Kawartha Dairy patriarch remembered

Minden's 'gentle giant' Don Crowe was truly one of a kind

Those who knew Don Crowe say he'd have given you the shirt off his back. That's just how he was.

The Crowe family patriarch died suddenly Sept. 6 after a stroke. The 77-year-old was rushed to Peterborough Regional Health Centre, where his family spent his last moments with him at his bedside.

Kawartha Dairy announced on social media Sept. 11 that the eldest son of Kawartha Dairy's founders had died, adding Don was someone you were unlikely to forget even if you met him only once.

Many called him a "gentle giant" and knew he just "simply had a way of making you feel good."

"I have had so many calls and emails, even people stopping in saying what a

mentor he was," Don's youngest son, Craig, undergoing cancer treatment, each son has told *The Highlander*. "Business people saying they wouldn't be where they are today if it hadn't been for dad."

Don was married to his late wife Opal (Hewitt) for 51 years. The couple had five sons: Steve, Terry, Darryl, Rob and Craig. He also has 10 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

With the exception of Darryl, who is

a prominent role in the business – either in Minden or in Bobcaygeon, where it all started.

Don's parents, Jack and Ila Crowe, bought the small business in Bobcaygeon in 1937. So small, it only had three rooms and everything was kept cold with ice cut from the lake. In the early 1960s, a second dairy

Two people walk away from plane crash

Two people avoided serious injuries after the plane they were in crashed after attempting to take off at the Stanhope Airport Sept. 9.

Fourteen Dysart firefighters, police and paramedics all responded to a call around 2:30 p.m. The single-engine plane crashed into a wooded area east of the airport when it lost power, according to OPP Const. Dianna Dauphinee.

Dysart firefighters responded because the person who reported the crash lives in the municipality, which is where the plane came down, said Iles in an interview. His report

describes it as the "area of 1270 Green Lake Rd."

"Two patients where located at the plane crash site," he said. "They had climbed from the plane and were able to walk from the crash site to the waiting ambulances. Both patients were transported to Haliburton Hospital."

Iles doesn't know if they suffered any injuries. "I typically don't hear anything beyond the scene," he said.

Dauphinee had no further information at press time. The Transportation Safety Board is investigating the crash

ATV collision kills man

A single ATV collision killed a 73-year-old Minden Hills man Sept. 8, according to a Haliburton Highlands OPP press release.

At approximately 12:50 p.m., police were called to an area off Hunter Creek Road where the collision took place. Police have not released any other information. The release also says the identity of the driver has been withheld pending next of kin notification. The investigation is ongoing.

Toronto man charged with impaired driving

A 30-year-old Toronto man was charged with multiple offences after Haliburton Highlands OPP responded to a single motor vehicle collision in Minden Hills Sept. 4.

Michael Conrad was charged with driving while impaired, failing to provide a breath sample, assault and possession of cannabis resin under one gram, after police found the vehicle he was driving, a black SUV, in the ditch along County Road 503, according to a press release.

Conrad is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Minden Nov. 1. His driver's licence was suspended for 90 days and the vehicle he was driving was impounded for seven days.



Climate change growing issue for lake associations

Many lakes in Haliburton County hit record high water levels this spring, and once again the weather played a major

The message from the Coalition for Equitable Water Flow (CEWF) is that extreme weather events are now normal and must be considered when it comes to water management.

"Climate change is an issue we have raised and started to raise more frequently now," said Bruce McClennan, vice-chair of the CEWF, during the organization's annual communications meeting at the Haliburton fish hatchery on Sept. 9.

It's an issue they've talked about with Parks Canada staff, who manage the Trent-Severn Waterway (TSW), and municipal officials.

"It is a file we're going to be moving forward with," he said.

McClennan said the winters are getting wetter and summers drier. But at this point, coming up with a solution isn't so

"It's hard to say whether we can really do anything as far as water management strategy is concerned to mitigate any of the problems," he said. "But the reality is, we don't really know."

The CEWF is made up of 33 lake associations, or 93 per cent of the TSW's reservoir lake storage capacity. One of its main objectives is advocating for a balanced approach to water management for all stakeholders.

They did a review of flood management this year, said McClennan, and are encouraging the TSW to use forecasting tools and "what-if" scenarios. They are looking at what other areas, such as

Muskoka, are doing to adapt.

