➤ **GPSS Attends SAGE Day on the Hill:**

During spring break four GPSS representatives will attend SAGE Day on the Hill, a four-day conference dedicated to education and advocacy for policies at the federal level that affect graduate and professional students, alongside student government leadership from other R1 Universities across the country. We will workshop policy-oriented white papers, cast votes for organizational leadership positions and coalition platforms, and attend advocacy training. Lastly, we will meet with legislators in both the House of Representatives and the Senate on Capitol Hill to advocate for policies that benefit graduate and professional students, including student finance, gender equity and sexual harassment, immigration, research funding, and more.

➤ **Student Regent Search and Onboarding**


