Warden in hot seat over amalgamation

County Warden Liz Danielsen was pressed about amalgamation during a Haliburton Highlands Chamber of Commerce breakfast Tuesday morning.

During a question and answer session, Keith Thomas of Francis Thomas Contracting, Highlander columnist Jack Brezina and Haliburton Highlands Health Services Foundation chairmen Peter Oyler all asked guest speaker Danielsen about the

"We continue to hear concerns and private thoughts about our governance structure and the need for amalgamation," Danielsen said

She added that while the province is looking at the possibility of structural changes in larger regions, "they're simply encouraging rural and northern counties to consider streamlining services and realizing

cost savings where ever they can be found."

She said county council will be reviewing different models of governance and their level of success, "but continue to seek a made-in-Haliburton solution that will reduce costs across the board, provide better levels of service, all while maintaining our unique individuality and I think that's something we'd all like to be able to keep."

She said the county and its four municipalities are now doing a shared

services review, "in order to demonstrate to the public just how closely we do work together to save taxpayers dollars and to investigate further opportunities for partnerships, streamlining and cost saving."

Thomas questioned duplication. He noted that most of the municipalities have purchased or will be buying excavators but is certain they are not getting the hours to justify the spend.

State of emergency lifted in Minden

A state of emergency has been lifted in Minden Hills but Gull River water levels are predicted to remain high for quite some time.

The state of emergency ended at 1 p.m. this past Monday, May 6.

"The widespread and significant threat to safety of persons and property from the recent flooding of the Gull River Watershed has stabilized," the township said in a news release. But it added that due to rain in the forecast, it would not be initiating recovery operations until water levels significantly decline.

The township said water levels are expected to stay high for the foreseeable future, and the ground continues to be saturated.

Meanwhile, it said the Trent-Severn Waterway (TSW) continues to manage water flows throughout the system, so it's strongly recommended that property owners who have a historical susceptibility to flooding, continue to monitor their situation.

Some roads remain closed and are restricted to local traffic only.

In addition, Red Cross flood clean-up kits were made available Tuesday, May 7 at the Minden Hills township office at 7 Milne St.

For information about recovery or the kits, contact the recovery/event coordinator at 705-286-1260 ext. 211 or after hours at 1-866-856-3247. For more information, visit mindenhills.ca for accurate updates.

In addition, the local OPP issued a press release advising people to beware of flood scams.

It said that with the recent floods, it's come to their attention some individuals may be attempting to fraudulently benefit from the situation.

"Given these circumstances, Haliburton Highlands OPP is strongly urging anyone who may wish to support any

fundraising initiatives that may be underway or planned for the future, to make sure that they research carefully before they donate.

"Municipalities within the County of Haliburton encourage individuals, businesses and organizations interested in making financial or material donations to contact their local Food Bank, or to seek out a local community organization of their choice (churches, service clubs, etc.)," police said.

In the latest water level management update from the TSW, they said flows on Gull River and Burnt River have peaked but are expected to remain high because of the high amount of runoff from precipitation.

Parks Canada has launched the Ontario Waterways Water Management InfoNet on the TSW website at pc.gc.ca/en/ lhn-nhs/on/trentsevern/info/infonet


The InfoNet contains background information on water management practices, updates, frequently asked questions, various reports, and the most recent water levels of lakes along both the Rideau Canal and the TSW.

Of specific note is the new water levels tool within the InfoNet, which provides lake levels data from the last 30 days and graphic representation of levels for the current year. The information comes from hydrometric gauges located at key points along both waterways and is vetted by trained and experienced Parks Canada water management

It's intended as supplemental information only. Parks Canada is still encouraging people to refer to their respective conservation authority or the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry as the primary source for relevant flood forecasting information specific to their area.

Brezina wants more than 'lip service'

Continued from page 1 Brezina asked Danielsen, "if there's any sense that something is going to happen beyond just talking about it?'

She replied that county council is committed but, "we are not convinced that amalgamation, in its true from, will work. I think in many ways we will lose our identify, lose our ability to make decisions on our own, and we're not convinced that it's going to save money in the long run. "

"I don't think people realize just how much we already share our services and that we'd like to prepare something that shows it ... here's what we're doing, here are further opportunities for us to share and partner and this is the direction that we're going to

She said results of the shared services study should be ready for a strategic planning session within the next couple of

"So, it sounds likes it's a little more serious than it's been in the past. In the past, it's been all lip service, and not much more than that," Brezina commented.

