



INDIA'S ARCTIC POLICY TITLED 'INDIA AND THE ARCTIC: BUILDING A PARTNERSHIP FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT' RELEASED

- Ministry of Earth Sciences released India's Arctic Policy to enhance the country's cooperation with the resource-rich and rapidly transforming region.

Significance of Arctic:

- > Changes in the Arctic, especially melting Arctic ice, can be highly disruptive for national development.
- > Synergies between polar studies and **Himalayas.**
- > Melting Arctic ice opens up new opportunities like energy exploration, mining, shipping etc.

History of India's Arctic Research



India holds one of the 13 positions as the Observer in the Arctic Council.

PM UJJWALA YOJANA (PMUY) REDUCED AIR POLLUTION DEATHS BY 13%, PREVENTED OVER 1.5 LAKH DEATHS IN 2019: STUDY

- An independent impact assessment of Ujjwala programme has found that:
 - > PMUY helped in avoiding at least 1.8 million tonnes of PM2.5 emissions in 2019.
 - > Biomass burning in household cooking could be contributing 30-40% of outdoor air pollution.

About PMUY

- > It was launched in 2016 to provide LPG connection to the rural and deprived **households** that were using traditional fuels like wood, cow-dung cakes, or coal for cooking purposes.
- > It aims to reduce premature deaths due to Indoor air pollution.
- > Ujjwala 2.0 was launched in 2021, with an aim to provide deposit-free LPG connections to those low-income families who could not be covered under the earlier phase of PMUY.

About Indoor air pollution:

- > It refers to chemical, biological and physical contamination of indoor air.
- > WHO fact sheet on household air pollution due to indoor pollutants states that 3.8 million premature deaths occur annually.
- > Indoor pollutants recognised: NOx, SO2, ozone (O3), CO, volatile and semi-volatile organic compounds (VOCs), PM, radon and microorganisms.
- > Impacts: Risks of stroke, ischaemic heart diseases, chronic obstructive pulmonary diseases, lung cancer.
- > Other steps taken for Indoor air pollution: Unnat Chulha Abhiyan, National Biomass Cookstoves Initiative, Promoting solar cookers, Neerdhur etc.

Eligibility Criteria for PMUY

- O An adult woman belonging to a poor household and not having LPG connection in her household, will be eligible under UJJWALA 2.0.
- The beneficiaries should belong to any of the following categories:
- ➤ Eligible as per SECC 2011 list
- > Belongs to SC/ST households, be a beneficiary of Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (PMAY), Antyodaya Anna Yojana (AAY), Forest dwellers, Most Backward Classes (MBC), Tea and Ex-Tea Garden Tribes, People residing in riverIslands.
- > If she is not falling in the above 2 categories, then she can stake her claim to be a beneficiary under Poor household by submitting 14-point declaration.







DISASTER MANAGEMENT PLAN OF MINISTRY OF PANCHAYATI RAJ (DMP-MOPR) RELEASED

- Objectives of DMP:
 - > To develop disaster resilience at the grassroots level among the Panchayats,
 - > Establish a framework to align the disaster management measures in rural areas to that of the National Disaster Management Authority.
 - > Convergence of actions to envision, plan and implement community-based disaster management plans.
- Features of DMP-MoPR:
 - > Under it, every Indian village would have a Village Disaster Management Plan (VDMP) and every Panchayat, a DMP.
 - > Incorporates many innovations in addition to being in compliance with Disaster Management Act 2005, National Disaster Management Policy 2009, and guidelines issued by NDMA.
 - > All stakeholders including PRIs, elected representatives and functionaries of Panchayats etc. would participate in planning,

implementation, monitoring and evaluation of the plan.

- Importance of local government & community in DM
 - > Use the local knowledge and resources, and build on them in order to improve the capacity of the people to withstand the impact of disasters.
 - > Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) can be especially effective in enhancing people's responses to disasters by forming village-level disaster response committees, organising early warning systems, rescue teams and diversified sources of livelihood.