One thing they've determined is that lake residents need to be part of the solution.

"When we hear about docks being taken out by rising ice levels and docks being inaccessible because of low water levels ... part of it is to change your infrastructure and recognize that it's going to happen and be prepared for that," said McClennan.

For the last six years, CEWF has been working on a water levels summary report. It includes input from 25 lake associations in the Haliburton area. They identified lake-specific constraints. For example, there are 400 cottagers on Little Kennisis Lake that have to go under a bridge if they want to get to the marina, explained Chris Riddle, former CEWF co-chair. If the water is too high, their boat will hit the bridge. Constraints can also be environmental.

When it comes to climate change, one of the conclusions they reached is that "water conservation measures are increasingly important." Due to the frequency of extreme weather events, there is a "need for the evolution of the current water management model."

In an interview with *The Highlander*, Jewel Cunningham, director of Ontario waterways for Parks Canada, said it's too early to tell how the information from the report will be used.

"I'm not in a position yet to say because we haven't done the fulsome analysis," said Cunningham.

"We need to be able to model what the ask is and what it will look like in a holistic picture," she said.



Dysart consultant's pumped septage estimate way off, local haulers say

As Dysart seeks a preferred option for waste management services, local haulers are worried that its consultant is low-balling estimates for annual septage pumped per

The municipality is undertaking a Schedule C Class Environmental Assessment (EA) study to establish the preferred option for waste management services.

ASI Water, which specializes in water and wastewater operations and engineering, has been hired by the municipality to evaluate septage treatment options.

Their preliminary planning suggests a new treatment facility is the best option, but its estimates for volume of septage pumped per year in Dysart, 3,900 square metres, are grossly inaccurate, local haulers say.

The estimates were part of ASI Water's presentation during a public meeting Aug. 31, which was held at the Haliburton Legion.

"Those numbers are skewed, by a lot," Pat Casey, owner of Total Site Services, a construction company that also performs septic services, told The Highlander.

According to the company's annual figures for Haliburton, Total Site Services alone pumped 2,424 and 3,250 square metres of septage in 2015 and 2016, respectively.

Dave Elstone of Haliburton Septic Pumping echoed Casey's comments saying ASI Water's daily truck haul estimates are inaccurate.

"[Haliburton Septic Pumping] has three truckloads per day, and that's not including the other haulers' truckloads. Their numbers are way out of whack," he said.

ASI Water estimates an average of two to three haul trucks per day during the summer.

"Based on some of the comments, we'll have to go back and look at some of the numbers we've calculated," Dawn Riekenbrauck, an engineer for ASI Water, told *The Highlander* after the meeting. She emphasized the numbers are very

preliminary, and that there are several unknown factors that have been left out of the equation, including the provincial government's pending decision on land application of untreated holding and septic tank waste.

"The Ministry of Environment and Climate Change haven't finalized a plan, but we expect a ban on land application," said Riekenbrauck.

That could result in significant rate hikes, said Elstone.

"It could put local haulers and myself in a very difficult situation," he said. "It's a huge issue here and [Dysart] has to be very careful as to what they do."

There are no estimated costs for a potential treatment facility, or a preferred location, said Riekenbrauck.

Dysart currently does not have any infrastructure dedicated to septage treatment, said Rob Camelon, the

municipality's interim director of public

He encouraged haulers to come forward and participate in the conversation.

"Some of them had really good points and ideas," he said after the meeting. "They really want to be included and I think they should be."

Some haulers have suggested the issue be tackled at a county level, but Camelon said septage treatment is out of the county's jurisdiction.

"We look after Dysart's waste, and the opportunity to start this process presented itself to us through the Clean Water and Wastewater Fund Program (CWWF)," he

After a successful application to the CWWF earlier this year, Dysart became eligible for more than \$69,600 and \$34,800, in federal and provincial funding, respectively.

Dysart to plow four more roads

Dysart added four roads to its winter maintenance schedule, while denying a request for maintenance on the west side of Wenona Lake

Rob Camelon, the municipality's interim public works director, recently presented council with two reports about winter maintenance requests Aug. 21.

Council granted requests for maintenance on Cruiser Lake, Bonnyville, Norman and Unicorn Road, which will cost the municipality \$4,800 by contract for both Cruiser Lake and Bonnyville Road – \$1,200 and \$960, respectively. A combined total of 21 residents live on the roads. Camelon cited "horrible" grades and alignment issues on a specific portion of Wenona Lake Road for reasons why the municipality doesn't perform winter maintenance on it.

