- Khanij Bidesh India Ltd. (KABIL) is a joint venture company set up with the participation of 3 Central Public Sector Enterprises namely, National Aluminium Company Ltd. (NALCO), Hindustan Copper Ltd. (HCL) and Mineral Exploration Company Ltd. (MECL).
- KABIL is mandated to identify and acquire overseas mineral assets of critical and strategic nature such as lithium, cobalt, nickel, Copper, Neodymium, other rare earths etc.
 - > KABIL is already engaging with countries like Australia, Argentina, **Bolivia and Chile** which are endowed with cited critical and strategic minerals
- Significance of the initiative
 - > Ensure mineral security and attain self-reliance (Atma Nirbhar Bharat) in the area of critical & strategic minerals.
 - > Cater to requirements of crucial sectors such as e-mobility, renewable energy, medicine, aerospace, aviation etc.
- Critical and strategic minerals
 - > A mineral is labelled as critical when the risk of supply shortage and associated impact on the economy is (relatively) higher than the other
 - > These minerals are termed strategic due to the limited availability of substitutes and their demand in high-technology products such as hybrid cars, wind turbine magnets, and defence equipment.
- Issues with availability of such minerals: Complex global supply chains (High degree of monopoly), supply risks (due to domestic factors and interruptions in international trade) etc.

 - > Learning in regional languages is one of the features of National Education Policy 2020.

SUPREME COURT (SC) NOTICE TO CENTRE, MANIPUR ON INNER LINE PERMIT (ILP) SYSTEM

- SC sought Centre and Manipur State government's response on a plea challenging the constitutional validity of the ILP system extension in Manipur.
 - > The petition challenged the decision of the Centre in 2019 to extend the ILP system in Manipur by way of an order promulgated by the President.
 - > The plea contended that the ILP provides unrestrained power to the state to restrict entry and exit of non-indigenous people or those who are not permanent residents of Manipur. Two of Assam's three
 - > As per plea, ILP violates the fundamental rights of the citizens guaranteed under Articles 14, 15, 19 and 21 under Articles 14, 15, 19 and 21.

About ILP

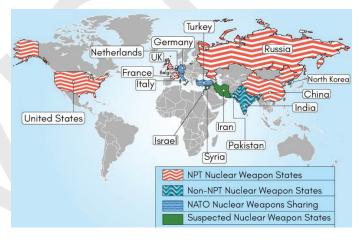
- > ILP is an official travel document or permit granted to outsiders for travel to protected areas for a limited period.
- > It was introduced by the British under the Bengal Eastern Frontier Regulation (BEFR) of 1873.
- > ILP is seen as a way to protect the demographic, cultural, political and social ___under ILP regi **integrity** of the small tribal populations in the hill states.
- > Foreigners need a Protected Area Permit (PAP) to visit tourist places which are different from Inner Line Permits needed by domestic tourists.
- Manipur is the fourth State after Arunachal Pradesh, Nagaland and Mizoram where the ILP regime is applicable.

5 UNITED NATIONS SECURITY COUNCIL (UNSC) STATES PLEDGE TO AVOID NUCLEAR WAR

- In a joint statement, UNSC's Permanent members (Britain, China, France, Russia and U.S.) pledged to prevent further spread of nuclear weapons and to avoid a nuclear war.
 - > They also emphasized importance of preserving and complying with bilateral and multilateral non-proliferation, disarmament, and arms control agreements and commitments.
- Development came ahead of a five-yearly review conference (now postponed) for Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT).

> NPT came to force in 1970 to:

- > Prevent spread of nuclear weapons & weapons technology
- > Foster peaceful uses of nuclear energy,



- > Further goal of disarmament.
- > India, Pakistan, Israel and North Korea are not part of NPT.
- Other multilateral treaties for preventing nuclear proliferation and for promoting progress in nuclear disarmament:
 - > Treaty Banning Nuclear Weapon Tests in Atmosphere, In Outer Space And Under Water, also known as Partial Test Ban Treaty (PTBT). India has ratified
 - > Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty (CTBT) that bans all nuclear weapons test explosions. It was signed in 1996 but has yet to enter into force.
 - > Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW) includes a comprehensive set of prohibitions on participating in any nuclear weapon activities. India is not part of TPNW.

