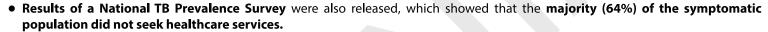


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### **WORLD TUBERCULOSIS DAY 2022 OBSERVED**

- India TB report on the theme 'Coming Together to End TB Altogether' and National TB **Prevalence Survey Report** released in the backdrop of celebrations.
- Key highlights of India TB report
  - > 2021 witnessed 19% increase from previous year in TB patients' notification.
  - > Vision of the National Strategic Plan for Elimination of Tuberculosis (NSP 2017- 25) permeated to state and district levels with 18 states having committed to Ending TB by 2025.
  - > In India, childhood Tuberculosis remains a staggering problem, contributing to approximately 31% of the global burden.
  - > There has been an increase in the mortality rate due to all forms of TB between 2019 and 2020 by 11% in India.



- > Prevalence of all forms of TB for all ages in India was 312 per lakh population for the year 2021.
- Government also launched "Dare to Erade TB" program for formation of a Genome Sequencing Consortium for Whole Genome Sequencing, (WSG) TB surveillance based on the Indian Data.

#### **About TB**

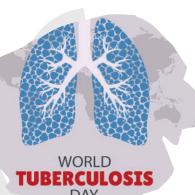
- O Caused by bacterium Mycobacterium tuberculosis.
- OIt is a communicable disease which is spread from person to person through the air.
- o India's vision to end TB Eliminating TB by 2025, five years ahead of global target by World Health Organisation (WHO) i.e., 2030.
- O Steps taken by government to check TB -National Strategic Plan for Tuberculosis Elimination 2017-2025, National Tuberculosis Elimination Program (NTEP)- Centrally Sponsored Scheme and TB Harega Desh Jeetega Campaign.

# ON COOPERATIVES, HOUSE PANEL TELLS GOVERNMENT: ENSURE FEDERAL FEATURES INTACT

- Parliamentary standing Committee has made following recommendations:
  - > Exercise utmost prudence in chalking out Activities / Schemes / Programmes at National Level so that the federal features of country are not impinged upon.
  - > New National Cooperation Policy shall be evolved after wider consultations with all the stakeholders.
  - > Introduce necessary legal and institutional framework to protect the interests of the Members of all Multi State Cooperative Societies (MSCS).
  - > Formulate an effective mechanism to ensure that Cooperatives get adequate opportunities / facilities for existence, growth and development.
- **Cooperatives in India:** 
  - > 'Cooperative Societies' is a **State subject** under Seventh Schedule.
  - > Through 97th constitution amendment act, Part IXB was introduced in the Constitution.
    - > Amendment set out **basic rules** such as a maximum of 21 directors in a society, a fixed term of five years for elected members etc.
    - > However, Supreme Court in Union of India v Rajendra Shah and Others (2021), has partly struck down the amendment as it violated the powers of state legislatures with respect to items in the state list.
      - > It held that Cooperatives are strictly within the domain of the state and only in matters of multistate cooperatives does Parliament have sanction to legislate.

#### Legislative framework for Cooperatives

- O Various states have enacted State Cooperation Societies Acts for governing the Co-operative Societies operating in the respective States.
- For societies operating in more than one State, the Central Government has enacted 'Multi State Co-operative Societies Act, 2002'.





## **USE OF NUCLEAR ENERGY FOR POWER GENERATION**

- Present installed nuclear power capacity in the country is 6780 MW comprising of 22 operational nuclear power reactors.
- India has developed comprehensive capabilities in all stages of nuclear fuel cycle namely: Mining, uranium production, fuel fabrication, nuclear power production, spent fuel reprocessing and waste management.
- Inter-Governmental Agreement (IGA) for co-operation in peaceful uses of nuclear energy have been signed with the 18 countries: Argentina, Australia, Bangladesh, Canada, Czech Republic, European Union, France, Japan, Kazakhstan, Mongolia, Namibia, Republic of Korea, Russia, Sri Lanka, United Kingdom, United States of America, Vietnam and Ghana.
  - Currently there is no collaboration with Israel on nuclear energy.
- Significance
  - > Credibility to its status as a responsible nuclear power.
  - > Potential to sustain the country's growing energy requirements.

#### Challenges

- > Barriers to India's acceptance within the global non-proliferation regime due to India's nuclear weapons programme, and its **strained relationship** with its neighbour Pakistan (also a nuclear weapons state).
- > Domestic protests due to concerns, such as diversion of water to the plants, environmental degradation, land acquisition etc.

## MINISTRY OF HOME AFFAIRS (MHA) EXTENDS FOR-EIGN CONTRIBUTION (REGULATION) ACT (FCRA) REGISTRATION OF NGOS

- MHA in public interest extended the validity of FCRA registration of NGOs till June 30, revising its previous extended deadline of March 31.
  - > Also, FCRA entities whose 5-year validity period is expiring between April 1-June 30 and who have applied for renewal before expiry of registration will also stand extended.
- FCRA is meant to ensure that foreign contribution is received from legitimate sources and utilised for legitimate purposes by any person.
  - > First enacted in 1976, it has been amended in 2010 and 2020.
  - > To receive foreign funds, it is imperative for NGOs to get themselves registered under the (FCRA) and certificates are renewed every 5 years.
  - > NITI Aayog is the nodal agency for registration and accreditation of NGOs seeking funding from the Government of India.