NATIONAL COMMISSION FOR SCHEDULED TRIBES (NCST) DYSFUNCTIONAL: PARLIAMENTARY COMMITTEE

- As per the **Standing Committee on Social Justice and Empowerment report**:
 - > NCST has **not delivered a single report to Parliament** in the last four years.
 - > Pending reports include a study of the impact of Indira Sagar Polavaram Project (Andhra Pradesh) on the tribal population and a special report on rehabilitation and resettlement of displaced tribals because of the Rourkela Steel Plant.
- Key observations of Committee:
 - **Lack of manpower:** As per the Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA), **recruitment in** the Commission was constrained because of lack of applicants as the eligibility bar was set too high.
 - > Budgetary shortage: At the Revised Estimate (RE) stage, Budgetary allocations for MoTA were reduced to ₹6126.46 cr (from ₹7,084.07 cr) in 2021-22.
 - ➤ MoTA could not spend fully on the RE allocation in 2020-21.
 - > States also could not utilise the amount released to them by the Ministry.
- **Recommendations of** Committee
 - > Budgetary allocation for the Commission needs to be reviewed so that its functioning is not made to suffer for lack of funds.
 - > Strive to achieve better coordination between the States and the implementing agencies for full utilisation of the funds allotted to them.

About NCST

National Commission for **Scheduled Tribes**

Government of India

O NCST was established by amending Article 338 and inserting a new Article 338A through the 89th Constitution Amendment Act. 2003.

Functions:

- > To investigate & Monitor matters relating to Safeguards provided for STs under the Constitution or under other laws or under Govt. Order.
- > To inquire into specific complaints relating to Rights & Safeguards of STs
- > To participate and Advise in the Planning Process relating to Socio-economic development of STs, and to Evaluate their progress
- > To discharge such other functions in relation to STs as the President may, subject to the provisions of any law made by Parliament, by rule specify
- O It is vested with all the powers of Civil Court while investigating any matter on inquiring into any complaint relating to deprivation of rights and safeguards for STs.

FILM INDUSTRY MUST ALSO **IMPLEMENT POSH ACT, SAYS** KERALA HIGH COURT (HC)

- Kerala HC has asked organisations associated with the film industry to take steps to constitute a joint committee to deal with cases of sexual harassment of women, in line with the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act of 2013.
 - Commonly referred to as the 'PoSH Act', the Act was enacted with the objective of making workplaces safer for women by preventing, prohibiting and redressing acts of sexual harassment against them in the workplace.
- Features of PoSH Act:
 - > It seeks to protect women from sexual **harassment** at their place of work.
 - > The Act defines sexual harassment at the workplace and creates a mechanism for redressal of complaints.
 - The definition of "aggrieved woman," who will get protection under the Act, is extremely wide to cover all women, irrespective of their age or employment status and whether in the organized or unorganized sectors, public or private, and covers clients, customers and domestic workers as well.
 - > An internal complaints committee (ICC) is mandatory in every private or public **organisation** that has 10 or more employees.
 - > ICC has been given powers of a civil court for summoning, discovery and production of documents etc.

Vishaka guidelines

- O Formulated by the Supreme Court (SC) in the Vishaka & Ors vs State Of Rajasthan (1997), making it mandatory for organisations, whether private or public sector to establish a mechanism for redressal of sexual harassment complaints.
- OThese guidelines are legally binding, defined sexual harassment and imposed three key obligations on institutions - prohibition, prevention, redress
- SC directed that they should establish a Complaints Committee, which would look into matters of sexual harassment of women at the workplace.
- 2013 PoSH Act broadened these guidelines.

Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC)

- India has hit out at the OIC for inviting the Hurriyat chief to attend its foreign ministerial meeting in Islamahad
- About OIC:
 - > It is **2nd largest inter-governmental organisation** after the United Nations.
 - > It endeavors to safeguard and protect the interests of the Muslim world in the spirit of promoting international Peace and harmony among various people of the world..
 - > Membership: 57 states.
 - > **Headquarters:** Jeddah, Saudi Arabia.
 - > India is not its member.



