Candidates asked about looming seniors tsunami

How Dysart candidates will handle an approaching 'seniors tsunami' was on the mind of local CARP president Bob Stinson at an all-candidates debate at Fleming College.

Stinson, who is also on the Haliburton Aging Well Committee, commented, "I

don't know if you realize that we've got an approaching seniors tsunami coming and it's going to come during your term in office." He said almost one-third of the county's population are seniors and there aren't enough services for them.

Ward 1 candidate Nancy Wood-Roberts said if people are not aging well they need

facilities such as Parklane and Echo Hills for assisted and supportive living, as well as more long-term care beds in the county. "I think it's totally unreasonable and unfair that someone who has lived in our community for 70 or 80 years has to leave our community near the end of their life," she said.

Ward 2 candidate Larry Clarke said the approaching seniors tsunami is also a business opportunity, however it will require services and tradespeople. He said to do that, Dysart must have young families remain in the community and that has to be part of a balanced plan going forward.

Seniors complex one piece of puzzle

said the proposed seniors housing complex at 1 Sunnyside is part of a solution. However, he said the community needs more 1,000-sq-ft, one-level homes and affordable rent. "If I get there, I'm prepared to work on trying to fill some of the other holes that are there."

Mayoral candidate Murray Fearrey talked about his role in getting the proposed seniors complex and said one of the reasons he is running again is to see the project to completion. "Seventy-four beds there means 74 people leave their houses and that makes housing for other people and it creates 20 new jobs too, he said."

Deputy mayor candidate Pat Kennedy thinks the township can be a leader in working with other community organizations to find solutions.

Mayoral candidate Andrea Roberts noted Dysart owns and zoned another property on Wonderland Road four years ago for seniors housing. She also lobbies for

collaborating with the Haliburton Highlands Health Services for programs to help seniors age well.

Ward 1 candidate Bram Lebo said the proposed seniors complex and small condominium projects "are not anywhere close to what we need. There are 3,500 people living in our municipality 55 or older. We're going to need about 1,500 units." He said Dysart has to take control of housing via a community development organization that is going to set objectives and get this housing built.

No other candidates responded to the question.

Other questions asked at the meeting were about: snowplowing, accessibility, youth retention, housing, leadership philosophy, fireworks, attracting a trade school or university, a recreational facility or pool, shoreline tree cutting bylaws, tourism, water quality and the proliferation of deer.

New college president gets acquainted with Haliburton

The community got an introduction to Fleming College's new president, Maureen Adamson, during a meet and greet at the college's Haliburton campus Oct. 4. Adamson met more than 20 people at the event, including college staff, community members and dignitaries. She started Aug. 22 and said she's since been on a listening tour across all of the college's campuses.

"I'm meeting with all staff and just having a very open conversation," Adamson said in an interview. "What's working, what can we do better, what are opportunities. My goal is just to really move the needle for Fleming College."

Adamson is the sixth president in the college's history. She is also both the first woman and first person originally from Peterborough to serve in the role, according to a June 22 college press release. She was most recently the deputy minister of tourism, culture and sport for the provincial government and has 25 years experience in post-secondary, healthcare, government and non-profit sectors.

She toured the Haliburton campus during her visit and said it was a positive experience.

"This is a true gem. It's amazing and I'm just so blown away by what's here," she

said.

Haliburton School of Art and Design dean Sandra Dupret said a major point of discussion with Adamson was the need for student housing to grow the campus.

"I think she's a strong advocate for us and she recognizes the need."

Adamson said such a decision would require board approval, but a residence at the Haliburton campus is worthy of study.

"From everything I'm seeing, I think there's great opportunity for residence here. We're currently turning students away because we don't have housing. It's something we have to study very closely with a view to taking the right kind of action."

Faculty member Tammy Rea said student housing and attracting student attention to the school are issues that need addressing.

"The Haliburton School of Art and Design campus is a hidden gem," she said. "Even the executive at Fleming itself didn't even really understand what the potential is here."

She added she's optimistic Adamson has a good grasp of the campus and the challenges it faces.

"I'm hopeful this president will have more of a presence here, will visit more often, will really see what this campus is like in action," Rea said.

