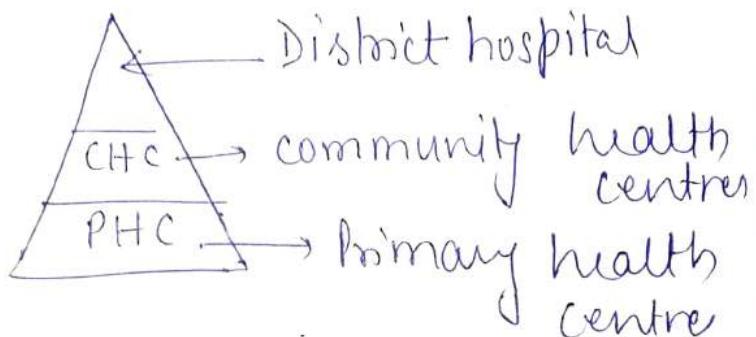

Steps that can be taken

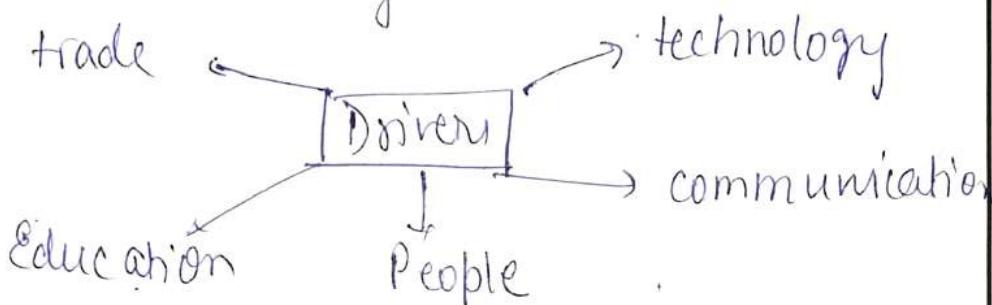
- ① Raise public expenditure to 6% of GDP - 2/3rd should go to PHC

