- Ancient Indians have left behind the rich heritage of cave architecture which are not only depiction of beauty but also exemplary form of strength.

The cave architecture was developed during the different point of time showing ~~tem~~ cultural, religious, social aspects of the contemporary period.

Barabar Caves built by Ashoka depicts the beautiful arches as well as also represents religious tolerant policy of him.

Chaityas & Viharas are the peak illustrations of cave architecture. They are ^{mostly} found in stable and strong western ghats which led to their presence even after thousand years. e.g. Karla, Bhaja Caves

Ajanta & Ellora caves are famous for engraved sculptures, in-built stupas, various paintings which show the traditions & customs of religions to which they belong. Moreover, they ~~exam~~ creation of Kailasha temple shows the richness of structural engineering along with artistry during those times.

The ~~blend~~ blend of beauty & strength is also found in later built cave temples of S. India.

2. While the Battle of Plassey laid the foundation of British Empire in India, it was the Battle of Buxar that proved to be the turning point of British fortunes in India. Discuss. (150 WORDS) 10

The expansionist motives of British East India company ^(EIC) had ~~was~~ come forward after the Battle of Plassey in 1757. ~~But~~ However, their ^{desire of} political control of Indian subcontinent got ~~true~~ realised after the Battle of Buxar in 1858.

The Battle of Plassey (1757) was fought between Bengal Nawab Siraj Uddaula & ^{British} EIC due to conflict over commercial interests and exemptions to British colonies. British EIC wanted to remove the hurdles in the path of their colonial exploitation. Yet, due to domestic

conflicts of Siraj Uddaula with Mir Jaffer led to EIC to establish ^{its} political control over Bengal which ~~know~~ led to foundation of British Empire.

However, Battle of Buxar was fought between the Bengal Nawab Mir Qasim and EIC. Precursor to this, British got aware the necessity to possess strong foothold to avoid any political conflicts in their commercial activities.

Also, Battle of Wandiwash (1760) has raised confidence of British EIC and to avoid any ^{other} European interference,

British EIC formed the system of dual government. This system left Indian rulers with no power and British colonialism expand its form to imperialism.

3. Among many novel methods and themes, the Swadeshi Movement laid great emphasis not only on boycott but also on self-reliance. Discuss.

Swadeshi Movement in 1905 was the first massive outbreak of voice of Indians against British

government. It differed from the earlier modes of ^{passive} agitations like prayer, protest, petition of moderates.

Due to participation of wide public and large reach in the India, the movement has shown many new models & themes of protest.

During 1906 session of Congress at Calcutta, Congress has adopted the other 4-point program - Swarajya, Swadeshi, Boycott, National Education.

'swarajya' was ~~pres~~ put forward first time by the Indians. The urge of self-government was given voice. Foreign goods like cloth, liquor, salt were boycotted and the pursuit of swadeshi (Indigenous) was emphasized.

This led to establishment of Indian fir factories of cloth and other goods. To promote this initiatives, Indian research institutions were established.

Anushilan committee sent some youth scholars to Russia, Japan to learn and gain new scientific knowledge.

The record no. of national education institutions were opened and the emphasis of on study of Indian literature were given.

In the sphere of art & culture too, ~~many~~ Indian art form were revived

4. The idea of linguistic states predated independence, however it took some time even after independence for this idea to be implemented. Discuss.

The formation of states on the basis of language ~~is~~ discourse ~~not~~ after of pre-independence, especially during ~~to~~ various Congress sessions. It was specifically came forward during, when Mahatma Gandhi formed congress committees on linguistic basis in provinces during 1920.

In the congress session of 1931 at Karachi, linguistic states formation was reiterated.

Yet, the realisation of linguistic states took a longer than expected after independence. There are many reasons which were hurdles like -

- ① Partition on the basis of religion -
 The partition of India haunted the national leaders with the fear of Balkanisation on the basis of language.
- ② Negative reports of various committees
 The committees like Dhar committee, JVP committee were against the formation of states on the basis of language.
- ③ Nature - Fazal Ali commission (1953)
 was against 'One language, one state' demand of people. This led to ~~the~~ formation of multilingual states like Bombay, PEPSU.
- ④ Other priorities -
 New Born Indian state had many socio-economic challenges like poverty, communal riots as well as stability of democratic polity.