Dysart currently provides yearround maintenance from Trappers Trail Road to Noble Lane on Wenona Lake Road.

A resident on the west side of Wenona Lake, wrote to council saying, several residents have moved up to that area permanently.

"We believe that Dysart has a responsibility to ensure that its permanent residents have access to 911 emergency services should such an event be necessary," the letter read. Reeve Murray Fearrey said residents should plan ahead when moving into a seasonal home.

"This comes up every year," he said. "They need to look into whether or not their road is entitled to year-round maintenance before they move there."

A couple of stories that crossed our path this week have us questioning the value of consultants.

The first example is at the Township of Minden Hills. Every year it pays Cambium Inc. a hefty sum of money to advise it on its landfills. They are the supposed experts in their field.

So it left us scratching our heads, when the Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change (MOECC) recently rejected the 25-year-plan for the Scotch Line landfill due to the planned placement of a transfer station

Apparently the location picked by the township, as advised by Cambium, was too close to homes. Cambium should have known that. Surely it knows what the MOECC regulations are about placement of transfer stations.

Now, the municipality must spend more time and money to fix things up and re-file plans with the ministry.

The second example involves Dysart et al and consultant, ASI Water. ASI Water, which specializes in water and wastewater operations and engineering, has been hired to evaluate septage treatment options. It now appears they've low-balled estimates for annual septage pumped per year in the

township.

ASI Water is recommending a new treatment facility, estimating the volume of septage pumped per year in Dysart at 3,900 square metres.

But local haulers are saying it's much more than that. One company alone said it's pumped as much as 3,250 square metres in a year.

A spokesperson for ASI Water told us they'll have to go back and have a look at the numbers. Rob Camelon, the municipality's interim director of public works, then encouraged haulers to come forward and participate in the conversation.

Why didn't that happen before an Aug. 31 public meeting at the Haliburton Legion? That would have seemed a more logical sequence of events.

Municipalities hire experts for a reason. They expect jobs to be done accurately, on time and on budget. That can be elusive. In some cases, it would be more cost effective, and accountable, to train staff to do these projects.

We've also seen a worrying trend of sole source procurements in the county. If only one company is bidding on the job, you're stuck with them.

It's like the Toronto man who built

a set of stairs for \$550, irking the city after it received a consultant's estimate of \$65,000 for the same job. The man's stairs were ripped out and taxpayers were ripped off. Woe to anyone who expects common sense to triumph over government policies.

We would urge our councils to rely less on consultants when staff can do the job as effectively. If they can't, training them once means the skills will be there for the next time

Sure, there are some fields of expertise that are too specialized for a small municipality to afford. They may not always know best..

In the case of good reusable items being left at these boxes it's possible that people don't want to throw them into the dump and think someone else might pick them up and use them.

Many times, I've found good items left at the Wilberforce charity boxes outside Agnew's store, and taken the time to take them to one of the local charity thrift stores.

Once, my husband and I found a complete set of new dishes still in the original boxes that we took to the Thrift Warehouse in Haliburton.

This is something people can do to

help keep the area around the boxes tidy and reduce the number of things that the businesses hosting the boxes have to clean up, while also helping the thrift stores.

Another idea would be to post signs beside the charity boxes giving directions to the nearest charity thrift stores that accept items other than clothing.

We hear all the time that people don't read signs but it might redirect a few

Maybe dumps, like the Highlands East landfill sites that threaten legal action for anyone found removing any items, should have the charity clothing donation boxes at the gates along with posted directions to the nearest charity thrift stores where items could be donated instead of discarded.

With dump sites like the Tory Hill Landfill in serious danger of reaching capacity innovative actions and ideas are needed to reduce the number of reusable and recyclable items discarded.

Apple Sauce Project helps seniors and families

The health unit and SIRCH Community Services want to ensure no apples go to waste this fall.

This is the fourth year they will be running the Apple Sauce Project. Once again, volunteers will be picking apples from trees on private and municipal property that can be turned into applesauce and delivered to seniors and families in need.

The community initiative is making an impact.

Last year, 1,636 servings of applesauce were made from local apples. (One serving of fruit is half a cup, according to Canada's Food Guide.)