RELIANCE JIO GETS APPROV-AL TO BUY 5G GEAR FROM 'TRUSTED' VENDORS

- It will enable Jio to use equipment from various vendors, including Ericsson, Nokia Networks, Cisco, and Dell, which have been endorsed as a trusted source by National **Security Council Secretariat (NSCS).**
 - > Recently, HFCL Ltd also received approval as a 'Trusted Source' from NSCS.
- Government in June 2021 launched Trusted Telecom Portal (TTP) for giving clearance to trusted products that telecom service providers (TSPs) can install in their network.
 - > 'Trusted Products' are those equipment, whose critical components and the products themselves are sourced from 'Trusted Sources'.
- TTP was launched as a part of National Security Directive on Telecommunications Sector (NSDTS).
 - > NSDTS was approved in 2020 to control installation of telecom gears from non-friendly countries which can pose security threats to the country.
- Under NSDTS, government declares a list of trusted sources and trusted products for installation in the country's telecom network.
 - > List will be decided based on approval of **National Security Committee on Telecom** headed by deputy national security advisor.
 - > Also, directive has **provisions to qualify** telecom gears made by domestic players in trusted category.



BI RELEASES FRAMEWORK FOR OFFLINE DIGITAL PAYMENTS

- Framework has been released under Payment and Settlement Systems Act, 2007.
- Offline Payment refers to a transaction which does not require internet or telecom connectivity to take effect.
 - > It includes any channel or instrument like cards, wallets or mobile devices, with certain Conditions for Authorised Payment System Operators (PSOs) and Payment System Participants (PSPs).
- Framework is aimed at pushing digital transactions in rural and semi-urban areas.
 - > It will allow offline payments of up to Rs 200 per transaction, subject to the total limit of Rs 2,000.
 - > It will enable small value digital payments in offline mode using cards, wallets and mobile device and allowed face-to-face mode
 - > Offline payment transactions may be offered without an additional factor of authentication (AFA).
 - RBI's integrated ombudsman scheme, will be applicable for grievance redressal.
- Benefits of Offline Mode Payments
 - > Enable retail digital payments in remote areas with low speed or no internet connectivity.
 - > Boost the adoption of digital payments and encourage technological innovations in payment system.

Highest Ever Merchandise Export Figures for December

- As per the Preliminary Data for December 2021, India's merchandise export in December 2021 was USD 37.29 billion, the highest ever monthly achievement.
 - > It shows an increase of 37.0% for December 2020 and an increase of 37.55% for December 2019.
- The trade deficit has reduced from April-December 2021 (143.97 billion) to December 2021 (USD) 21.99 billion).



Indian Cyber Crime Coordination Centre (I4C)

- Recently, the **Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA)** released Basic and advanced manuals on Cyber Hygiene for Cyber Space -Dos and Don'ts, and a Quarterly Newsletter - 'CyberPravah' under I4C.
 - > It aims to create awareness of cyber crimes and cyber crime terminology etc.
- I4C, under MHA, acts as an agency for coordinating at the Central level and to support States/UTs by providing a common framework in their fight against cybercrimes.
 - > It brings together academia, industry, public and government in prevention, detection, investigation and prosecution of cybercrimes.





Crops create cooling effect

- As per new study:
 - > Converting annual crops to perennial bioenergy crops can induce a cooling effect on the areas where they are cultivated.
 - > Global air temperature decreases by 0.03~0.08 °C, after 50 years of large-scale bio-energy crop cultivation.
 - > Large-scale bioenergy crop cultivation induces a biophysical cooling effect at the global scale and induces secondary effects on natural greenhouse gas fluxes.
- Bioenergy crops are defined as any plant material used to produce bioenergy.
 - > Bioenergy is "energy derived from recently living material such as wood, crops, or animal waste."