Biological and Toxin Weapons Convention (BTWC)

- India at the UNSC advocated the BTWC saying that it is important to ensure its implementation in letter and spirit.
- About BTWC or Biological Weapons Convention (BWC):
 - > It was the first multilateral treaty categorically banning a class of weapon.
 - > The treaty prohibits the development, stockpile, production, or transfer of biological agents and toxins of "types and quantities" that have no justification for protective or peaceful use.
 - > Membership: 183 (including India)



Dredging Corporation of India (DCI) signs the historic Ship Building **Agreement**

- DCI and Cochin Shipyard signed an agreement to build India's first domestically-manufactured high-capacity dredger.
 - > It will help in **bringing down the logistic costs of cargos.**
- DCI is a premier dredging organization catering to the dredging and allied services to Major Ports, Minor Ports, Indian Navy etc.
- **Dredging** is the **process of desilting river bodies, or removal** of soil, mud, and dirt at the shores or the bottom.
 - > Currently, 70% of our dredging requirement is for maintenance dredging (maintaining water bodies previously dredged), while the rest accounts for capital dredging (desilting for new projects).



Bali interim Peace Clause of World Trade Organisation (WTO)

- US has questioned India's high rice exports in 2021 and accused India at the WTO of using the 'Bali interim peace clause' for over-shooting subsidy limits.
- The peace clause protects a developing country's food procurement programmes against action from WTO members in case subsidy ceilings are breached.
- The "peace clause" was accepted at the Bali Ministerial (2013).
- Under the 'Peace Clause', developing countries can provide WTO-prohibited subsidies to farmers without inviting any dispute under the Agreement on Agriculture.



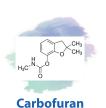
Land Port Authority of India (LPAI)

- Recently the 10th Foundation Day celebrations of LPAI was held.
- LPAI is a statutory body under the Department of Border Management, Ministry of Home Affairs.
- It is entrusted with the task of building land ports on India's borders and provide state of the art infrastructure facilities to facilitate seamless and efficient movement of cargo and passengers.
- Its overall objective of reducing dwell time and trade transaction costs, promote regional trade **and** people-to-people contact and imbibe the best international practices.



UPI Lite

- National Payments Commission of India (NPCI) has launched a new UPI service called UPI Lite.
- The feature will allow to make faster near real-time small value payments without an internet **connection** via the money added in the wallet.
 - > Upper limit of a payment: Rs 200.
- > Total limit of UPI Lite balance: Rs 2,000
- It will support QR code-based payment, presently available payment methods i.e., 123Pay or USSD-based do not support QR-based payment.



- Recent death of more than 95 Himalayan griffon vultures (Near Threatened) and a steppe eagle in Assam has been attributed to **pesticide poisoning due to carbofuran.**
 - > Habitat of Himalayan griffon vultures: western China, Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Afghanistan and Pakistan, east through the Himalayan mountain range in India, Nepal and Bhutan, to central China and Mongolia.
- About Carbofuran:
 - > It is a pesticide that is widely used to control insects and nematodes on a variety of agricultural crops
 - > Its extensive use for agricultural and non-agricultural purposes has been directly responsible for the environmental contamination and human health issues.



Green triangle

Personalities in News

- As part of the 'Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav', a "Green Triangle" named after Mahatma Gandhi was jointly inaugurated in Madagascar's capital Antananarivo.
 - > The word green in the plaque signifies commitment to sustainable development and saving the environment.
- The new green space highlights Gandhi's vision and philosophy when it comes to reducing consumerism, respecting nature and aiming for sustainable development.
 - > It will help raise awareness among the people about his values of peace and non-violence.

Rahul Sankrityayan (April 9, 1893- April 14, 1963)

 Bihar government is in the process to translate and publish hundreds of original Buddhist manuscripts from Nalanda and Vikramshila, saved during the burning of the ancient universities in the 12th and 13th centuries by Bakhtiyar Khilji's army and later brought back to India from Tibet by Rahul Sankrityayan.

Contributions:

- > A traveller and literary polymath, he was universally called Mahapandit (great scholar) as he knew nearly 30 languages, but he almost wrote in Hindi.
- > Wrote "Madhya Asia Ka Itihas" (History of Central Asia); "Volga Se Ganga" (From Volga to Ganga); a grammar and primer of Tibetan in Sanskrit.
- > Made a pioneering contribution in preserving and reconstructing the philosophical works of Buddhist logicians like Dharmakirti, Asang and Subandhu.
- > His travels prompted him to write travelogues and he is considered 'father of Hindi travel literature!
- Values: Humanist; anti-colonial political activist etc.
- Awarded by Sahitya Akademi (1958) & Padma Bhushan.