Oyler said he had experienced three amalgamations, "and they were all positive steps in my opinion." He said they initially cost more, but amalgamated services and reduced corporate infrastructure led to "lots of savings.'

"Further, change is inevitable and the longer you stand still the further behind you get. I would say to you and Pat [Dysart deputy mayor Kennedy, who was at the breakfast], please take a serious look at

amalgamation moving forward. Haliburton County will not lose its identity by an amalgamation process."

He also encouraged the county to reach out to private individuals who have experience with amalgamation to help them prepare for the next municipal election.

Danielsen said several municipalities are still getting over the last amalgamation.

But Oyler replied, "It's all in the political will to do it. You're going to suffer the wrath of the taxpayer one way or the other because you can't please all of the people all of the time. So, have the intestinal fortitude to move forward, reduce costs to the taxpayers, because clearly we cannot afford them anymore, whether we're homeowners or whether we're businesses."


Danielsen said they want to ensure they are going to reduce costs before making any changes.

Smith okay with being lone voice on council

Coun. John Smith found himself at odds with some Dysart et al council members after an argument over his line of questioning during a special meeting April

The disagreement came during a discussion about a request for proposals (RFP) for an asset management plan. Smith asked a series of questions about the RFP, the accompanying staff report and the justification for the RFP.

Coun. Larry Clarke said Smith was going off on unrelated tangents.

"You're on tangents that are not adding any value to this discussion at all. I'm sorry, I just feel like you're wasting my time," Clarke said.

Smith said he was trying to understand why the municipality is spending more than \$100,000 on the asset management plan. The province has mandated every municipality make these plans to better track degrading municipal assets.

In a recorded vote, councillors voted 6-1 to spend \$105,345 plus HST on the plan from Watson and Associates Economists Ltd. The proposal was the second highest price of the five bids received but staff said most of the other proposals did not meet the requirements for the RFP, including on-the-ground inspections. Smith requested the recorded vote and went against the proposal.

After the vote, Smith responded to Clarke's comment.

"I'm just sitting here troubled and frustrated with the fact that a fellow councillor can say, after a couple of minutes discussion on a topic, that I'm wasting his time and the chair doesn't object to such a comment," Smith said. "That's completely out of line."

He added Mayor Andrea Roberts

encouraged the comment by noting during his questioning that she had a call to get to at the top of the hour.

Roberts said she did not expect controversy over the RFP.

"I was presupposing the conversation ... and that we would support staff, who have taken a lot of time to makes this recommendation with good justification," Roberts said. "We do have to have decorum all around and have respect for every councillor. We're here for as long as we need to be to make good decisions."

"I apologize to my fellow councillor," Clarke said.

Roberts said after the meeting councillors have ample time to ask staff questions between meetings.

"We have to follow our procedural policy, which I'm going to brush up on, which limits the time a councillor can speak to the item," Roberts said. "There was tension and it's unfortunate.'

"We work better when there's a level of respect and we're all functioning well together. Doesn't mean we have to agree on things, it's fine to vote differently on issues, but it's going to be my job to get a level of respect," she added.

Smith said as a newcomer, he has brought different perspectives to the table. He further said he does not have a problem being a lone dissenting voice on some

"I believe questions and discussions result in better decisions," he said. "I stand up for what I believe and I have no problems with that. I express what's on my mind."

Smith said he has brought things forward that have received support, such as a proposal at the environment committee level to prevent Hydro One from spraying the herbicide Garlon in the municipality.

His times dissenting have not bled into his relationship with his colleagues, Smith said.

Residents worried about noisy highway work

Algonquin Highlands council opted to delay a decision to give a noise exemption to the Ministry of Transportation for highway work.

Council discussed the ministry's request at its May 2 meeting. The ministry seeks an exemption to the municipal noise bylaw in order to complete 20.8 kilometres of rehabilitation on Highway 60 in summer 2020. The ministry is proposing to work extended hours between July 18 and Sept. 7, from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m.

Coun. Jennifer Dailloux said she has spoken with residents on Oxtongue Lake about the work. She said although residents support improvements to the highway, they have questions about the project.

"There are obviously concerns about the noise considering it's fairly late at night," Dailloux said.

She said residents want more information and asked about whether the work could slow to regular hours when its near Oxtongue Lake residents. People also said their position on the extended hours would depend on how many days it is necessary and whether work would extend into the busy fall leaf season.