LCBOs close one day a week in winter

LCBOs in Highlands East will be closed one day a week this winter, the crown corporation has confirmed.

Last week, Wilberforce resident Linda Nottage attended the Highlands East council meeting. She told councillors she'd learned about the cost-saving measure and said it could have devastating effects on Wilberforce and Gooderham, where the LCBOs are located.

The Gooderham store will be closed on Mondays and the Wilberforce outlet on Tuesdays, effective immediately.

An LCBO spokesperson said in an email last week that, "all decisions regarding LCBOs store network are made only after a thorough review and careful considerations. The reduced hours in Wilberforce and Gooderham are part of the seasonal review of retail operations across the province that considers in-store sales and customer traffic."

The spokesman added they will "continue to provide a great shopping experience in both stores as well as on lcbo.com for our customers affected by the reduced hours, including ensuring that the stores, located approximately 15 minutes apart, are not closed on the same day."

Nottage told councillors on Oct. 3 it was "just another

nail in the coffin to force people out of town to do their shopping" and later said, "it's just the bank all over again." She was referring to last year's closure of the Scotiabank.

She added that she doubted Gooderham residents would go to Wilberforce, and Wilberforce residents to Gooderham, on the closed days, but would shop in Haliburton or Bancroft instead.

She called on the township to write to the LCBO and politicians to outline "the devastating effect [the closures] can have on our community."

She said if it is a good snowmobile season, people will visit during the week and will want to see an LCBO that is open.

The township decided to write the LCBO, Premier Doug Ford, MPP Laurie Scott and MP Jamie Schmale.

The LCBO spokesperson said they'd placed advertisements for LCBO agency store tenders in Carnarvon, West Guilford and Eagle Lake, "to ensure that all local businesses have the opportunity to express their interest. This is a standard practice in growing our retail network in communities across the province."

Election issues

Dear editor,

All local politicians acknowledge that water quality is key to sustaining the County's tax base and therefore the economy. Their actions contradict their statements. Proper septic systems are the largest single factor that impact water quality and yet mandatory septic inspections have only commenced in the last two years and Dysart advises that this process will take approximately 12 more to complete. This is despite some form of remedial action required on approximately 40 per cent of inspections on Kennisis Lake properties in the first year. One problem cited is the lack of inspectors. Hire/train more. This is a skill set that is not going the way of the Dodo bird.

The regulation of short-term rentals can also have a negative impact on water quality, among other issues. Realtors claim this bylaw will drive purchasers to other municipalities – unlikely since regulations of this type are becoming much more prevalent and could actually entice a potential buyer to a more progressive and protected environment. Others claim it will have a negative impact on the local economy by making it less attractive to potential renters and their local spending. Neither renters nor landlords are likely to be deterred by a, say \$300 annual fee per dwelling, when the average weekly rental is likely above \$2,000. One analysis actually suggests that the overall revenue could exceed administration/ compliance costs.

An indication of the lack of forward thinking and closing the barn door too late is the bylaw regarding shoreline protection. Hindsight would suggest that this should have been implemented many years ago as likely most lakefront has now been developed. Let us not make a slow reaction or non-action on septic inspections and short-term rentals too late to be beneficial – particularly given the recent algae bloom on a lake in Algonquin Highlands.

The municipalities collectively need a longer-term strategic plan to proactively address these types of issues rather than reacting once the damage is done. One example is the focus on bioheat in Dysart which, I suspect, was going to impact a relatively low percentage of

the approximately 7,000 dwellings, plus businesses, in Dysart, yet would likely require a disproportionate amount of Dysart's resources to implement. If the water quality declines, no one will need to worry about funding for roads, cell towers etc., but addressing Dysart's rising debt will certainly be an issue. While not an advocate of regulation, I do believe some regulations are required to protect the majority, not the minority. Politicians need to remember it is the majority, not the vocal minority, that gets them elected.

Q

- 1) Tell me a little bit about yourself - particularly what would make you a good candidate - ie. previous work experience, or volunteering for the township are good points.
- 2) Why are you running? What do you think you can do for the ratepayers of Dysart that your competitors cannot?
- 3) How do you think the township is being run? What would be your good, bad and ugly list?