Rosie Kadwell, a registered dietician with the health unit, came up with the idea.

"Rosie was walking home one day and she saw these trees loaded with apples," recalled Kate Hall, public health food worker with the health unit.

"A week later, they were still loaded with apples and people didn't seem to be picking them. Then they're falling to the ground."

Kadwell reached out to SIRCH and its community kitchen program, as well as Haliburton Highlands Health Services' Community Support Services division.

Since then, volunteers have been picking the apples and processing them at SIRCH Central in Haliburton.

The applesauce is distributed to clients of the Meals on Wheels program and SIRCH's frozen meals program.

The apples are helping residents get more fruit servings in their diet.

"Any senior that would like to have [applesauce] can come by the community kitchen at SIRCH or give them a call," said Hall

Donations of apples are welcome. To drop off your apples, visit SIRCH Central at 2 Victoria St. on Sept. 14 and 15 from 1-4 p.m. and Sept. 18 from 8-11 a.m., or go to the health unit on Highland Street on Sept. 14 and 15 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Seven crates of apples had been donated as of Sept. 12, said Diane McKnight, food initiatives coordinator for SIRCH. This will allow them to make more applesauce than last year.

A dozen volunteers have signed up to process the apples, she said.

Scotch Line cleanup costs escalate

The cost of cleaning up the Scotch Line landfill has increased.

The Township of Minden Hills' beleaguered waste disposal site was up for discussion once again at an Aug. 31 Minden Hills council meeting.

Ivan Ingram, environmental and property operations manager, reported that the municipality will need an additional \$37,000 to complete work, after the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MOECC) issued a Provincial Officer's Order to the township June 19 over concerns about leachate and a too high construction and demolition pile containing improper material.

The municipality had until Aug. 2 to

report back, which it did, with a cleanup plan. But, the MOECC sent it back. The plan largely involved tackling the construction and demolition pile first, in 2017, followed by leachate in 2018.

Ingram said in a written report that the MOECC "have requested changes be made to the plan to address the leachate issues in 2017 rather than 2018."

He tabled a revised plan for information that "contends that the issues of the leachate will be greatly reduced if the construction waste pile is taken down to a 4:1 slope and covered; this will make the other seeps easier to manage in 2018."

Ingram said any sand used to absorb pooled leachate will be scraped up and disposed of on the tipping face. He said the litter control plan – to remove garbage from around the site – will also be completed by this November.

Staff originally proposed a \$29,000 budget to complete the sloping of the construction waste pile, compliance plan, litter control and well notification but Ingram said that, "upon further review of the site with contractors, the estimate of the remedial work proposed will not be enough to complete the work required."

He suggested the extra \$37,000 could come from the Water Reserve. Total costs are now about \$69,000.

Ian Oosting, senior environmental officer for the MOECC's Peterborough office, said the ministry has accepted the plan to address "several operational issues" at the

"The municipality will now act to

undertake the work set out," he said. Council heard the MOECC also rejected

the township's 25-year-plan for Scotch Line over the placement of a transfer station.

MOECC senior engineer Ranjani Munasinghe, in a letter to council, said he had reviewed the file and visited the site June 14 and the "proposed new location for the transfer station does not meet the ministry requirements." He asked them to revise their proposal and re-submit in a month's time.

A report to the Aug. 31 council meeting contained a revised version of the layout of the transfer station.

It's basically moved the proposed station from the bottom of the landfill, to the west and south - to the east of the site.

Another bloomin' good result

Minden Hills received a rating of 5 Blooms and a special mention for Community Involvement during the 2017 Communities in Bloom Ontario Provincial Awards hosted by the Municipality of Lambton Shores on Sept. 9. In July, trained volunteer judges travelled to Minden Hills (pictured above with township staff and horticultural society representatives) to evaluate the overall contributions of municipal council and departments; industry; businesses and the private sector - including volunteer efforts - in regards to tidiness, environmental action, heritage conservation, urban forestry and trails, landscape and floral. bar was opened in Minden and Don and Opal took the helm.

"[They] concentrated on the Minden location and my grandfather and grandmother looked after Bobcaygeon," Craig recalled. He added that it was only until Don's brothers were old enough to start helping, that there really was a succession plan in place.

The rest, as they say, is history.

