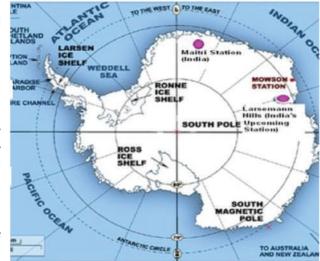


MINISTRY OF POWER ISSUES GUIDELINES FOR BUDGETARY SUPPORT (BS) IN HYDROPOWER **PROJECTS**

- Guidelines have been released for BS for Flood Moderation and for Budgetary Support for Enabling Infrastructure roads and **bridges** with regard to Hydropower Projects.
 - > Objective of BS is to reduce tariffs of electricity produced from these projects, thus ensuring that the consumers are charged costs related to power components only.
 - Amount required shall be released through Ministry of Power after appraisal of each project, on case-to-case basis, by Public Investment Board (PIB)/ Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs (CCEA).
- Hydro electricity is conversion of mechanical energy in flowing water into electricity.
 - > Hydropower provides benefits beyond electricity generation by providing **flood control**, irrigation support, and clean drinking water.
- India is endowed with large hydropower potential of 1,45,320 MW of which only about 45,400 MW has been utilized so far.
 - > India targets to achieving a cumulative Hydropower installed capacity of 75 GW by the year 2030.
- Measures to promote hydropower sector
 - > Declaring large hydropower projects, i.e., projects with a capacity of more than 25 MW as renewable energy source;
 - > Hydro power purchase obligation;
 - > Tariff rationalization measures for bringing down hydropower tariff.

INDIA EXTENDS SUPPORT FOR PROTECTING ANTARCTIC ENVIRONMENT AND FOR DES-**IGNATING EAST ANTARCTICA AND WEDDELL SEA AS MPAS**

- Designating East Antarctica and the Weddell Sea as the Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) are essential to regulate illegal unreported and unregulated fishing (IUUF).
 - > MPAs provides protection for all or part of its natural resources, certain activities within an MPA are limited or prohibited to meet specific conservation, habitat protection, ecosystem monitoring, or fisheries management objectives.
- India also urged the Commission for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (CCAMLR) member countries to ensure that India remains associated with the formulation, adaptation and implementation mechanisms of these MPAs in future.
 - > CCAMLR is an international treaty to manage Antarctic fisheries to preserve species diversity and stability of the entire Antarctic marine ecosystem.
 - > CCAMLR came into force in 1982. India has been a permanent member of the CCAMLR since 1986.
- **Other Government initiatives**
 - > In 1983, India signed Antarctic Treaty 1959 that aims to demilitarize Antarctica and establish it as a zone used for peaceful research activities and to set aside any disputes regarding territorial sovereignty, thereby ensuring international cooperation.
 - > Indian Antarctic Bill aims at having India's own national measures for protecting the Antarctic environment and dependent and associated ecosystem.









GEOGRAPHICAL INDICATIONS (GI) TAG FOR 7 INDIGENOUS PRODUCTS OF UTTARAKHAND

- 7 indigenous products of Uttarakhand include: Kumaon's chyura oil, Munsyari rajma, Bhotia dann (a rug made by Bhotias, a nomadic community), aipan (traditional art made on special occasions), ringal craft (art of making items by knitting bamboo strands), copper products and thulma (blankets spun from locally-sourced fabrics).
 - > Tejpatta, Indian bay leaf, was the first product in the state to get the GI tag.
- A GI is a sign used on products that have a specific geographical origin and possess qualities or a reputation that are due to that origin typically used for agricultural products, foodstuffs, wine and spirit drinks, handicrafts, and industrial products.
- The GI are part of the intellectual property rights that comes under the Paris Convention for the Protection of Industrial Property.
 - > A GI right enables those who have the right to use the indication to prevent its use by a third party whose product does not conform to the applicable standards.
 - > In India, Geographical Indications registration is administered by the Geographical Indications of Goods (Registration and Protection) Act of 1999.

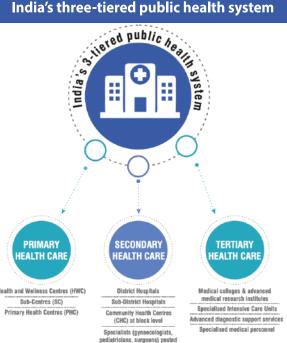
NITI AAYOG LAUNCHES REPORT TITLED 'BEST PRACTIC-**ES IN THE PERFORMANCE OF DISTRICT HOSPITALS'**

• It is the first-ever performance assessment of district hospitals and marks a

shift in healthcare delivery system towards data-driven governance for communities and people availing health services.

> Report is **released** jointly by NITI Aayog, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare and WHO India.

• According to the report, district hospitals in India have on an average 24 per 1 lakh heds population, with Bihar having the lowest average of six beds and Puducherry Health and Wellness Centres (HWC) the highest of 222.