"It's a very small community. It's primarily resorts," Mayor Carol Moffatt said. "If we can get more of those details ... that would be better."

The proposed project is between the Highway 35 intersection and Algonquin Park.

Algonquin Highlands avoids worst of flooding

Moffatt delivered an update on flooding in the community and said Algonquin Highlands "dodged a bullet" when it came to the rising waters.

Moffatt said there was a short period of concern for flood waters but the municipality has avoided anything as severe as seen in neighbouring municipalities like Minden. In an April 28 Facebook statement, Moffatt said although rain could change things, the situation is stable and there are no longer concerns about reaching 2013 or 2017 flooding levels in AH.

"We have, as a municipality, been addressing concerns with our water levels for a number of years," she said. "We'll certainly keep mitigating and adapting to those changing patterns."

Waste wizard app moving ahead

The township is planning to move ahead with a new app to spread information regarding waste.

Staff presented to council about the app. It would cost about \$3,000 annually which could be split with other municipalities. Minden Hills and Dysart et al are both interested in the project but staff said they could not commit to it this year. Highlands East is expected to partner in 2019.

Moffatt said hopefully they could get more partners for the application next year.

"Concerns they have can be allayed over the year if we're going to put this in place," she said. "There should be some very solid feedback for them to get on board next year."

Operations manager Adam Thorn said staff hope to have it running for Canada Day weekend but could not guarantee the timeline. (Algonquin Highlands news compiled by Joseph Quigley).

Healthy eating 'trailblazer' celebrated

Rosie Kadwell's had plenty of obstacles to overcome in her 32-year career in public

The Haliburton dietitian reflected on her journey at her retirement party May 3. Family, friends and colleagues celebrated Kadwell for her work with the Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge District Health Unit.

Kadwell started her career split between Peterborough and the County of Haliburton. After her job in Peterborough was cut, she worked to lobby to get a full-time position in public health, which she eventually managed.

"I always wanted to work in public health," she said. "I've been through a lot of cutbacks through my career and the moral is hang in there folks, it works out.'

People close to Kadwell described the work she put into the programs in the community. Her accomplishments include chairing Harvest Haliburton and bringing forth a community food assessment, starting up student nutrition programs and implementing a school board-wide healthy eating policy.

"Rosie is a trailblazer," Lisa Tolentino of Harvest Haliburton said. "We're talking about cutting a path where there is no path. We're talking about veering and it's hard

Former health unit colleague Leslie Orpana said Kadwell had high expectations for herself.

"She could always see how many unmet needs were out there and she wanted so very much to meet them all. There was always a resource that needed to be created, a group that needed a presentation, a school that needed help," Orpana said. "She managed to put healthy eating on a lot of people's radars.'

Kadwell's husband, Kris Kadwell commented on her dedication to her work over the years.

"She's very passionate about her work. 'Let's get the damn job done,'" he said. "Her dedication and her commitment are just overwhelming."

Kadwell said the timing of her retirement came from a desire to be physically active, with her husband also retiring one year ago.

"I wanted to retire when I was still young and healthy and able to do a lot of physical activities, which I love to do," she said. "Be able to spend time with my husband and we

can enjoy life together."

Kadwell thanked the community for the help she received in pushing food programs and healthy eating.

"I've worked here for over 30 years and I was welcomed into the community back then. I've worked with a lot of people that allowed us to change the landscape of food and healthy eating within this community, so I'm grateful for that," she said.

Campaign launched for sexual assault prevention

The Haliburton, Kawartha Lakes, Northumberland Drug Strategy is reminding people of the dangers of drug and alcohol use as it relates to sexual assault with a social media campaign May 6-10.

The drug strategy is participating in the provincial Sexual Assault Prevention Month with the campaign, which aims to highlight the involvement of alcohol and other substances in reported sexual assaults.

The organizations behind the strategy said between 25 and 50 per cent of sexual assaults involve alcohol or other drugs. Strategy co-ordinator Megan Deyman said the hope is for the campaign to raise awareness and connect people with

"The campaign will also give people information about boundaries and consent and to encourage conversations free of shame and blame," Deyman said.

Strategy media and communications worker Nick Adams said the range between 25 and 50 per cent is due to the different sources the stats are pulled from, with the upper-range coming from campus-based studies.