5. Dr. B. R. Ambedkar understood that persistent inequalities pose fundamental challenges to the economic and social well-being of the nation and people. In this context, discuss the key contributions of Dr. Ambedkar in the history of modern India. **(150 WORDS) 10**

- Dr. B.R. Ambedkar was not only the ^{academic} scholar but also the empathic keen observer of socio-economic conditions of depressed & backward section of the India. His own experiences and the scholarly wisdom helped him to dissent against the oppressions of such people.

According to him, political equality offered by our democracy has no meaning without attaining social & economic equality.

He In 1920s, he led the Mahar movement which allowed the untouchables the access of public ponds. This movement inspired many other in ^{whole} country later.

He had ~~g~~ been giving many petitions to British government to give equal opportunity to backward classes in realm of education, appointment and political representation.

Due to his efforts, & after a round table conferences, In 1935 ^{GOI} Act, reservation of seats to depressed classes.

He also formed the political party - 'Republican party of India', 'Scheduled Caste Federation' to give an organised ~~of~~ form of movement.

He started the daily Bahishkar Bharat' and wrote many books & articles to point out socio-economic disparities and evil in the Indian society.

He wished to put on dynamite to Vedas and ancient literature to dissent their authority in Indian society.

6. It has been pointed out that in recent times, while the proportional share of nuclear households has dipped in urban areas it has risen in rural areas. Analyse the reasons behind this trend. (150 WORDS) 10

(1) Migration -

Earlier migrated nuclear family in urban area need their older

parents to support their family in terms of care of babies, household work due to two wage earners.

(2) ~~Opposite~~ to above argument, some families left nuclearised due to migration of younger ones leaving behind the older generation in villages.

(3) ^{Less} Productivity of agriculture has led to fr dispute in families leading to land fragmentation and family breakups.

With the socio-economic ~~devel~~ empowerment and self-realisation among women, the rise in cases of separation and divorces are visible in the society. However, separation exceeds divorces which is a thing of serious concern for women for their further life.

Reasons -

- (1) The expectations of families to get matter sort out during course of time.
- (a) The requirement of various divorce acts for the legal separation of certain years. varying from six months to 2 yrs.

(3) Hesitating approach of husband to prolong the cases due to demands of alimony or custody of children.

(4) Long negotiating/mediating period taken by other stakeholders like family courts, NIGO counsellors etc.

(5) Pendency in family courts.

We find the striking differences in divorce rates between diff. regions due to -

(1) Education of women.

Highly women literate state show higher trend of divorce. esp. northern states lag

(2) Population of various religion in region.

The divorce rates differ acc. to religion. Thus, trend differ according to population of composition.

(3) Tribal states are liberal with regard to women rights

- The dust storm is an atmospheric phenomenon which contain storm short of moisture and aggravated by dust particles. The phenomenon has been increasing in areas esp. Northern states like Rajasthan, Haryana, Delhi etc.

The reasons behind increased

frequency are -

- (1) Intense summer season

The ^{unusual} temperature increase in air led to increase in moisture holding capacity of air. However, the supply of moisture was less in land-dominant area.

- (2) supply of dust

The area with plain topography led to as well as desert led to supply of sand, soil particles.

Also, polluting particles like ash, PM are available due to increasing pollution activities

(3) Removal Western disturbance

In upper layer of atmosphere, western disturbances drive to mechanism of storm formation.

(4) Deforestation

The aggravated disappearance of trees has led to freeing of soil and strengthening of dust storm.

(5) Decreasing rain

As air does not get saturated, absence of rain

led to unsettlement of dust.