1. I've lived in Haliburton County most of my life, working and managing the family business (Elephant Lake Lodge) for 30 years. Working in the tourism business most of my life, I understand the challenges of living in an area like this. I currently work at H & R Block as a tax specialist and bookkeeper. organizers of the Harcourt 3 Pitch League, bringing free WIFI to the new Harcourt Community Centre.

2. There are still areas in our municipality where there is no cell service and/or the internet is poor quality. I will push to improve these services for all of Harcourt Township. Some areas need to have the speed limits evaluated where there is no bicycle lane as more people are adopting a healthier lifestyle, for example jogging, cycling or walking the family pet. Contractors are always looking for skilled labour for this area, we need to promote a Work Where You Play Program to attract skilled labourers to Haliburton County.

3. Our municipality has the lowest tax rates in the county and if elected I plan to work to keep it that way. I believe that Ward 3 has so much potential to move in a forward direction. Harcourt Township is in my heart and I will go to bat for all the residents and cottagers here.

2. My four years as a councillor has opened my eyes to the issues of managing a municipality. Making decisions on competing priorities and meeting the needs of such a diverse community is challenging. I believe that council is doing a good job, but improvements can be made. I am energetic and enthusiastic about the future of our beautiful area. I believe in protecting our natural assets while ensuring we have positive growth and development in the Haliburton Highlands. Protecting our amazing natural assets is already working hand in hand with economic development and promoting a great tax base. We can build on this.

3. *An answer wasn't provided to this question.

1. After graduating from the business school (Ivey) at the University of Western Ontario I enjoyed a very successful business career including senior executive positions at IBM, Sears and Canada Post. Always believing community service was important, I served on the boards of several not for profits in the GTA. Three times in the 1980s and 90s the voters of Etobicoke elected me as a school trustee. My colleagues there selected me to represent them on the Metropolitan Toronto School Board. Here in Dysart I have served on the board of the Kennis Lake Cottage Owners' Association (KLCOA) since 2015. Currently I serve as chair of the community advisory committee at Haliburton Highlands Health Services. I have also served on the board at Abbey Gardens. As part of the KLCOA I was a strong advocate for the septic re-inspection program. My extensive board and committee work have taught me how to work effectively with others in building consensus, setting plans, establishing priorities and measuring progress for the organization.

2. I am running because I firmly believe that I have the skills, experience and time available to make a significant contribution to the improvement of our community. As a retired person who lives on Kennis Lake full time I have all of the time in the world available to serve the constituents of Ward 4. As proven by my having personally knocked on well over 1,000 doors across Ward 4

during July and August I not only have the time but I also have the commitment and passion needed to make a difference. I have the necessary background to provide a voice for everyone from Ward 4, be they seasonal cottagers or permanent residents on and off the lakes.

3. Good - Generally modest overall increases in property taxes (unfortunately much of this is due to the savings resulting from declining school enrollments). Implementation of a septic re-inspection program as long recommended by the KLCOA. Bad - Still not doing enough to protect our lakes and forests. Conversion of hardtop roads to gravel with no prior warning to, or consultation with, affected residents. Failure to leverage tax bill envelopes to communicate with and educate property owners (communication re septic inspections has been inadequate). Don't yet appear to have a plan to address short-term cottage rentals. Ugly - The lack of a documented strategic plan and related alignment on a single set of priorities for our community from our current and past councils. The severe housing shortage, especially the lack of rental housing suitable for young people. Inadequate cell and internet services in some areas (not up to our local government to build the infrastructure but this issue should get much more focus to get services in place).





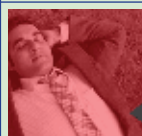

High school recognizes student success

Haliburton Highlands Secondary School (HHSS) recognized the achievements and hard work of last year's Grade 9-11 students with an honours and awards assembly Oct. 5.

More than 100 students were recognized for achieving the honours benchmark of 80 per cent or higher in their grades. Another 55 individual awards and scholarships were handed out, primarily for best-in-course performances.

Vice principal David Waito said the ceremony is an important start to the school year.

"At the beginning of the year, we talk

about goal-setting. We talk about the importance of the academic work that we do here," Waito said in an interview.

