





COVID-19 in Whatcom County, by School District Recent Two Week Case Rates & Cumulative Counts





WHATCOM COUNTY HOSPITALIZATION COUNTS





LOGISTICS

- Continuing to provide support and supplies to Byron Avenue I/Q facility.
- 2. Creating an inventory and monitoring system to streamline ordering of consumable supplies for the Byron Avenue I/Q facility.
- 3. Continuing to research and compile sourcing options for PPE and connecting customers directly to distributors on our supply list, when feasible.
- 4. Continuing to interact with the State for meeting PPE requirements.
- 5. Continuing to support staffing for ongoing, weekly food distribution efforts.
- 6. Providing resources, support, and volunteer staffing needed for the Whatcom County Health Department's COVID-19 mobile testing program.
- 7. Continuing to follow up and report to the State on successful distribution of adult cloth masks to vulnerable populations by partner agencies.
- 8. Assembling and distributing new supply totes for the Whatcom County Health Department's COVID-19 mobile testing program, while collecting and removing used supply totes on Tuesdays.

OPERATIONS

- 1. Supporting Wednesday's scheduled food stocking efforts and providing traffic control support during scheduled food distribution efforts.
- 2. Continuing operations of the Byron Avenue I/Q facility with the admittance of community members needing isolation/quarantine. Currently, 12 rooms are occupied.
- 3. Working in partnership with the Whatcom County Health Department to support the mobile COVID-19 testing program.
- 4. Reviewing the operations plan submitted by the Whatcom County Health Department's COVID-19 mobile testing program.

PLANNING

- 1. Continue to coordinate with the Healthcare Coalition to monitor regional planning for COVID-19 medical surge and medical isolation/quarantine facilities.
- 2. Working in collaboration with members of the Whatcom County Health Department and local healthcare professionals on management and dissemination of COVID-19 data and tracking of disease models.
- 3. Working in collaboration with the Logistics section to expand the pool of volunteers being utilized for volunteer staffing.
- 4. Assisting in transitioning the Salvation Army food distribution program over to a sustainable model.
- 5. Providing feedback on the operations plan submitted this weekend for the Whatcom County Health Department's COVID-19 mobile testing program.
