

## Prophets, Pipelines and Palestinians by Rev. Dr. Ross Lockhart

As your Pastor I enjoy meeting you in various locations around the community whether it is the coffee shop, the grocery store aisle, the play park, the rec centre or the seawall. Whenever I meet church members downtown over a meal I usually get around to inquiring about professional life by asking, "What's your business?" The answers are as varied as you can imagine - mining, investments, law, banking, and so forth. My follow up question is then, "How's business?" That question leads us deeper into the challenges and successes of their professional life.

Earlier this summer the General Council of our United Church of Canada met in Ottawa and made what some would call prophetic stands against various political issues from pipelines in Alberta to the treatment of Palestinians in the middle east. Many folks asked me what "business" the church had in making statements on these various political issues. While I was furious at a lot of what I observed this summer at General Council, I affirm the need for any Christian group to be prophetic when it comes to the gospel critiquing culture. But perhaps the most helpful way to respond is to turn my usual business question on the

church. I would be very, very interested to hear the response of my ministerial colleagues (including those who attended General Council) if asked, "What's your business as a church?"

For a long time my response has been grounded in the foundational statement of our Church of Scotland ancestors who declared in response to the question, "What is the chief aim of humankind?" - "To glorify God and enjoy Him forever." Isn't that lovely? What's our business? To glorify God and enjoy Him forever. As Christians we glorify God through proclaiming Jesus crucified and risen, our judge and our hope. We live out this calling through a commitment to the Great Commandment (love God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength and love your neighbour as yourself) and the Great Commission (baptise all nations in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit). And then comes the next question, "How's business?" I watched online for many days this summer waiting for a thoughtful and thorough debate on "How's business?" in the United Church of Canada but it never came. While commissionaires to General Council passed a variety of motions that will be swatted off the

desk of the first low level bureaucrat in Ottawa, we missed a critical opportunity to ask "How's business?" In fact, I don't think we missed that opportunity by chance. I think we avoided the question on purpose. It appears to be much easier to wade into Middle East politics than it is to do evangelism and church growth here in Canada. Seeing as the stats are clear - the United Church of Canada is closing a congregation a week – you would think that alarm bells would be going off at the national level. Indeed, if we treated our General Council like a shareholders meeting we would fire everyone at the national level for leading an organization in numeric decline since the mid-1960s. Oh, I know, I've heard all the arguments before...we're better off smaller, we're more faithful now than before, etc. Sadly though, most folks I've bumped into with this logic are cloaking failure in the language of faithfulness. No, the prophetic and the pastoral must go hand in hand. We must earn the right to be heard in Canadian society through our acts of love and mercy.

Which then leads us back to the questions at hand, "What's your business and how's business?"

I say unusual because I'm used to welcoming quiet and shy children on the first day of any given camp. But not this year! The 32 children signed up, our largest group yet, arrived eager, filled with excitement and wonder, and ready for what was another great week!

Through all the silliness, through all the games, and through all the teachable moments with the children, what struck me this year



was the addition of a large crew of teens who infused the program in every area with their youthful energy. What I find most exciting is that these teens represent some of the first fruit that grows when a congregation infuses new life into its children and youth ministries. Some of these young volunteers were much younger when I started working at West Vancouver United Church in early 2010. Others had yet to make their way into our community's loving embrace! To see young leaders emerging and modeling a curious, energetic, and authentic life of faith to younger children is such an inspiring image.

## Kenya 2013 by Julie Walsh

As it is with so many projects in the 3<sup>rd</sup> world, it all comes down to money. I know I have the time and energy but raising my goal of \$10,000.00 has been and is going to be a struggle.

The project is a school in the small village of Kanyawegi, Kenya where the roads are dirt (mud when it rains). Homes are small, many made of mud and thatch,. The bathrooms are outhouses, The cooktops are open fires in huts. The water, for the most part, comes from a deep hole in the ground and is carried in large buckets on top of children's heads for at least a mile. There are no stores. no hospital, and no internet. The people grow mostly corn which they sell to the mill and buy back for food.

Our goal in 2011 was to start a garden. It was a struggle, and continues to be so, to change the way people think about food. Our hope was to introduce new vegetables and fruits and encourage the local people to plant and harvest their own food. We started with the school. Now that the Oyiengo School is built and running at capacity, we introduced fruit trees. The children helped dig up the clay soil, created compost and planted the small trees that would one day bear fruit. Happily, in one year they are eating the bananas and papayas already. With the trees, we installed water tanks that



would provide the trees with water long after the rainy season as well as drinking water for the children.

Many people have asked me about my trip in the last year and the one question that haunts me is 'don't you want to just bring them all home?' The answer is no. These people have a rich culture. They have skills that I will never master....anyone know the process of making a rope? I do, but not well. I have learned to respect their way of life. My goal is to help relieve some unnecessary burdens that continue to cause hardship, sickness and death. I would like to enrich rather than change their lives. There will be some children that will leave the village in pursuit of higher education. I want to start a scholarship fund to help the best and the brightest not only reach for their star but to return and enhance their community. I would like to build a 'shop' where young people can learn from their elders how to work with wood or metal or maybe become an electrician! Many would love to have a venue where they can create art work that would reflect their culture and talent but this has sadly been removed

from the school curriculum. These opportunities and skills are desperately lacking in this community.

The biggest issue is and has been AIDS. Although the children are learning about the transmission of the HIV virus, culturally girls are still very much 2<sup>nd</sup> class citizens and are very vulnerable. Few complete high school. Many have babies by the age of 14 and are left to fend for themselves. Others will go to the big cities and end up in the slums. When virtually a whole generation of parents died and left their children behind, much of the progress and future promise died with them. Education is their wav out.

My hopes for Kanyawegi are huge. It is a community with rich human resources but few material ones. I dream of the day when each person has access to good nutrition, education and health care. I dream of the day when the girls have the

same opportunities as the boys. I dream of the day when the child with artistic talent has the materials needed to express him or herself. I have a dream that the bright young people will leave for higher education and training and will return with their new knowledge and skills because Kanyawegi is a good place to live.

I am grateful to my neighbours, the congregation of West Van United, my friends and especially my family for supporting my crazy ambition and fundraising. They have dropped off bottles (I am the bottle lady of my neighbourhood), donated cash, potted plants for my plant sales, listened to my endless stories and generally encouraged my dream. It is a dream. Thanks Mum for taking me to see 'Born Free' when I was 7....the seed was planted.

June 2013....here I come!


Parents, children, grandparents, concerned adults are

## **Book Review:**



Bowen, John P. Growing Up Christian: Why Young People Stay in Church, Leave Church and (Sometimes) Come Back to Church. Vancouver: Regent College Publishing, 2010.

Recently a member of our church provided me with an excellent study of youth and young adults in Canadian society and their views on religion. The report, commissioned by an Evangelical Christian organization, clearly sounded alarm bells on the future of young people and the Christian church. This, of course, is not new news in the mainline protestant churches in Canada. For decades now we have been struggling to connect with younger people and it has become a successful focus of our ministry here at West Vancouver United Church. Despite our growth in children, teen and family ministry over the last few years we must endeavour to keep the question of how the next generations connect with the gospel of Jesus Christ. To that end, I am happy to recommend a former professor of mine at the University of Toronto's new book on this topic. John Bowen, a lovely soft spoken Welshmen who has the title "Professor of Evangelism" at Wycliffe College, U of T, has produced a book on the subject of young adults and the church. Through research, and personal ministry experience, John offers both an assessment and a prescription for the road ahead. I look forward to hearing your thoughts on this book....Rev. Ross.
