3. Chair's Announcements

- *Senate Executive Meeting, April 9, 2007*
 - Secretary of the Senate acknowledged great work done by council.
 - Kaminsky gave a five-minute presentation. During his presentation, Kaminsky underscored opportunity for UW to be of scholarly excellence. The topic will be revisited at the next Senate Executive Meeting, and will be on the next Senate Agenda.
 - Concerns are raised by the council about the scope of the project, and need for assistance in implementing, which Kaminsky will emphasize to the Senate. Kaminsky also notes that Turnitin.com is not exclusively identified as a vendor, but their free trial is mentioned.
 - Next Steps: Proposal will move forward to the budgeting committee. There is an approximate cost of \$30,000 associated with the project, once the free trial expires (approximate \$1,000 fixed license fee, plus \$0.75 per student, per year usage fee).