**Provisions regarding Regulation of NGO** in India

> Foreign Exchange **Management Act** (FEMA), 1999 regulated by Ministry of Finance

> New rules under **FCRA Amendment** 2020

> > Prohibition of transfer of funds from one NGO to another.



- > Decrease of administrative expenses through foreign funds from 50% to
- Making Aadhaar mandatory for registration.

# INDIA'S APPROACH **UKRAINE-RUSSIA SITUATION BASED ON 6 PRINCIPLES: EX-**TERNAL AFFAIR MINISTER

- India has had to walk a diplomatic tightrope over Ukraine in the past few days as it tried to balance its ties with Russia and the West.
- India has abstained on two resolutions at the **United Nations General Assembly (UNGA)** related to the humanitarian crisis in Ukraine following the Russian invasion.
  - > First abstention was on a draft resolution that held **Russia responsible** for the crisis.
  - > Second was a **procedural vote-** on whether the UNGA ought to take up a second **resolution**, **for action** at all. This resolution did not mention Russia.
- Government has informed that India's approach was guided by its own national interest and was based on six principles which espoused peaceful resolution through dialogue and diplomacy.
- Six principles are
  - > An "immediate cessation of violence and end to hostilities."
  - > Return to the path of dialogue and diplomacy.
  - > Recognition that global order is anchored on international law, UN Charter and respect for territorial integrity sovereignty of all states.
  - > Call for Humanitarian Access to the conflict situation.
  - > India gives humanitarian assistance.
  - > Being in touch with leadership of both Russia and Ukraine.







- The 9 states include Mizoram, West Bengal, Chhattisgarh, Rajasthan, Maharashtra, Kerala, Jharkhand, Punjab and Meghalaya.
- About General Consent to CBI
  - > Unlike National Investigation Agency (NIA), which is governed by its own NIA Act and has jurisdiction across the country, CBI is governed by Delhi Special Police Establishment Act.
  - > This makes **consent of state government mandatory** for conducting investigation in that state. There are two kinds of consent: case-specific and general.
  - > "General consent" is normally given to help CBI seamlessly conduct investigations smoothly across states.
  - > Section 6 of DSPE Act, 1946 empowers state government to give or deny consent to CBI officer.
- With withdrawal of General Consent, CBI will not be able to register any fresh case involving officials of the central government **or a private person in the state** without the consent of the state government.
- However, Supreme Court and High Courts can order CBI to investigate such a crime anywhere in the country without the consent of the State.
- CBI is the main investigation agency of the central government for cases relating to corruption and major criminal probes.

**Vacancies in Tribunals** 

- Supreme Court has expressed concerns over the inability of the Government to fill up the staggering vacancies in Tribunals.
- Tribunals are established for discharging judicial or quasi-judicial duties with the objective of reducing case load of the judiciary or bringing in subject expertise for technical matters.
  - > Article 323A empowered Parliament to constitute administrative Tribunals (both at central and state level) for adjudication of matters related to recruitment and conditions of service of public servants.
  - > Article 323B specified certain subjects (such as taxation and land reforms) for which Parliament or state legislatures may constitute tribunals by enacting a law.



**Reserve Bank Innovation Hub (RBIH)** 

- It has been inaugurated in Bengaluru.
- Set up as a Section 8 company under Companies Act, 2013, with an initial capital contribution of Rs 100 crore
- RBIH aims to encourage and nurture financial innovation in a sustainable manner through an institutional set-up.
  - > It create an ecosystem that focuses on promoting access to financial services and products for the low-income population in the country.
- Hub would bring convergence among various stakeholders (BFSI Sector, Start-up ecosystem, Regulators and Academia) in the financial innovation space.



**Government e Marketplace** 

- Government e-Marketplace (GeM) achieved annual procurement of Rs. 1 lakh crore in Financial Year 2021-22
- About GeM:
  - > One stop portal to facilitate online procurement of common use Goods & Services required by various Government Departments / Organizations / PSUs.
- > Launch Year: 2016
- > Hosted by: Directorate General of Supplies and Disposals (DGS&D) under Ministry of Commerce and Industry.
- > **Benefits:** Transparency, efficiency and speed in public procurement.



**Polar Science and Cryosphere Research** (PACER) scheme

- PACER scheme has been approved for continuation during 2021-2026.
- About PACER scheme:
  - > Comprises the Antarctic program, Indian Arctic program, Southern Ocean program and **Cryosphere and Climate** program.
- > Implemented through National Centre for Polar and Ocean Research (NCPOR), an autonomous institute under the Ministry of Earth Sciences.
- Achievements:
  - > Executed 39th& 40th Indian Scientific Expedition to Antarctica (41st ongoing).
  - > Automatic Weather Station (AWS) systems installed at Baralacha La, in the Spiti region.
- > IndARC mooring system was deployed in Kongsfjorden, Svalbard.
- > Executed 11th Indian Southern Ocean Expedition.



- DRDO successfully test fired the surface to surface BrahMos supersonic cruise missile in the Andaman and Nicobar islands.
  - > The extended range missile hit its target with pinpoint accuracy.
- The extended range missile hit its target with pinpoint accuracy.
- > BrahMos variants can be launched from land, air, sea and under water.
- > The range was originally capped at 290 km as per obligations of the Missile Technology Control Regime (MTCR).
