Explain that each session has time for physical activity at the beginning and end as a warm-up and cool down. State that these exercises can improve strength, balance, and flexibility.			
Encourage all to join at a level that is comfortable: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> State that participation is voluntary and it is okay to sit out if you have a physical condition that prevents you from exercising. 			
Pass out <i>Handout 1b, Session 1 Exercises</i> and lead participants by demonstrating each exercise and inviting everyone to follow along: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Walking in Place Leg Curls Upper Body Twists Bicep Curls

Welcome participants <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Introduce yourself and your program 			
Explain that this is the first of 4 sessions and today is about identifying ways to set and reach your goals, step by step.			
Get to know each other by stating name and sharing a recent personal goal you have set.			
State the purpose of today's lesson: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> To eat more F/V To get more physical activity

<p>Explain that the <i>Eat Smart, Live Strong</i> program focuses on 2 important behaviors that health experts recommend to improve health and well-being at all ages:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Eat at least 3½ cups F/V every day. • Participate in at least 30 minutes of moderate-intensity physical activity most days. 			
<p>State that the amount of F/V for any person depends on activity level, age, and gender. Older adults need:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 1½ cups from fruit • 2 cups from vegetables 			
<p>Ask participants to name benefits of eating F/V every day. Ensure the following are mentioned:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Get vitamins, minerals, and fiber needed for good health • Maintain regularity • Help prevent or delay effects of chronic conditions such as obesity, diabetes, hypertension, and heart disease • Add color, taste, and variety to diet 			
<p>Ask participants to list ways they can be physically active. Be sure to include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Walking briskly • Mowing the lawn • Aerobics • Weight lifting • Jogging • Dancing • Swimming • Stationary cycling • Active walking or running with grandchildren 			
<p>Discuss benefits of engaging in 30 minutes of physical activity most days. Mention the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Help prevent or delay effects of chronic disease • Feel better • Decrease mild stress, anxiety, and depression • Build and maintain healthy bones, muscles, and joints • Improve strength

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Increase balance and reduce risk of falling • Improve sleep

Invite participants to talk about the recommendations and ask: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Is this something you think you can do? Why or why not? • What makes it hard for you to eat more F/V? • What makes it hard for you to get enough exercise? 			
Stress that every little bit helps, making small Changes can make a big difference.

Apply - Skill Building Activity	Yes	No	Comments and/or Changes
Prepare 1 cup samples of a variety of fruits and vegetables. Show what 1 cup of F/V looks like. Pass examples around and encourage discussion by asking: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Which of these measures surprises you? • How many (grapes, berries, carrots, green beans) are in 1 cup? • How do you estimate 1 cup of fruit or vegetable? 			
<u>Activity: How Did I Do Yesterday?</u> Set the samples in a place where people can see them as they record what they ate yesterday. Distribute <i>Handout 1c, How Did I Do Yesterday?</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Help participants identify how many F/V they are currently eating • Have participants share how many cups of F/V they reported eating yesterday. 			
Refer to the physical activity list created earlier. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ask people to record number of minutes they participated in physical activity yesterday. • Have a discussion about exercising. What are the advantages? 			
Ask participants to report how many minutes they exercised yesterday. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Have everyone stand, ask people to sit if they exercised less than 10 minutes, 20 minutes, 30 minutes. ○ Congratulate those who exercised 30 minutes or more.

<u>Goal setting:</u> Distribute and discuss <i>Handout 1a, Set Your Goals</i>			
Have participants set a goal for this week using the handout. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Discuss new ways to eat fruit and vegetables ○ Have participants share goals with group ○ Have each participant compare goals to what they ate the day before. ○ Discuss importance of variety and color in choosing fruits and vegetables. ○ Encourage participants to try new kinds of f/v. ○ Help participants set goals for physical activity. ○ Give participants a few minutes to share goals. 			
Encourage participants to take handout home and record progress throughout the week.			
<u>Challenges to reaching goals:</u> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Have participants share challenges they might face reaching their goals. • Discuss obstacles that older adults face and how to overcome these (optional). • Talk about how to eat more F/V on a limited budget. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Participate in SNAP ✓ Enroll in Senior Farmers Markets voucher program ✓ Choose produce in season ✓ Use local Food Distribution programs ✓ Purchase dried, frozen, or canned f/v on sale. ✓ Use SNAP benefits to purchase seeds and grow a garden. • Talk about how time is a barrier to achieving physical activity goals and brainstorm ways to include exercise in daily routine.