Larry Anderson was hired in 1978, when Kawartha Dairy still delivered door-to-door.

"Don hired me," Anderson told *The Highlander*. "A driver was off sick for a couple of weeks, [and seeing as] I was not working ... he asked if I could fill in."

For more than 32 years, Anderson worked for his Aunt Opal and Uncle Don. He recalled how Don liked a good joke, which many of his family members would agree with.

"One winter, when I was done work and went to leave, he had filled the back of my truck with wet, packed snow, higher than the cab, with his tractor," Anderson said. "[Witnesses] said he would grin with every bucketful."

Don's grandson, Sterling, will miss the time he spent growing up with his grandpa.

"He would take us on classic car tours, on some of his travels to collect bottles, and to visit with his many friends across Ontario," Sterling said. "I got to see so many small communities in Ontario with him while having long talks on the drive and getting to learn more about all of the things that he loved."

Sterling said Don always had his back in the most authentic of ways. "He would have confidence in you when you weren't sure, and would tell you if you had a blind spot to help you out."

Sister-in-law, Joy Kellett, and her husband were living with Don in Minden for the past five weeks. She believes they were meant to be there in his time of need.

"We've been living in the States for 30 years now, so we miss a lot of babies being born and funerals for closure," the 71-year-old said. "It's still so hard to believe he's gone. We were meant to be here now."

She spoke fondly of trips they would take as couples in their motor homes across Canada and the U.S., taking the less travelled routes. "I am sure that he and Opal are out cruising the back roads of heaven now."

Tom Prentice Sr. and Don had been friends since the Crowes moved to Minden. He reminisced about Don's dedication to the Minden Kinsmen and their friendship over the years.

"We met when he first came to Minden, as teenagers," Prentice said. "At that time, all Kawartha Dairy amounted to was a van, [person] and a parking lot. I remember riding with Don in the evenings to Bobcaygeon to pick up milk for the next day."

Both Prentice and Kellett said Don never wanted to be in the forefront for his philanthropy. "He never did it to take praise," Prentice said. "He just wanted to do everything he could for his community."

The Kin Canada motto is to serve the community's greatest need and Prentice confirmed that is exactly why Don was voted by the club to become a life member.

"Don became a Kinsmen in the 1970s," Prentice recalled, "and then in the 1980s, he was made a life member and once that happens, you're always a Kinsmen. He was just so humble."

A visitation at the Gordon A. Monk Funeral Home will take place on Sept. 22 from 1-6 p.m., followed by a funeral service to celebrate Don's life on Sept. 23 at 11 a.m. The reception will be held at the Minden Legion and any donations are to be made to the Haliburton Highlands Health Services Foundation (HHHSF).

Don's dairy collectibles will still be on display for Doors Open this weekend (Sept. 16-17) in Minden, because Craig said the family wishes for "people to see the most amazing collection of the super, most amazing man who put it together."

of the paddles, culminating in a grand finale music. All are as unique as their creators," he said.


> The innovative contest caught the attention of the Tom Thomson Art Gallery in Owen Sound, which displayed three entries in its gallery and held two workshops.

The Land Between: residents invited to share thoughts on changing landscape

People who know the land around Haliburton County – farmers, hunters, anglers, woodlot owners, beekeepers, gardeners, kayakers and hikers – are invited to an upcoming event.

The Land Between charity, Curve Lake First Nation and Hastings Stewardship Council are hosting two 'knowledge circle' gatherings. One is in Gravenhurst Sept. 16 and the other is in Buckhorn Oct. 14.

The Land Between bioregion stretches from Georgian Bay to the Ottawa Valley; between the granite of the Canadian Shield and the limestone of the St. Lawrence Lowlands. The knowledge circles come from Indigenous talking circles, the Land Between said in a news release.

"What is the state of our fish and wildlife? Is our land productive? Are our natural resources sustainable?" the Land Between's Leora Berman asks.


"These are the essential questions that need to be asked in our communities, for our own health and the health of our children. And these are the questions that only those that live on the land and with the land can answer," she said. "However, increasingly governments are less able and apt to engage with landowners in meaningful ways to find these answers. And more and more we see that resources are being managed at regional and even provincial scales, often without sufficient local knowledge."

The Land Between is dedicated to conservation of the natural, cultural and social heritage of the region. Funding for the events is coming from the Ontario Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration's Partnership Grant Program.

