Acts 2:37–39

Big Idea:

Because God's promise is for us and for our children, the church must learn to worship as one covenant family across generations.

I. The Promise Comes to Sinners

A. Peter's hearers are cut to the heart.

B. Peter calls them to repentance and points them to forgiveness in Christ.

C. The church is a people created by grace, not by spiritual maturity or worthiness.

II. The Heart That God Gives

A. Peter says, "The promise is for you and for your children."

B. The children of believers are not outsiders to the life of God's people.

C. Children learn worship by being among the worshiping church.

III. The Wisdom That Flows from a Renewed Heart

- A. God's promise moves outward to the nations.
- B. The gospel gathers people across languages, cultures, and generations.
- C. Our multilingual church displays the wideness of God's promise.

IV. The Promise Creates a Worshiping Family

- A. Worship is not a polished adult performance.
- B. Children need both age-level teaching and whole-church worship.
- C. Parents, children, young adults, and the whole church share in the discipleship of the next generation.

Let us worship like **Acts 2:39** is true:

The promise is for all whom the Lord our God calls to Himself.