Prime Minister's National Relief Fund (PMNRF)

- Recently, Prime Minister approved ex gratia from PMNRF for the victims of stampede at Mata Vaishno Devi Bhawan.
- PMNRF was established in 1948 with public contributions to assist displaced persons from Pakistan.
- The resources of the PMNRF are utilized to render immediate relief to families of those killed in natural calamities like floods, cyclones and earthquakes, etc.
- It does not get any budgetary support and it accepts voluntary contributions from Individuals, Organizations, Trusts, Companies and Institutions etc.
- Donation to PMNRF is completely tax exempt and contributions made to it qualify as CSR **expenditure** under Companies Act, 2013.



- **Perovskite-based devices**
- Recently, IIT Guwahati have found a way to make solar panels more efficient, cheaper and recyclable by stabilising hybrid perovskite-based solar or photovoltaic devices to produce electricity.
- Perovskite-based devices are considered heavily used semiconductor materials as they are affordable and easy to manufacture.
 - > The perovskite materials are extremely unstable towards ambient (humidity and oxygen) conditions that restrict their commercialisation.



Personalities in News

Places in News

Rani Velu Nachiyar (03 January 1730 - 25 December 1796)

- Rani Velu Nachiyar was daughter of King Chellamuthu Vijayaragunatha Setupathy of Ramanathapuram.
- She is also known as Veeramangai (brave women in Tamil),
- She became the **queen of Sivaganga estate** (in present day Tamil Nadu) from 1780-1790.
- Personality Traits: A trained fighter with proficiency in multiple languages (English, French, Urdu etc.), personifies women empowerment through her virtues of indomitable courage, bravery and strong determination.
- Significant Contributions: She formed an alliance with Hyder Ali against the British in 1780, and she was the first queen to wage war against the **East India Company.**

Saint Kuriakose Elias Chavara (10 February 1805 - 03 January 1871)

- Also known as Chavara Pithavu, Saint Chavara was born at Kainakary (Kerala).
- He belonged to Syro-Malabar Church and became a priest in 1829.
- Personality Traits: An iconic spiritual and social leader, known for virtues of compassion, tolerance and humanity.
- **Significant Contributions:**
 - Started a Sanskrit school at Mannanam in 1846 for education,
 - > Established the first non-government press in Kerala.
 - > Worked towards spiritual, educational, cultural and social reforms in the 19th century.
- > Started the concept of **Palikoodam**, i.e. setting up a school alongside every parish church.

Sudan (Capital: Khartoum)

- Political boundaries: Shares borders with seven countries (Libya, Egypt, Chad, Central African Republic, South Sudan, Ethiopia and Eritrea).
 - ➤ In 2011, **South Sudan was separated** from Sudan.
- Geographical features
 - > White and Blue Niles meet in Khartoum and merge to become the Nile River.
 - > Sahelian belt (semiarid region extending from Senegal eastward to Sudan) with the desert in the far north and fertile land in the Nile valleys.
 - > Bounded on the:
 - > West by the Nile-Congo watershed and the highlands of Darfur plateau.
 - > East by the Ethiopian Plateau and the Red Sea Hills.

Pangong Tso

- China is building a new bridge on Pangong Tso.
- Location: In eastern Ladakh
- Salient features
 - Situated at a height of almost 4350 m, it is the world's highest saltwater lake.
 - > Derives its name from the Tibetan word, "Pangong Tso", which means "high grassland lake.
 - > One-third of the Pangong Lake lies in India and the other two-thirds in China.
 - > It is not part of Indus river basin area and geographically a separate land locked river basin.
 - Khurnak Fort lies on the northern bank of the lake.
 - > Contested area of the lake is divided into 8 Fingers with India claiming territory up to Finger 8.



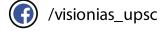


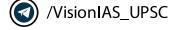