"The goals of a circle event are to share local, first-hand knowledge, understand the conditions of the land, and build relationships in our communities. Political agendas are not acceptable in these grassroots gatherings," the group said.

The circles will be recorded and made publicly available. Also, groups and individuals will be able to access online tools and direct mentorship opportunities "to support the adoption of grassroots democratic processes beyond these events," the release said.







Did you know the role motorcycles played in the Second World War? Only a handful of motorcycles went across when Canadians embarked for Europe, but by war's end thousands had been put to good use. Linemen used them to check telegraph wires, officers as transport, infantry for scouting. Their riders delivered medical supplies and evacuated the wounded. A few had sidecars fitted with guns. But their biggest role was ferrying messages to and from headquarters, to distant units in England, and to battalions and batteries at the front. Dispatch riders even delivered carrier pigeons in wicker baskets strapped to their backs. In the final 100 days of the war, motorcycles scouted for Canadian shock troops, identifying strongpoints to be taken out by the gun brigade, cavalry and infantry. All this information and much more can be found in the Legion Magazine. Many back issues are available at our branch.





A sneak peek behind closed doors

Nineteen very different Minden doors will open to the public Sept. 16-17 during Doors Open Ontario.

Boasting everything from a historical lodge to a tiny home, a generating station and family farms, Doors Open Minden Hills will provide visitors with many opportunities to glimpse our area's heritage.

"Doors Open Minden will be special," said Ward 1 Councillor Jeanne Anthon, who sits on the township's events committee.

The program has been running across the province since 2002. The Ontario Heritage Trust works with communities such as Minden to open the doors, gates and courtyards of their unique and most fascinating cultural sites so the public can explore the stories hiding inside.

Doors are open 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday and all visits are free. The Lady of the Boat tour must be pre-booked by calling Paul Dillon at 705-457-5442.

Elisha Weiss, the community development coordinator for the Township of Minden Hills, said the municipality was interested in Doors Open "because we want to be able to showcase some of the historic, unique and interesting homes, lodges, farms and buildings that occupy our township that many members of the community don't

know about (let alone visitors from outside the area). It's a fun way to see parts of the township, especially during the fall, meet the hosts that own or upkeep these sites, and hear the stories surrounding them."

She said a lot of work had gone into pulling the event together.

"It has been a year of organizing with the events committee, which has included reaching out to sites we thought would fit into the scope of Doors Open, but then also extending the offer out to the community to see who else would be interested in being a host site," Weiss said.

Once they had their list, they collected information, pictures and addresses to send to Doors Open. It created a website for Minden Hills that lays out all of the sites, with a map of each location. The committee decided to also create a brochure as another way to ignite interest.

One of the participants is Killara Station. "Open Doors is a great opportunity for the community and visitors to get to know our area better," Killara Station's Sue MacDonald told *The Highlander*.

On Saturday, she and partner Randy are opening their 215-acre property, located halfway between Minden and Haliburton, which is home to the MacDonalds and several small businesses they own and operate, including SueMac Designs, Paws,

Fresh and Canadian Cobar Coolie. They also have animals and walking trails.

"I feel it's a crime not to share in our special or historical sites," MacDonald

"We have only lived on the farm for four years. Randy and I are very interested in hearing more stories about our property. Having Doors Open gives people the opportunity and the comfort to be able to stop in and share their stories as well as feed their interest in what goes on behind those doors. Stories are a very special part of Doors Open, not only for the visitors but for the hosts. We look forward to hosting Doors Open now and hopefully in our future."

The committee's chairwoman, Betty Mark, will be opening the doors to Nickels' House.

"A lot of people have commented to me that they've driven past my home and would love to see what it looks like inside. My home was mentioned in Jim Mitchell's book about the history of Canning Lake "A Little Piece of Paradise". He mentions the Nickels family who lived in this house. The original house was built in 1874 by Joseph Congdon. The Nickels family purchased the property in 1917. That I believe is the reasoning for naming the road Nichols Road. However, someone didn't research

the proper spelling of the name which is Finnish in origin," Mark said.

Weiss said they are still looking for volunteers to help with parking, handing out brochures, and providing information on particular sites. If anyone is interested, they can contact her directly at 705-286-2298 or eweiss@mindenhills.ca
