've been lucky enough to be involved with canoe trips to art shows and everything in between.

So, when I realized I was missing something in my life, it was certainly not out of boredom. I was content, but I knew I needed something more. I missed learning, being creative and really challenging myself. So, one night, while binging the newest Netflix craze Outlander, a fantasy series set in the Scottish Highlands, I figured out what I needed to do: bagpipes.

Now, this may have initially seemed like a bit of a pipe dream, but upon further investigation and a few phone calls, I learned that Haliburton actually has a rich and diverse culture of bagpipers, dating back to 1970. I connected with current Pipe Major Andrew Mansfield, who explained the world of pipes in the Highlands is a vibrant community unto itself. "Piping shows our spirit here," said Mansfield. "It is truly part of our tradition"

The Haliburton Highlanders Pipes and Drums Band was originally formed by Earl Cooper, a resident of West Guilford, who started playing the pipes when he was 15 years old. It is rumoured that it takes a piper seven years to really learn the technique, but Cooper picked up his first set of pipes at Christmas in 1942, and by Easter, he was playing. "It's really not that hard!" chuckles Cooper as he revisits his early days on the pipes.

I had the opportunity to visit Earl and his wife, Eleanor, at their farmhouse, which Earl was born in 90 years ago, and

since then, many aspiring pipers have played in and around the property, "There was just always music in the house, always when our family gets together," the Coopers reflect.

On St. Andrew's Day in 1970, Cooper launched the first pipe band in the region. Twelve members signed up, none had any experience. Yet, Cooper taught all 12 of them, and eventually, they were making music. It was during this time that the Highlands of Haliburton tartan came into fruition, which members of the band still wear today. The tartan includes blue from the lakes, green from the trees, yellow and red from the leaves, and brown from

he wildlife.

Fast forward 25 years, to the mid1990s, and current Pipe Major, Andrew
Mansfield began to play the pipes at the
age of 10. "We would drive out to the
farmhouse and Earl would sit with me
and teach me, I was always so in awe of
him," remembers Mansfield. Mansfield
continued to play as he grew up,
eventually leaving Haliburton to attend
Queens University for applied science.
It was at school that he joined a student
pipe band, which practiced and performed
multiple times a week around the campus.
Mansfield became Pipe Major of the band
before returning to Haliburton County

to work as a professional engineer. Mansfield is now on his tenth year as the Pipe Major for the Haliburton Highlanders Pipes and Drums Band.

Both Mansfield and Cooper agree that the sounds of the pipes in the Highlands would not exist if not for the support of the community. "I don't think we've gotten anything other than support during our time here," says Cooper. Yet the interest in the pipes seems to be dwindling these days. The Highlanders are a non-profit community service, so if you are interested in joining, the cost of lessons, equipment, and uniforms is totally covered, and there is no experience required. To get involved, come down to the town docks on Monday nights at 7 p.m. to connect with the Highlanders.

For those interested, I am learning on the most traditional type of bagpipe, called a "Great Highland Bagpipe," which is the largest of the pipe family, and the most classic sound. There are four reeds, which means while you play, you are essentially harmonizing with yourself at all times. In total, there are only nine notes in the whole bagpipe repertoire, which I am learning from the exact same book that Cooper and Mansfield both learned from, as it continues to be passed down to interested piper students.

Sure, maybe I only joined to learn the Outlander theme song, but now I know, the Haliburton Highlanders Pipe and Drum band offer a family for those involved, new learning opportunities, and a continued sense of community pride that carries on our Haliburton heritage, and I will be playing at least for the next seven years.







### Former HHSS teacher gets union award

Steve Colliver's teaching stint at Haliburton Highlands Secondary School (HHSS) might have been short-lived, but the memories he made at the school have staved with him decades later.

Originally from Toronto, Colliver was a child when his father got a teaching job at HHSS and the family moved to Haliburton. He attended grades 6-13 before going to teacher's college. In 1984, his father, Bob "Ponch" Colliver, suffered a heart attack and he wound up filling in for him for half a year.

"Lots of great folks," said Colliver in an interview, referring to his time at the high school. "My favourite memory was going back and being allowed to be in the staff lounge. I wasn't that far removed from being a graduate there at the high school."

It was a unique situation: many of his former teachers became colleagues.

"It was different getting used to calling John Stouffer—who was my Grade 13 calculus teacher—something other than Mr. Stouffer," he laughed.

Colliver began teaching full-time in 1987 in Lindsay with the former Victoria County Board of Education, and

eventually added some extracurricular activities to his resume.

Between 1996 and 1998, he served as secretary of the Ontario Public School Teachers' Federation Victoria, a predecessor of the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO).

Colliver was elected vice-president of the Trillium Lakelands Teacher Local in 1999 and went on to become president two years later, according to a news

release. He was the local chief negotiator for 14 years.

After retiring in 2015, he was the longest-standing president of an ETFO teacher local. On Aug. 17, he received an Honourary Life Member Award from the ETFO, the province's largest teachers'

"I'm tickled pink they would recognize the years of service I put in," said Colliver, who described himself as "a

reluctant politician."

"I got involved only because something had happened that I thought was not right."

In 2015, Colliver and his wife made their cottage in Gooderham their permanent home. The 59-year-old enjoys curling and plans on getting involved in the community—after they finish renovations.

# Canadian folk artist kicks off tour in Minden

Ottawa native Shawna Caspi is set to heat things up at The Dominion Hotel on Sept. 3

The 34-year-old solo folk artist is excited to kick off her North American tour in the quaint village of Minden.

"I'm really looking forward to it," said Caspi, who now lives in Toronto, in a phone interview. "I love playing in small towns in Ontario. There's something really charming about them."

The tour, which includes several stops in the U.S., is promoting her fourth album titled "Forest Fire." It will be released two days before her performance in the Highlands.

Although it will be her first time on a local stage, it won't be her first time in the area. A few years ago, Caspi participated in the Haliburton County's Folk Society's Winter Folk Camp.

It was there that folk society president Barrie Martin told her about the Minden venue.

"I've been in touch with them about performing, but it just didn't work out [at the time]," said Caspi.

Music has been a part of Caspi's life since she was a child—and early on she knew it would be more than just a hobby. She got her start in the choir at elementary school and studied vocal music in high school.

She then obtained a fine arts degree at York University in Toronto, which is where she learned to paint.

"I think ever since I went to that arts high school, I knew I wanted to do music," said Caspi. "If I couldn't be a performer or songwriter, I figured I'd always be working in the arts some way."

Caspi was surrounded by folk music and developed a strong connection with the genre. She performed at folk festivals such as the Ottawa Grassroots Festival and worked at a popular folk club.

Some of her musical inspirations include Stephen Fearing, Bruce Cockburn and Joni Mitchell.

According to her bio, Caspi is a singer, story sculptor and truth teller. She's also a finger-style guitarist.

The songs on her latest album are about "burning things down and building them up again," states a press release.