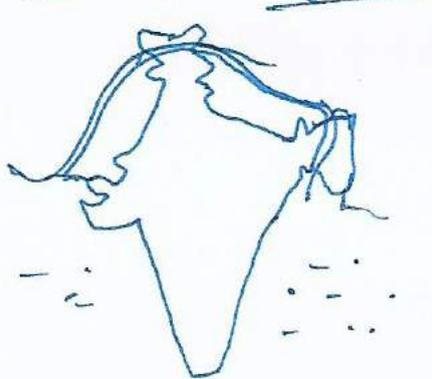

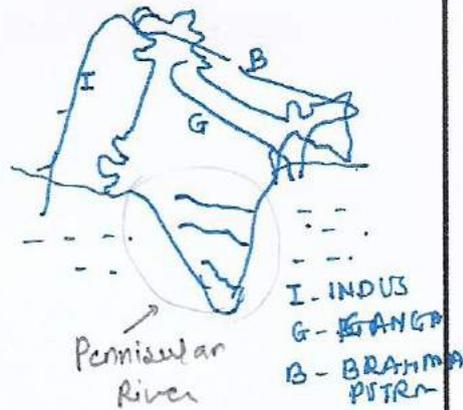
- The Indo- Ganga- Brahmaputra & peninsular rivers drainage system of Indian sub-continent has been a boon for the people living in here.

With the advent of 1st century, the schools of Arts like Gandhara, Mathura and Amravati were developed as the prominent Buddhist Art forms.

They were found in various locations of Indian subcontinent as rich sculptural & architectural styles.

Following are the distinctive features among these 3 schools

(1) Regions of developments

Gandhara Art was developed in North-western part of India till ^{present} N - Afghanistan. This art was promoted under the reigns of Kushanas

While Mathura school of Art was developed in North India under the local smaller kingdoms

Amravati school of Art was developed under the Andhras & Satvahans.

(2) Prominent Art

While Gandhara & Mathura school of Art were prominent in sculptures of human form of Buddha under influence of Mahayana school; Amravati school shows prominence in built construction of stupas showing ~~prom~~ influence of Hinyana thought of Buddhism.

(3) Style of Art in Buddha sculpture:

Gandhara school was eraggressive in sculpting the rich elements of Buddhism for e.g. curly hair, wearing of jewellery etc.

Mathura school of Art shows
ascetic features of Buddha

In Gandhara Art, & Mathura
art, the Hasta Mudras of Buddha
are different.

(4) Use of Material

While Gandhara school use
the grey sandstone, Mathura
artists remain heavily dependent
upon red sandstone.

In Amravarati school, the
stupas were mainly built in the
white marble.

(5) Development of later arts -

During ~~After~~ the Gupta times,
the Gandhara & Mathura school
lag behind due to Hindu-religious
domination in architecture.

British East India Company (EIC)

has gained control over large part

of India gaining benefits of drain of wealth.

Along with ~~them~~ EIC, christian missionaries were allowed to travel to India by Charter Act of 1813,

The christian missionaries had the motive to civilise the barbaric natives by ~~attain~~ proliferation of christian religion. It was called as 'providential mission'. To get more legitimacy, missionaries propounded that the rule of British is boon for natives

• The British EIC sought these missionaries required for their strong foothold through proliferation of religion. British government gave them concessions to achieve legitimacy in the minds of natives

by picturising 'civilising mission' as eternal.

Through this mission, British wanted to change the natives to adopt the customs & norms of west so that. ~~the~~ It would help them to make an impression in mind of Indians that the European Christian culture is superior & advancing while native is inferior & retreating.

The ^{another} motive behind this was to create clerks & subordinate staff in the administration by English education thr^r missionary schools as well as expansion of western culture.

The legal support through ^{disabilities} religious act (was also given to converted natives.

Though the British were not

impressive in religious propagation,

- Jawaharlal Nehru & Mahatma Gandhi

were prominent national leaders in making of India of today along with freedom struggle. Though both were close associates there were many differences in their ideology. esp with respect to state & its control.

(1) Nehru was liberal socialist supporting the ~~the~~ imperativeness of existence of state while Gandhi was anarchist. According to Gandhi, 'State is unnecessary evil'

(2) Nehru was supportive of the opinion that the state is must for socio-economic development of people.

Whereas due to ardent faith in masses, Gandhi was propounding the village co-operatives, ~~small~~ and associations at grass-root level for their economic upliftment.

(3) Nehru opined that state should control heavy industries and led ~~to~~ in the establishment of same.

While Gandhi was against heavy industries due to unemployment it may cause. He gave importance small & rural industries.

(4) ~~Achru~~ According to Nehru, state is protector of rights of citizens. while the respecting of others rights was moral duty in eyes of Gandhi.

Thus Gandhi's concept of rights was moral & relative.
not legal

(5) For Nehru, use of force is necessary by state to maintain law & order. For Gandhi, state is cruel thing suppressing the soul of individual.