The campaign discusses issues such as people's misunderstanding of consent and how alcohol and drugs can impair one's ability to consent.

"There's real confusion it seems with what consent even means. The fact that consent can even start at one point and can be withdrawn at any time," Adams said. "The fact is if someone is intoxicated, they can't give consent. Whereas our culture, talking about young people, it's a hook-up culture where you're meeting in bars, you're

meeting in social settings where alcohol's involved.'

The campaign notes 27 per cent of sexual assaults occur in bars or restaurants.

Adams said rape myths are still prevalent. In his previous capacity as a youth minister, he said he has seen them perpetuated in the community.

"Thinking about incidents in our own community, I think there's this idea that these are good boys that wouldn't

do something like that. This idea that the victim was lying in some way ... that's unfortunate, it really is," Adams said.

"Nobody asks to be assaulted."

Adams said it is

important for young people to understand consent and he hopes to spread the campaign's message to the local high school amidst prom season.

He added it is important for bystanders to be active in potentially dangerous situations involving drug and alcohol use.


"We need to be able to speak up and speak truth to these situations," Adams said.

What's the A-plan?

Listening to County Warden Liz Danielsen talk about amalgamation on Tuesday, I was left wondering about the county's long-term plan.

She chatted about the short-term. It involves a shared services review with the lower-tier municipalities. It sounded like a bit of a public relations piece to me: proving to the public how well they all play together now. Danielsen said it will also identify other opportunities for partnerships and streamlining to cut costs.

Results of that shared services study should be ready for a strategic planning session within the next couple of months, the warden said.

That brings us to summer, when this kind of work can grind to a bit of a halt. It's likely to pick up again in the fall. Before we know it, one year will have expired on the current term of county and municipal councils.

As to what happens after the shared services study, no one at the county has elaborated. If there is a plan moving forward, no one at the county has shared it with the public. Are they going to take the study out-of-house? Do they think county councillors and staff - who could be directly impacted by a municipal government restructuring, for example, are the ones to lead the way forward? Have they

considered hiring an independent consultant who does not have a vested interest in the outcome?

Is there even the political will for change? Highlander columnist Jack Brezina has been outspoken about the need for amalgamation. He asked Danielsen if something's really going to happen or if it's just more lip service.


The warden said councillors and staff are taking it seriously. But, on the other hand, Danielsen herself is clearly not convinced that amalgamation "in its true" sense will work. She actually used the word "we" are not convinced so it would be interesting to know who's the "we."

The 'we' camp talks about losing identity, ability to make decisions and questions whether money will be saved.

Like Brezina, Peter Oyler of the HHHSF didn't mince words. He said it comes down to political will, and intestinal fortitude.

K.I.S.S.: Keep It Simple Septic

Dear editor,

Minden Hills is the final township to enter into a septic re-inspection program with the intent of protecting our environment.

What an opportunity to make a significant and positive impact on our natural environment, specifically our lakes. So much good could be achieved.

Unfortunately, it appears that the township is opting for a program that will be heavy in paperwork and light in uncovering the true state of septic systems.

Presently, three other townships within Haliburton County are in the process of working through their own septic initiatives. Two townships have opted for a "no pumping" type of inspection and have found fewer problems. They have been able to get a lot more completed, quantity over quality.

Conversely, the Dysart et al program, which includes a pump out, part of regular septic maintenance, allows the inspector to view 100 per cent of the tank's inner workings versus the 25 per cent the proposed inspection type will provide. This would explain why Dysart has a higher rate of non-compliant (damaged) systems.

Minden Hills has put out a tender for what is referred to as a "Level 3" septic inspection. No pumping required. It is important to note that any septic review is better than nothing. Conversely, Dysart officials chose not to simply follow suit but to spend time speaking with local professionals who can provide septic inspection services, thereby utilizing the workforce within Haliburton County.

The Dysart program is ambitious, a vision that will extend 10 years. This is truly working towards the future. A short-sighted vision is such that a less robust effort but larger volume is the way to go.

But, what amount of continuous lowlevel poisoning of our lakes is acceptable? The Minden Hills tender requirement: 3.1 Overview in the Proposal Specifications, I would state with confidence that embracing the inspection protocol that Dysart has set forward versus what has been proposed will ensure: customer satisfaction, understanding will be increased exponentially; guesswork will not be part of the inspection; dye test will not be necessary; communication will be provided by inspectors that do have "skin in the game" because they live here and pumping myths will be abolished.