"Having an average that qualifies for honours and getting the highest mark in certain classes, we need to recognize those things when they're there."

The event is a result of the work of the HHSS scholarship committee. Chair Melissa Stephens said this year, approximately \$40,000 was handed out between undergraduate and graduate students through awards and scholarships.

"It's very important to recognize them," Stephens said. "For some of them, the money is helpful, especially when they get

into one of the graduate awards."

Businesses and organizations who sponsor the awards care about the success of students, she said.

"The organizations really take it to heart and the kids all send thank you notes and [businesspeople] love to read their thank you notes," Stephens said.

Morgan Burke earned the Haliburton Legion Ladies' Auxiliary Hospitality and Tourism Award for outstanding achievement in the Year 2 course. Burke said winning the award was meaningful.

"It felt really good. I felt like my hard work paid off. It means a lot to me."

Waito said the school split the graduate

and undergraduate award ceremonies two years ago, with the graduate ceremony held at commencement. The later ceremony was also moved from Thanksgiving Saturday to a week day.

The changes have given younger students and the community a better chance to witness the ceremony, Waito said.

Principal Chris Boulay said in the ceremony's opening address students should be congratulated on their hard work. He later added they should also continue that hard work going forward.

"The work doesn't end at this point. It simply begins. I challenge you to set your sights even higher."

Fuel for warmth preparing for a cold snowy winter

Fuel for Warmth is gearing up for what the Old Farmers' Almanac says will be a colder than average winter with higher than average snowfall.

Volunteers have been busy splitting wood already, said Mike Jaycock, in a press release on behalf of Fuel for Warmth.

This year marks 10 years since Joanne Barnes started the first of its kind service in the highlands.

Jaycock said it offers help throughout the county thanks to its volunteers and non-paid staff.

"As a result, 95 per cent of all money raised goes directly to those in need, providing access to fuel oil, propane, wood and wood pellets." He emphasized that administration costs are always kept to a minimum.

"In an age when donors are concerned about their donations getting to those in need, Fuel for Warmth can point with pride to their record of service and fiscal management." Fuel for Warmth does not receive any government funding.

It's a registered charity that abides by the reporting requirements of the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA). Their treasurer, Lorne McNeil, is a Chartered Professional Accountant, who performs the annual audits of all expenditures, ensuring full CRA compliance. Community advisors

include Jaycock, Scotty Morrison and Sharon Foster.

Jaycock said the organization uses the rigorous application and qualification process used by the Minden Food Bank. All payments for fuel are made directly to fuel suppliers on behalf of the clients. This ensures that only those in need are approved for help.

This year, Fuel for Warmth is planning to purchase a dump trailer. "This will make the delivery of wood more efficient for clients requesting that fuel source. Thanks to a generous donation, they are finally able to make this purchase," Jaycock said.

Barnes said it's simple, really. "No one should have to choose between fuel and food."

One client named Jennie, who's a single mom with two school-age children, says, "without the help of Fuel for Warmth, my children and I would have been in real trouble last winter. Their help was a godsend."

Fuel for Warmth accepts donations at any time of the year. Cheques can be made payable to Fuel for Warmth and sent to PO Box 313, Minden, ON K0M 2K0, or through Canadahelps.org.

On Nov. 24, the Highlands Christmas Shindig, a family-oriented Christmas variety show at the Northern Lights Performing Arts Pavilion, will once again raise money for the cause.

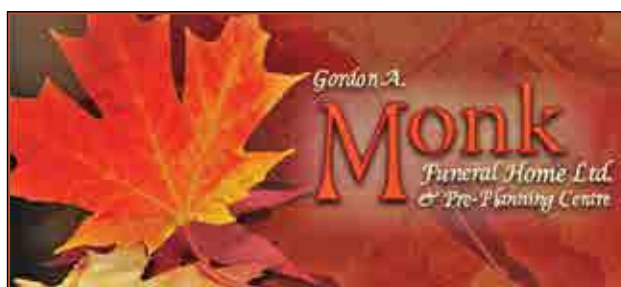

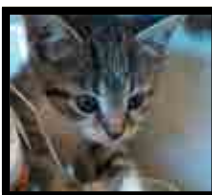