Though the views these two leaders were different in ideological point of view, they prosper for betterment of people. The blend of their views can be seen in the ~~new~~ Constitution of India.

14. Enumerating the reasons behind Sino-Soviet split in the second half of the 20th century, analyse its impact on the Cold War. (250 WORDS) 15

- The sino-soviet split in 1956 was due to ideological differences between ~~PR~~ People's Republic of China and USSR. Though both were communist countries, the interpretation of communism ~~led~~ ^{became} to ~~point~~ cause of split between them.

Reasons -

- (1) Destalinization policy of USSR -

The regime of Nikita Khrushchev adopted the policy of 'peaceful coexistence' with capitalist west.

This was opposed by the PRC under the leadership of Mao Zedong.

- (2) Influence over newly independent asian countries.
- (3) Different approaches by leadership-
While Nikita Khrushchev of USSR was accommodative in global realm, Mao was apprehensive about expansion of communism on his lines
- (4) Veto exercised by USSR in United Nations Security Council differing to China.

Effects on cold-war.

- (1) In the future conflict of US-USSR, China didn't support openly to USSR.

- (2) Rather china came ~~to~~ closer to USA to develop economic relations & china's economic development.
- (3) Theatres of cold war were specifically in asian region esp. Indo-china region where china remain neutral led to retreating of USSR.
- (4) ~~After~~ ^{In} 1970s, china started liberalizing its economy which led to USSR being only torch-bearer of communism in true spirit.

Thus weakening of USSR & its experiment of communism & became dead policy, the one of reason ~~of~~ ^{is} china's neutrality.

② Black soil -

- This soil found basaltic regions of Deccan
- Rich in potash & poor in phosphorus
- cotton cultivation due to water holding capacity
- Also food crops like jowar, oilseeds.

③ Red & yellow soil

- High iron content
- poor in ~~be~~ potassium & phosphorus

- can be improved by adding nutrients

(4) Saline soil -

- soil salinity has become problem in the areas of green revolution
- quality can be improved by addition of Gypsum.

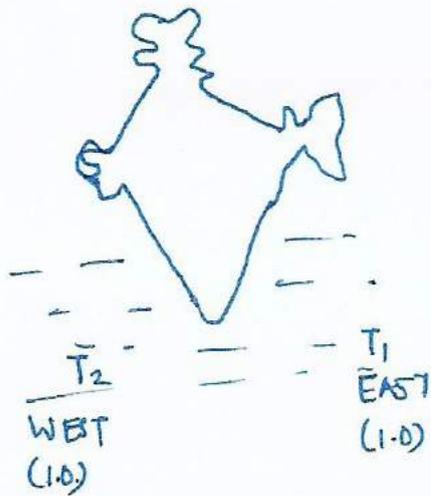

① Polar stratospheric clouds ✓ (PSC)

② - At equatorial region

- In the season of spring, there is cloud formation over polar region in stratosphere.

- such clouds are not found in equatorial region.

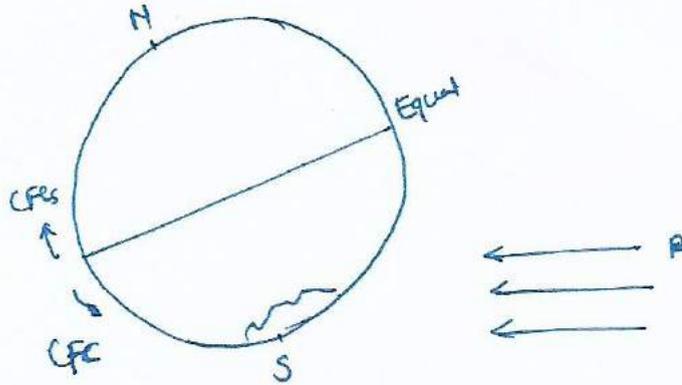
- CFCs are blown away with wind towards poles

- These clouds provide base to CFC to react with atmospheric ozone & break it into oxygen molecules.

② Antarctic region -

→ Antarctic is surrounded by ocean which supplies ~~to~~ the moisture for cloud formation
→ Albedo of ice led to reflection of sun rays in atmosphere leading to rise in temperature & favourable condⁿ for cloud formation.

③ spring season - initiates the vapourisatⁿ of sea water as well as melted ice of Antarctica.