With a proposed timeline of three years to complete 6,500 inspections, with consideration to extend the program per year, the objective is volume. There's nothing wrong with a program that has a 10-year cycle. We need to keep in mind that the end result should be striving for pristine lakes, not who can cross the finish line first.

As septic inspectors, we have strong opinions on the subject. Our few voices carry little weight, only numbers count.

Let your councillor know what you think. "When you can't see it all it is unrealistic to believe you can assess it all. Pumping matters."

With the proposed Minden Hills Level 3 re-inspection program, the inspector will be required to sign off on a "certification." It will probably be worded along these lines: "I am satisfied on reasonable grounds that the sewage system located on the property is in compliance with the requirements of Section 8.9 of Division B of the Building Code."

The section states: (1) Every sewage system shall be operated and maintained so that, (a) the sewage system or any part of it shall not emit, discharge or deposit sanitary sewage or effluent onto the surface of the ground, (b) sanitary sewage or effluent

shall not emit, discharge, seep, leak or otherwise escape from the sewage system or any part of it other than from a place or part of the sewage system where the system is designed or intended to discharge the sanitary sewage or effluent, and (c) except as provided in Sentence (2), sanitary sewage or effluent shall not emit, discharge, seep, leak or otherwise escape from the sewage system or any part of it into a piped water supply, well water supply, a watercourse, groundwater or surface water.

The question is, how can an inspector in good faith sign off on something that they cannot see the bottom of?

Reborn Hike for Hospice supports palliative care

Haliburtonians joined people across the country to raise funds for palliative care at the annual Hike for Hospice May 5.

Dozens of participants hiked through Head Lake Park for the event, one of many happening throughout the country. HHHS president and CAO Carolyn Plummer said the community support for the event is strong.

Plummer said.

Brian Daoust has participated in every Hike for Hospice in Haliburton. He said the event also acts as an important way to raise awareness for the services.

"We have high school kids talking about hospice whereas five to six years ago, that never happened. The awareness is as important as the money raised," Daoust said. "It's really important to have it public."

This is the second year of the reborn hike in Haliburton, which went into a hiatus for three years after a decade running.

Plummer said the hike being tied to a national event will help it continue into the future.

"It gives us a lot of support we wouldn't otherwise have. Given the turnout and given the commitment that people show to this event and to our services, I think we have a chance to keep this going for the long haul," she said.

TraX4 breast cancer ATV ride raises \$42k

Organizers of the TraX4 Breast Cancer ATV ride were carrying a torch as they hosted the 10th edition of the event May 4.

The annual fundraiser for the Kelly Shires Breast Cancer Foundation was co-founded by Tracey Guthrie. She lost her 19-year battle with breast cancer three years ago.

Despite that, Guthrie's friends and family have continued the event in her stead and reached the decade milestone. Co-founder Suzy Stenoff said Guthrie would be glad to see the event carry on.

"This is really her baby, her brainchild and she would have wanted to see this group," Stenoff said. "I know she'd be really proud to have all of you here today representing the event."

The co-ed event's 42 participants raised \$42,000 for the foundation, which helps breast cancer patients cover living and travel expenses. This was the first time the event has been held in Haliburton, with ATV riders taking off from the Pinestone Resort to hit county trails.

Volunteer Lindsay Draper said participants were looking for a change in atmosphere for the event, which has previously been held in Sequin and Parry Sound.

"It gives us an opportunity to open up this event to others who are not able to travel

and also bring more awareness to the event and the charity with new surroundings," Draper said.

Brooke Creighton participated for her fourth time. She said the cause is an important one to support, with the foundation getting seven to 10 applications from people seeking financial assistance every week.

"The more the awareness grows for the charity, the more applications we get and there's just not enough money to go around," Creighton said. "We want to be able to help as many people as we can. There's a great financial need when you're going through breast cancer."

Lori Mathers said she was participating for the first time in honour of two colleagues battling breast cancer.

"I love them and they're an inspiration to me," Mathers said. "We're all touched by cancer in some way."

Draper said people in the Haliburton area have embraced the event and organizers hope to continue to expand it.

"We're keeping Tracey's dream alive of this event and growing it and just keeping that awareness out there that this charity is here," she said. "Everybody in the community has just really jumped on board."



This year's fundraising will likely go toward the club's next project to build new washroom facilities at Head Lake Park, Brandon said.