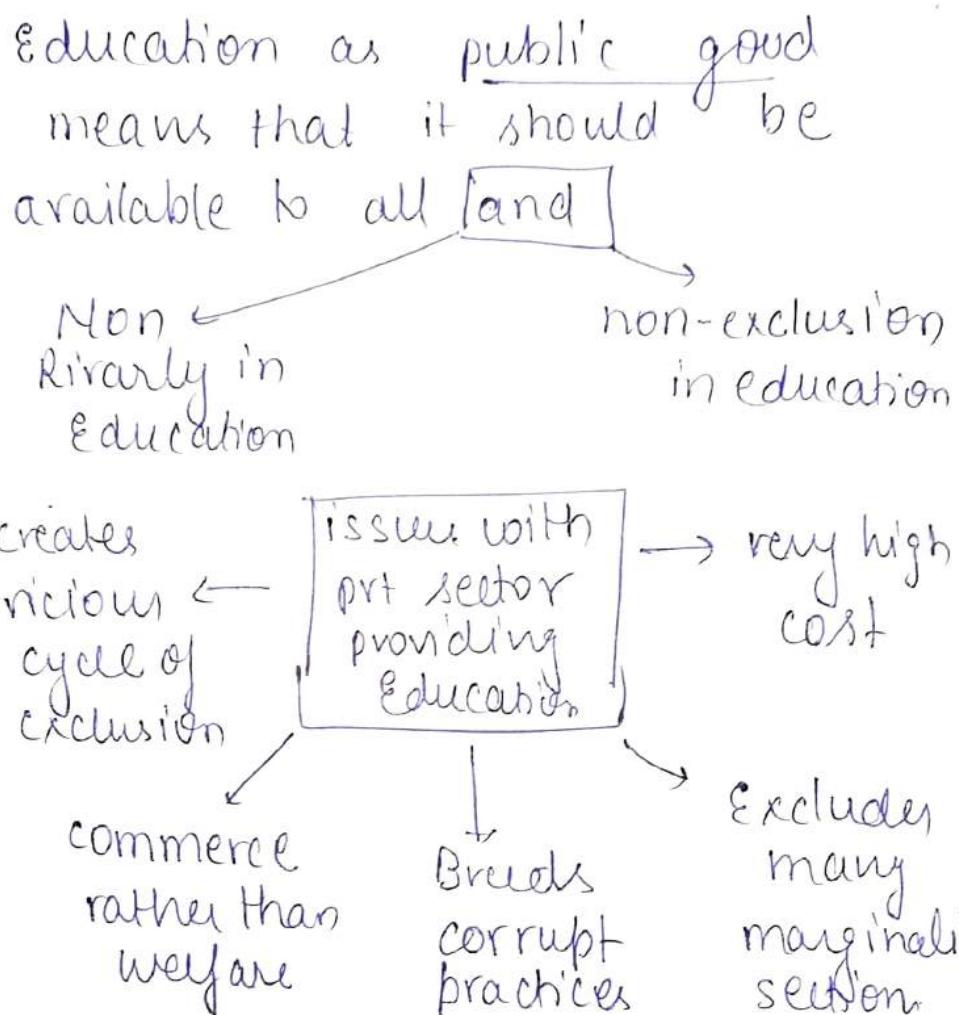

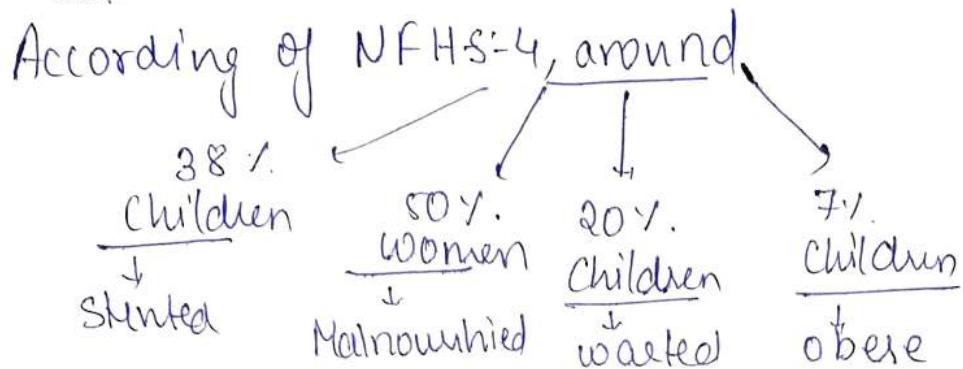

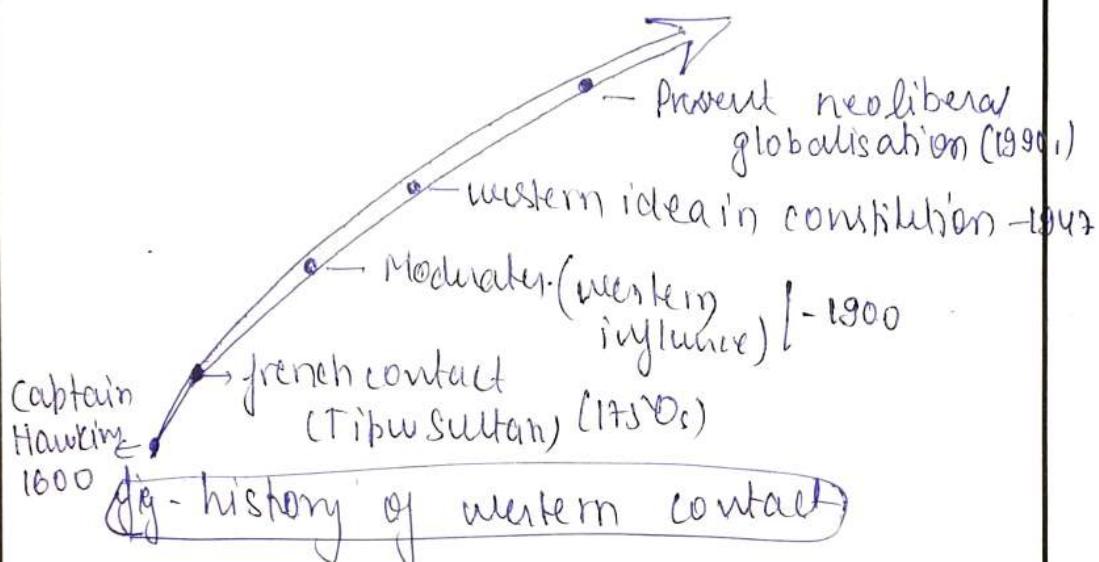

However, there are many differences between caste and ~~caste~~ race.

- ① caste is based on ritual hierarchy while race is based on conventional hierarchy

- ③ No legal/constitutional recognition to race, but caste has legal recognition
- ④ Racial difference is a natural phenomenon, caste difference is not natural but created by humans.

Population growth trend in last few decades

1960s → high population growth rate

1970-80s → total fertility rate (TFR) decreased due to actions by Indira govt

1990s → population increased but TFR decreased

2020s → current TFR ~ 2.24 expected to reach replacement level by 2021

Other trends

- Youth population (15-45) years largest share
- Working age population $\sim 60\%$.
- Old age population increasing $\sim 8\%$.
- More TFR in poorer states such as Bihar (3.4)

Reasons behind such trends

- ① Earlier years \rightarrow not much awareness on family planning, hence resulted in population explosion.
- ② National population policy 1976, 1994, 2000 \rightarrow focused on family planning \rightarrow so TFR progressively reduced.

