

FOURTH CONFERENCE OF PARTIES (COP4) TO THE MINAMATA CONVENTION ON MER-**CURY BEING HELD IN BALI, INDONESIA**

 MC on Mercury, adopted in 2013 at Geneva, is the world's first legally binding treaty to protect human health and environment from adverse effects of mercury.

- > It is named after the city in Japan that became the epicenter of Minamata disease, a neurological disease caused by severe mercury poisoning, in the 1950s.
- > India signed the MC in 2014 and ratified in 2018.
- > It came into force in 2017.
- At the meeting, Indonesia as well as the United Nations have introduced a global declaration that calls on parties to the Minamata Convention (MC) on Mercury to tackle global illegal trade of mercury.
- Non-binding declaration calls upon parties to
 - > Develop practical tools and notification and information-sharing systems for monitoring and managing trade in mercury.
 - > Exchange experiences and practices relating to combating illegal trade in mercury, including reducing use of mercury in artisanal and small-scale gold mining.
- Other conventions
 - > Rotterdam For certain hazardous chemicals and pesticides in international trade.
 - > Basel- Control of transboundary movements of hazardous wastes and their disposal.
 - Vienna- Protection of Ozone Layer.
 - > Stockholm- Persistent Organic Pollutants (POPs).
- Mercury considered by WHO as one of the top ten chemicals or groups of chemicals of major public health concern.
 - It may have toxic effects on nervous, digestive and immune systems, lungs, kidneys, skin and eyes.
 - India is second-largest user of mercury in world after US.

STATE LEGISLATURES HAVE POWER TO TAX LOTTERIES ORGANIZED BY OTHER STATES: SC

- The judgement came on appeals filed by Karnataka and Kerala governments and set aside the orders of their respective High Courts which held that they lacked legislative competence to levy tax on lotteries.
- Issues involved
 - > Whether "betting and gambling" include "lotteries" and whether States have the competence to tax them as per Entry 62 of Indian Constitution.
 - > Whether Entry 40 of List I restricts the power of States to levy tax on lotteries organized by other states.
- SC observation
 - > Lotteries come within ambit of 'betting and gambling' as appearing in state subject under Entry 34 List II of Seventh Schedule.
 - > Lotteries, except those organized by the Government of India or Government of a State covered under Entry 40 List I, come within State subject.
 - > Entry 40 of List I does not take away the power of States to levy tax on other-state lotteries.
 - > Court observed that in case of an apparent overlapping between two Entries, the doctrine of pith and substance has to be applied to find out the true nature of a legislation and the Entry within which it would fall.
- O According to Finance Act, 1994 act "Betting or Gambling" means putting on stake something of value, particularly money, with consciousness of risk and hope of gain on the outcome of a game or a contest, whose result may be determined by chance or accident, or on the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring.
- O Lottery is enumerated under Entry 40 of List I of Seventh Schedule and governed by Lotteries (Regulation) Act.



TING BETWEEN EXTERNAL AFFAIRS MINISTER OF INDIA AND OMAN HELD

- India and Oman agreed to finalise negotiations for a bilateral protocol on investment and avoidance of double taxation at an early date.
 - > They also agreed to pursue opportunities in areas such as renewable energy, green hydrogen etc.
- India Oman Relations
 - > Political relations: Oman is a strategic partner of India in the Gulf and an important interlocutor at the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC), Arab League and Indian Ocean Rim Association (IORA) fora.
 - > Diplomatic relations were established in 1955 and the relationship was upgraded to Strategic partnership in 2008.
 - > Defence: It is the only country in the Gulf region with which all three services of the Indian armed forces conduct regular bilateral exercises.
 - > Oman also provides critical operational support to Indian naval deployments in Arabian sea for anti-piracy missions.
 - > Strategic: India has secured access to Oman's Port of Dugm for military use and logistical support as part of its strategy to counter Chinese influence in the region.

> Economic and commercial: For Oman, India was 3rd largest source for its imports and 3rd largest market for Oman's crude oil exports in 2019.

INDIA ACHIEVED ITS AMBITIOUS TARGET OF CROSS-ING \$400 BILLION EXPORTS

- For the first time ever, India achieved the target that it had set for exports marking a key milestone for Atmanirbhar Bharat journey.
 - > Key drivers of export growth included petroleum products (147.6%), engineering goods (49.7%), electronics goods (42.8%) and gems and jewellery (57.3%).
- Reasons for such expansion include
 - > Demand side
 - > Pent up demand that was not met during major waves of the Covid-19 pandemic.
 - Expansionary monetary policy by developed economies in response to the

economic impact of the pandemic.

> Supply Side

- > Foreign Trade Policy (FTP) 2015-20 was extended till 2022.
- Niryat Bandhu Scheme was launched to reach out to the new and potential exporters.
- > Trade Infrastructure for Export Scheme (TIES) and Market Access Initiatives (MAI) Scheme were launched to provide assistance.
- > A comprehensive "Agriculture Export Policy" was launched.
- > Remission of Duties and Taxes on Exported Products (RoDTEP) scheme and Rebate of State and Central Levies and Taxes (RoSCTL) Scheme.
- > Enhancing role of Indian missions abroad towards promoting India's trade, tourism etc.



