Santa Fe Strong Resiliency Center Opening Wednesday *Long-term community-based services available to those impacted by tragedy*

SANTA FE, Texas – May 30, 2018 — The City of Santa Fe is partnering with the Santa Fe Independent School District (ISD) and Gulf Coast Center to open a free community center to support those impacted by the Santa Fe High School shooting tragedy.

To ensure continuity of service, the Family Assistance Center will transition to the Santa Fe Strong Resiliency Center on Wednesday, May 30. The center will continue to operate at Aldersgate United Methodist Church in Wesley Hall (13217 FM1764, Santa Fe, TX 77510). The center will be open Monday through Saturday 10 am-7 pm and Sunday 1 pm-7 pm.

The Santa Fe Strong Resiliency Center will be a long-term resource for the greater Santa Fe community and Galveston County, including victims and their families; students, staff and their families; residents; responders; and the public.

“The outpouring of support to the City of Santa Fe and our residents is truly special and we are grateful for those who keep us in their hearts as we recover from this tragedy,” said Santa Fe Mayor Jason Tabor. “Our residents and neighbors have demonstrated a sense of community of which we should be proud.

“We know that Santa Fe residents, those connected to us and many others are dealing with the emotional trauma of this event in a variety of ways. We encourage anyone who needs support to visit the Santa Fe Strong Resiliency Center so that we may continue the healing process together.”

Drawing from other communities’ experiences, the Santa Fe Strong Resiliency Center will serve as a resource and referral hub for anyone impacted by the incident. Partner agencies will provide case management, counseling and spiritual care referrals, training, advocacy and support, legal aid and more. Multiple community partners will help support the center including local, state and nonprofit agencies. Services will evolve with the needs of the community.

COPING AND PREPAREDNESS TIPS

The following are coping and preparedness tips for those impacted by this tragedy.

- Events like this can cause feelings of uncertainty and anxiety since no one knows what could potentially happen next. Remember that this is normal.
- Stay informed but limit media exposure of the events, especially for children.
- Let children talk about their fears and then reassure them about their safety. Talk with them in ways that they can easily understand. Let them guide the conversation; share details only when they ask about them.
- Be patient with yourself and others. It’s common to have any number of temporary stress reactions such as anger, frustration and anxiety.
- Spend more time with family and friends and offer your support.
- Watch for signs of stress in your family, friends and children. Get help from others if needed.
- Take care of yourself. Eat healthy, drink plenty of water and get enough rest.

- Trained mental health professionals are available to talk privately at the Family Assistance Center.