- ③ poorer states in Hiholi belt have less literacy hence high TFR.
- ④ literate southern states have already achieved Replacement rates.
- ⑤ Emergence of ASHAs, ANMs resulted into more awareness on family planning.

Way forward

- ① Empower ANMs, ASHAs, Anganwadiis and home-delivery of contraceptives.
- ② Population control as a subject in school curriculum.
- ③ Special focus on high TFR regions in North Bihar is needed.

Hence, a pro poor, pro women pro nature population strategy would help India to achieve an optimal level of population.

Caste system is the derivation of Ancient Varna system and today considered as 'mosaic' of Indian society'



Historically → Caste was feature only of Hindu society.

Present → Caste is found in all major religions.

Caste in ~~other~~ Religions

[A] Hinduism

- chaturvarna system
- many sub caste emerged due to accommodation, assimilation (Hunas invaders became Rajputs)

[B] Islam

- Islam believed in equality within Religion
- Under influence of Hinduism, many caste emerged
 - Ashraf → original muslims from foreign
 - Ajlaf → local converts
 - others
 - sheikhs
 - Siddiqui
 - Ahmadiyas.

[C] Buddhism

→ although buddhism doesn't recognise caste system, but social stratification is present.

[D] - sikhism

→ some type of social division exist among Sikhs -
eg- Nihangas, Nomadhanis, etc

Hence, Caste like social stratification is present in India across religious distinctions.

19. Domestic servants are one unique group of workers in modern India, which ① is ubiquitous but remains invisible. Indicate the challenges faced by this section of workers. Also, discuss the factors that contribute to these challenges and suggest measures to address them. (250 words) 15

Domestic servants have become important group of workers in modern India due to changing lifestyles.

Reasons of rise in domestic workers

- traditional connections
- rise of nuclear families
- women becoming more aware
- need of more income - hence both parents work in cities.

Why Invisible

- No legal identification given
- Based on oral contracts
- dispersed across India hence no organisational strength.

Challenges of domestic workers

- ① they are more vulnerable to exploitation due to unregulated nature of job.
- ② less wage - only for subsistence
- ③ Sexual harassment is a new challenge
- ④ less job security.
- ⑤ often harassed on accusation of burglary.

Reasons/factors of these challenges

- ① oral contract - hence no job security
- ② No organisational strength, hence no bargaining power in fixing wages
- ③ lack of any legal/institutional grievance redressal mechanism.

- ④ unregulated hours of working
due to absence of laws like
Code of workers act
- ⑤ Informal, unorganised form
of employment

(Steps that can be taken)

- ① Establish "commission of domestic workers" to formulate plan for their working conditions
- ② One stop centre for grievance redressal
- ③ make written contract mandatory
- ④ fix minimum wage per hour basis.
- ⑤ separate judicial mechanism for speedy hearing on sexual harassment cases

Welfare of domestic workers is important to implement Right to life and ensure human dignity.

20. Highlight the need and challenges of mainstreaming vocational education in India. What measures have been taken by the government in this regard? (250 words) 15

भारत में व्यावसायिक शिक्षा को मुख्यधारा में लाने की आवश्यकता और चुनौतियों पर प्रकाश डालिए। इस मंदिर में सरकार द्वारा क्या उपाय किए गए हैं?

According to NITI aayog, only 22% of population in India is formally trained.

This highlights the need of vocational education and formal training.

- ① to harness demographic dividend
- ② promote market oriented career path
- Need → ③ to promote entrepreneurship in knowledge economy
- ④ traditional courses have become less relevant with changing time
- ⑤ solve issue of unemployment, skill gap, joblessness.

However, mainstream vocational education presents many challenges

- ① low aspirational value of vocational education
- ② social taboo against vocational edu
- ③ Poor vertical-mobility structure
(from-school→college-job)
- ④ lack of standard curricula which is uniform across India,
- ⑤ All colleges don't have sufficient resources to promote vocational education.
- ⑥ shortage of faculties, poor infrastructure

(Measures taken by India)

- ① established vocational institutes like ITIs, across India.

- ② Included vocational curriculum resources on Swayam Prabha, E-Pathshala
- ③ New Educational policy
 - ↳ focused on increasing aspirational value of vocational edu
 - ↳ More flexibility to students in schools, colleges in choosing subjects

Way forward

- ① Need to promote Industry-academia linkage (Niti-aayog)
- ② Attract CSR, NRI funding towards vocational education (Niti-aayog India@75 report)
- ③ Awareness generation about career opportunities
- ④ Develop, standard curriculum, uniform
- ⑤ Set up independent skill assessment board (Niti-aayog 3-year action agenda)
Vocational education needs to be brought into mainstream to harness our demographic dividend.