PROVIDES ASTRONAUT MOON **PLANS UNDER ARTEMIS**

- National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) rolled out its **ARTEMIS I moon mission** to the launchpad for testing at the Kennedy Space Centre in Florida, United States.
- ARTEMIS program means Acceleration, Reconnection, Turbulence and Electrodynamics of Moon's Interaction with the Sun. It is divided into three parts.
 - > Artemis I involves an uncrewed flight to test Space Launch System (SLS) rocket and Orion spacecraft.
 - > Artemis II will be the first crewed flight test and is targetted for 2023.
 - > Artemis III will land astronauts on the Moon's South Pole in 2024.
- With this program, NASA aims to land humans on the moon by 2024, and contribute to scientific discovery and economic benefits and inspire a new generation of explorers.
 - > Also, demonstrates new technologies, capabilities and business approaches that will ultimately be needed for the future exploration of Mars.
- Elements involved in going to moon are exploration ground systems (the structures on the ground that are required to support the launch), **SLS, Orion** (the spacecraft for lunar missions), **Gateway** (the lunar outpost around the Moon), **lunar landers** (modern human landing systems) and the Artemis generation spacesuits.

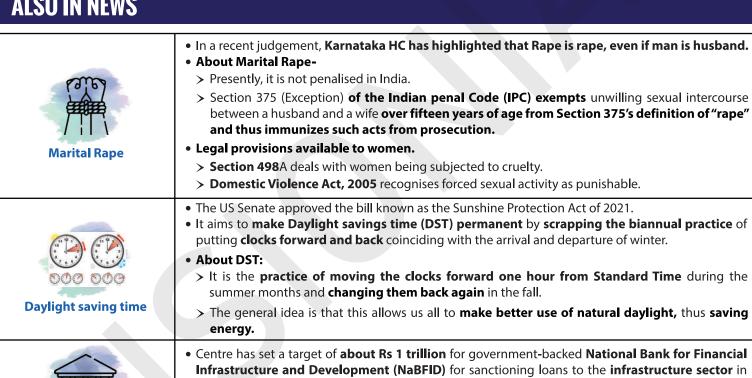
Liquid Waste Management

TURE THIS YEAR: PARLIAMENTARY PANEL

Key highlights of the report

- Poor target achievement under Swachh Bharat Mission According to the report, implementation of solid and liquid waste management (SLWM) infrastructure which was to be taken up under second phase of SBM lagged behind in the country.
 - Only 22% of target villages covered under Solid Waste Management and 12% under Liquid Waste Management.
- Under Jal Jeevan Mission which aims to bring potable tap water to all rural homes by 2024, the committee slammed the government for low fund utilisation.
 - > While ₹50,011 crore was allocated in the Budget, the actual expenditure incurred so far is only ₹28,238 crore.
- Solid and Liquid Waste Management (SLWM) is the collection, transportation, processing, recycling, treatment, and disposal of waste material in a scientific manner.
 - > SLWM is one of the key components of SBM- Gramin, launched with the objective of bringing improvement in cleanliness, hygiene and the general quality of life in rural areas.
 - > Gram Panchayat functionaries would be responsible for design, implementation, operation and maintenance (O&M) of SLWM systems with support from respective state governments.

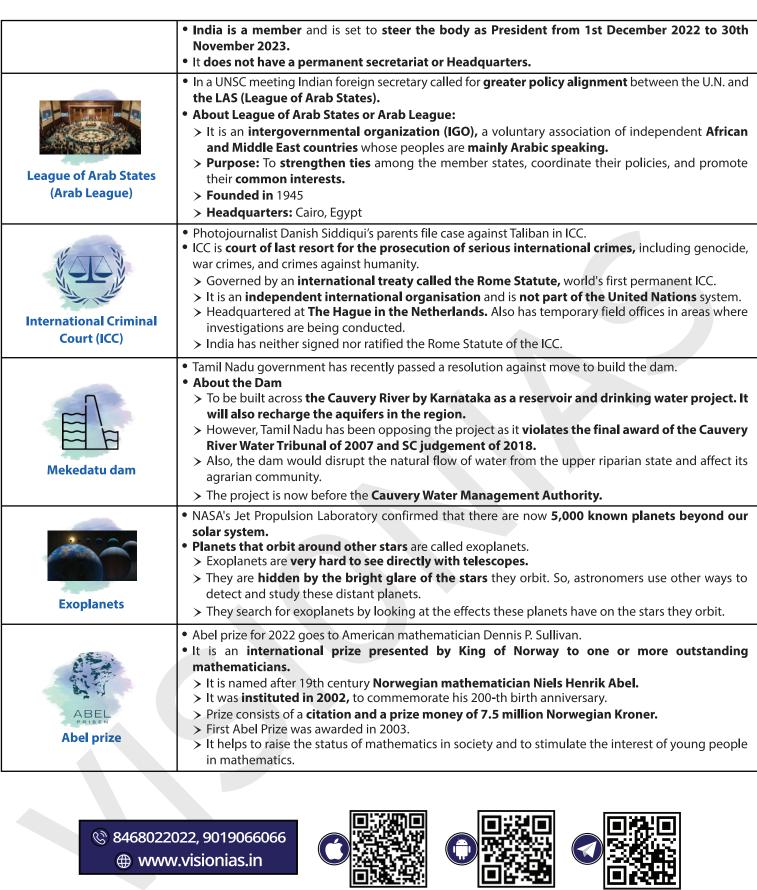
Financing Infrastructure and Development (NaBFID)

- Infrastructure and Development (NaBFID) for sanctioning loans to the infrastructure sector in the next financial year.
- About NaBFID:
- > It is **principal development financial institution (DFIs)** for infrastructure financing.
 - > DFIs are set up for providing long-term finance where the risks involved are beyond the acceptable limits of commercial banks and other ordinary financial institutions.
- > It will start operations in the first quarter of the next financial year.



- Founded in 1999, it is an informal group of 19 countries and the European Union, with representatives of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank.
- Together, the G20 members represent more than 80% of world GDP, 75% of international trade and 60 percent of the world population.
- Its objective is to discuss key issues in the global economy.