- > The Indian Public pediatricians, surgeons) posted at CHC and DH **Health Standards (IPHS)** 2012 guidelines recommend district hospitals to maintain at least 22 beds per 1 lakh population (based on 2001 census).
- > WHO recommends that for every 1,00,000 people there be at least 500 beds.
- Public health care in India
 - > Health is a State subject.
 - > The public health care infrastructure in India has been developed as a three-tier system (refer to the infographics).
 - > As per the IPHS, district hospitals are mandated to:
 - Make services more responsive and sensitive to the needs of the people of the district.
 - > Provide comprehensive secondary health care (specialist and referral services) to the community;

MINISTRY OF PANCHAYATI RAJ LAUNCHES PEOPLE'S PLAN CAMPAIGN (PPC) 2021- SABKI **YOJANA SABKA VIKAS**

- The PPC is an effective strategy for ensuring the preparation of Gram Panchayat Development Plan (GPDP) in a campaign mode.
 - > During the campaign, structured Gram Sabha meetings will be held for preparing the GPDP for the next financial year i.e. 2022-23 respectively.
- Panchayats have been mandated for the preparation of GPDP for economic development and social justice utilizing the resources available to them.
 - > It involves full convergence with Schemes of all related Central Ministries / Line Departments related to 29 subjects enlisted in Eleventh Schedule of Constitution.
 - > GPDP brings together both the citizens and their elected representatives in the decentralized planning processes.
- Main objectives include
 - > Ensuring proper utilisation of funds, raising own source revenues **Panchavats**, use of innovation technology, bridging digital divide in rural and remote areas, and mainstreaming of Panchayat – Women Self Help Groups.
 - > Evidence Based Assessment of Progress made during previous years
 - ➤ Public Information Campaign of programmes in Gram Panchayat office.
- Government also launched Vibrant Gram sabha dashboard for enhanced coordination and data streamlining.

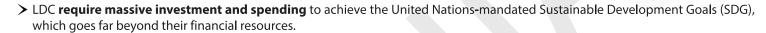






'LEAST DEVELOPED COUNTRIES REPORT 2021' RELEASED BY THE UNITED NATIONS CONFER-**ENCE ON TRADE AND DEVELOPMENT (UNCTAD)**

- Least developed countries (LDCs) are low-income countries confronting severe structural impediments to sustainable development. They are highly vulnerable to economic and environmental shocks and have low levels of human assets.
 - > The list of LDCs was first created in 1971 (50 years ago) and is reviewed every three years by the Committee for Development Policy (CDP), a group of independent experts that report to the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) of the United Nations.
 - > The review is based on income, human assets index (HAI) and economic and environmental vulnerability index.
- Key highlights of the report
 - > 46 countries are designated as LDCs.
 - > Gross domestic product (GDP) per capita for LDC group represented less than 10% of the world average in 2019.
 - > The scope for trade and industrial policies to influence economic development in LDCs remains largely unexploited.
 - > Due to health, economic and social crises brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic, in 2020 they recorded their worst growth performance in about three decades.

DigiSaksham

- Ministry for Labour and Employment has launched DigiSaksham a digital skills programme to enhance the employability of youth by imparting digital skills that are required in an increasingly technology driven era.
 - > This is a joint initiative with Microsoft India.
- Free of cost training in digital skills including basic skills as well as advance computing will be provided to more than three lakh youths in the first year.
 - > Jobseekers can access the training through National Career Service (NCS) Portal.
 - > It gives priority to job-seekers of semi-urban areas belonging to disadvantaged communities.



- Basel III is an internationally agreed set of measures developed by the Basel Committee on **Banking Supervision** in response to the financial crisis of 2007-09.
 - The measures aim to strengthen the regulation, supervision and risk management of banks.
- > It has 3 pillars: Enhanced minimum capital and liquidity requirements, Supervisory review process, Enhanced disclosure.
- Members are committed to implementing and applying standards in their jurisdictions within the time frame established by the Committee.
 - > Reserve Bank of India had deferred implementation of provisions made under Basel III capital due to uncertainty related to Covid crisis.



Senior Able Citizens for Re Employment in Dignity (SACRED) Portal

- Under Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, it is a first-of-its-kind dedicated employment exchange portal for senior citizens.
 - > Bring together on a single platform the employment seeker senior citizens and employment providers.
 - > According to LASI report 2020, more than 50% senior citizens were found to be active.
- Significance It will ensure Senior Citizens live healthy, happy, empowered, dignified and self-reliant life.
- Rs. 10 Cr would be provided for funding for the platform development along with maintenance grant of Rs. 2 Cr per year for 5 years.



- The Indian Astronomical Observatory (IAO) located at Hanle near Leh in Ladakh is becoming one of the promising astronomical sites globally.
- This is due to its advantages of more clear nights, minimal light pollution, background aerosol **concentration**, extremely dry atmospheric condition, and uninterrupted by monsoon.

Plastic Waste Management (Second Amendment)

- Amendment said that carry bags made of recycled plastic or products made of recycled plastic can be used in food packaging.
- Experts have voiced apprehension over the move as there is a possibility of presence of poisonous substance in recycled plastic bags.
 - > As Plastic is used in variety of sectors, it raises concern of the source of recycled plastic that will be used in food contact applications.
 - > Use of recycled plastic was prohibited for food contact applications in the Plastic Waste Management Rules, 2016.



Cyclone Shaheen

- The deep depression over the northeast Arabian Sea off Gujarat coast will intensify into a severe cyclonic storm named as Cyclone Shaheen.
- The conditions favourable for the formation and intensification of tropical storms are:
 - > Large sea surface with temperature higher than 27° C;
- > Small variations in the vertical wind speed;
- > Presence of the Coriolis force;
- A pre-existing weak low-pressure area or low-level-cyclonic circulation;
- Upper divergence above the sea level system.



Sanjay Gandhi National Park (SGNP)

- The Maharashtra government is looking for an alternate site for the permanent rehabilitation of families in the tribal hamlets and eligible encroachers of the SGNP.
- SGNP located in Mumbai harbours artificial lakes named 'Vihar and Tulsi'.
- The Kanheri Caves (carved from basalt rock between the 1st century BCE to the 10th century CE) at the center of the park were an important Buddhist learning center and pilgrimage site.
- Flora: The southern mixed-deciduous forest, dominated by the Tectona, Albizzia, Terminalia, Holarrhena, etc.
- Fauna: Spotted Deer, Sambhar, Barking Deer, Black-naped Hare, etc.

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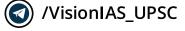








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
