Disaster Distress Helpline: Goals and Objectives

A) 24/7, year-round access to crisis counseling & support for individuals in distress related to disaster

B) Technical Assistance & Training for Call Centers in Disaster Crisis Counseling

C) Outreach & Education to Impacted Communities

D) Assess Performance & Measurable Impact



Disaster Distress Helpline: The Basics

- Provides emotional support first, Information & Referrals second
- Will work to complement existing I & R / Crisis Hotlines as well as link callers/texters with FEMA CCPs & other services, as well as community services (American Red Cross, Salvation Army, other VOADs) provided related to disaster
- Phone (1-800-985-5990) and text ('TalkWithUs' to 66746) available 24/7, year-round
- Multi-lingual interpretation services; Spanish-counseling and texts ('Hablanos' to 66746) available 24/7
- •Will provide support to callers before, during & after natural and man-made disasters, incidents of mass violence, public health crises, and any other disaster that has the potential to have a significant psychological impact on a population and that indicates the need for an organized response
- Will be promoted to the public through grassroots marketing & outreach across the country and within each region



Why the Disaster Distress Helpline?

The occurrence of natural and man-made disasters has increased in the U.S and its territories by 39% over the past decade¹. The psychological impact these events have on a significant proportion of people who experience them² suggests / illustrates the need for a disaster hotline network with the capacity to provide disaster crisis counseling, information and referral in any part of the country with immediacy.

Disasters:

What interferes with 'normal' or functioning levels of readiness, response and/or recovery?

- History of a challenging or difficult recovery from past disasters
- Overwhelming feelings: fear, anger, anxiety, sadness; persistent feelings of powerlessness; pattern of unhealthy coping
- Prior history of / risk factors for depression, suicidal ideations, substance use, other mental health concerns
- History of / risk factors for family violence, domestic violence, sexual violence, other issues of crime/victimization
- Marginalized individuals / communities before, during & after disasters: disabled, elderly, poor, immigrant, LGBT, racial / ethnic / faith minority groups, rural, etc.

This is who the Disaster Distress Helpline will help.



Why Texting for the DDH?

- Prevalence of Mobile Phones, SMS/Texting
- § Study: Preferred Method of Communication for Teens, increasingly also for Adults
- Growing form of outreach and engagement for other Helplines and social services
- Opportunities to reach individuals whom otherwise may go unnoticed ('hard to reach')
- § Engaging individuals in circumstances when they can't make phone calls





What types of disasters might require an organized response?

- Disasters that result in a significant loss of life and/or property
 damage, and/or that have the potential to inflict psychological distress
 on a sizeable population
 - ✓ Natural (Tornadoes, Hurricanes, Earthquakes)
 - √ Man-made (Technical Disasters)
 - ✓ Incidents of Mass Violence (Terrorism)
 - ✓ Public Health Crises (Epidemics)




What might an organized response look like?

Disaster Distress Helpline CRC Resource Database

- A web-based, easy-to-use resource database containing general and disasterspecific mental health and other resources (FEMA CCPs, VOAD services, etc.)
- Resources will be verified and updated regularly, incl. 24-72 hours after a disaster.


